Crime task force joins MG police in murder investigation

Mob hit hinted in MG murder

Morton Grove Police will have a platoon of Federal, State and other local law enforcement personnel helping them solve the first murder in their community since 1979.

The November 21 killing of 73-year old Philip Goodman of Nevada is shrouded in as much mystery as his recent life. Since his brutally beaten body was discovered face down in a pool of blood by a maid at the Admiral Oasis Motel, 9353 Waukegan Rd., Morton Grove Police along with a major crime task force of FBI agents, Illinois State Police and Chicago Police have been searching through correspondence and other papers found in his hotel room.

Goodman, legally a resident of Las Vegas, Nevada, checked into the motel Monday, November 21, paying in advance for one night. He was driving a rental 1988 Chrysler LeBaron from an O'Hare agency. He had flown into the Chicago area several days prior to checking in but his exact movements prior to his murder are unknown. Found in his possession was an Illinois driver's license in his name which listed a Glenview residence belonging to his nephew. Goodman, married three times, has at least one former wife living in the Chicago area, according to records.

Niles youth write winning essays

Are today's young people frivolous or are they too serious? Judging from the winning essays submitted by Niles' seventh and eighth graders, local youngsters are articulate as well as informed about a variety of weighty issues faced by the world.

Przybylo's hard work and family devotion built House of the White Eagle

In Thaddeus E. Przybylo, Niles has its own version of Horatio Alger. Przybylo's moral is "If you want to get rich, you've got to be willing to work a lot of hours as well as outdo the next guy." He is owner of the House of the White Eagle at 8839 N. Milwaukee Ave. Although in his early 70's Przybylo (pronounced Shi-bi-lo) insists on averaging from 12 to 15 hours a day including weekends at the White Eagle. He supervises the huge restaurant and catering establishment, waits on tables, talks to customers "and does everything including smiling at girls," he said.

The name of his restaurant reflects Przybylo's pride in his Polish heritage. He once considered naming the restaurant the "Polonaise" after a Polish dance but decided the name was inappropriate following numerous phone queries about the "Polynesian" restaurant, said Przybylo.

A White Eagle was chosen as the symbol of Poland when it became a state in 966 A.D. It is also the symbol of the Polish Na-

tional Alliance.

According to legend, three men named Lech, Czech and Rus met at the site of Gnesow where a white eagle was building a nest. Lech built his home in the area which later became part of Poland. Czech moved south to a part of Europe known as Czechoslovakia and Rus traveled east to the land mass that

good," said Przybylo.

Vivian Kolpek, Przybylo's daughter, arrived to say "Hello." She owns a florist shop next door to the White Eagle. "My father won't tell anyone about all the good things he's done. He is a modest man and doesn't want any accolades," she said.

However she recalls the strong emphasis placed on charity by her father. "When we were very little, my dad asked us what our favorite Christmas gift was and I pointed to a stuffed animal. He took our gifts along with a food basket to a needy family because he wanted us to know that it isn't always easy to give. I've never forgotten that," said Kolpek.

Christmas Eve is very important to Polish families and Przybylo invited about 100 Polish immigrants to dinner during that holiday following the Solidarity Uprising in the 70's, she continued. "The family waited on them and we kept out TV cameras so these people wouldn't feel exploited," recounted his daughter.

Przybylo said he became president of the Polish Welfare Org. about 10 years ago at a time when it was barely surviving. Today it has a budget of thousands of dollars. Currently, his "pet" organization is the three-year old "Polonia cares," a program to help youth, the elderly and lonely, he said. Old-age is one of the "greatest sicknesses" of man, according to Przybylo.

Almost all of Przybylo's employees who entered the office spoke Polish which evidently posed a problem for some persons, he said. "I hired a chef from the Drake Hotel, a fine chef, but he quit after one week because he couldn't speak Polish and communicate with others in the kitchen," recalled Przybylo with a smile.

Prior to the Niles business, Przybylo owned a catering service on Chicago's west side, purchased in 1973. It stood on the former sites of The Deborah Boys' Club and Rosen's Bakery.

Przybylo has worked since the age of eight when he delivered newspapers and caddied at Tam O'Shanter Golf Course. Six years later he attempted to support his family by seeking employment as a dishwasher. Therefore, his conversation is peppered with maxims and "morals" regarding observations on how to succeed in business.

His father was one of many Americans numbered among the unemployed during the Depression of 1930. Fearing that the family would lose their home, young Ted dropped out of school following 8th grade and began work as a dishwasher on the north side of Chicago. But first he had to learn how to wash dishes. The first attempt at such employment was unsuccessful. "A restaurant owner asked if I could wash dishes and I said 'Absolutely, yes.' However, I had had a typical Polish mother who wouldn't let her sons do anything and we had never washed a dish in our lives," said Przybylo regarding his lack of experience.

A result, he dumped refuse from dirty dishes into soap water. In those days, long before the advent of dishwashers, restaurants rarely changed soap water and relied on cleansing dishes with more frequent changes of rinse water, he said.

Przybylo said, "This is the only job I ever lost" and cited a "moral" learned from the experience. "Don't ever prevent your sons or daughters from learning anything," he said.

