Claims distribution center would disturb residents

Zoning Bd. turns down Tribune site

Amid cheers of approval and a round of applause by approximately 100 residents of St. Andrew's home for the Aged, the Niles zoning board at Monday's meeting turned down a request by Peterson Glass Co. to lease a portion of an existing building for distribu-

Small thoughts on a weak newscast....

Back in August we ran a news release which reported local students tested "above the norm" on math, spelling, social studies, language expression and study skills. While we make sure we publish the article, which came from the school district offices, in other times we might file the release under, "Ho Hum". And had we so filed, it would be alongside similar releases of every other district in the area which also have "above the norm" reports. The reason for the "Ho Hum" file is there has never been a school district outside the big cities which has ever reported its students are doing less than above average work. We would guess 99% of all school districts in the United States report they are doing above average work.

We would assume in any study half of any group falls in the lower half or in the bottom 50% of any finding. That means half of the doctors in the United States were in the bottom half of their classes. Same percentages regarding lawyers. Half of all law graduates were in the lower half of their classes. Villages propose options for removing fall leaves

Homeowners who bag their dead leaves or shred them into their lawns will save money their own and that of their Public Works Department. A sensible approach to 1988's leave raking will give residents greener lawns and their municipalities greener pocket books as well.

A court appearance can be a learning experience

So much for fantasy. The reality is that you have been left with a ticket as well as an experience which will be hopefully instructive even though inconvenient. For one, if you don't have a bail bond card, you will have surrendered your license to the officer and now have a yellow ticket for it. You will advertise the fact of your violation to every retailer where you write a check. Then, there is the constant awareness that you are "driving on a ticket". You are now

Golf Mill plans second anniversary in November

Niles Fire Dept. calls

The Niles Fire Department answered 21 fire alarms and 25 ambulance calls from Sept. 23 to Sept. 30.

An investigation of a gas odor at 8056 Oriole Ave. proved negative on Sept. 25. A crew from Northern Illinois Gas working on a leak about 10 homes south of the subject property assisted firemen, but were unable to detect any odor in the area.

Firefighters responded to Imperial Eastman, 6300 Howard, where they found a malfunctioning smoke detector in a computer room on Sept. 25. The alarm box was reset.

A truck fire was extinguished at Milwaukee and Jonquil Terr. on Sept. 26. The fire, which started in the muffler of the vehicle, caused \$200 damage.

A fire alarm on Sept. 27 at Gemini Jr. High School at Greenwood and Ballard, was attributed to an overheated unused boiler room. There was no fire hazard.

A trouble alarm at St. Isaac Jogues School, 8101 Golf Rd. was apparently due to a power failure. A check of the school showed no hazard.

Golf Mill shopping center will have a second anniversary in November to celebrate the enclosure of the mall completed in 1986, which resulted in breathing new life into the regional 28-year-old shopping center.

Golf Mill now boasts 120 tenants, double the number of merchants since 1986, with mall officials seeing a definite trend of growth in the future, according to Rick Echelmeyer, Golf Mill's manager.

"Enclosing the mall has boosted sales marketability and has made it a viable commercial property in this town," he said.

Plans are to add 40 more stores during the next few years that would include a mix of businesses to complement the existing ones, as well as service facilities related to the health field and free-standing operations in the north and south mall. "The concept is to have booths in the mall for the sale of various merchandise. Our goal is to have one-stop shopping convenience for our customers," he said.

Echelmeyer said that by remodeling the Golf Mill complex, the facility was able to accommodate more tenants. "An enclosure in this town," he said.

District 207 saves \$71,000 through direct gas purchase

Since the program began last December, Maine Township High School District 207 has saved more than \$71,000 by direct purchase of natural gas, according to Donald E. Kenney, Assistant Superintendent for Business. Through the program, District 207 buys gas directly from suppliers and then stores the gas with Northern Illinois Gas until it is needed. By the end of October,

the district will have purchased enough gas at a guaranteed price to meet fuel needs for the remainder of the 1988-89 school year. "This means that we have purchased the fuel we need at summer prices, which are considerably lower than we expect the price to be during the height of the heating season from November through March," said Kenney.

