A Circuit Court judge on April 30 resisted efforts by lawyers for legislator Penny Pullen (R-55th) to include Cook County Clerk Stanley Kusper in her suit asking the court to declare her the winner

of the March 20 primary on the basis of her findings in a discovery recount. Rosemary Mulligan, a Des Plaines paralegal and Pullen challenger, was named victor in the

primary contest by a margin of 31 votes. Because errors were discovered during a discovery recount on nearly half the precincts, Pullen claims to be ahead by 17

Debate continues over leadership in Maine Township GOP organization

Raffe files lawsuit for GOP funds

A debate over leadership is stirring a storm of conflicting claims for money belonging to the Maine Township Republican organization. Over \$23,000 is at stake.

The former committeeman, Phil Raffe, who lost in the primary election to Park Ridge Mayor Martin Butler by 8,146 votes to 6,789, on April 30, filed a suit in Cook County Circuit court asking holding banks to release the monies to his "Regular Republican Organization of Maine

Township" on the grounds the money was earned during Raffe's 14-year tenure as committeeman. He said "We earned it; it's ours."

Three holding banks, the Northern Trust-O'Hare, the First National Bank of Des Plaines and the First State Bank & Trust Company of Park Ridge, put the funds on hold when the dispute arose between Raffe and the newly-elected committeeman, Butler.

Raffe could declare himself "King of Disneyland and I could do nothing about it," Butler said, but suggested the dispute is "bringing smiles to the faces of Democrats." He fears the GOP may have to go to emergency funding as bills go unpaid, prior to the upcoming November elections.

Butler noted the Maine Township Republican organization is not for profit and a legal entity. On April 26, in accordance with corporation by-laws, he met with 125 appointed precinct captains in the Township hall, 1600 Bal-

Maine Township flood alarms in demand

Maine Township Clerk Stephen J. Stolton said the township has sold close to 200 flood alarms since they went on sale March 26.

The battery-operated alarms are available for \$10 at the Clerk's Office in the Maine Township Town Hall, 1700 Ballard Road, Park Ridge.

The devices help safeguard property against flood damage by emitting a high pitched warning signal when water reaches the alarm's sensor arm. They are easy to install and can be used in basements, laundry rooms, kitchens, bathrooms, and any other area that might flood.

Stolton said the township will continue to maintain a supply of the alarms to meet the demand.

Gas pipe breaks at Dempster construction site

Construction crews using a front end loader to break up the street hit a gas pipe in the parkway at the northwest corner of Dempster and Merrill Streets, Niles, April 30.

Contractors notified Northern Illinois Gas Company, (NIGas) at 2:40 p.m. and repair crews responded, but the Niles Fire department was not called until 3:30 p.m., according to Lieutenant Steve Borkowski.

Borkowski reported the NIGas crews had secured the leak when

the Niles engine arrived and although there was a smell of natural gas in the air, NIGas representatives did not consider it dangerous to the nearby residents and no one was evacuated. Gas service to nearby homes was not interrupted.

Because the pipe was located on the parkway, the flow of traffic on Dempster Street was relatively unhindered, said Borkowski.