Subsequently, he worked as a busboy and waiter at several hotels including the formerly renowned LaSalle Hotel in Chicago. While still in his "teens," Przybylo became a waiter at the hotel's exclusive Blue Fountain Room featuring the famed Husk O'Hare band.

He notes that the world's largest hotel was completed in 1928 by Ernest Stevens who also owned the LaSalle Hotel. It was wiped out two years later during

Miller, and Department Accreditation Manager Janet Drouin participated in a final review by the Commission prior to receiving this national recognition. Less than 100 law enforcement agencies have won accredited status to date, out of approximately 40,000

eligible agencies nationwide. The Virginia meeting represented the culmination of a three-year self-assessment process during which the Department examined all aspects of its administrative and operational responsibilities in order to bring them into compliance with over 900 nationally established standards.

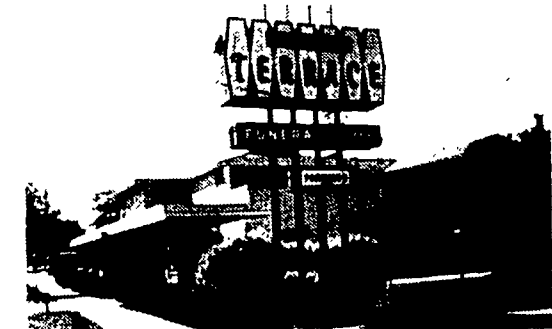
She had been a member of the Niles Community Church of Niles, since 1966, where she was the most elderly (in age)

Interment was private. In lieu of flowers, memorials may be made to Geneva Place of The Presbyterian Home.



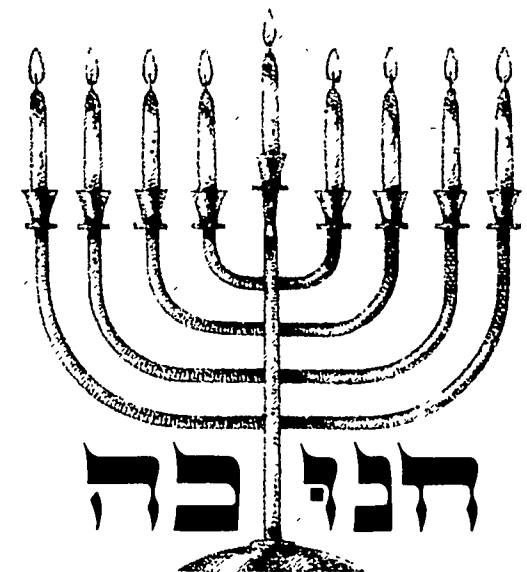

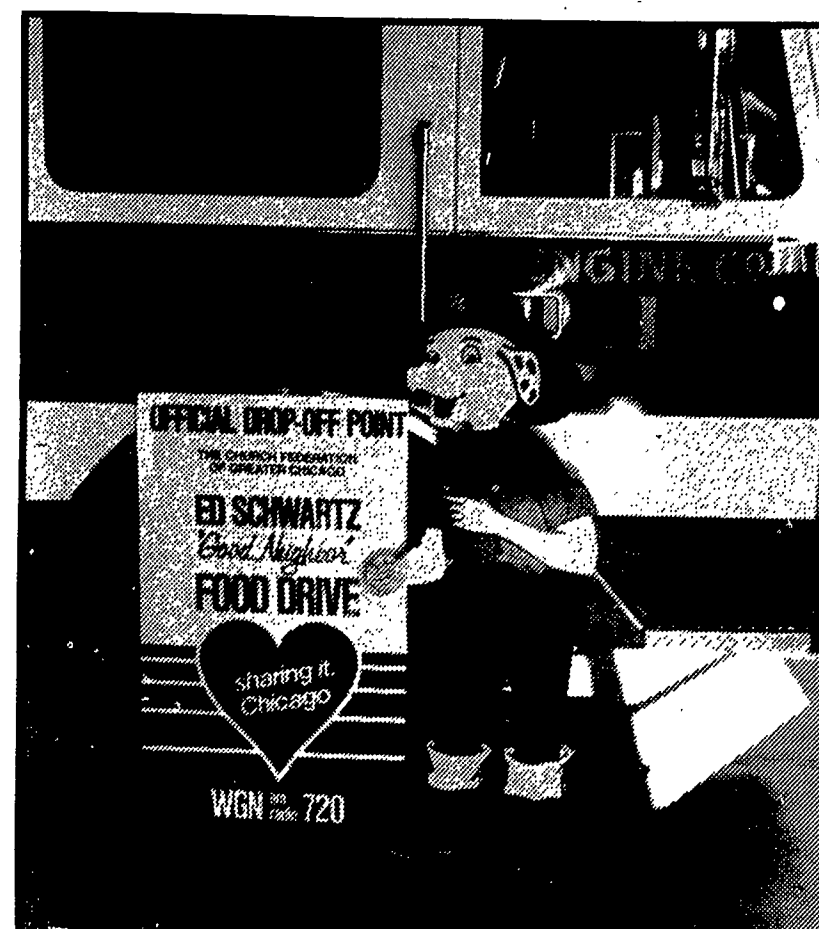

The scoreless third period featured some fine goal tending by both teams however the Rangers Tony Turner had to be particularly sharp as he was tested often by a fine Glenview team.