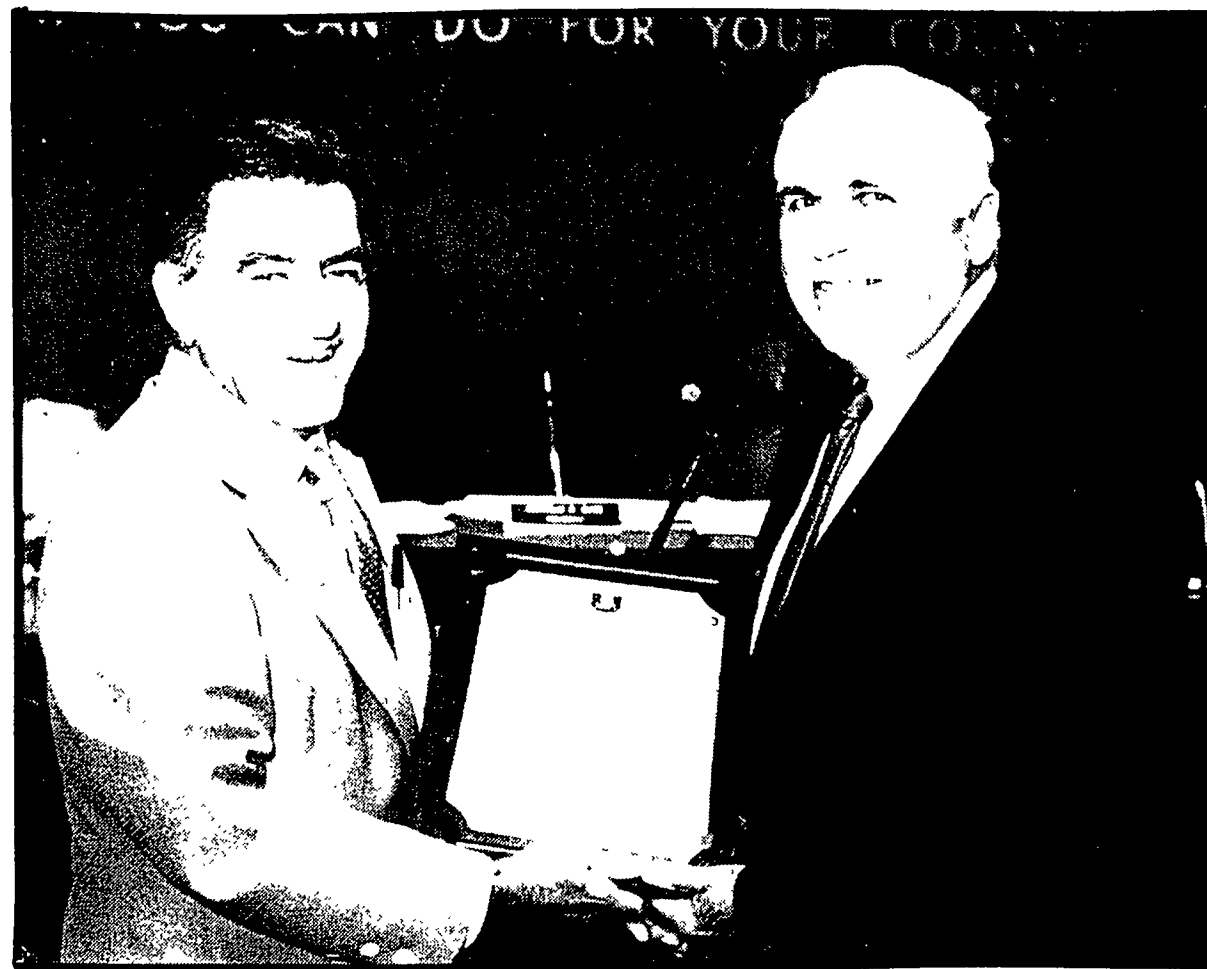

BLOOD PRESSURE

The pressure that the heart muscle must exert in order to pump blood through the body is expressed in two ways, the systolic and the diastolic blood pressures. Systolic pressure is recorded when the heart contracts while diastolic pressure is taken when the heart is resting. The lower the pressure the easier the work of the heart. Though the human body is very complex and there is a great deal of individual variation, most blood pressure experts would agree that at rest, the ideal systolic pressure for persons beyond age 40 is something less than 140 while the diastolic pressure should not exceed 90. Niles woman injured following party

A party to celebrate a birthday ended in a serious incident early Saturday morning on Oct. 1 involving a 36-year-old Geneva man and a 20-year-old Niles girl. She suffered a severe head injury and is listed in critical condition at Lutheran General Hospital.