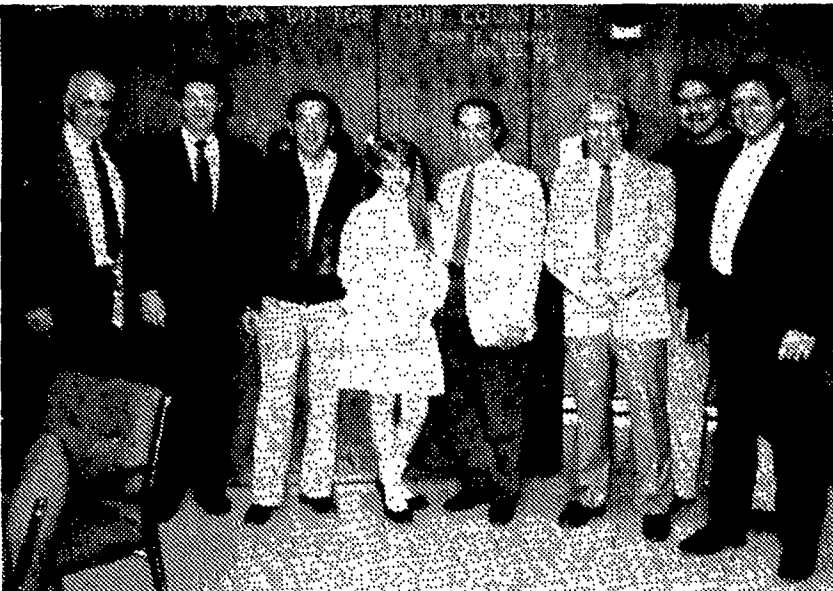

Illinois Poet Laureate Gwendolyn Brooks will be one of three authors to read at the Tenth Annual Lincolnwood Library Literary Festival. Joining her at the podium will be Elmore Leonard, master of the crime thriller, and former Northwestern University professor Stuart Kaminsky. The festival will be held at the library from 1-4 p.m., Sunday, May 6.

Brooks, having spoke at one of the first literary festivals at the library, is returning to help celebrate the tenth anniversary. "This year's festival represents a decade of bringing some of the nation's best writers to our podium," said Cynthia Josephs, library director. "We wanted to bring back one of our favorite writers to help us celebrate our continued success," she continued.

Also returning for his sixth year as moderator will be Bob Cromie, former Chicago Tribune book editor and PBS "Book Beat" host.

The program begins with individual readings by each author followed by the Author's Forum—a panel discussion of questions from the audience. An hors d'oeuvres reception follows the Author's Forum. The authors will be available to sign autographs and festival participants are encouraged to take this opportunity to meet and talk with the authors.

MG residents content with park services

Morton Grove residents appear to be satisfied with present park facilities and do not favor any expansions which would raise their taxes, according to the findings of a feasibility task force.

The park district board agreed to form the task force last fall in response to residents' concerns about losing Borg School and the open space around it after the school was sold by District 70 to the Muslim Management Group for \$1.8 million.

The goal of the task force was to determine whether a need for additional recreational space ex-

isted and whether the park district could afford to finance any such needs.

After conducting a random survey of Morton Grove households, the task force concluded in its report, "the community is generally content with supporting the current recreation and park operations of the park district. It appears that ongoing improvements, along with status quo growth having minimal impact on taxes, are elements most desired by the community."

IEPA reviews Wells' emission reduction plan

An attorney for Wells Manufacturing Co. said a confidential emission reductions proposal submitted by the Skokie foundry to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency is meeting with that agency's approval.

"I think they're very impressed with the plan," said attorney Joseph Wright, who also professed surprise that the E.P.A. had communicated with State Senator Howard Carroll about something "we proposed in confidence to them."

Carroll, a 1st District Democrat, issued an April 23 press release which stated, in part,

"Wells presented an emissions-reduction proposal to the EPA at a meeting last month in Springfield. . . The agency is now reviewing the plan, which would include installation of new equipment and changing the materials used in the casting of metal."

"It isn't a new program," Wright said, calling the plan "one of the most far-reaching programs in the industry." The attorney added the highly technical plan is one of many things "we have done or are ongoing in the future."

More Dist. 207 graduates going on to college

More students from District 207 are continuing their education after high school according to the 1989 graduate follow-up study conducted by Joel W. Morris, assistant superintendent for instruction.

According to the study, 82.9 percent are continuing their education as compared to 80.7 percent of the class of 1988 and 79.2 percent of the class of 1987.

"The continuing rise is especially notable in light of the more demanding entrance requirements for state universities in Illinois," said Morris. "It is statistically significant because it is not only a higher percentage; it is a

higher percentage of a smaller number of students."

The study showed that the class of 1989 had 1,170 of 1,450 graduates, or 80.7 percent continuing in college as compared to 1,213 of 1,544, or 78.6 percent of the class of 1988. Of the 1,170 attending college from the class of 1989, 460 enrolled in junior college. The number of graduates enrolled in business, trade, and special schools totals 32, or 2.2 percent. This brings the total number of students who are continuing their education to 82.9 percent.

In the wake of the abrupt resignations of two members of the three-man Morton Grove Fire and Police Commission, Commissioner Joseph Alessi says he opposes certain recent actions of the Board of Trustees but will remain on the commission for the time being.

