Niles residents in the Ransom Ridge area have been battling with Commonwealth Edison officials over the frequent power outages in their neighborhood seeking to rectify the problem, but they say action has been slow on the part of the company.

Ransom Ridge, a sub-division of single-family homes located in the area west of Greenwood Ave.

and Normal St., has been experiencing power outages for about six weeks, residents claim. Joan Fredrickson, 8332 Knight, noted residents don't know from "one day to the next" whether the electricity will go off. "It's aggravating. We have repeatedly called Com-Ed, but all they say is they are working on the problem."

News-caster Ted Koppel: "Do you know how many people died in 1985 as a direct cause of illicit drugs? 3,600. By contrast, do you know how many people died that same year from alcohol use? 100,000. Do you know how many people died from tobacco consumption? 320,000. There are some interesting things we need to examine if we pride ourselves on being an informed electorate that makes decisions based on knowledge rather than just hunches or instincts or visceral reactions."

Koppel offered these statistics which might be used as an argument to legalize the use of drugs.

During the past year 28% of all adults visited art museums. Forty-nine per cent were college graduates. Thirty-one per cent had some college training and 17% had no college learning.

In 1937, only 31% all American adults said they would vote for a qualified woman for president. In 1958, the percentage was 52%. In 1978, 76% and in 1987, 82%.

## D.A.R.E. to say No in MG

September 15, 1988 has been proclaimed DARE day in the Village of Morton Grove, as well as in the State of Illinois and across the nation. The official DARE flag will be flown on the Richard T. Flickinger Administrative Building flagstaff as a reminder that we can win the war against drug and alcohol abuse.

DARE - Drug Abuse Resistance Education is a program that has been in effect in the schools of Morton Grove for the past two years. Learning to say no and not feeling compelled to go along with the crowd is the essence of the program. It's aim is to equip the youths with skills to resist peer pressure to experiment with and use harmful drugs, to make their own decisions, and to learn to cope with life's problems in positive ways.

Specially trained Morton Grove Police Officer Robert Davis teaches the 17 session curriculum targeted primarily to the fifth and sixth grades. The DARE project study indicated that children in these grade levels are most responsive to prevention education because they have not yet been introduced to controlled



substances and other drugs. This year the program has been expanded to include 4th, 7th, and 8th grades on an abbreviated basis. Officer Davis employs a variety of activity-oriented techniques to involve students in discussions, ideas, feelings, and role playing exercises.

Parents must also be involved. It is no longer debatable concern-

ing the need for an effective drug preventative program for students. Parents should educate themselves about drugs so they can talk informatively with their children and answer questions.

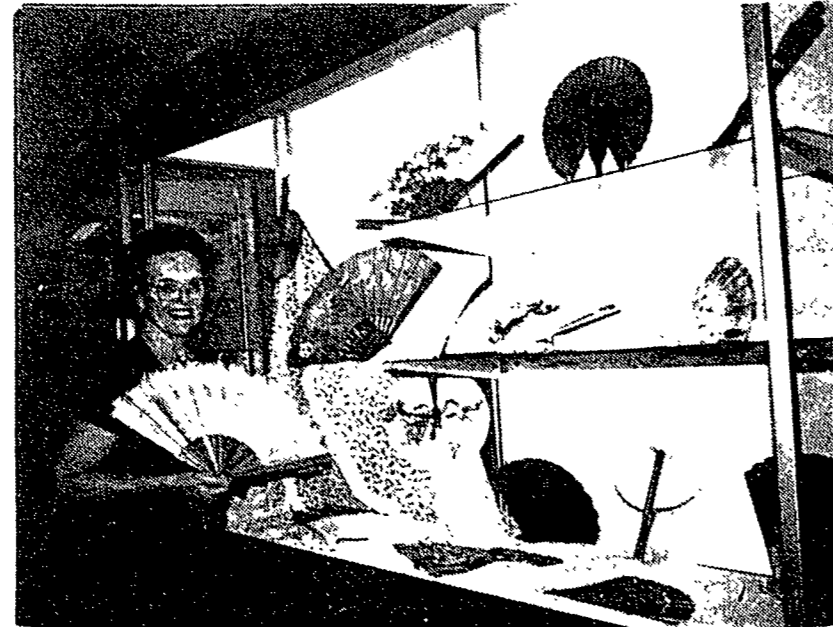
### West Word wins national awards

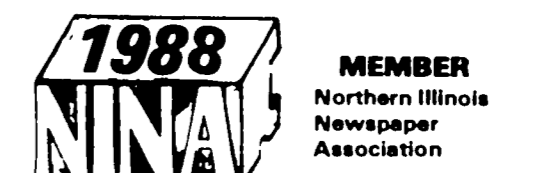

**ON THE STUMP**...exciting events last week included Michael Dukakis paying our town a visit in his whirlwind campaign for the presidency in November. During his visit to the House of White Eagle Restaurant, he encountered supporters and anti-abortion protesters, but Mike played it cool all the way.

Coincidentally, Dukakis' father-in-law, Harry Ellis Dickson was in the local area the same day as the candidate visited here.

Dickson, associated director of the Boston Symphony Orchestra and the Boston Pops Orchestra, spent some time with the Niles West High School Orchestra at noon and later went to The Skokie Club restaurant for a reception hosted by State Rep. Calvin Sutker.

According to Democrats at the event, the word from Dickson was that his son-in-law still plays the trumpet he first took up as a soloist in his high school band.

It is also in order to straighten out a reported peccadillo regarding advance arrangements for Dukakis' appearance at the House of White Eagle, in which it was reported that 2,000 people showed up, but only 75 seats and no tables were available.

Andy Przybylo, manager of the restaurant, said the report was true and noted the advance person for the candidate arranged to pay \$500 for coffee and cake despite Andy's warning the refreshments would not last long with a large crowd.

"Since the breakfast was supposed to be a Breakfast Rally, I made several suggestions to change it from a breakfast to something else, such as a continental breakfast. The whole upshot was we had wall-to-wall people and we ended up serving coffee on our own," he said.