According to Sgt. Charles Giovannelli of the Niles Police Department, the alleged offender, Glen J. Daley, and the victim were part of a group celebrating a friend's birthday Friday evening at various

taverns in the northwest suburbs, with a last stop at Skokie pub.

"When the party was about over, the offender decided to leave with another girl, who was going to her apartment in Niles," Giovannelli said. "The victim somehow found out about it and she subsequently called the apartment to say she was coming over."

Giovannelli prefaced his statements by saying information came from the alleged offender concerning the incident that occurred between 5 a.m. and 7:45 a.m. Saturday. "We have not been able to interview the girl because of her critical condition," he said.

Daley stated that he decided to leave the apartment after the phone call. He was backing out of a parking space and when he saw the victim's car pull in, stopped his vehicle. He then got out to talk to her, which soon culminated in an argument, Giovannelli said.

In the midst of the argument, Daley went back to his car to leave the premises. "Daley said that as he was driving toward the exit, the girl was standing off to the left and allegedly flung herself on the hood of the car and then fell to the pavement," Giovannelli said.

Niles paramedics transported the victim to Lutheran General Hospital. Daley was taken into custody and was charged with reckless conduct and driving with a revoked license.

He was released on \$1,000 bond pending a Nov. 4 court date.

Suspect assaults cop

A twenty eight year old Deerfield man is awaiting trial on charges of aggravated assault and battery and resisting arrest in connection with injuries he inflicted on a police officer called to stop a fist fight he and another man were involved in. Two officers responded to a citizen's complaint about a fist fight in progress in a back yard in the 9300 block of Sayre.

When the officers arrived, the arrestee attempted to flee. He climbed over a rickety fence which then collapsed beneath the pursuing police officer. In the scuffle, the detainee, who was wearing boots, also kicked the 32 year old patrolman in the face.

Due to swelling on his forehead and the left side of his face and abrasions on his nose, the officer was taken to Lutheran General Hospital, where he was treated for lacerations to the facial area. The Deerfield man was held on a \$5,000 "D" bond. The other scuffle was not charged.

Store guards "clothes in" on shoplifters

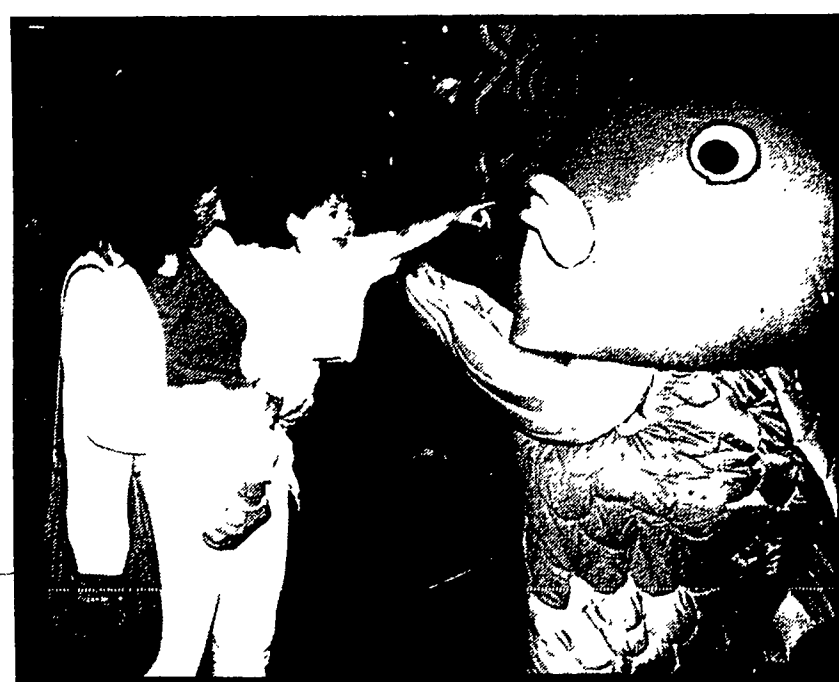

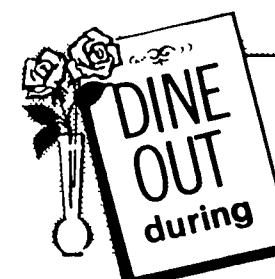

Skokie resident receives research grant

Nursing program endowment for Oakton

The serious shortage of nurses is a problem that just moved closer to a solution because of the generosity of the North Shore Visiting Nurse (NSVN) Foundation. The organization is providing a \$50,000 grant to establish a permanent endowment for the nursing program at Oakton Community College.