"I want to see who they (the board) pick as replacements. Hopefully it will be two private citizens who love their community. I would be remiss in my responsibilities if I left a brand new commission to handle everything," Alessi said.

Commissioner Ronald Lanning submitted his brief resignation April 20, as did Commissioner Frank Hren, who wrote that the board is attempting to politicize the fire department by giving itself the power to accept or reject appointments as chief or district chief.

Mayor Richard Hohns and the trustees say the board has the responsibility for the actions of their department heads and should have the authority to appoint them.

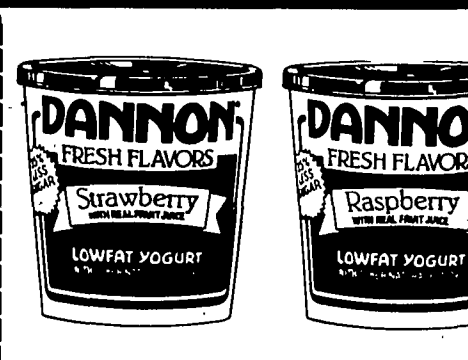

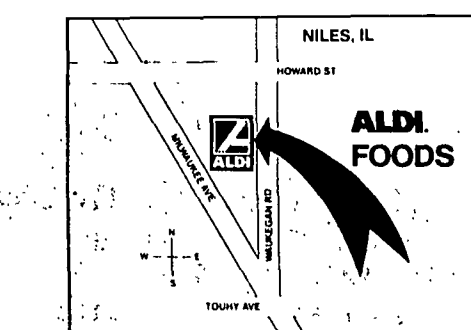

The 1990 Chicago area State of Israel Bond campaign, whose theme will be to provide funds for housing and job opportunities for the massive influx of Soviet Jews and Jews from other parts of the world into Israel, will be officially launched at the Israel Bond Inaugural Banquet, Wednesday, May 9 at 6 p.m. at the Fairmont Hotel.

Larry Goodman, President of the Goodman Group, Inc., will be installed as new general chairman of the bond drive, along with other officers of the campaign.

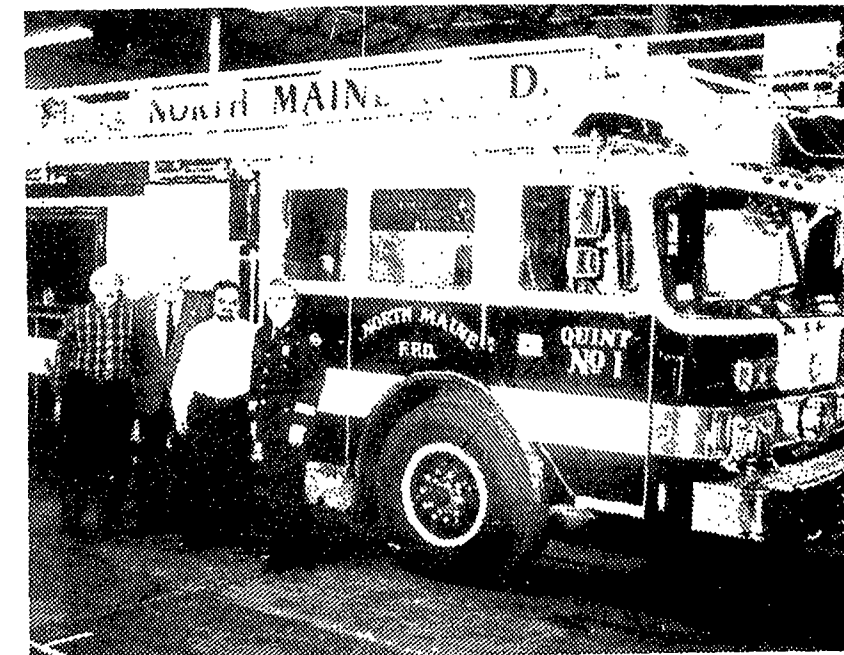

dates for the posts and to present these applicants to the board for their decision.