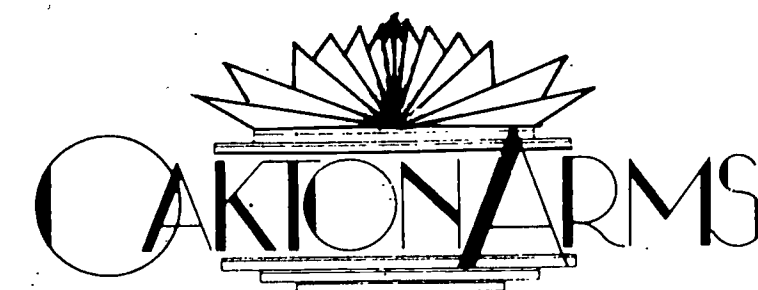

Com Ed says "Take a hard look at CUB"

Dear Editor:

On August 6, the Executive Director of the Citizens Utility Board predicted that Commonwealth Edison would earn an extra \$85 million from June 1 through August 31, compared with the same period in 1987. Our books showed an earnings decrease of \$98.5 million.

In 1988, CUB predicted that Edison's peak load would not reach 15,683 megawatts of power until 2000. We reached it in 1987. This past summer, the company's customers demanded \$17,459 mw, an 11 percent increase in one year.

Erroneous predictions and unfounded charges flow from these self-appointed experts on a seemingly endless basis and are left to stand largely unchallenged by the media. If their estimate of power requirements is off by a couple of decades, so what? They don't have the responsibility to customers of delivering the power. If their earnings forecast is off by 200 percent, who cares? Just move on to a new prediction of an "undeserved windfall" to Edison shareholders--and throw in additional half-truths and untruths for good measure.

By deliberately understating the amount of electricity consumed by an average single family home, and focusing only on a brief period, CUB was able to gain widespread publicity for a charge that Edison's non-summer residential rates are the highest in the United States. CUB conveniently failed to acknowledge that charges to customers vary with usage. Usage above 400 kilowatthours per month costs less. If CUB had made its comparison at 750 kilowatthours per month, it would have found non-summer rates to be 40 percent higher in New York, 30 percent higher in San Diego, 21 percent higher in Philadelphia, and 9 percent higher in Boston. CUB also looked at temporarily high autumn rates that balance lower spring rates this year. Overall 1988 rates are designed so that customers will pay approximately the same total in 1988 that they did in 1987 for the same amount of electricity used.

Although CUB has called on the business community to fight Commonwealth Edison, it has offered no similar "study" of industrial rates. Perhaps there is good reason for this omission. In a recent survey by the National

Utility Service, Edison ranked twelfth in cost among the 23 major investor-owned utilities in the United States.

It's amazing how CUB continues to cling to the belief that Edison maintains generating capacity that won't be needed "for years to come". The fact is that Edison barely met last summer's all-time record peak demand with an actual reserve margin of 3.6 percent. Customer demand in 1986 exceeded the 1987 peak on 16 separate days. Byron and Braidwood stations, which CUB has fought to cancel for years, consistently provided about 20 percent of the power during these periods of high demand. Without them, brownout and even blackout conditions would have prevailed.

Far from a "windfall", Edison's shareholders seek only a fair return on their investment in three generating units that helped northern Illinois avoid these conditions. Since they started generating, these three units have provided customers with approximately \$100 million in fuel cost savings. On the other side of the ledger, Edison's revenues, net income, and earnings per share have been in a tailspin since August 1987. For the 12 months ended September 30, revenues declined 3.9 percent, net income fell 24.6 percent, and earnings per common share dropped 28.6 percent.

Electricity consumption in northern Illinois and elsewhere in the United States is expected to keep on growing, driven by healthy demands from the commercial/industrial sector and, if some of the climatologists are correct, possibly more torrid summers. Edison is ready; we've recently completed a generating station construction program to meet the future.

Perhaps the community should take a hard look at CUB and its leaders and ask: Who are these people who pretend to be so knowledgeable about providing electric service? Does anyone know much about them? Or why they merit anyone's trust? Their track record is one of grossly inaccurate predictions, public posturing, and knee-jerk opposition to any step taken by Commonwealth Edison.