Juliet Dammann, NSVN Foundation board president, said that the board's priority for this round of grant-giving was "to give money that would be used to address the nursing shortage."

The donation to Oakton is the first time the visiting nurse organization has established a permanent endowment rather than making an outright grant for a short-term project. Endowment income will immediately fund two annual nursing scholarships of \$1,100 each for a first and second year nursing student.

The gift is the first five-figure contribution to the annual campaign drive for the Oakton Educational Foundation, according to campaign chairman Jim Riebandt, partner in the Park Ridge law firm of Palmer, Blackman and Riebandt, P.C.

Riebandt said the NSVN's endowment is an auspicious beginning to the Oakton campaign which began September 19.

"It's a tremendous boost to our efforts to raise \$400,000 over the

next two years. Grants for specific projects are very important, but an endowment provides benefits in perpetuity," he said.

To foster excellence in the nursing program, remaining income from the NSVN will be available for special projects that will enhance the nursing program, such as equipment purchases not provided for by state taxes, visiting lecturers, special tutor-

ing, as well as additional scholarships.

Arthur B. Muir, partner in the law firm of Katten Muchin and Zavis and NSVN Foundation vice president, said that the Foundation's intention is "to provide a perpetual source of income for scholastic and related purposes to increase the number of qualified nurses practicing in the north suburban area."

After 400 hours of intense training and 110 hours of clinical training at St. Francis Hospital in Evanston, Firefighter/Paramedic Michael Fox and Firefighter/Paramedic Michael Quinn have successfully completed all requirements set forth by the State of Illinois to become State Certified Paramedics.

Firefighter/Paramedic Fox graduated with Honors, having the third highest academic achievement of the graduating class. Also graduating were Randall J. Buttlere and Joseph Beltris, both of whom are Paid-on-Call Volunteers with the North Maine Fire Department.

Firefighter/Paramedic Fox joined the North Maine Fire Department in November of 1987 and resides in Des Plaines with his wife Helen and his sons, Danny 4 1/2 years and Matthew 1 year.

He comes from a family of Fire Service people. His father, Carl, is a retired Lieutenant of the Niles Fire Department and very proud of his son's accomplishments. Lieutenant Carl Fox completed 23 years of service to the people and City of Niles. Mike Fox feels there is a real need for trained Firefighter/Paramedics. He looks at his professional career as a member of the North Maine Fire Department as a challenge, an opportunity, a need, but above all, something he can be proud of and can hope that his sons would follow in his footsteps.

and Mrs. Quinn live with their son in their apartment in Rolling Meadows. Quinn joined the North Maine Fire Department in March of 1987 and is looking forward to a long, challenging, and worthwhile career in the Fire Service.

Randy Buttlere is hoping to become a full-time employee in the Fire Service and Joe Beltris is hoping to become a Medical Doctor. Both of these Volunteers joined the North Maine Fire Department in May of 1988. Since that time they have participated in Basic and Advanced Firefighter Training. This training, coupled with their paramedic certification, will give them a better chance at their selected careers.

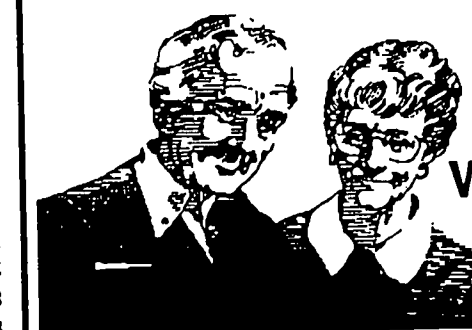
Lieutenant William Griggs, Medical Officer for the North Maine Fire Department, states that with the addition of these two newly certified paramedics the total number of certified personnel now stands at 11. This provides for a minimum of 3 certified paramedics for each 24 hour shift at North Maine. Lieutenant Griggs further states that the comprehensive study and long hours are very demanding on a student and require real commitment on the individual's part. The student must complete classroom study totaling 182 hours, written assignments requiring 45 hours, homework study of 63 hours and clinical time of no less than 110 hours at the teaching hospital. The clinical time includes: intravenous therapy, operating room, recovery room, coronary

surveillance, obstetrics/newborn nursery, and respiratory therapy.

