Dist. 63 teacher assistants to receive pay raise

All 30 members of the East Maine Teachers Assistants Association (EMTAA) will receive a five percent raise per person for three years, according to board approval Tuesday of the collective bargaining agreement between the association and East Maine School District 63.

A total of about \$370,000 for this year's salaries was approved for expenditures with an average salary of about \$12,300 a year.

In other changes, the assistants union will be given "fair share." That is, all assistants will be considered to be benefiting from the union whether or not they are members and be required to pay dues.

Judi Voller, Gemini assistant and president of the EMTAA, said at a previous meeting that assistant positions are "transient" because many assistants are certified teachers waiting to obtain jobs elsewhere.

A major language change was obtained by assistants from their former title of "aides." Teachers and assistants are certified personnel.

Classified personnel will receive a five percent raise the first year, also. Classified personnel are those not required to have certificates.

Board members also authorized payment of almost \$70,000 to 13 teachers in the district's early retirement program.

Although all board members seemed to agree with the administration that district duplicating machines needed to be replaced, a motion to do so was defeated after some debate. Board members also defeated a motion to table the recommendation for purchase of four new copiers with district expenditure to be about \$40,000.

Board member Norman Padnos criticized the proposed purchase. "Now, you are coming in with no rationale, in my mind, for justifying these machines," said Padnos. He said action on the recommendation should be tabled until the next meeting.

Defending choice of the copiers was District Administrator Eldon C. Gleichman who said, "I don't care what kind of copy machines we have, but we have to replace our (present) machines. Unless you stand over a machine, it will get abuse because it runs many, many copies. There's not a copy machine we could get that could make as many copies as these with such a small amount of down-time."

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71 year old MG resident charged with drunk driving

MG cop killed by motorist

Morton Grove patrol officer Barry Shalin, 42, was struck and killed by an alleged drunken driver about 7:35 p.m. Monday, Oct. 9.

Minutes before, Shalin had made a traffic stop on a motorcyclist. He was standing at the rear of the squad car when a grey Buick being driven southbound on Austin hit him, catapulting his body over the Buick's roof.

The motorcyclist, David Scherrer, 35, of Skokie used the squad radio to call for help. Paramedics tried to resuscitate Shalin en route to Lutheran General

Hospital, Park Ridge, but he was pronounced dead at the hospital at 7:51 p.m.

The flag outside the Morton Grove Police station hung at half mast Tuesday and workers secured purple bunting around the Village Hall entrance.

Shalin, an 18 year police department veteran, was well liked. Deputy Chief George Incledon described him as "very nice, helpful, an excellent policeman." Going off duty Monday night, Incledon had waved to Shalin in the parking lot as Shalin set off on patrol en route to Lutheran General

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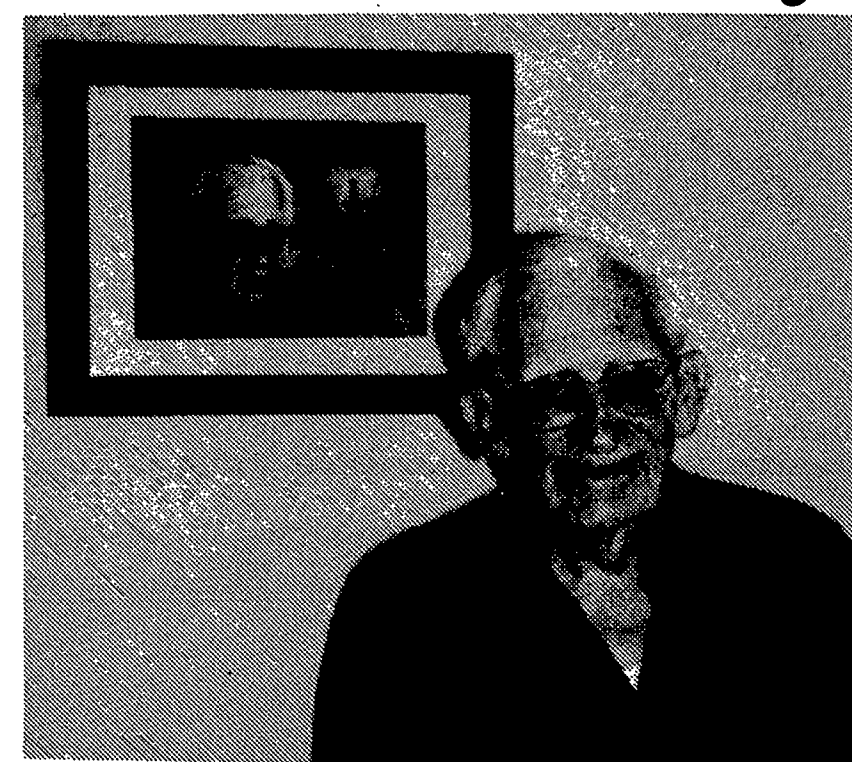

Niles Fest profits released

Niles Fest profits are reportedly down from last year, due to increased insurance premiums for the sale of alcoholic beverages and to the higher cost of beer, according to the Niles Special Events Chairman, Elaine Heinen. After bills were paid, the All American Festival yielded \$21,500 in profits, "slightly less than the 1988 figures," according to Heinen.