The explanation could be that Dukakis' stop in Niles was put together hastily and there was no time to make the proper arrangements.

## OCC approves storm water control plan

A Storm Water Management Plan presented by the engineering firm of Barton-Aschman Associates was authorized at Tuesday night's meeting of Oakton College's Board of Trustees. The plan differs from the original idea of expanding Oakton's retaining lake and instead concentrates on the regrading of a parcel of land on the north west corner of the campus.

The project, presented by engineer Glenn Schirmer, will restore the land to its original elevation. The land will be regraded and debris illegally dumped by unknown persons will be removed.

Schirmer told the board, "Cost estimates run between \$109,500 and \$125,000 depending on the volume of soil and debris to be removed. The minimum figure is \$109,500." *Continued on Page 47*

## Goldman Home has pre-hearing on procedure charges

The George S. Goldman Home for the Aged in Niles, which was fined \$5,000 in April by the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) for failing to respond to a medical emergency, had a pre-hearing on the case last week, according to David Novick, administrator of the home located at 6601 Touhy Ave.

"The pre-hearing allows us to give our input on the IDPH charges that owners of the home are challenging. We are now waiting for the formal hearing, where evidence and witnesses will be presented by both sides," he said.

Goldman Home was issued a conditional license for a type "A" violation which constitutes a substantial probability of death or serious physical or mental injury to a resident, according to a health department spokesman. Challenger Edward Vrdolyak (R) spent most of his five-minute time limit blasting the Democrats for decisions made at the state and county level and especially in the City of Chicago. "We need a change from the one-party rule in the city," he said.

In reply to a question regarding goals in running the clerk's office, Vrdolyak said he would "clean up the office" and run it like a business under proper supervision.

## State gives clues on detecting drunk drivers

It is estimated between the hours of 10 p.m. and 3 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights, one of every 10 drivers is legally drunk. The ability to detect a driver under the influence of alcohol or other drugs could save your life.

The following clues indicate the driver may be under the influence:

- Turning too wide or wandering; from one lane to another
- Driving with the car's headlights off at night
- Stopping without cause in a traffic lane
- Responding slowly to traffic lights or giving inappropriate signals
- Going too fast or slow for conditions
- Following other vehicles too closely

If you encounter a suspected drunk driver, put as much distance between you and that vehicle as possible. Do not pass a suspect vehicle unless necessary. Keep your eye on the vehicle when you do.

If the suspect vehicle is moving too fast behind your car, let it pass. Stay alert because you may encounter the vehicle farther down the road.

Reporting an impaired driver to the local authorities protects all other vehicles on the highway. Do not try to stop a suspected drunk

driver. When you reach a gas station or rest area call the police and report the vehicle's description and license plate number.

Most importantly, do not drink and drive yourself.

## Watch for slow-moving farm vehicles

by Secretary of State Jim Edgar

The fall harvest season has begun for many Illinois farmers. Make this season safe by watching for slow-moving farm vehicles on county roads and two-lane highways.

Be prepared to slow down quickly if farm machinery appears suddenly on your side of the highway. Remember, farm vehicles not only move slowly but usually are wider and longer than other vehicles.

Do not pass a farm vehicle until your vehicle can clear the machinery or implement safely while staying on the road. Some farmers show courtesy and concern for traffic safety by pulling to the right to allow more room for motorists to pass. However, be alert because it may be necessary to drive implements back onto the road occasionally to cross a bridge or to avoid a

culvert. Also, watch for machinery that is not secured properly for towing.

Farm tractors, implements of husbandry and animal-drawn vehicles must display a slow-moving vehicle emblem at the rear of each vehicle or implement. Combinations of farm tractors and towed farm implements also must be equipped with a slow-moving vehicle emblem. The emblem usually is mounted on the implement, but may be displayed on the tractor if it is visible to other motorists.

All vehicles displaying a slow-moving vehicle emblem must use at least one flashing amber signal light after dark when visibility is poor. The light must be mounted as high as possible and be visible to the rear for at least 500 feet in normal sunlight.

## The person watching your purse may not be you

Opportunistic thieves took advantage of two grocery store customers in separate incidents last week. On September 6 and again on September 8, the women were shopping in the Dominick's store at 5747 W. Dempster, left a purse unattended in their grocery cart, and within moments, the purse was stolen. Both occurrences were in the early afternoon.

On that Tuesday, a 68 year old Skokie home economist told police the stolen purse contained a \$400 place setting of sterling

silver, \$548 in cash and a pair of eyeglasses valued at \$125 in addition to her identification and charge cards.

The following Thursday, around 2 p.m., a 70 year old Skokie housewife, lost \$180 cash and \$25 in coins as well as keys, credit cards and identification when her purse was stolen. 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


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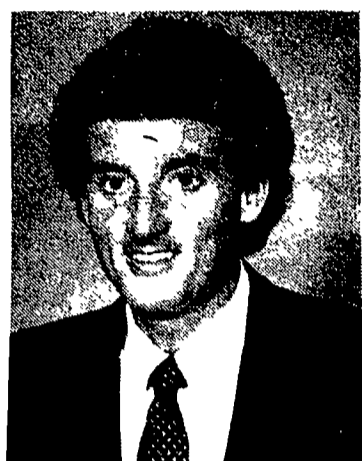
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# I Bet You Didn't Know

Would you know how to tell false from actual labor preceding the birth of child? If not and there is a new baby about to arrive in

your family, this and many other pertinent pieces of information will be covered in the Classes for Expectant Parents being offered at Swedish Covenant Hospital, 5145 N. California, on Monday evenings from 7 to 9 p.m. beginning October 3.

The series of five classes are designed for families seeking a broad basic approach to birth education whether or not this is the first pregnancy. It also prepares couples for a father-attended birth, including cesarean birth. An optional sixth class gives information on breast feeding.

Instructor for the course is Louise Hedstrom, RN, MSN, associate professor of maternal/neonatal nursing at North Park College. She also supervises nursing students at Swedish Covenant Hospital and other hospitals in the area.

