In 1988 the FBI reported in their Uniform Crime Reports that 3,218, 077 burglaries were committed in the United States! In Illinois there were approximately 130,292 burglaries committed and in Niles we recorded 123 burglaries for 1988. We have police officers on the street 24 hours a day but it takes everyones help to prevent and apprehend burglars. Throughout past years we have been fortunate to have received help from citizens such as Michael Kaminski, Karen Farber, Marsha Warnick, Brett Feiler, Joe Briski Sr. Anthony Leva, Ken Ranieri, and many others who have assisted the Niles Police Department in the successful apprehension and prosecution of offenders committing burglaries in our neighborhoods The Village of Niles and the Niles Police Department take satisfaction in recognizing the contributions of these citizens and it is our hope that we receive the same mutually beneficial cooperation in the future since some of our most successful cases and arrests are made through the assistance of neighborhood people. Keeping our neighborhoods safe and desireable places to reside is everyone's re

Besides being watchful of suspicious persons there are other pre cautions that we can take to make our residences a less desireable target for a potential burglar. Burglars are opportunists who want to get in and out as quickly and as quietly as possible without being detected and they are going to hit the easiest mark they can. Some deterrents that you might think about are sturdy bolt locks on your front and rear doors, and if you have a knob on the inside of the bolt lock keep it out of reach if a window on the door should be broken. Windows should be locked when you're out and keep laudscaping from concealing windows and doors. When you are out at nigh keep your interior and exterior lights on and most importantly if you see someone who seems to have no purpose roaming the neighbor hood call the police. 

"Precious stone" is the meaning of the Latin word opal. While every gemstone is precious, the beauty of the opal makes it clear why the Romans pointed to the opal as the epitome of a precious stone.

The exciting colors which play across the opal are caused by light being refracted by transparent silica spheres. The size of the spheres determines the overall color of the stone. Opals are valued based on their display of color and light refraction.

Velvet black opals which display red are considered the most valuable. Any dark background color causes the opal to be called a black opal, though in certain countries the term black is reserved for the opal which has a black background color. Fine black opal can be prized as highly as diamond, ruby, or emerald.

White opals have a lighter background and also show play of color. The most valuable display color is red, though green and other colors are also prized. Fire opal has a reddish, fire-like body color but does not show play of color. Opal in matrix, or the host material, is also sometimes used in fine jewelry.