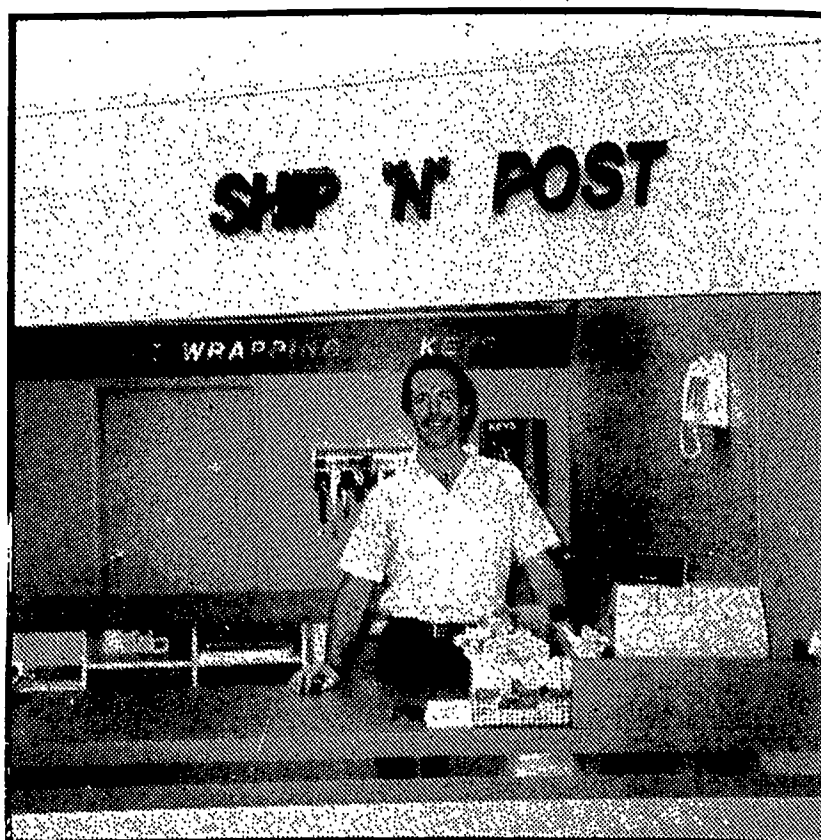

How to survive holiday spending: Plan purchases

It's time for that annual ritual—holiday shopping. Consumers armed with credit cards, checkbooks, and cash scurry to purchase gifts for family and friends. Yet, for some people, December's good cheer and giving turns to January woes of bills and debt.

Consumers encounter these holiday debt problems for two primary reasons, according to Les Kirschbaum, president of Mid-Continent Agencies, Inc., a leading collections firm based outside Chicago in Glenview that contacts debtors daily.

"For starters, most consumers shop with no set budget," said Kirschbaum. "While people usually take time to budget routine home tasks such as groceries and entertainment, they don't follow this discipline during the holidays."

"In addition, many shoppers simply buy more than they can afford," he added. "The hype of the holiday season—and people's nature to be generous this time of year—make consumers spend beyond their means."

Kirschbaum believes consumers can avoid debt created from holiday shopping by

establishing a special gift plan and budget.

"A total budget for holiday gifts should first be set. Then, assign specific dollar amounts for each individual on the list. The total should not exceed that overall budget; at least, one will have a target to work with," he explained.

Another tip is to use common sense when utilizing credit cards. "Credit cards are another major cause of debt problems during the holiday season," Kirschbaum said. "Consumers have a tendency to overspend when charging their purchases. The key is to adhere to the established budget and use the plastic only when cash or a check is not convenient."

If consumers already use 20 percent of their net income to pay off installment purchases, Kirschbaum strongly suggests that only cash be used when gift buying.

"A planned holiday shopping program will enable consumers to maintain that holiday spirit into the new year and not be extinguished when overwhelmed and financially overburdened by a barrage of bills," he said.

Safety tips for overzealous holiday party-goers

The holidays can be one of the most joyous and eventful times of the year; however, if merry-making goes too far, distress and grief may be the outcome. Drinking and overeating are a few areas to approach with caution before attending holiday festivities, according to Chris Fahey, M.D., family practitioner, Lutheran General Hospital-Lincoln Park, 2035 N. Lincoln Ave., Chicago. Dr. Fahey suggests you consider the following information for a safer holiday season.

Toast of the Town

One area for the most concern during the holidays is drinking and driving. Dr. Fahey stresses that the best way to avoid unpleasant and possible deadly mishaps is prevention - don't drink alcoholic beverages. Instead, drink beverages such as fruit

juices, tea, club soda or non-alcoholic beer and wine.

However, for those who will be partaking in holiday cheer, Dr. Fahey offers the following suggestions:

- Assign a designated driver who will not be drinking alcoholic beverages at all during the evening.

- Call a cab or limousine service to transport you home if you've been drinking and don't have a designated driver.

- Don't attempt to walk home after drinking. Although you may feel that walking is better than driving, the end result can be just as hazardous. A great number of pedestrians who are hit by cars during the holiday season are intoxicated.

- Alcoholic beverages dilate the blood vessels in the skin giving you a false sense of warmth. A

person who has been drinking often feels that proper dress isn't necessary, resulting with any of a number of cold-weather ailments - the worst of which can be fatal.

- Make arrangements ahead of time to spend the night at your hosts' home to avoid all possibilities of accidents on the roadway. Even if you haven't been drinking, you can't be sure that others on the road are sober.

Old Wive's Tales
A number of "family" remedies for sobering up at a party are in fact "old wive's tales," stated Dr. Fahey. For example:

- "Drinking coffee at the end of the evening will restore clear thought." Wrong. Dr. Fahey said that, in fact, drinking coffee to sober up can cause more harm than good because it creates a false sense of security. Coffee has

no effect on the alcohol level in a person's blood stream.

- "Eating lots of bread will help soak up the alcohol." Wrong. Eating any type of food only slows down the absorption time into a person's blood stream, and may cause a delayed reaction to the liquor consumed later in the evening.

Food for Thought

Another cause for holiday woes is overeating. Often when an abundance and a variety of foods are consumed, the digestive tract becomes upset, causing indigestion, heartburn or other discomforts. Dr. Fahey has the following holiday-eating suggestions:

- Eat in moderation - and eat slowly - to give the body enough time to become full and metabolize the food.

