Parents wrestle with decision to send their children to a coed or a single sex school

Do high school kids do better in coed or single sex schools? Are grades the only thing to consider? Many parents wrestle with this

problem when choosing a high school for their adolescent. Dr. Donald Ring, Principal of Niles Township, West, High

School said, "In reality, life is coed; high school should be part of that. We're helping students develop social relationships.

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At Loyola academy in Wilmette, Dr. Bernard Bouillette, Headmaster, accents the need for both single sex and coeducational schools because legitimate differences exist among people.

Fewer girls do tend to sign up for science and math classes, but whether that is because classes are coed has to be researched." At Maine Township, East, Donna Smith, Dept. of Physical Education Chairperson, maintained "When you separate the sexes, they give an inordinate amount of thought to the opposite sex." Smith sees coeducation as the best way to develop people

skills that will be important later in life. But spokespersons for single sex schools are vocal in their support for this division in the formative years of adolescence. Regarding girls, Nora Byrne, dean of admissions at The Willows academy in Niles, points out that girls' personalities are taking shape in the years between 14 and 18. They are getting to know themselves and determine who they want to be. She feels it's good to start on that path in a single sex environment. Willows students don't neglect the social side," Byrne said, "but it's done after school hours." The school has an enrollment of 125 and 100 percent of the graduates go on to advanced education. One-third of these choose studies in the math or science fields.

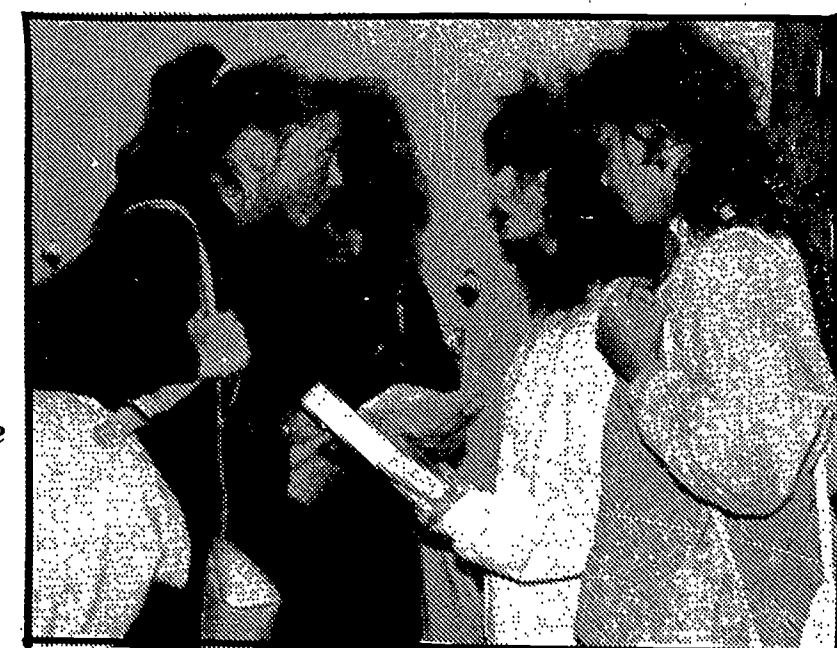
Sister Judith Murphy, O.S.B., Principal of St. Scholastica High School, Chicago, observes that society presumes that men are smarter, more decisive. When girls hear this, they feel second rate. By providing an environment where social and academic concerns are separated, single

sex schools help girls aim higher because they see a variety of options for women and have fewer stereotyped views about women as leaders and successful.

Sister Ann Marie Butler, D.C., head of Marillac High School for girls in Northfield, echoes these points. She and Sister Judith refer to studies done by Anthony Bryk, Ph.D., of the University of Chicago and Valerie Lee, Ph.D., of the University of Michigan who are quoted in Psychology Today. These educators found that "Girls attending single sex Catholic high schools do better

moil, because boys are looking for identity and self esteem. He says the school's college prep curriculum is geared to respond to the male adolescent and his special needs. "There are 8600 Notre Dame grads; they are well adjusted, very successful; leaders in society. They are our best witnesses."