### Cholesterol is kid's problem, too

Millions of Americans suffer from high cholesterol. If ignored it can clog coronary arteries and other blood vessels, causing heart problems such as heart attacks. So millions of adults with high cholesterol watch their diet and many take medication.

But what about children? Do they have to worry about high cholesterol?

Yes, says Dr. Cesar Mendez, assistant professor, section of pediatric endocrine metabolism and nutrition, Loyola University Medical Center. Dr. Mendez, who is currently completing a doctorate in nutrition, believes that checking cholesterol levels is necessary - even in very young children.

"High cholesterol affects children in the same way it affects adults, one just doesn't see the results of high cholesterol in children," he says. "Except in rare cases of heart attacks in children of 14 or 15 years of age, most problems with clogged arteries don't surface until adulthood."

Children diagnosed with cholesterol problems should follow the same treatment as adults, according to Dr.

Mendez. That includes a low-fat, low-cholesterol diet and, in some cases, a cholesterol lowering drug.

"Although diet will improve the chances of lowering an already high cholesterol level, unfortunately, a low-cholesterol diet - even in children - will not be a guarantee of never having a cholesterol problem. That's one of the great ironies of this problem," adds Dr. Mendez.

Yet that does not prevent him from placing high importance on diet and nutrition for his pediatric patients.

"Diet is a very controversial topic in regard to cholesterol. Despite studies that prove diet can affect cholesterol levels, there are still people who argue this point," he says. "The importance of diet in one's overall health is one of the main reasons I decided to pursue a degree in nutrition."

Cholesterol lowering drugs are certainly effective and safe to prescribe to children with cholesterol problems, adds Dr. Mendez, but only after a nutrition plan has been followed for a number of weeks.

It is helpful for parents to talk about their thoughts and feelings with others in the same situation. 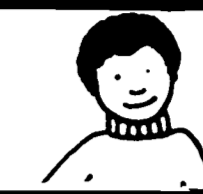

### Social rejection--A back-to-school hazard

Back to school will mean back to hurt feelings for many kids this fall. Parents can't protect children from the inevitable popularity game, but they can teach them how to cope, says a child and adolescent psychiatrist.

"The most difficult part of school for many children is the cliques," says Dr. Pouran Imani, medical director of the Pritzker Children's Psychiatric Unit of Michael Reese Hospital and Medical Center, Chicago, who has also worked with many schools as a consultant to school staff and students. "No child can escape from hurt feelings or from hurting others. In fact, a normal part of growing up is that a child experiences both sides of such rejection."

Cliques can be large groups of youngsters or as small as a trio of friends, with two ganging up on one. The dynamics of childhood relationships dictate that some children will emerge as leaders and wield a powerful influence over the group, and others will be followers, masking their own

sense of insecurities, Dr. Imani explains.

"One of the ways a clique reinforces itself is by its upsetting effect on others," observes the doctor. "By ostracizing certain children, hurting their feelings, watching them react defensively, the group reinforces its own behavior. Its actions provoke attention. And, as we all know, reinforced behavior grows stronger."

Dr. Imani adds that children mimic their peers because their own identity is not yet solidly established. A child eagerly looks to others for ideas about looks and behavior. He imitates and models his young counterparts and is easily influenced to fit into the group.

Says Dr. Imani, "It is easy to see why children who are in any way different may be most susceptible to ostracization. Whether a child looks different, dresses different, is limited in his intellectual ability, or perhaps is too smart, he can stand out in a negative way."

The truth is, of course, that

every individual is unique, Dr. Imani says. Aside from following your child's cues and helping him assimilate by letting him wear clothes "that all the kids are wearing," she suggests fostering a child's positive adaptation. If it's inevitable that your child will be the target of rejection at some point, the best defense is to make sure he has the tools to enable him to cope.

A child's ability to cope depends on himself, his family support, and his "fit" in school, notes Dr. Imani. "First, know your child's temperament and capabilities. Is he shy? Does he withdraw easily? Is he a slow learner or a gifted student? The answers to these questions should guide a parent in choosing a school or classroom setting appropriate to the child's capabilities. Expectations that are either too high or too low will make a child uncomfortable and may cause him to feel awkward with classmates."

Here are Dr. Imani's tips for helping a child feel more at ease

socially, starting with an honest assessment of the child's situation:

-Accept your child as he is. Be very patient with his shortcomings and realistic about his abilities. Don't push.

-Make him feel good about himself. Don't take good behavior for granted. Praise your child-show your love and attention.

-Encourage participation in group activities, overnight camps, or after-school play. Invite other children to come over, or allow your child to visit at a friend's house.

"At some time or another, a child will come home in tears-you can't avoid it," warns Dr. Imani. Follow these steps in handling the situation:

-Get the facts about what has happened to upset your child. Listen carefully.

-Keep your head. Do not become defensive and quickly criticize another child.

-Teach your child to be empathetic. Have him place himself

in the other child's shoes and imagine why he might have behaved in a hurtful way (for example, because he feels insecure himself?)

-Encourage your child to resolve the issue on his own, not run from it. Suggest that your child approach the one who has hurt him and say something like, "You hurt my feelings yesterday. Did I do something to make you mad?"

-If you child absolutely won't face the offender alone, go with him but stay in the background. Do not call the other child's parents. Encourage your child to communicate and express his own feelings. He should learn to resolve problems between himself and his friend.

The most important thing to remember about your child's social dilemmas is that they are inevitable, says Dr. Imani. If you teach your child to cope gracefully with hurt and disappointment, he will have the confidence to ride out future rejections which are sure to come.

## Gottlieb supports parental home care of children

George S. Gottlieb, Republican nominee for U.S. Congress (11th District), recently announced his support for Vice-President Bush's plan for encouraging families where one parent stays home to care for children.

Gottlieb attacked pending Federal legislation which would provide incentives for parents to use our of home child care. The legislation, which its sponsors call the "Act for Better Child Care," would provide vouchers for parents to purchase services from facilities approved by the Federal government.

