Newscaster Ted Koppel: "Do you know how many people died in 1985 as a direct cause of illicit drugs? 3,600. By contrast, do you know how many people died that same year from alcohol use? 100,000. Do you know how many people died from tobacco consumption? 320,000. 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

Some people, including some in our country, still hold the belief that gems are magical. They certainly are magically pleasurable to wear.



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



### Watch for slow-moving farm vehicles

begun for many Illinois farmers. Make this season safe by watching for slow-moving farm vehicles on county roads and two-

lane highways. Be prepared to slow down quickly if farm machinery appears suddenly on your side of the highway. Remember, farm tors and towed farm implements vehicles not only move slowly but usually are wider and longer than

Do not pass a farm vehicle until your vehicle can clear the machinery or implement safety while staying on the road. Some farmers show courtesy and concern for traffic safety by pulling to the right to allow more room be alert because it may be necessary to drive implements back onto the road occasionally to cross a bridge or to avoid a

The fall harvest season has culvert. Also, watch for machinery that is not secured properly for towing.

Farm tractors, implements of husbandry and animal-drawn vehicles must display a slowmoving vehicle emblem at the rear of each vehicle or implement. Combinations of farm tracalso mush be equipped with a slow-moving vehicle emblem The emblem usually is mounted on the implement, but may be displayed on the tractor if it is visible to other motorists.

All vehicles displaying a slowmoving vehicle emblem must use at least one flashing amber signal light after dark when visibility is for motorists to pass. However, poor. The light must be mounted as high as possible and be visible to the rear for at least 500 feet in normal sunlight.

### **Cholesterol is** kid's problem, too

Millions of Americans suffer it can clog coronary arteries and other blood vessels, causing heart problems such as heart attacks. So millions of adults with high cholesterol watch their diet and many take medication.

But what about children? Do they have to worry about high Yes, says Dr. Cesar Menedez,

from placing high importance on diet and nutrition for his

"Diet is a very controversial topic in regard to cholesterol. Despite studies that prove diet can affect cholesterol leve's. there are still people who argue this point," he says. "The importance of diet in one's overall health is one of the main reasons I decided to pursue a degree in

Cholesterol lowering drugs are certainly effective and safe to prescribe to children with cholesterol problems, adds Dr. Menedez, but only after a nutrition plan has been followed for a





### TRAC puts youth on right track

With the opening of school, many Maine Township students head for football, cheerleading and track. But a special group of Maine Township teenagers are pursuing another "track" - community service – in an effort to get their lives back on the straight track.

These teens are participants in MaineTRAC (Maine Township Restitution for Adolescent Change), an innovative program administered by MaineStay, Maine Township's youth services department.

Maine Township Supervisor Paul K. Halverson said. "MaineTRAC offers young offenders who have been involved in minor nonviolent crimes a second chance to prove to the community that they can be responsible citizens by devoting a segment of their free time to community service."

They work after school, weekends, and vacation at public and nonprofit agencies in Maine Township including park districts, hospitals, service centers, local governments, and other community-based organizations. Job assignments can include maintenance work, office work, yard work, senior citizen assistance, and other supervised tasks.

MaineTRAC accepts juvenile offenders from Maine Township between the ages of 12 and 17 who are referred by the police, probation officers or Juvenile Court. However, MaineTRAC is no easy way out for these juvenile of-

To be accepted in the program they must have committed no more than three separate offenses and must not be dependent on drugs or alcohol. Most of all they must agree to all restitution plans and be able to benefit from MaineTRAC.

The teens are required to participate in mandatory orientation and pre-employment workshops to prepare them for a community service placement. Additional workshops address job skills, substance abuse awareness, and values. Short-term counseling is also available through MaineStay.

Parents, too, are part of the process. They are required to attend two family meetings at the beginning and end of the pro-

To date, seven youths have successfully completed the program, another eight are continuing their work assignments, and seven more are in the orientation pro-

After only one year in operation, MaineTRAC was recognized as an "exemplary program" in the 1988 Governor's Awards for Outstanding Achievement in Community Crime Prevention.

In recommending the contract to the Board, the District's General Superintendent Arthur Janura noted that the Lagoons were constructed during the 1930's by the Civilian Conservation Corps. Not long after their completion, however, the Lagoons began to degrade as sediment-laden runoff from agricultural lands and nutrients from wastewater treatment plant effluent flowed into the lakes. Excessive growth of algae, murky water, damaged fish habitat, and unpleasant recreational aesthetics became com-

monplace. After the meeting, Board President George Dunne praised the the installation of a parabolic project, adding that the Lagoons are visited by several hundred thousand visitors each year.