- Avoid alcohol, spicy foods, cigarette smoke and coffee. All will add to the discomfort of an upset stomach.

"The holidays are a special and festive time of year but when you overextend yourself by overdrinking or overeating, all you'll remember is how terrible you felt," says Dr. Fahey. Use care when popping champagne corks

and foremost, never point the champagne cork at anyone's face, especially your own.

Another safety tip is keeping the bottle cold.

"Warm champagne or sparkling wine is more likely to pop unexpectedly," explained Dr. Gerstein. "Besides, champagne tastes better when served at a temperature of about 40 degrees."

Remove the foil over the cork. Keep the cork down with the palm of your hand, and carefully remove the wire hood.

"Place a towel over the entire bottle and tilt the bottle at a 45-degree angle. Make sure it is pointed away from yourself and others," said Dr. Gerstein. "Grasp the cork firmly and slow-

ly twist it to break the seal."

If the cork won't budge, simply place the bottle under cool water for 20 seconds, then repeat the twisting method.

With the bottle at a 45-degree

angel, grasp the bottle firmly and

turn the cork slowly using a slight

upward pull until it is nearly out

of the bottleneck. Use slight

downward pressure and roll the

cork, it will come out completely.

"Your cork won't pop" with the

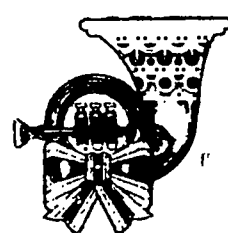
traditional sound, but because

the pressure is released gradually with a hissing noise, the bubbles in your champagne will last longer," said Dr. Gerstein.

In addition to numerous informational handouts, all forms need to apply for financial aid will be available at this meeting.

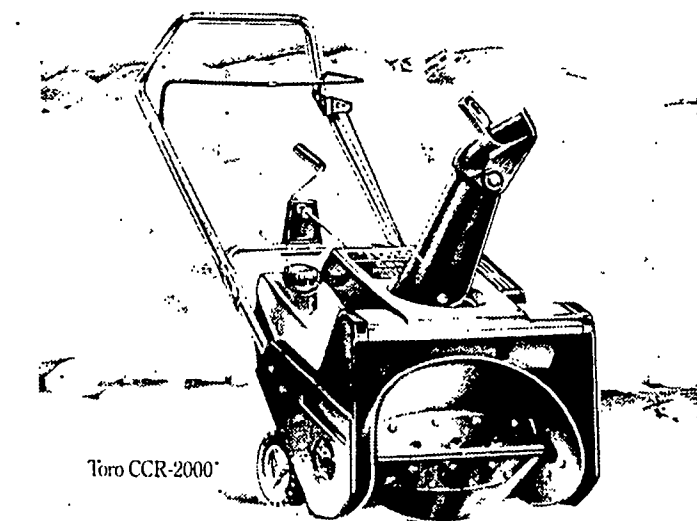

ding to Morton Grove Police Deputy Chief George Incedon. An adult son and daughter also reside locally. According to police, Goodman did not reside at the Glenview address, but used it for identification purposes.

Police officials said Goodman was on the fringe of organized crime, reportedly a former Chicago bookie and Las Vegas oddsmaker. Up until two years ago he operated various businesses, including a travel agency in Las Vegas suspected of laundering mob money. He had gambling arrests in the 1960's but no recent convictions. Because the brutality of Goodman's head wounds are typical of gangland type reprisals, the task force will look into an underworld connection in Las Vegas and Chicago.

Morton Grove investigators are interviewing restaurant and other personnel to determine Goodman's activities between the time of his registration at the Admiral Oasis and 11 a.m. the following day when his body was found. His room was located at the end of the building and the adjoining rooms were vacant. He had been dead between three and seven hours prior to the discovery of his fully clothed body, according to a police witness at the November 23 autopsy, performed by Cook County Medical Examiner Michael Chambliss.

According to a preliminary report by Morton Grove Evidence Technician Matthew Pankow, based on the location of bloodstains and wounds, Goodman,

struck repeatedly in the face while sitting in a chair in the room. The unknown assailant was probably right-handed but the exact object used to pommel Goodman is unknown. The victim's head was covered with two towels, evidently used to prevent his blood from staining his attacker. Bloodstains from the head injuries splattered the wall, the chair, and the left knee of the man's grey trousers. In addition to the "boxer injuries" sustained to the left eyebrow and bridge of his nose, Goodman suffered "blunt trauma to the back of the head." The back of his skull was crushed, causing damage to his brain tissue. One of the victim's teeth was dislodged as well.

Incedon speculated Goodman either knew his assailant(s) or was surprised as he used his key to enter the motel room. Goodman had no "defense wounds" on his arms and he may not have realized he was going to die as a result of the beating. None of the other motel guests reported hearing any screams or other unusual sounds or activities from the room. Morton Grove police are downplaying any potential connection to organized crime until more information is obtained about why Goodman was at the Admiral Oasis and why he was in the Chicago area.

Goodman's body was released after the autopsy and funeral services were held for him in a north shore suburb of Chicago over the Thanksgiving weekend.

not have to wait the time required by the Niles legislation.