District school repair costs will have to be re-evaluated, since the most recent study was done in 1987. The cost estimated to repair Hynes at that time was \$750,000. That figure, along with the prospect of a diminishing enrollment, led school board members to decide to close the school at 9000 Bellefort Ave., sell it and combine the school population with that of Golf Junior High, 9401 Waukegan Rd. Golf required remodeling to accommodate the plan. Hynes was sold to the firm of Bernard Katz and Company, Skokie, but an active citizenry upset the plans by voting new members opposed to the sale onto the school board. The Hynes sale was later legally nullified by the court.

Currently, both Hynes and Golf require repair and it is expected implementation of a media center and multi-purpose room at Golf will proceed. Trumfo noted the roof at Hynes needs work, as do the tiles in the gym, but he said the board would decide what repairs have priority, based on the funds available.

He said it is probably too late to begin work this summer, but it could start at Golf in late fall.

Trumfo stressed the district is well within federal guidelines in regard to asbestos removal. The removal is an on-going project in the district even though the asbestos-covered pipes are in the virtu-

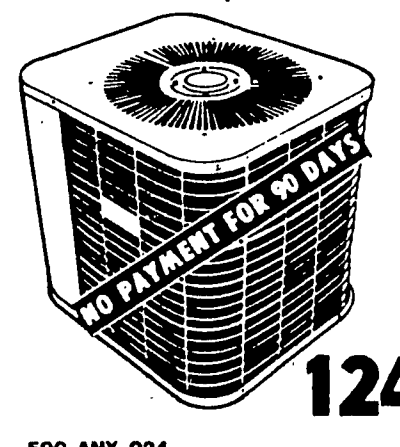

261 or 44 percent were completed and sent back to the park district.

IRS ruling gives commuters a tax break

Commuting to all temporary work locations is now deductible from Federal income tax, advises Joan C. LeValley, a Park Ridge tax accountant.

Generally, costs of getting to work from home aren't deductible, although you could deduct commuting to temporary sites beyond the metropolitan area where you normally work. IRS Revenue Ruling 90-23 unexpectedly liberalizes the rules: People with regular places of businesses who go directly from home to any temporary site to work on an irregular or short-term basis - for days or weeks - may deduct the cost.

Thus, suggests LeValley, a doctor, architect or consultant who goes from home to see a patient, client or subject instead of to the office or regular work site may deduct unreimbursed costs. The ruling is retroactive, so many filers could amend past returns. The costs must be added, however, to miscellaneous items that are deductible only to the extent that they exceed 2% of adjusted gross income. The IRS warns, however, that auditors will look for a "pattern of abuse" of the relaxed commuting-cost rules.

Wright predicted there has been "an 80 percent decrease" in objectionable emissions since the IEPA first attempted to deny the foundry an operating permit.

The attorney also expressed his belief that air quality complaints regarding Wells have decreased.

Senator Carroll stated, "It's encouraging to see citizens and local industry come to an agreement on an environmental issue. I understand they've been cooperating with the EPA and that Wells wants to resolve the problem."

lege from the class of 1989, 94.4 percent chose midwestern colleges, 1.5 percent chose eastern colleges, 1.9 percent chose western colleges, and 1.7 percent chose southern colleges. Five students are attending foreign colleges.