Added to the formal classroom and hospital setting is actual training in the Fire Department Ambulance. This includes, but is not limited to, a total of 22 hours of Advanced Life Support calls and a total of 100 hours of actual Ambulance time. He must also have the experience of working one full "Arrest Call"—a full heart attack. "It was a real challenge," states new paramedic Fox, "one which I will always remember with fondness and a great appreciation for my instructors." Newly graduated Paramedic Quinn says he is glad that it is over and that the book work is behind him. He is looking forward to the daily challenge of the job and the opportunity to help those who need his skill and training.

Chief Farberman of the North Maine Fire Department is very proud of his two new Paramedics. He feels that the residents of the Fire District is at an all-time high. This is due primarily to the number of certified and qualified personnel and also to the Advanced Life Support equipment used by the Department. The Chief commented further that each certified paramedic is required to take a total of 40 hours continuing education each year for practical skills and alternately takes an examination one year for practical skills and one year for classroom study and a written examination.

percentages for lawyers and journalists and psychologists and other higher beings. Half were below the norm. Yet, school districts persist in flooding newspapers with meaningless records about their students being "above the norm".

These over-moneyed suburban schools may be reporting a particle of truth in citing their dubious achievements. Perhaps their "above the norm" scores are pushed up by the dismal showings the inner city schools record.

A much more accurate gauge of how well the suburban schools are doing would be to compare how they are scoring compared to the other suburban schools in its area. You never read those kind of numbers. And it's unlikely you ever will.

If an enterprising reporter would care to do a bit of research he could find out how well his local school district fares at the high school in its area. There are records which show certain districts do less well than other districts which feed into the same high school. But it is doubtful you've ever read about it. And it is highly unlikely any school district would send a news release which reports its district does less well than its neighbors at the high school level.

In Maine Township it would not be difficult to predict the wealthier Park Ridge kids at Maine South have a higher average of school accomplishment than its sister schools' students. Likewise, the New Trier students along the North Shore have a higher school average than less affluent

areas. There's no mystery to such a report. Yet, when was the last time you read your students' schools had a lower average than these schools? Next time you read about your schools' averages are "above the norm" think about the "norm". And remember about all the doctors in America (one-half of them) who were in the bottom half of their graduation classes.

We were heading for lunch Tuesday at 12:30 when we saw a bulldozer about to do a number on a frame house on Sherman Road just north of Dempster Street. The house was still standing when I first passed by but when I returned an hour later it was a heap of 60 year old wood.

When I returned to the office I was telling everyone how sad it is to see 60 years of living go up in scrap in 60 minutes. There were 60 years of growing up - of parties and babies and teenagers and joyous moments of graduations and communions and weddings and boys and girls yelling down hallways. And the bulldozer put its final imprint on all these memories in 60 minutes. When I finished my "heart on my sleeve" soliloquy my number one son looked at me somewhat less sentimentally and said he wasn't too saddened by my tale. He reminded me the family, whose home had been scraped, received \$3 million for the land which will be used for a shopping center.

All those dollars still can't erase those memories of 60 years.

signals at the two intersections so that when trains are passing, all signals will be red to prohibit movement of cars in any direction. IDOT is bearing the \$6,500 cost for the engineering changes that were completed in September.

The new signs read, "Thanks I.D.O.T. for all red signals when trains are crossing. This will save lives." The signs bear the signature of Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase.

Niles Police Chief Ray Giovannelli said Metra supported the village's position in its demand for more safety measures at the two crossings, which were the scenes of two fatal car-train accidents in February.

"Metra should also get some credit for the new traffic signalization that will help save lives in the future," Giovannelli said.

Giovannelli noted that with the all-red signal, the waiting period for motorists will be a minute or less for passenger trains and two minutes or less for freight trains. "Police have monitored activities at the two railway

crossings following the signal change and there have been no problems. Motorists appear to understand the new system and no confusion or violations have been reported so far," Giovannelli said.

He stated he was happy with IDOT's decision to bring safety improvements which will prevent confusion by motorists to make a left turn and blunder into an oncoming train. "It's not a total solution because there are always those who try to beat trains," he said.

Prior to the change, the lights turned green for Lehigh at both intersections when a train approached and red for the east-west streets. IDOT has jurisdiction on both Touhy and Lehigh. The deaths that sparked the controversy occurred on Feb. 12 and on Feb. 29. In the one accident, an Arlington Heights man rammed the third car of a passing Metra commuter train after driving into the wrong lane of traffic. The second accident involved a Glenview woman who was killed under similar circumstances.

welfare of the residential community. "Other concerns are the vague plans regarding possible expansion in the future that could cause problems in the area," said Commissioner Andy Przybylo.