"I would like to see more parents staying home with their children," Gottlieb said. "Too many parents are looking for child care just so they can enjoy two incomes and enhance their economic situation. I believe that children, in the first five years of their lives, should be cared for by a parent who is tuned in with their needs. A child care employee cannot possibly provide this to the extent a parent

can. "There are many situations where it is absolutely necessary to put a child in day care—namely single parent and low income families," Gottlieb continued. "We should give federal assistance to people in this situation. But we should also give 'credits' to families in which a parent stays home to take care of her children.

"For whatever reasons, many parents do not want to take care for their own children. This, I believe, is detrimental to the child. Any psychologist will tell you the importance of the first five years of life. Trust, confidence and sense of well being have all developed during this early period, and reinforced by a parent's nurturing. Parents in a marginal situation should consider whether a higher economic standard of living compensates for the parental care that their child is not getting during the day.

## Loyola expert offers alternatives to T.V. for children

"A child can become almost addicted to television." So says Paul E. Jose, Ph.D., assistant professor of psychology at Loyola University of Chicago.

How much T.V. is too much for a child? Does excessive T.V. viewing have a deleterious effect on a child's creativity? What can a parent do to break the T.V. habit in a child?

"Excessive television viewing can be a problem," says Jose. "Studies indicate that the average child watches six-to-eight hours of T.V. a day. Two hours or less would be adequate."

While he says that there's nothing wrong with a child's watching a small amount of T.V. simply for entertainment, he points out that a steady diet of cartoons isn't any better than a steady diet of junk food. "In addition to limiting T.V. time, parents should aim for a well-balanced T.V. selection of educational and informational programs, as they do a well-balanced food menu for their children."

"The critical factor for children is that watching T.V. is so passive. Although they can learn a lot, T.V. is a one-way street. The young viewer takes in, but doesn't actively process, the information presented."

Parents can help make the experience of watching television a little more active by serving as an aid to children, helping them think critically and analyze what they see. "A parent's questions give the child a context, a perspective, a background from which to look at the information in a way not thought of before," says Jose. "After an educational show on exotic animals, the parent can ask a child to relate the information on a zebra's adaptation to its environment to city pigeons and how they conform to their urban surroundings. This makes the T.V. information relevant to home, and encourages a child's critical thinking."

"Children have a great deal of imagination," he points out, "which can be stimulated by reading and by playing games with playmates, too. Some games are better at stimulating the imagination than others," Jose says. "Activities such as painting will also foster creativity."

A child needs opportunities to interact with another person. The ideal is to have neighborhood children, close in age and of the same sex, who are the kind of children parents want interacting with their own child. It's extremely important for children to have fun doing something with another child.

When parents are able to set

aside the time, there are a number of enjoyable things to do with their children. Trips to museums or the zoo can provide family fun away from the T.V. set for everyone, as well as being educational. Regular trips to the library to select books can be scheduled, and don't have to take a great deal of time.

The parents who take a little time to introduce their children to books, games, art and other creative activities are the parents most likely to have creative children who are tuned into the world beyond that shown on a television screen.

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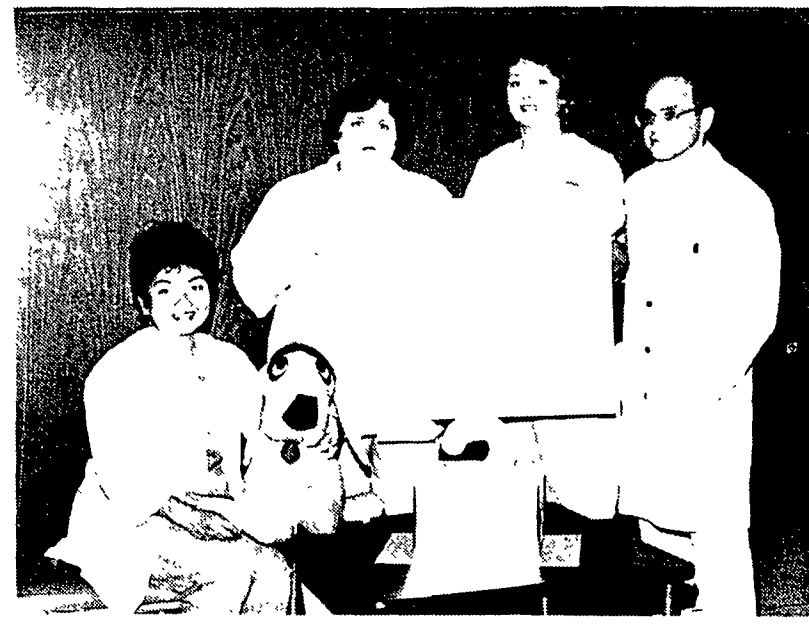

### Oakton opens a Kid's College

Beginning September 17, the Oakton Community College MONNACEP program will begin a Kid's College for children in grades first through eight. The purpose of this program, according to Coordinator Gale Fritz, is to give children enrichment beyond what they can get in the classroom.

"This is a stimulating program open to all children. The courses are designed to give students an extra edge and nurture their academic and artistic skills."

### TRAC puts youth on right track

With the opening of school, many Maine Township students head for football, cheerleading and track. But a special group of Maine Township teenagers are pursuing another "track" - community service - in an effort to get their lives back on the straight track.

These teens are participants in MaineTRAC (Maine Township Restitution for Adolescent Change), an innovative program administered by MaineStay, Maine Township's youth services department.

Maine Township Supervisor Paul K. Halverson said, "MaineTRAC offers young offenders who have been involved in minor nonviolent crimes a second chance to prove to the community that they can be responsible citizens by devoting a segment of their free time to community service."

They work after school, weekends, and vacation at public and nonprofit agencies in Maine Township including park districts, hospitals, service centers, local governments, and other community-based organizations. Job assignments can include maintenance work, office work, yard work, senior citizen assistance, and other supervised tasks.

MaineTRAC accepts juvenile offenders from Maine Township between the ages of 12 and 17 who are referred by the police, probation officers or Juvenile Court. However, MaineTRAC is no easy way out for these juvenile offenders.