Niles Police are still uncertain about the exact mechanics of the checks they will be performing but Police Chief Ray Giovannelli is working on a prototype form to be completed by gun dealers, and submitted to Niles police. Currently, gun shop owners are required to keep affidavits by gun purchasers on file for inspection purposes and produce the records at the request of a village police officer. Barton's and Sportmart receive updates from the State of Illinois about the status of FOID (Firearm Owner Identification) numbers, which are revoked if the cardholder has been convicted of a felony, or recently institutionalized at a psychiatric facility. The existing Niles ordinance also prohibits a narcotic addict from purchasing a gun which can be concealed on their person.

Barton believes the ordinance will hurt the retailer more than the criminal, who will obtain guns and ammunition by illegal means. While pistols represent only about ten percent of Barton's business, sales of ammunition and holsters and other accessories which are often purchased at the same time as the

handgun may be adversely affected.

Katsoulas, noting that an ordinance in Niles does not have direct impact on many types of criminals, sees the amendment as a safeguard, especially if a new sports business selling guns establishes itself in Niles. "Barton's and Sportmart are cooperative and ask us for our recommendations," said Katsoulas. "We're not going to go into these stores and shoot from the hip" to administer this ordinance. Katsoulas said the police will work with the retailers to develop an effective plan. Even though State Police send through periodic updates on revoked cards, Niles police want to be able to perform a third check to run the FOID numbers through State Police computers, which are available only on weekdays.

Katsoulas said the Department will perform additional checks in the event a card number checks out as valid but the retailer or police department have further questions.

The ordinance has been signed by Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase and by Village Clerk Frank Wagner. Notice of the law will be posted in newspapers prior to it becoming official.

school to girls, Molinaro explained that those surveyed in Phase I of the study were in favor of the option because of the quality of education at Notre Dame.

The school sees these as advantages: a larger enrollment base strengthening a more unified outlook in education, and giving parents another alternative in secondary education.

Phase II is looking at the practical side of the question: curriculum, cost of remodeling the facilities to accommodate girls, and impact on neighboring Catholic schools. Molinaro said these points would be considered, in addition to the change of atmosphere from an all male school.

Notre Dame High School founded in 1955, by the Holy Cross Fathers who staff the school, saw enrollment peak in the late 60's with a student body of 1400. Today is a different era in education, said Molinaro, because of special resource facilities and computer rooms. Present enrollment is 810.

If the decision is to change to coeducation, the Holy Cross Fathers would have to apply to their congregation headquarters in South Bend, Indiana, for approval. The Archdiocese of Chicago would also have to sup-

tion.

Art's staff is researching recycling programs in other municipalities, including a pilot project in Arlington Heights where participants are recycling plastics as well as aluminum, newspaper, and glass. According to Art, the final recycling decision will be based on all available information and there will be negotiations to ensure Morton Grove gets the most economic programs. If the decision is made to extend the program village-wide, the target date for implementation of the program is late spring of 1989.

EMPLOYEE INSURANCE COSTS COMPUTED

Art also reported a standoff between costs of insurance for village employees. I.R.M.A. (Insurance Risk Management Agency) costs in 1989 will decrease nearly \$100,000 but the savings to the Village are offset by nearly 33 percent increase in Blue Cross/Blue Shield rates for Village employees. Increases in claims are the cause for the cost hike, which affects retirees as well. Art has not ruled out the possibility of switching insurance providers. He told the board two other agencies are preparing alternative proposals for his review.

the Depression, said Przybylo, as were many businesses due to "overextension" and more need for "personal supervision."

A business, said Przybylo, should have good management. "Be good to people and give them their money's worth," he said.

At the age of 22, Przybylo established his own business, a small bar on the northwest side of Chicago. Here he met the multimillionaire Louis Gerber, the former owner of Gerber Plumbing.

"We would talk together for one or two hours and I questioned him about business. The man gave me so many ideas. You might say he shared the knowledge of his success," said Przybylo.

During this time, Przybylo met his wife, Alice. "We met in a bakery over a loaf of rye bread," he said. "Now I tell her that everytime I see a loaf of rye bread, it reminds me of her," he laughed.

Alice watched the couple's business while her husband marched off to World War II where he served until 1944. According to Przybylo, I was a real "devil" until I met my wife. She made a "different person out of me."

So different did he become that he considered becoming a mortician when he returned from duty. "But there was a lot of money in liquor and I decided to heck with that idea," he said and started another business following his return to the States.

The White Eagle and Przybylo's reputation have attracted many famous persons including Pope Pius XII, President Jimmy Carter, former presidential candidate Edmund Muskie, Willie Mays, Walter Payton and Karl Malden.

President Carter was hosted by the White Eagle eight years earlier at a centennial banquet for the Polish National Alliance. The restaurateur recalls "At the time, three wedding receptions also were being held in the building. I asked Carter to do the Polka. If he had, every person of Polish descent in the country would have voted for him."

Przybylo was asked to accompany Carter to O'Hare Airport, an honor accepted at the urging of daughter Vivian.

His children are Kolpek, Niles; State Sen. Althea Kroger (D-Vt.); Alice Pawlicki; Lincolnwood; Victoria Pendres, Niles; Teddy M. Przybylo, Niles and Andrew Przybylo, Niles. The latter works with his father and is a former candidate for Cook County Commissioner on the Democratic ticket.