Petitioner Jerome Peterson, who purchased the office-warehouse building from Lo Verde Construction Co., said he wanted to lease about 11,300 square feet of the warehouse portion to the Tribune Company for newspaper distribution in Niles, Morton Grove and Park Ridge.

Traffic activity would involve 40 to 50 cars going into the property at staggered hours between 1:30 a.m. and 5 a.m. where newspapers would be prepared for home or store delivery and then loaded into the cars. Entry would be on Newark and exit on Milwaukee.

Peterson said he would use a portion of the existing office facility for his glass company and space for a work shop. The remaining portion would be leased. In reply to a question from the board on possible expansion, Peterson said he was considering an addition for office leasing in the future.

Other plans called for excavating an open area at the rear of the building for a parking area and landscaping of grass, trees and shrubs. A berm would be located near an existing fence facing Newark. He noted the subject property was 300 feet away from St. Andrew's Home on Newark.

"Soft lighting will be installed around the building and the landscaping has been planned to subdue any noise from cars on the premises," said a representative from the Tribune Company.

He contended that sound would not travel that far and noted there is a "lot of noise" from vehicular traffic on Milwaukee Ave.

Sister Rosalita, administrator of St. Andrew's Home for the Aged, 7000 Newark, said the home has 200 residents, 150 independent who come and go from the facility, and 54 bedridden patients that would be affected by the proposed plan.

blem is that the water flows east to a sewer in front of his street. "The sewer doesn't have that much capacity. Every year I get two or three inches of water in the basement and as much as 38 inches in heavy rains."

Barrigan noted the sewer carries all the water run-off with the Gremman sewer taking part of it. He added downspouts have not helped and installing a sump pump, as suggested by a village official, would not alleviate the situation.

"It would only overflow and flood the yard and basement," he said. "All the homes have flooding problems, but I get the brunt because of the lower elevation of the land."

Asked by trustees if he had complained to the village, Barrigan said he had contacted a village official three years ago and did not get anything.

Harrigan said he moved into his home in 1967, and over the years, has replaced three furnaces, two freezers, three washing machines and other appliances, files and records. "I've had 31 years of this and it's enough," he said. "Young people are moving out of the neighborhood because of the problem and we want something done."

Ron Lori, who said he lives across the street from Barrigan, said the village is responsible for police and fire protection, snow removal, etc. and should be responsible for sewage. He added that children like to play in basements and have become "Theater of the Mind" problem living like this. We need to have more sewers to drain the water," he said. "If you don't want to do it because it will cost money or that it involves only 20 homes, then do it for the children."

Trustees said people should have complained sooner. "This town is where people count and our board believes in that," said Trustee Louella Preston. "Something will be done."

expert on the complete stop, encyclopedic in your knowledge of one way streets, school zones and right-turn-on-red intersections, and a veritable snail compared to other drivers. You will elevate driving to an art form because it is a matter of legal and economic survival. There are serious ramifications if you get another ticket in the next twelve months. But, get past this insidious piece of yellow paper first.

In most minor traffic offenses such as disregarding traffic signals, speeding less than twenty miles over the posted limit, driving with expired plates, etc., a court appearance is not mandatory. However, if you decide to plead guilty to the offense and pay your fine without going to court, be aware that traffic convictions are reported to the Secretary of State's office and your insurance company regularly accesses those records. Your insurance rate may be adjusted on the basis of your driving record. Perhaps court is a better option for you.

Park Ridge Traffic Court. Landscaped setting on Park Place, just off Prospect, inside City Hall. Right through the double doors. You have the feeling that you have walked into a tribunal, rather than a courtroom. The understated decor is appointed in oak. The judge's chair is slightly higher at center than the semi-circle of comfortable swivel chairs to either side. Elevated but not lofty. Arrive at least fifteen minutes before the time specified on your citation. Re-check your ticket before you leave your house to make sure that you are at the correct courthouse. This is a time to be garbed in businesslike attire. More than the defendant has been dressed down, so to speak, for wearing inappropriate clothing, such as shorts, to a hearing.