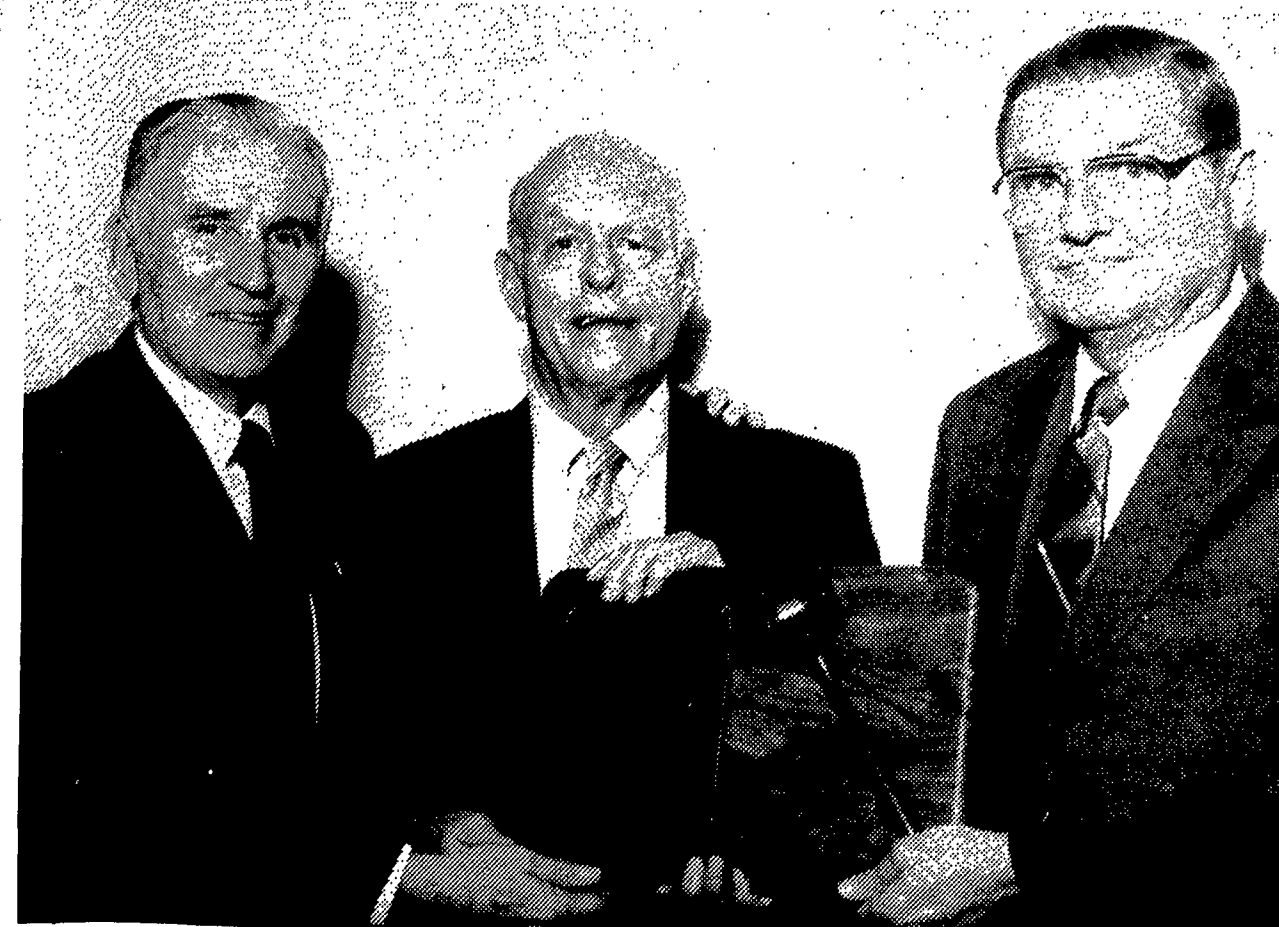

A not-for-profit operation, JULIE was formed in 1974 by owners and operators of underground facilities in Illinois to increase public safety through the protection of its member utilities.

Continued from Page 1 marijuana in Niles and surrounding suburbs.

Brueckert posted a \$50,000 bond and will appear in court May 4 on charges of unlawful possession with intent to deliver, cannabis, and cannabis trafficking. Armed with a search warrant, police raided his rented room at a Glenview motel, finding a suitcase containing 16 pounds of marijuana, heavily swathed in plastic.

In addition, according to Sgt. Dennis McEnerny of the Niles Police Immediate Response Unit, Brueckert will be fined \$188,000 by the Illinois Department of Revenue for failing to purchase tax stamps for the illegal marijuana, which has a street value of between \$1,500 to \$3,000 per pound, depending on quality.

Police have also shared information of this investigation with federal drug enforcement and Internal Revenue Service agents.

lard Road, Park Ridge, and the organization elected a board of directors and officers. But because of bank action, the group cannot use the accumulated party funds.

Butler accuses Raffe of trying to "grab" the money, but Raffe said he wants the funds for "the benefit of the Republican Party" and to elect Republicans to office. He insists the funds were never in his name, but always in the hands of the Maine Township GOP Finance committee, a five-member body, and that two signatures were required to withdraw funds.