At Loyola academy in Wilmette, Dr. Bernard Bouillette, Headmaster, accents the need for both single sex and coeducational schools because legitimate differences exist among people. "Look at the in-

than their counterparts in private coed schools. Starting at roughly the same level of achievement sophomore year, students at girls' schools surpassed their coed peers by senior year in reading, writing and science...they have greater educational aspirations...have fewer absences and discipline problems." At least 95 percent of Marillac and St. Scholastica grads go on to advanced education.

How do boys perform in this environment? The spirit developed by an all male atmosphere is appropriate for the male adolescent during critical years of his life, believes Father Ken Molinaro, C.S.C., Principal of Notre Dame High School for Boys in Niles. "The teen years can be full of tur-

dividual. Some perform better in the single sex environment. Loyola is concerned with the development of the whole person. Boys are free to pursue intellectual and personal formation, to set goals, be more natural."

Does this mean boys should give no thought to the fairer sex? "No," Bouillette said, "the purpose is not to avoid relationships that must exist with girls. We are challenged to help boys appreciate and understand the feminine perspective." The Headmaster thinks that people today look so much at ACT scores and report cards they lose sight of the formational issues of young adults. "High school goes beyond strictly intellectual development. That's why Loyola exists; there is a need for alternatives."

Child passenger safety awareness week

"Have a Heart...Click from the Start!" That's the theme of National Child Passenger Safety Awareness Week, Feb. 12 - 18. The safety campaign, which coincides with Valentine's Day, encourages parents to protect their children during every motor vehicle trip by correctly using car safety seats and safety belts.

Studies indicate that 70 percent of children under the age of five are placed in child safety seats. However, about one-third of seats are used incorrectly, according to the AAA-Chicago Motor Club. "Motor vehicle accidents on American roads are the number one cause of death for children over six months of age," Jonathan Lehrer said, AAA-CMC's division manager of public affairs. "When used correctly, child safety seats are

about 70 percent effective in preventing fatalities and major injuries."

AAA-CMC offers these suggestions for proper use of child restraint systems:

-Read and follow all directions that accompany the child restraint seat you purchase. Be sure to ask how the system is installed and if all hardware is included.

-Child safety seats should be secured by the vehicle's seat belt. -The center of the back seat is the safest location for child safety seats.

-Safety seats for infants weighing less than 20 pounds must be installed so the baby faces the rear of the vehicle.

-Be sure the child safety seat will fit in your vehicle and be comfortable for your youngster. If possible, test the seat in your car

before you make the purchase. -Never drive anywhere without first securing all children in appropriate restraint seats or seat belts.

Illinois law requires children under the age of four to be in a child restraint system while traveling in a motor vehicle. Children more than four years old, but under the age of six, must be secured in a child restraint system or by conventional seat belts.

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Homeless shelter program may expand