This year's insurance bill was \$4,300, compared to last year's \$2,800 tab. In previous years, the Special Events Committee has purchased beer kegs and tapers, but due to the beer strike, the Budweiser beer was only available in cans. "People buy less beer when they're purchasing by the can," she said.

In addition to increased insurance costs and decreased beer sales the fest's profit margin was affected by the smaller number of food vendors. Next year there will be a broadened base of revenue-producing booths, according to Heinen. "By experimenting, we learned how we can increase revenue. Next year we plan on adding arts and crafts booths, if possible."

Heinen indicated she was not markedly disappointed by the final tally. "We're proud of what we made; we still made money," she said.

Maine pols disagree on flood solutions

Mayor Nick Blase of Niles has accused Maine Township officials of shirking their responsibilities to citizens of the unincorporated area by not using township funds for sewers and drains to abate flooding.

Supervisor Joan Hall replied that Blase knows that a "knee-jerk" reaction to flooding, such as building sewers without proper engineering studies, would result in an increase in taxes.

Maine Democrats raised the tax issue in their April, 1989, election bid to wrest township control from the Republicans.

Blase, the Maine Township Democratic Committeeman, sent copies of an Oct. 3 letter addressed to Supervisor Joan Hall to the mayors of Morton Grove, Skokie, Des Plaines, Park Ridge and Glenview. He chastized Hall for "not properly advising those

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Local school administrators are divided on mandatory drug testing for students, but a casual survey of several local students reveals students are for it. Both schools involve athletes and their parents in pre-season meetings relative to school regulations and expectations for school athletes. The athletes are required to sign an agreement in which they promise to abide by a list of school regulations, including those banning drugs and alcohol.

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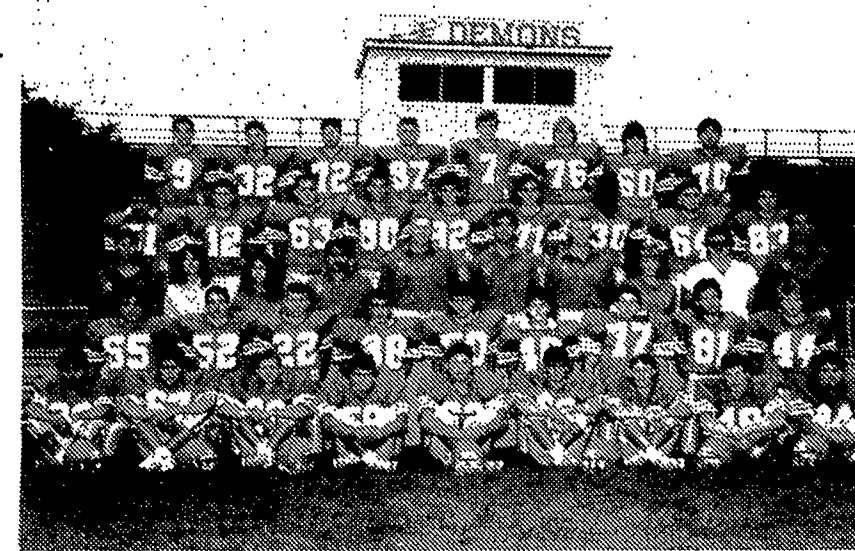

Hall indicated new sewers, if warranted, would cost "large amounts of money," which the township doesn't have without asking for an increase in the levy. In addition, she says no programs would be undertaken without properly studying all the issues.

"As he (Blase) knows, we formed a committee at the Aug. 10 meeting to explore the possibilities of what can be done regarding future situations," the Supervisor said in an Oct. 10 interview. Hall said the committee, composed of citizens and officials, has met twice and a third meeting is scheduled for Oct. 11.

She added they have talked with flooding engineers, Metropolitan Water Reclamation District Commissioner Tom Walsh, and other experts. "We're talking with the right people. This is a regional problem, not just a township problem," she said, adding the suggestion Blase should send his own fences. "Forty-eight percent of the flooding (in Maine Township) is from Niles. He had better take care of his water there."