To be accepted in the program they must have committed no more than three separate offenses and must not be dependent on drugs or alcohol. Most of all they must agree to all restitution plans and be able to benefit from MaineTRAC.

The teens are required to participate in mandatory orientation and pre-employment workshops to prepare them for a community service placement. Additional workshops address job skills, substance abuse awareness, and values. Short-term counseling is also available through MaineStay.

Parents, too, are part of the process. They are required to attend two family meetings at the beginning and end of the program.

To date, seven youths have successfully completed the program, another eight are continuing their work assignments, and seven more are in the orientation process.

After only one year in operation, MaineTRAC was recognized as an "exemplary program" in the 1988 Governor's Awards for Outstanding Achievement in Community Crime Prevention.

### "Babies susceptible to whiplash, Doctor says"

Many slow, learning and clumsy children might well have been intelligent and normal today had they not been "whiplashed" as infants, a Des Plaines Chiropractor contends.

The whiplash occurs when the parent, who would never think of striking a child, seeks to discipline him or her by grabbing the shoulders or chest and shaking the child vigorously.

The child's unsupported head flops about, creating hemorrhages in the brain. This can lead to "mild" mental retardation or "mild" cerebral palsy in thousands of otherwise normal children, declared Dr. Bernard A. Shindler of the A Back Pain Chiropractic Clinics.

Unlike the "battered baby" who shows external signs of trauma, the "shaken babies" are not detectable, he said.

An infant's head, he pointed out, is relatively heavier than at any other time of life and the neck muscles weaker. It bobs freely under stress.

"The hands of an angry parent or jealous older sibling can be deadly weapons," he cautioned.

Dr. Shindler cites studies done by Dr. John Caffey, M.D., of the University of Pittsburgh, to support his contention. Dr. Caffey has proposed a nationwide campaign to alert parents to the harm of shaking, slapping, jerking and jolting infants' heads.

## Centel first in Illinois to seek new pricing plan

Central Telephone Company of Illinois (Centel) filed a petition with the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) yesterday, seeking approval to initiate a price regulation plan next year on a trial basis.

The proposal, which is the first such filing by a telephone company in Illinois, would change the way the ICC regulates Centel's rates during a three-year test

period. The company's rates would continue to be regulated by the commission, but the pricing of services would be limited by caps.

The plan would provide Centel with an option to make pricing adjustments within the limits of the caps, as needed, without being required to formally file a petition with the ICC, according to Richard S. Vanderwoude, vice president of Central Telephone Company of Illinois and Ohio.

"This approach to pricing is more consistent with the rapid change of our business environment, which includes new technology, deregulation, and competition," he said.

"Our plan would give customers the satisfaction of knowing that their rates for local telephone service must stay within specified limits. At the same time, it would provide the company with an incentive to use high technologies to expand services and attain greater operating efficiencies."

Vanderwoude pointed out that if approved, the proposal also would eliminate some lengthy delays and added expenses now required through the filing of formal petitions with the ICC. Centel has asked the Commission to make a decision on the company's present proposal by Jan. 1, 1989.

"We are looking for a trial replacement of rate-of-return regulation, without the costs attendant to a full regulatory proceeding," Vanderwoude noted. "We believe our proposal would be beneficial to customers as well as to the industry."

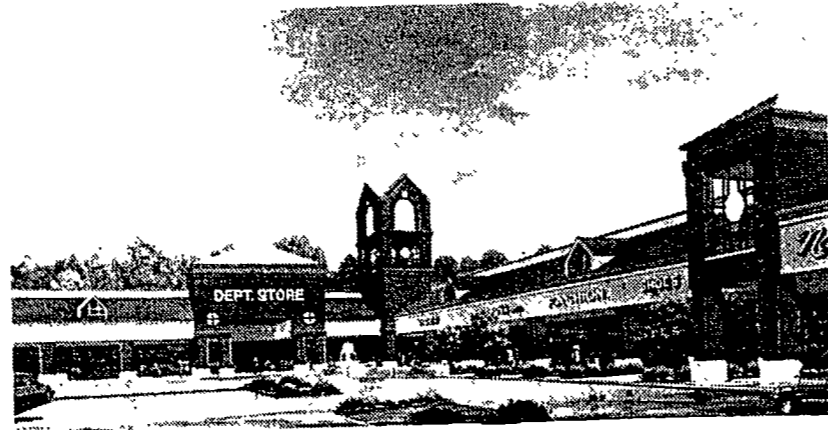

## Village Crossing on AT & T site



Trammell Crow Company has begun construction of Village Crossing, an 810,000-square-foot shopping center at the southwest corner of Touhy Avenue and Niles Center Road, straddling suburban Skokie and Niles and adjacent to Chicago.

Crow, the nation's largest real estate development company, purchased the 63-acre site from AT&T.

Village Crossing will be developed in three phases, according to James Mackenbrock, a partner in Trammell Crow's retail division. The first phase, to include approximately 300,000 square feet, is scheduled to open spring 1989.

Phase I anchors include a 112,000-square-foot Montgomery Ward, relocating from Old Orchard in Skokie, and a 65,000-square-foot Jewel/Osco Food and Drug Store.

Phase I is already 85 percent leased, according to Mackenbrock.

"In terms of both location and size, Village Crossing could be considered a regional shopping center," Mackenbrock said. "It will consist largely of retailers who advertise and promote heavily in order to maximize sales."

"But unlike most regional shopping centers, Village Crossing will not be enclosed, and will emphasize apparel, hard goods and food in its tenant mix," he said.

Village Crossings one-half mile west of a full Edens Expressway (Int. Hwy. 94) interchange. Strong demographics are the contributing factor to the rapid lease-up. The 168,000 residents within a three-mile radius of Village Crossing had an average 1986 household income of approximately \$43,400, according to a market study Crow commissioned.

Since Village Crossing is within two different municipalities, an inter-governmental agreement was reached between Skokie and Niles. Trammell Crow agreed to make off-site improvements, including new traffic signals and widening Touhy Avenue and Niles Center Road, which will have turning lanes added.