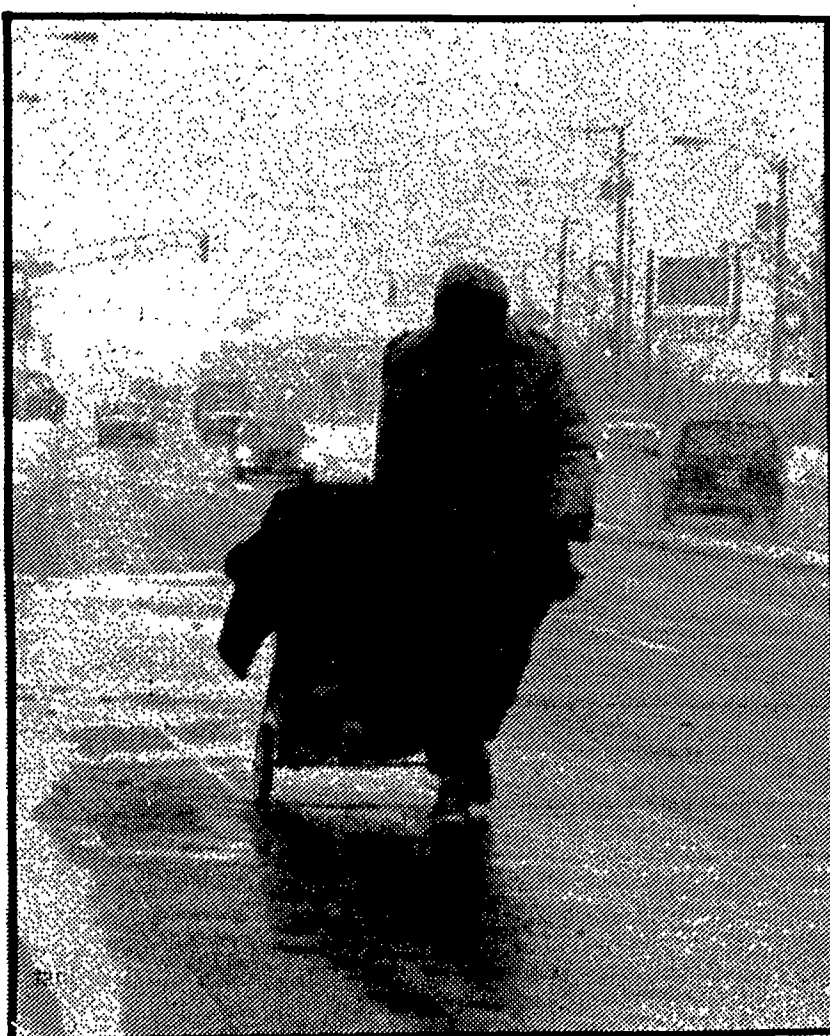

The Notre Dame Alumni News, in its Winter issue, details the school's search for consensus on the subject of coeducation at Notre Dame, an all-male high school in Niles. This search is still underway, notes John McGee, Director of Institutional Advancement at the school.

Phase I was begun in 1987 and Phase II is expected to be completed this September. McGee explains the school is under no firm deadline to complete the study. "The big question is what public does the school want to serve 20 years from now?" The school wants to maintain quality and not have a negative impact on nearby Catholic schools.

Committees involved in the process include representatives from the school administration,

faculty, parents, alumni, the Congregation of the Holy Cross (the order that runs the school), the Archdiocese of Chicago and neighboring all-girl schools and parishes. Phase I research gave the go-head to examine the possibility of education. Phase II, now underway, is examining, if the decision is to change to coeducation, how the school would revise the curriculum, remodel building facilities and whether resources would be available to implement the changes. McGee emphasizes the size of the study: "The complexity of the issues, when properly analyzed, leaves the prospect of remaining an all male institution a possibility, but not a foregone conclusion."

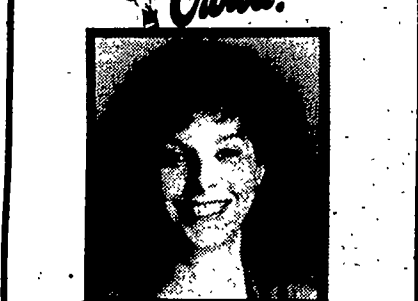
share their experiences with neighbors," Joe added. Friends from neighboring communities are invited to this meeting.

look for other revenues." Capparelli drafted HB 79, which doubles the current Homestead Exemption, HB 80 which asks for a property tax freeze on certain taxing bodies and a third bill designed to curb legislative bodies seeking to raise property taxes.

When Homestead Exemption legislation was initiated homeowners were permitted to waive \$1500 valuation from their property. The current allowance of \$3500 was enacted in 1983. HB 79 calls for an increase of the exemption to \$7000.

Under somewhat complex provisions of HB-80, property taxes would be frozen at their current level through 1990, except those previous assessments granted by referendum, mandated by law (such as for pensioners) and a number of school taxing bodies.

