Burns continued to lead as the most commonly reported injury at almost 30 percent followed closely by corneal abrasions. Hemmorhages of the vitreous (the fluid in the poster of the eye) and hyphemas (blood in the anterior portion of the eye) occurred next most often.

Bottle rockets continued to be the firework most likely to cause a serious eye injury followed by firecrackers in general.

Two peple were seriously injured by homemade explosives of oxygen and acetylene.

"In a recent report on risk, one researcher said fireworks tend to be an easily tolerated risk," McKechnie said, "because they have been around for a long time. The perception of the risk, however, is not always related to the probability of injury. It only takes a moment to wreak the devastation visited on the four Illinois men last year. 

Bill lowers seniors' property taxes

The Illinois Senate has passed legislation that will help lower property taxes for senior citizens, according to State Sen. Walter

Senate Bill 896 will raise the senior citizen's homestead exemption from \$2,000 to \$2,500. "Increasing the amount senior citizens can deduct from the assessed value of their residences will help reduce the amount they have to pay in property taxes,

"Skyrocketing property taxes in Chicago have put a real strain on many people's budgets, especially senior citizens on fixed incomes," Dudycz said. "The legislation will help ease the financial Park Ridge - Lower Level crunch for many older people."

The law currently allows persons 65 years of age or older to deduct \$2,000 from the assessed value of their residences.

Sponsored by State Sen. Greg Zito, the legislation now moves to the House of Representatives for further consideration.

When riding in traffic, motorcycle riders must be able to control direction, speed and balance of their vehicles. Practice these safety tips for turning and braking so you can keep control and avoid an accident:

1. Limit your speed. New riders often try to take curves or turns too fast. When they cannot hold the turn, they cross into another lane of traffic or go off the road. Some brake too hard and skid out of control. Therefore, approach all turns carefully. Reduce your speed before entering a curve. and increase your speed gradually as you come out of the curve.

2. Lean with the motorcycle. Some riders are afraid to learn how to lean. For most turns, you should lean about the same amount as your motorcycle. If you take sharp curves at high speeds, you must lean even more.

3. Use both brakes every time you slow down or stop. If you use only the rear brake for normal stops, you may not develop the habit or the skill to use the front brake properly when you need to

4. Apply both brakes at the *same time. Some people believe the rear brake should be applied first. However, the sooner you apply the front brake, the sooner you will start slowing down.

Remember, you can also use both brakes in a turn. Using the front brake is dangerous only if the road is slipperty and you use the brake incorrectly