Phase II, scheduled to open Fall 1989, will include approx-

imately 100,000 square feet of specialty retail space.

The third and final stage will include approximately 300,000 square feet of anchor tenant space and another 112,000 for specialty shops.

An existing two-story building will be renovated into a parking facility for 900 vehicles.

Washington. "If she thought I was capable of running that office, does she think I'm less qualified to do a good job in the clerk's office?"

In the next order of appearance, incumbent State Senator Walter Dudy (R-7th Dist.) said he sponsored collective bargaining for police and fire departments and home equity legislation. He also supported the mandatory auto insurance package and the missing children program.

Dudy said if elected to another term in office, he would continue to fight for no tax increase, an elected school board, merit selection of judges and resume his battle against vote fraud.

Richard Valentino, Democratic candidate in the race for the senate seat, said good jobs and quality education are his main concerns in improving the quality of life for families. He favors having a district office in a community outreach concept to resolve problems.

Valentino noted education and senior citizen services are among his top priorities and he opposes tax increase. "There is too much waste in government and there is no need for high taxes," he said. "Something should be done about the high utility rates which are driving business away."

Marshal Belgrad (D), who is opposing incumbent Robert Kustra for the 28th District Senate seat, said he is an attorney and involved in the legal assistance program for the elderly.

He favors catastrophic insurance which could be subsidized by state supported programs and more senior citizens services.

Belgrad noted there is a need for quality schools, adding that his opponent has gone along with Governor Thompson in short-changing the educational system. "We must improve education because kindergarten now is the class of the year 2000."

As a legislator, Kustra noted he has been committed to improving the business climate for small businessmen and has worked to reduce government interference in this area. "I feel they should be treated fairly and will continue to fight on their behalf if I regain my seat in November," he said.

Kustra noted he was involved in the liability crisis a few years ago in which he sponsored a bill that limited attorney's fees in liability cases, saying the "outrageous" cost of insurance has affected business and citizens.

If elected to another term in office, Kustra said he would pursue an equitable Workmen's Compensation package.

Incumbent State Rep. Ralph Capparelli (D-13th Dist.) said he is committed to good tax and fiscal policies and is always aware of taxpayers' concerns.

He noted the mandatory auto insurance has worked in 16 states and the bill's recent passage will protect the insured driver against the uninsured motorist when in-

involved in auto accidents. Capparelli believes in fighting for consumer and senior citizen programs and said he has always been in the forefront in the fight against drugs.

Challenger Kevin Alexander (R) said if he wins election in November, his goals would include keeping a tight rein on taxes, fighting for senior citizen rights and protection of their benefits. He would also like to see a fine criminal justice system that would make Illinois a national example.

As a state representative, Alexander proposed a district office to serve senior citizens and members of civic organizations to work out problems. "I want to be a full-time representative and be in tune with the people," he said.

Bonnie Lindquist (D) running for state representative of the 55th District against incumbent Penny Pullen (R) stated her opponent has not been responsive to constituents who feel they don't have a voice in Springfield.

She added the incumbent also has not been responsive to flooding, consumer interests and toxic waste issues. As state representative, Lindquist said she would vote for a flood prevention plan, inspection of toxic waste dumps and equal pay for equal work.

Pullen pointed to her record of supporting on-the-job training programs, improving the business climate and her attempts for noise-mitigating measures at O'Hare Airport. On the latter issue, Pullen said the attitude of Chicago officials is that the O'Hare controversy is "partisan politics."

She also noted her stand against abortion and backing a bill on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) to control the disease. "Gov. Thompson, in signing the bill, said it is a medical issue and not a civil rights issue," Pullen said.

Sheldon Marcus (R), in the race for State Representative in the 56th district against Calvin Sutker (D), noted the legislative branch is a vital part of government, but a lot of people don't know who their legislators are. Marcus said he would be a "visible" legislator in serving the interests of the district in Springfield.

He noted he believes in human issues and would like to work with senior citizens to meet their needs by expanding social services and health care efforts to reduce financial burdens.

He said he would support quality education at all levels, promote business development and favors merit selection of judges.

Sutker stated he believes in full funding for education, saying he co-sponsored the state's prepaid college tuition program for students who will attend public institutions. He also supports improving senior citizen issues.

Sutker concluded by saying he helped Skokie win \$500,000 of Build Illinois money last year for its flood relief program.

One person put the blame on the Greenwood Avenue construction last year, claiming the work disturbed the underground cables," she said.

Fredricksen recalled the first power outage occurred on August 8. "We were having a birthday party for my husband that evening and the power went out for four hours," she said. "The air conditioning was off and 35 guests were sweltering in the heat."

Two days later, the power went off for seven hours and when it was restored at 1 a.m., the lights in the house woke the family up. The big concern is rain because sump pumps in the neighborhood would be inoperable, she said.

She went on to say there were not too many problems with food spoilage in refrigerators or freezers adding "they keep the food cold for some time," but she had a big problem with electric garage door opener.

She wanted to go shopping one day during a power outage and attempted to open the garage door manually by pulling a chain to release the mechanism, and broke it. "Needless to say, I didn't go shopping," she said.

Residents suffered through another power outage in which the power went off and on for a total of nine hours (7:15 a.m. to 4 p.m.) on Labor Day. "It just ruined the holidays for everyone. Some of the residents decided to call the village to see if they could get some action from the power company," she said.

Joe Salerno, director of code enforcement, said he was aware of the problem and had contacted

Commonwealth Edison who informed him that crews had been having difficulty repairing the breaks in the underground cables. "They are going to pull out the cables and replace them with new ones," Salerno said. "They couldn't tell me how long the work will take."

Alan Wozniak, district superintendent for Commonwealth Edison, said Monday they are working on plans to replace the cables and install a "loop feed" to bring a secondary source of electricity to the area, in the event of future outages.

