The moneystrapped school district is unburdening itself of a school which costs a great deal to maintain even though public school students aren't presently at the school. Furthermore, the school district would have to remove the asbestos in the building which is very costly.

The money-rich village of Niles, whose past fame includes the purchase of parking lots on Milwaukee Avenue, is now investing in school buildings. But what they're really doing is insuring young families, who move into the area, will have schools in their neighborhoods, particularly if student enrollments increase in the 90's and the next centu-

The pieces were quickly sent to their plant at 7326 N. Central Park and placed in a vacuum chamber six feet in diameter. Paintings are placed on plywood shelves and inter-leafed with freezer paper to prevent migration of colors. The material is frozen, then dehydrated by a method called sublimation. Sublimation retains the material's original shape and form because the contained water is extracted from the ice crystals and changed to a gaseous state without having to pass

In 1987 alone such overcharges cost Illinois seniors \$138 million in out of pocket expenses.

"This measure will make health care significantly more affordable to the elderly without costing state government a dime," said Jerry Prete, President of the Illinois State Council of senior Citizens' Organizations, the statewide federation of 600 senior clubs that has been coordinating efforts to pass the

Prete noted that seniors are particularly hard hit by physician overcharges since almost all "Medigap" policies only cover the 20 percent deductible on Medicare bills, leaving the recipient to pay the balance. As a result, seniors are unable to insure against astronomic medical charges. A study released last month by the ISCSCO found that doctors routinely charge as much as \$2500 per bill beyond the Medicare-approved amount.

"The next battle will come on the House floor," added Prete. "We expect a tough fight since the Medical Society has made defeating HB402 their number one priority. But if seniors mobilize to contact their lawmakers, we can beat the special interests and save elderly consumers millions of dollars in unnecessary health care costs."
In addition to the ISCSCO, HB402 has been endorsed by over 100 organizations, including the Illinois Association of Area Agencies on Aging, the AFL-CIO, several chapters of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), and the Illinois Public Action Council.