Just before the court call, the bailiff will announce that you are to line up before the clerk's seat and enter your plea. You will be told that no one is to talk or read during court. When the judge enters, you must rise and not take your seat until told to do so. Judge Zacone gives a short homily before calling defendants. He is concisely informative. Now is not the time to get drowsy. Better yet, keep your eyes on the judge as he speaks. He says that he's not there to fill the city's treasury but rather to keep the streets safe for drivers and pedestrians and you will believe him. He cites some interesting national driving statistics as well. He tells those assembled that a defendant can plead guilty or not guilty, that you can have a lawyer, and/or a jury trial if you are pleading not guilty. He disposes those who are entering a guilty plea first.

Honestly should be the operant policy here. If you plead not guilty, you are telling the judge that you did not break the law. This is not like a Chicago courtroom, where, at the very beginning of the court call, the judge often discharges defendants when the arresting officer is not there. While you won't be convicted if the officer who stopped you is not at court, you will have to rely on your powers of recognition to be sure that the officer is not running late. It's been at least three weeks since you were stopped. (Remember those blinding laser lights and your dazed reaction?) More than likely you kept your eyes lowered and didn't really look at the officer closely.

If you have given a guilty plea to the bailiff, you can still change the plea to not guilty before the judge. According to Illinois law, a defendant pleading guilty must understand the possible consequences of this plea before it is entered. If you do change your plea, your case will be heard the last part of the court call after the "guilty" defendants are taken care of. An attorney could give you a better idea of what might happen if you plead not guilty since each situation is unique.

If you plead guilty, the judge will ask you about your driving record. Again, be honest. There is a state's attorney next to you who has access to files at the Secretary of State's office. You will not be allowed to explain why you did what you did. The judge will announce your fine and call the next case. If you are lucky, you may receive supervision, which means that there will be no report filed with the Secretary of State's Office. If you receive supervision, you must not get any traffic offenses for at least a year in order to meet the terms of supervision. On the traffic court day in question, fines were levied in the \$0 to \$100 range, with the most common fine being \$35 or \$50. Only one guilty defendant received no fine, due to highly unusual circumstances. You could be out of there in as little as twenty minutes. No matter how you feel about the judge's decision, remain deadpan. If humanly possible, a simple "thank you" would be nice. He has probably done you a favor. And hopefully, this is the last time you'll ever have to appear.

Traffic Court Survival Guide

The following recommendations apply if you are appearing in court on a minor traffic offense that does not involve another driver:

1. Allow enough time. Arrive 15 minutes before your scheduled court hearing. Make sure to go to the right courtroom.
2. Dress appropriately. Business attire preferred. No shorts or skimpy halters.
3. Do not read, write or talk while court is in session. Listen carefully to what the judge, bailiff and clerk say.
4. Honesty is the best policy. If you plead not guilty, you are telling the court you did not break the law.
5. You are entitled to have a lawyer represent you and/or a jury trial. You are entitled to know the consequences of a guilty plea before you enter it.
6. Be honest about your driving record. The State's Attorney can access your Secretary of State's Office file.
7. Be prepared for the worst. Your fine could be as high as \$100. It will likely be in the \$35-\$50 dollar range. You may not receive supervision from the judge. If that is the case, the violation will become part of your driving record.
8. If you receive supervision, another violation within 12 months will revoke that supervision.
9. Allow a minimum of one hour's time for your court appearance.
10. Slow down, make full stops and pay attention to road signs from now on.

Skokie together with the key destinations they serve:

Rt. 208-runs from the Davis Street CTA Rapid Transit Station and through Skokie on Church Street. It goes to Old Orchard, the Cook County Courthouse and ultimately to Golf Mill. At Old Orchard, a rider can transfer to Rt. 212 which goes north along Waukegan Road, through Glenview, Northbrook, Northfield, to Northbrook Court. At Golf Mill, a transfer can be made to Rt. 220 which goes right through the O'Hare Airport terminals.

Rt. 210-can be boarded at Lincoln and Oakton for a ride to the east Loop, including Water Tower Place. The trip downtown costs \$2.50 plus 10 cents for a transfer if one is needed.

Rt. 211-operates from Devon and Milwaukee, travelling east of Devon to Crawford, north on Crawford to Howard, east on Howard into the Howard Street CTA Station.

Rt. 210-runs from the Howard Street CTA Rapid Transit Station in Evanston to Crawford. Then it goes north on Crawford to Golf and west again to Old Orchard.

Rt. 226-runs from Jefferson Park CTA Rapid Transit Station in Chicago along Lincoln, Niles Center and on Oakton all the way to Des Plaines.