"The old cables have deteriorated and are hard to repair," he said. Until the new cables are installed, repairs will be made to existing underground cables, he continued. "If the power goes out during heavy rain, a crew will install a temporary cable on top of the ground to feed electricity to the Ransom-Ridge area, he said.

In answer to residents' complaints about the lack of communication from the company, Wozniak said he has gone around the neighborhood and discussed the problem with homeowners standing outside their homes. "I'm sorry about the problem and we are trying to deal with it as quickly as we can."

Marion Wethelam, 8733 Madison Dr., said that neighbors can't wash, iron or use the dryer when the electricity is out. "Even a gas stove requires an electric spark to start it," she said. "You look around the house and see that nothing works...so you go shopping."

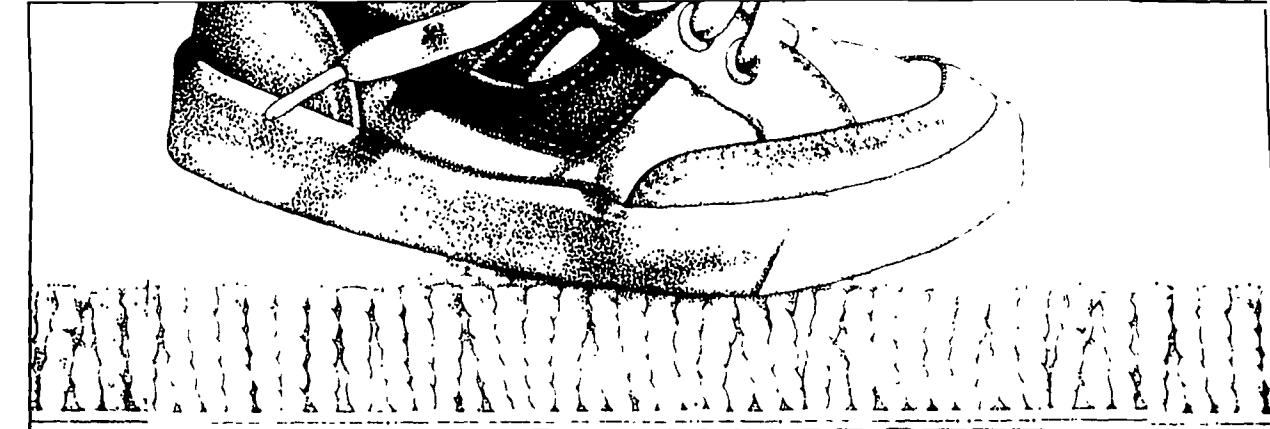
She added another neighbor is not able to show her house (up for sale) to potential buyers because she fears a power outage. "You just don't know when it's going to happen," she said.

She recalled that rain fell one night during a power outage and all she could think of was last year's outage in August, and that history would repeat itself. "The sump pump was not needed because it was a light rain," she said.

She complained about the lack of communication with the power company, saying residents have no information on whether repairs are being made. "There were some men wandering around my back yard late at night last week looking for a transformer which they apparently couldn't find," she said. "Don't you think they should know the location of a transformer?"

A spokesman for Our Lady of Ransom Church at Greenwood and Normal, said they have experienced several power outages, but with no problems. In a lighter vein, the spokesman commented, "one of the priests told me he had to use a flashlight to put on his clothes when the lights went off several weeks ago."

The underground pneumatic tube system used by the Chicago newspapers cost about \$100,000 to install in 1892. In 1899, the Chicago Tunnel company expanded a 65 mile network under Chicago's downtown to haul freight, garbage, coal and ashes underneath the city and the city press took 15 miles for their tubes.

delayed the ability for access funds for noise abatement measures.

The map details the noisiest areas around the airport and would adversely affect about 100,000 homes lying within the noise "contour" map resulting in a 10 to 20 percent drop in property values, according to suburban officials.

Niles is a member of the Suburban O'Hare Commission (SOC) which has been battling with Chicago on jet noise and pollution problems at the "world's busiest airport" for many years, Blase said.

He noted the city arbitrarily filed with the FAA despite objections from suburban officials to delay the map until an abatement report is completed. "Although Niles properties are not affected, we are in the fight to limit the scope of expansion at O'Hare," Blase said.

The expansion plan which runs through 1995, includes additional runways that would allow more planes to land at the airport. "This means more planes in the air creating an increase in jet

noise affecting not only airport residents, but also Niles," he said. Blase went on to say expansion will increase the number of flight operations from 650,000 to 920,000 when the project is completed. "That will magnify the problem. The environmental impact on communities is a great concern to towns that are in proximity to the airport," he said.

Noise abatement measures, such as quieter jets are not the total answer because as flights increase, any gains from quieter jets would be offset. "We have to come up with a viable noise-mitigation plan we can live with," Blase said.

Members of the O'Hare Advisory Committee (OHAC) comprised mostly of suburban officials, including Blase, will hold a meeting next week, in which members will discuss steps to reduce jet noise.

Park Ridge mayor Martin Butler, OHAC's chairman of the noise abatement subcommittee, has stated proposals that could include restrictions on the total number of daily flights at

put the Mass in English.

Prosperity was something the Catholic immigrants and their offspring might have expected, but pluralism in the Church was something they/we never dreamed. Yet in fact, the changes of the Vatican Council, dramatic and eventually traumatic as they may have been, were an enormous blessing for American Catholicism. If the Church had not become more relaxed and open and more pluralistic in the early 1960's, then it would face even a greater and even worse crisis today as educated and successful third and fourth generations struggle for their own independence. The battle combining freedom and loyalty emerging as I wrote the first draft of this chapter, between Geraldine Ferraro and Mario Cuomo, on the one hand, and Archbishop John O'Connor of New York, on the other, would have been even more violent and destructive. The Vatican Council, it has always seemed to me, enabled American Catholicism more easily to make the transition from uneducated immigrant to college-educated professional."

The officials stated that three days later, Krilich Builders and Riverwoods Developers of Niles filled in the drainage ditches without an explanation on why the excavation took place.

The park district, located in unincorporated York township, operates the fishing lake and every year stocks it with game fish for public angling.