If Przybylo has one over-riding suggestion for success, it would be "Give the business your heart and love people. Rewards occur when people come here and say they like me."

packed assembly.

In her first place essay, "Mayor" Jenny Savino, an eighth grader at our Lady of Ransom School, wrote about a teacher who had influenced her when she told her class "God had a plan" for every human life. Savino equated nuclear war with abortion, saying that each represented an "attempt to feel superior and showed a disregard for human life." Savino's essay earned the only monetary prize—a \$100 savings bond.

Nuclear war figured into the essays of four of St. John Brebeuf's eight winning entrants, Jeff Lesniak, Michele Venci (both eighth graders) Joel Rosal and Mike Blase (7th graders). "Trustee" Lesniak suggested that Russian and American politicians should follow the example of their Olympic athletes who manage to compete without fighting. "Trustee" Rosal said "War is a menace" and "Trustee" Venci declared the prospect of nuclear war, along with existing drug abuse, child abuse and teen pregnancy problems resulted from a lack of communication. "Fire Chief" Blase declared "Violence is a manmade problem." "Village Clerk" Ann Staunton, an OLR eighth grader, expressed uncertainty about a future looming with AIDS, pollution and nuclear war and discussed how complex life is.

Pollution by factories and the weakening of the ozone layer was mentioned by "Chief of Police" Tommy Chang, a Gemini eighth grader who is worried that the high cost of college education will keep young people from being successful. Suzie Nelson, a Gemini eighth grader who did not appear at the meeting, also wrote about pollution. "Director of Public Services" John Touzios, also in eighth grade at Gemini, is concerned about conserving the ozone layer and nonrenewable energy sources. Touzios wrote, "the earth is one old dog that has to learn new tricks."

Fire hydrants to be tested

Chief Morrie Farberman of the North Maine Fire Department has announced that hydrant testing will commence immediately in all of unincorporated Maine Township. The testing will be done only when weather permits (40° or above); and will consist of inspection, flushing and greasing. The flushing will require all hydrants to be cleared of vegetation. The Fire Department asks that residents cooperate by clearing vegetation away from fire hydrants in their neighborhood. Each hydrant will be opened, and to assure that the hydrant stem operates freely, water will be allowed to flow from the hydrant. After the fire hydrant has been shut off, the water drainage will also be monitored. The greasing

will require all outlet ports to be opened, threads checked, and greased. The ports will then be carefully secured. Any necessary adjustments will be reported to North Suburban Public Utilities at this time. These steps are being taken by the North Maine Fire Department in order to insure that each hydrant operates properly and easily, and that each hydrant flows the required amount of water. This testing process, states Chief Farberman, will be an ongoing project with the intent of inspecting and flushing each hydrant in the North Maine Fire Protection District annually. This project may create some inconveniences states Farberman, such as temporary rusty water, temporary low water pressure, and of course the presence of Fire Equipment in the streets.

This activity will help to insure that all hydrants are in acceptable working condition if any emergency should arise. Since the street level fire hydrant is the main source of water supply to combat fire, it is of utmost importance that this source is readily available.

Records will be kept by the North Maine Fire Department on which hydrants are tested and the results of the test. Chief Farberman says that the North Maine Fire Department will be glad to answer any questions the residents of the District may have.