Rt. 250-runs east-west along Dempster, from the Davis Street CTA Station in Evanston at its eastern end to Des Plaines at the western end. This route serves the Skokie Swift and the Prairie View Shopping Center in Morton Grove. In downtown Des Plaines, a connection can be made with Rt. 220 to O'Hare.

A glance at a NORTRAN map will show how these routes interconnect with other NORTRAN routes to each destination in every one of the 28 north and northwest suburban communities which NORTRAN serves.

"I urge Skokie residents to get a NORTRAN System Map and several timetables and keep them handy," Margolis said. NORTRAN buses are a major but very underutilized village resource."

The basic fare is \$1 plus 10 cents for a transfer. Senior citizens and handicapped with a Special User card and children from seven to eleven ride for half fare. "The best deal of all is for children under seven. They ride free when accompanied by an adult," Margolis added.

closed mall also attracts shoppers because they don't have to worry about inclement weather." The shopping center currently has 120 leases, but the goal is for 160 businesses to achieve over-all success from the 1986 renovations. "It could be a little difficult to get the last 40 tenants, but we plan to actively seek prospective tenants to fill the available space," he said.

Eichelmeier said he is not unduly concerned about possible competition from two new shopping centers that will soon be developed in Niles (reconstruction of the Lawrencewood shopping center and the AT&T property on Touhy Ave.). "They are what you call giant shopping strips. Different kinds of people are attracted to shopping centers depending on the facility and what they offer to meet the needs of customers," he said.

He explained that Golf Mill is a regional shopping center that attracts people from the local area, from Arlington Heights, Wheeling and other northwest suburbs. "I think the concept of a total environment for shoppers will continue to attract customers to Golf Mill," Eichelmeier said.

Golf Mill shopping center has come a long way since ground was broken on the 88-acre parcel of land bounded by Golf Rd., Milwaukee Ave., Church St. and Greenwood Ave.

Groundbreaking ceremonies were held in 1959 officiated by the late John F. Canoe and Sears, Roebuck and Co. officials, owners and developers of the

property. Sears, still the center's principal owner, moved into its 230,000 square foot building in 1960 in the north mall. Annexation by the Village of Niles was completed the same year.

The shopping center opened its doors in late 1960 and the first to open in the south mall was Karoll's Men's Shop, which is still doing business there today.

As the open-design shopping center was approaching its 20th birthday (1980), the complex had about 70 stores, including a second anchor store, J.C. Penney's, and a professional building.

Renovation plans for the aging shopping center began in 1979, in which the original plan was to enclose only the south mall of the center between Sears and Penney's. Although a study for the revamping of the center mentioned the possibility of a second floor in the mall, the plan was dropped because of financial reasons.

Plans by the former Golf Mill management company to improve the center followed a three-part study by Burton-Aschman in 1979 that explored the feasibility of renovations. Results of the study showed that modern day trends pointed to an enclosed mall for sales marketability in the future.

The project remained in the discussion stage for several years and was reportedly stalled because of the faltering economy.

Construction began in 1984 and was completed in 1986, with the addition of a third anchor store, MainStreet.

Township Clerk Stephen Stolton's office stated that the office has experienced a tremendous number of registrations - 650 in the past month versus 80 to 100 in an average month. These were individuals who signed up at the Township and the figures given do not reflect the number of registrants signed up by volunteer deputy registrars, sponsored by civic and political organizations such as the League of Women Voters and the local Democratic and Republican organizations. These registration cards are sent directly to the County Clerk's office.

Election Board Commissioners Robert Logay's department states that the pre-canvas 1988 total for Maine Township is 78,817 registrants, versus 77,843 for the same period in 1984. Niles Township registrations are at 65,183 versus 66,272 in October of 1984.

The totals will change after the voter canvas and an overall increase is anticipated.

When registration closes on October 11, volunteers will go door

to door from Wednesday through Friday to validate registrations. Registrants on the voter lists will be polled individually to verify their status, and those on the election rolls who have moved, died or are otherwise ineligible will be removed from the lists of eligible voters and will receive notification of their disenfranchisement by mail.

Persons receiving postcards telling them that their voting status has been challenged must go to the Clerks office with proof of identity and residency. This should be done well before the election, as they are otherwise disqualified from voting.

Any voter who has moved, changed his name or has turned 18 since the last election, must register to order to vote. The final October 11 registration will be held in each precinct from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. To find the location of your precinct or to volunteer to work on registration day, contact the township clerk's office. In Niles, the phone is 673-8300. For Maine, the number is 297-2510.