According to a park official, it is unknown how many fish were lost because of the excavation, and a scheduled October fishing derby may have to be canceled. Compounding the problem is a ruined shoreline, the park official said.

The park district attorney noted the developer (Krilich) will have to restore everything to its former condition, including the water level, the fish, the soil condition and landscaping. If this is not done, they may face a suit for damages, the attorney said.

A company official reportedly told the attorney the excavation took place because of complaints that homes in the neighborhood had been flooding and the draining was to alleviate the problem.

Repeated attempts by the Bugle Newspapers to contact Krilich were fruitless.

Park officials said they received a call from a resident on Sept. 2 asking why the lake was being drained into Krilich's property. After observing the lake draining out, park district employees attempted to stem the flow of water.

The next day the developer's crews returned to fill in the ditches, a park commissioner said. According to Oakbrook Ter-

race Mayor Richard Sarallo, whose city is studying a proposal for developing the land adjacent to the York Center Park, no permits were given by the city for building or digging, but just to install a fence.

Proposed plans call for a nine-hole golf course, multi-family and townhouse units and high-rise buildings on the site, the mayor said.

Sarello said he did not know the reason why the shoreline was destroyed and why the ditches were dug. One reason could have been confusion between the developer and his subcontractors about the status of plans before the village.

In latest developments, the Army Corps of Engineers and the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will inspect the fishing lake that was drained without a permit.

Officials from both agencies stated the developer apparently responsible for the incident, Robert Krilich of Krilich Builders and Riverwoods Developers of Niles, is well-known to them.

A spokesman for the corps said they have "dealt with him in the past" and Krilich knows he should have a permit.

The spokesman said an evaluation will be made of the lake, but if Krilich moved earth in any way, it would constitute a violation.

She added the Clean Water Act of 1977 carries fines of up to \$125,000 per violation. If a violation was determined, the minimum requirement by the developer would be a complete restoration of the site.

for soil removal alone was \$64,000 based on 8,000 square feet. The project also includes a sewer extension in the area that would cost \$7,000. After excavation the land would need top soil and seeding, bringing the total to \$91,000. If the amount of soil to be removed reaches 10,000 square feet, the cost could go as high as \$125,000. Part of the projected plan includes \$5,000 for additional study and \$11,000 for the final plan.

At the July and August board meetings, local residents pressed the board to consider Oakton's part in flood prevention. Their objections were based on the proposed building to house the Northwest Municipal Conference.

Objections raised at those meetings accused Oakton of unnecessarily building on land needed for water absorption during flood conditions.

Oakton is not in violation of the law and already has storage for 25 percent excess capacity in its retaining lake. Regrading the northwest area and enlarging the sewer will allow 33,000 yards of excess water absorption capacity. "The retaining lake absorbs the water during flooding and detains it," Schirmer said. "As the Des Plaines River level drops after flood peak, the water from the retaining lake is piped back to the river."

The college will also take extra measures to insure illegal dumping does not occur again. Oakton President Thomas TenHoeve announced, "Although there are no other immediate trouble spots, we are studying the baseball field on the south end of campus and doing studies on other areas of the campus."

The Storm Management Plan has no effect on Oakton's plans to build a new structure that would house the Northwest Municipal

Conference. There were no protests at the meeting, and Des Plaines citizens who raised objections at previous meetings were not present. Trustees Jody Wadhwa and Joan Hall voiced the opinion that it is Oakton's responsibility to go ahead with the plan even if it does not totally satisfy the objections formerly raised.

In other board action Ami Mader was sworn in as trustee to fill the vacancy created when Diana Loveland moved out of the area.

The final enrollment count at Oakton is 9,100 students at both campuses. This figure represents a 3.6 percent increase over last year's student population. Full time students increased 6.4% over last year with a 17 percent full time student increase at the Skokie campus.

In subsequent events, the developer decided not to build on the site and later sold it to a developer.

According to residents in the area, the parcel of land may turn out to be a white elephant and the birds, ducks and squirrels may find a permanent home there.

Agency is providing additional technical assistance and federal grant administration.

In recommending the contract to the Board, the District's General Superintendent Arthur Janura noted that the Lagoons were constructed during the 1930's by the Civilian Conservation Corps. Not long after their completion, however, the Lagoons began to degrade as sediment-laden runoff from agricultural lands and nutrients from wastewater treatment plant effluent flowed into the lakes. Excessive growth of algae, murky water, damaged fish habitat, and unpleasant recreational aesthetics became commonplace.

After the meeting, Board President George Dumme praised the project, adding that the Lagoons are visited by several hundred thousand visitors each year.

Dredging of the Lagoons will remove several feet of accumulated organic sediment. Dredging of "fish pools" an additional 5 feet into the original lake bottom will provide improved fish habitat. In all, about 371,000 cubic yards of material will be dredged by L.W. Matteson, Inc., from Burlington, Iowa.

Sediments will be removed by a hydraulic dredge and pumped to the 1.2 million gallon disposal basin. Sediments will settle from the water in the basin, and the clarified water then returns to the Lagoons. The dredging will be completed by June 1990, after which the fish population will be revitalized with a massive restocking program.

In late 1987, a \$1 million project was completed with a grant from the Illinois EPA to divert the North Shore Sanitary District's Clavey Road Wastewater Treatment Plant around the Lagoons. As a result, a majority of the inflowing nutrients (which stimulate algae growth) has been eliminated, and the future health of the Lagoons looks bright.

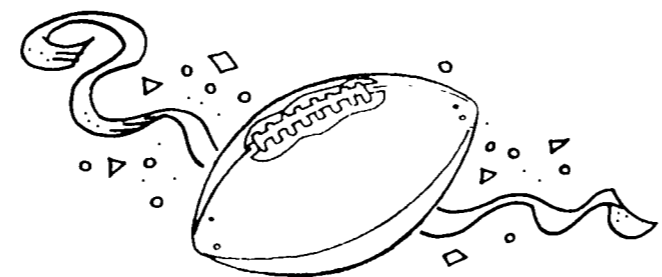