Blase sent a similar letter to Hall, dated Aug. 23. In his current letter he included a photocopy of Sections 160.31 and 160.32 and 160.33 under Chapter 139 of the Illinois Revised Statutes, which he cited as the township's authority to "relieve flooding of an area by providing storm water drainage."

Blase's August letter says, in part, "The municipalities of Niles, Park Ridge and Des Plaines are responsible for alleviating flooding problems for their residents. Maine Township has this same obligation to alleviate this unduly burdensome flooding problem for residents in the unincorporated areas."

The Illinois statutes, in Sect. 160.33 read "In order to pay the cost of the construction, purchase and improvement... (of a sewer system, including engineering and legal expenses, the Township Government) is authorized to appropriate township funds, including Federal Revenue Sharing funds, and to issue and sell revenue bonds of the township."

Hall indicated she has had "several discussions with (Des Plaines Mayor) Mike Albrecht," saying the Township will help finance the flood study commissioned by that city. "We have to figure what our participation should be. I hope we can work together. I do know something has to be done."

far away as California and Alabama.

Rev. Paluch, resides at Resurrection Retirement Community in Edison Park. He still celebrates daily masses at OLR, stopping afterward for a cup of coffee in the teacher's lounge of the school during the week. He seems to thrive on the dating attention from the school staff and his eyes brighten with the mention of the school children.

"We never deprive the school of anything," Paluch says, recalling that shortly before the opening day of school there was a young four-footed, black and white visitor in one of the washrooms. The priest jokes that someone assured him the skunk "won't sprinkle until he's a year old," but no one wanted to "ask him how old he is."

Father Theodore Paluch was the baby of his family, growing up with six brothers and sisters, near Chicago's Wrigley Field on the North Side. He reminisces about getting free admission to summer baseball games by going to the park with his friends and picking up the previous days, pop bottles littering the stands before the games.

He attended Quigley Preparatory Academy and St. Mary of the Lake Seminary and was ordained April 7, 1934, by George Cardinal Mundelein. He was assigned

to six parishes as assistant pastor before being given his own church in 1960.

His "church" was a vacant piece of land at Greenwood Ave. and Monroe St. "When I was appointed it was just swampland there," Father Ted recalls. He noted that the congregation sat on folding chairs at Ballard School for worship services and borrowed St. John Brebeuf Church for weddings and baptisms. Father Ted was one of the chaplains at Lutheran General Hospital for fifteen years and still visits the sick at area nursing homes.

OLR grew from 250 families in 1960, to 1200 families in 1964, when the junior high school was added, to over 2200 today.

Smoking his "trademark pipe, stuffed with Velvet tobacco", the octogenarian priest has no formula for longevity other than a life filled with love and service. "God has really blessed me," he says.

He still golfs weekly with three of his Quigley classmates, down from the original dozen school chums who got together regularly for bowling, cardplaying and golf. He "breaks a 100" in golf.

Father Ted, has enjoyed good health, except for a brief bout with pneumonia several years ago. He looks forward to visiting the OLR school children for years to come.

session, excusing McKenzie, five library employees and the one reporter in attendance.

All board members were present for the proceedings. Board members recessed and reconvened several times - first, to await the arrival of library attorney Laurence Weiner, and later, to separately call first McKenzie, and then Chief of Operations Daniel C. Macken into the boardroom.

McKenzie, whose 3 year contract was negotiated under the previous board's administration, could not comment on proceedings, on the advice of his attorney. Trustee Irene Costello spoke officially after the meeting's adjournment at 9:25 p.m., saying "No action has been taken."

While keeping executive session proceedings confidential, Quattrocchi attributed the current situation to poor "management of the previous board." He noted his own opposition to McKenzie's salary increase beyond \$48,000. A partial board vote on the increase, three of whose members no longer serve, and approved a raise to \$50,000, according to Quattrocchi.

A board executive session meeting Oct. 5 was also called by Quattrocchi to discuss McKenzie. At that meeting, board members drafted a resolution saying, in part, "There are members of the board that have serious concerns with respect to the continued employment of the administrator."

McKenzie was hired in 1983, with his contract renewed in 1986 and again in 1989. According to annual reports prepared by his office for the period beginning July 1, 1985, through June 30, 1989,

the library's book collection increased from 159,221 to 165,847. Periodical subscriptions increased from 500 to 615 and the audio-visual collection added categories, expanding to 6,633 items. Circulation rose from 267,760 to 387,759, a 33 percent increase posted for the last period.