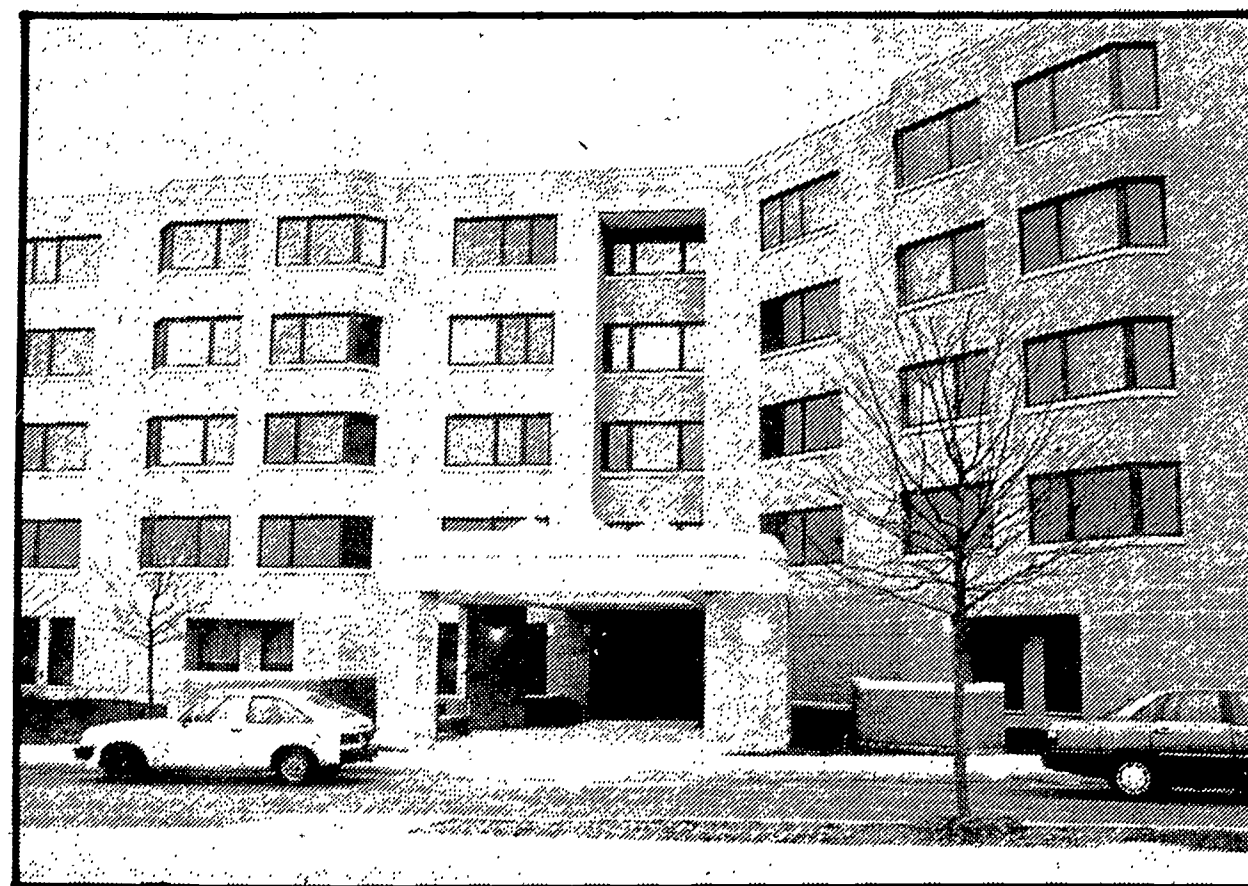

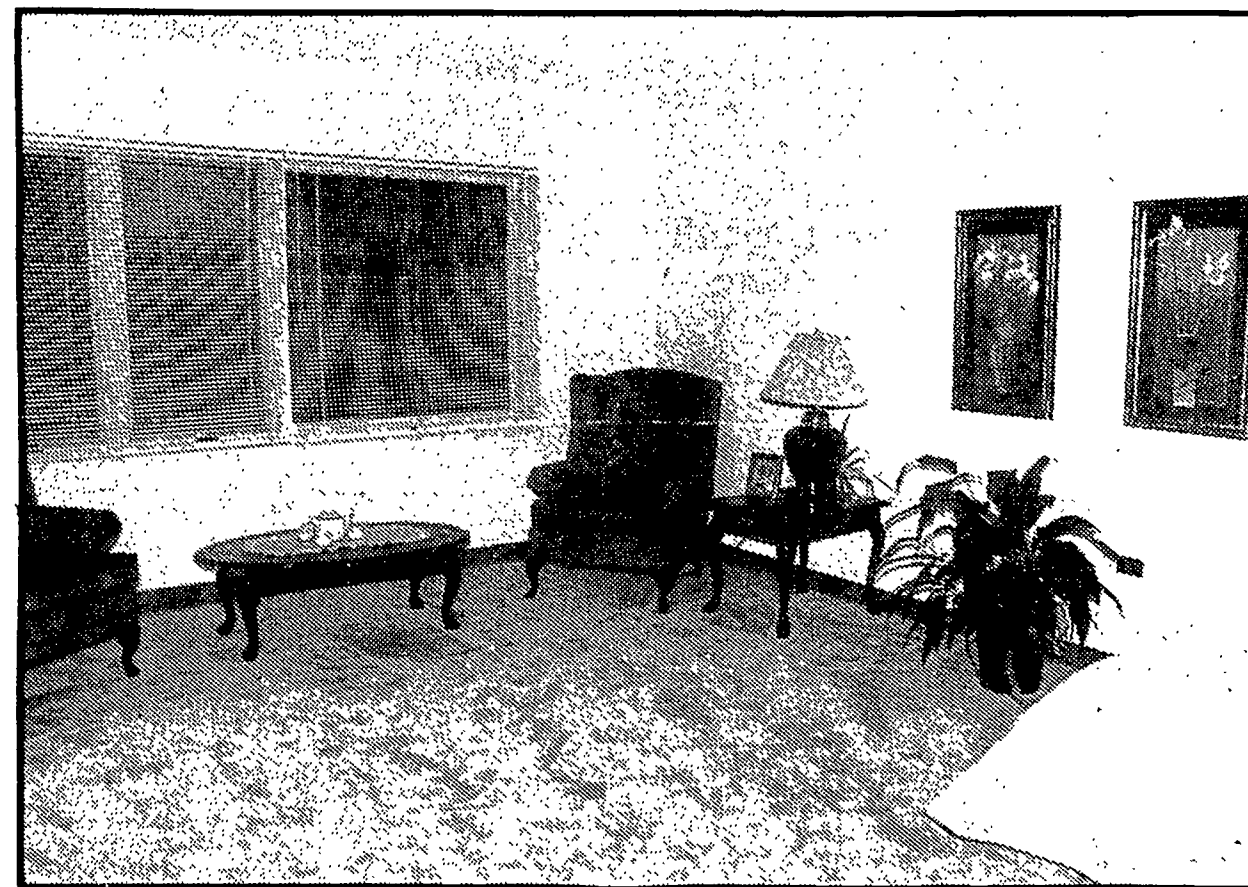