The third bill was introduced in response to the most recent assessment experienced by Capparelli's constituents on Chicago's Northwest side. "My taxes went up by \$300," Capparelli said. "Some people got \$1200 and \$1400 increases. These are retirees who are saying, 'We can't afford this' and they can't." The legislation calls for three-

fifth approval of the taxing body's council before it can levy an increase of more than 10 percent. Current law calls for a simple majority vote to approve any increase. In addition, a tax authority could not raise its tax by more than 15 percent without a voter referendum.

Capparelli is mindful of the discomfort and ensuing belt tightening his legislation might cause. "The biggest crybabies will be the school districts," he said. "There are too many supervisors and not enough teachers in the school systems." According to Capparelli, taxing bodies and governments need to be responsive to their constituents about their budgets. "Are they willing to cut their fat?"

Capparelli feels the homeowner is footing a disproportionate share of the bills for government. He cited the cigarette tax and state income tax as examples of taxes that are more equitable but cautioned that government might end up taxing its revenue sources out of existence if tax increases run rampant. "Each time they raise that cigarette tax, there's less people to pay it. Sometimes government is so stupid!"

"We're still in a holding pattern." If the group gets a green light for a building, they will incorporate.

"We'd like to have a flexible, versatile facility," Karshna said in a Feb. interview. "A good example of the type of feeder (theater) we'd like is run by a group in Western Springs. The volunteers handle everything." NPAC envisions a main theater with 250-450 seats for musicals and comedies and a smaller

'black box theater' for rehearsals, impromptu and more unusual types of entertainment. There are number of groups in existence now who would use it, according to Karshna.

NPAC sees this concept of a main theater and a smaller one as having the most realistic chance of turning a profit. Larger feeders often operate in the red because they don't fill the house. Relying heavily on volunteers, the theater complex would be run by a general manager, theater directors and either a full-time or part-time clerical person.

"If there's a building, our dream can come true," Karshna said.

Persons interested in communicating with hearing impaired friends and relatives may purchase a TDD phone at the Center on Deafness Gift Shop. The devices cost between \$189 and \$500.

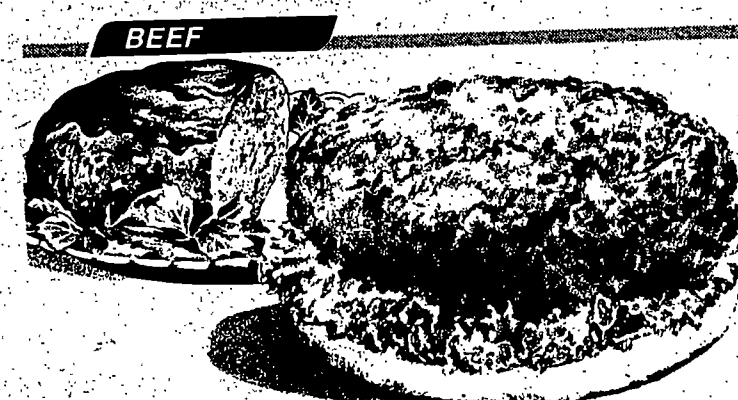

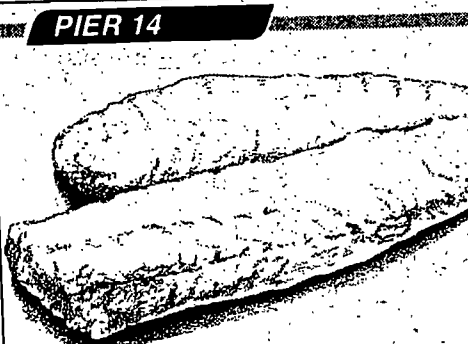

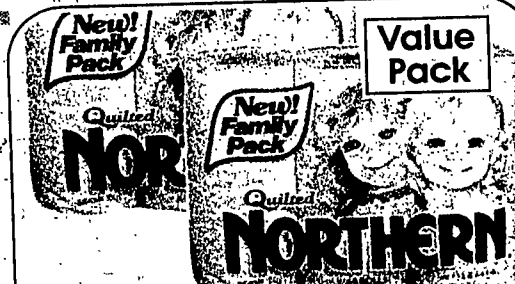