During this administration, the library district enlarged and renovated the main library, tripling the Children's Services space allocation, according to the administrator's newsletters. The 1986 addition allowed for a Public Access Computer Laboratory in place of the old reading room. The library also computerized itself, going online with 23 North Suburban Library System libraries. That year a citizens group, Friends of the Library, formed to raise funds for library projects.

The library branch at Ballard School was closed in 1987 following voters' rejection of a tax increase request the previous November. A book theft detection system was installed. Voters approved an 87 percent increase in the maximum operating tax levy in 1988, allowing for 1988-89 fiscal year expenditures of \$1,636,697, up from the previous fiscal year's \$1,306,286.

At its next regular meeting, the board is expected to nominate Trustee Irene Costello as Vice President to fill the vacancy left by the retirement of Charlene Wagner. No replacement for Wagner has been named as yet.

trol, Incledon heard the radio call for help as he drove home.

Officer Deb McEnerney remembers Shalin as "an outstanding officer, outstanding man, outstanding...he was good at what he did."

The Buick driver, Myron A. Iverson, 71, of Morton Grove, stopped his car about 50 feet beyond the accident scene and told an investigating officer he had only clipped a vehicle. He allegedly had bloodshot eyes and a strong odor of alcohol about him. At the police station, the man registered .21 percent in a breathalyzer test. A 10 percent level is considered legally drunk.

Iverson was charged with reckless homicide, driving under the influence with a fatal personal injury and failure to reduce speed. Conviction on these charges could result in from one to six years in jail. His bond was set at \$100,000 and he received a court

date of Oct. 23.

A native of Morton Grove, Shalin and his wife Iris lived in Arlington Heights. Shalin was the first fatality in the history of the Morton Grove Police department.

Shalin was buried Wednesday, Oct. 11 from Piser-Weinstein Menorah chapel, 9200 N. Skokie Blvd., Skokie and interred at Westlawn cemetery in Norridge. Rabbi Pavel Slavensky officiated at the services.

few minutes later, she unlocked her car and got into it. She then was surprised by a man who threatened her with a long metal bar. He forced his way into the car, demanding money. He took the \$4 and three credit cards she had, but kept asking for bank and money cards.

The assailant pushed her head down and drove to an area of rundown buildings, possibly the near southwest side of Chicago, and sexually assaulted her. The man then drove about five minutes and left the car near the Ontario Street exit to the Kennedy Expressway. The woman drove herself home.

State Scholarship Commission," said Morris. Oakton Community College also encourages its prospective students to take the test. This year 1,170 Maine students took the test.

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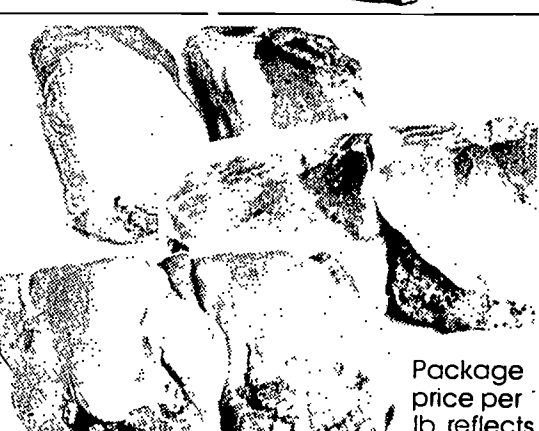


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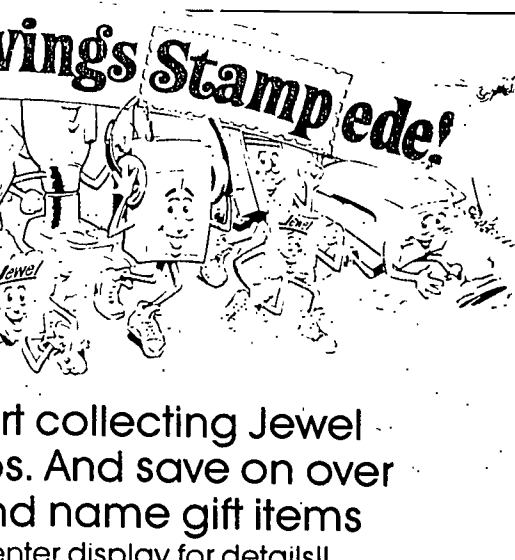


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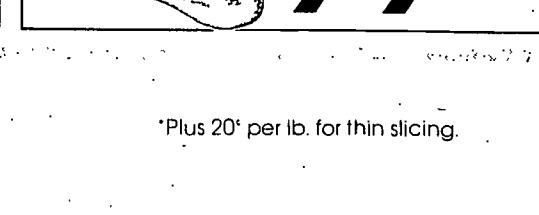


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