Raffe admits he lost the title of "committeeman," but claims the title of "chairman." He said he conferred with the State Board of Elections and was informed, though he lost the title of committeeman, he did not lose the right to the funds if he kept "a viable organization." To that end, he convened a meeting of 82 of his precinct captains April 27, addressed them for over an hour and received a standing ovation of support. He said they planned to meet the first Friday in June for an election of officers.

But Dick Siebell, chairman of the Cook County Republican Central Committee on April 30 called it a local issue and quoted from a letter from Ronald D. Michaelson, executive director of the State Board of Elections. Michaelson asserted no official

opinion was issued on the subject and it was inaccurate to maintain otherwise.

Siebell called the situation "unfortunate" and named Martin Butler as the "only one recognized as committeeman by the party structure or the candidates." He said "it is unfortunate he (Raffe) can't accept the decision of the voters."

Raffe said three prominent members of the GOP have contacted him to voice their support, but he declined to identify them. He also maintained Butler was not a member of the Maine Township organization although he

had been asked to join several times.

Raffe denied his legal suit would delay Republican pre-election activities and maintained after a preliminary hearing May 4, his suit should be resolved within 60-90 days. Park Ridge attorney Russ Stewart, described as "an old friend," presented Raffe's suit in Cook County Circuit court.

Butler suggested Raffe could face difficulties in seeking reappointment to his position on the Regional Transportation Authority's Board of Directors as a result of his post-election activities. According to Butler, the appointment expires in June and pays a reported \$25,000 a year.

her driveway. Her cat, Bandit, ran out the side door when it was opened, and smoke billowed out the door. She then ran to a neighbors to summon help.

An off-duty Glenbrook firefighter, who is a neighbor, talked her out of entering the smoke-filled home to rescue her other cat, Pinky, her three spaniels and the family hamster. Most of the pets were evacuated by firefighters, who arrived shortly after 1:51 p.m.

One Morton Grove firefighter, who declined to be identified, said a neighbor helped coax one of the dogs from under the bed after the smoke had been cleared, because the frightened pooch was snapping at emergency personnel.

Neighbors took Pinky to Morton Grove Animal Hospital, where, according to Dr. Roberta

Drell, the comotose cat exhibited the "classic signs of smoke inhalation," upon admission. Dr. Drell reported that two hours later, the cat was still receiving humidified oxygen and had an i.v. but was awake and meowing.

"She's not out of the woods yet," Drell said, "but she's certainly improved. We'll know better Thursday."

District Chief Ralph Czerwinski said, "The fire appears to be accidental," and said the initial concern upon arrival was to make sure the fire didn't spread to the upstairs. "A basement fire can move very fast," he added, noting there was smoke damage to both levels but the fire was confined to a small area of the basement.

The homeowner said she left the home around 11 a.m. and returned early from running errands. "Thank God I came home when I did," she said.

votes and the winner.

Mat DeLort, a Mulligan attorney, said Mulligan forces have until May 7 to respond to Pullen's original suit and Pullen aides will have until May 14 to respond to Mulligan's possible motion to dismiss the case. Judge Barth has set the next hearing for 2 p.m. May 15.

According to a Pullen attorney, Robert Mankivsky, a separate suit against Kasper will probably be filed. He said Pullen could charge Kasper violated her constitutional rights to due process by failing to count the primary votes correctly.

Mankivsky said in their interpretation of the election code, a precinct vote count is normally supported by another count by the clerk's office in a central location. He said the number of errors uncovered during the discovery, recount indicate the separate count was not done or Pullen would have been declared the winner initially.

Pullen is asking for \$100,000 in compensation and an award of attorney's fees under #42 United States Code, Section 1983.

The controversy between the

13-year incumbent, Pullen and Mulligan has drawn national attention because the primary was seen as a conflict between an anti-abortion position as represented by Pullen and a pro-choice stance as exemplified by Mulligan.

NIGAS corporate communications spokesperson, Jane Wiedmeyer, said NIGAS crews temporarily repaired the leak April 30, but were back on the scene May 1 to permanently complete repairs. Wiedmeyer described the effect of two-inch pipe as a "drip" pipe which comes off the bottom of the main gas pipe.

The drip pipe is connected to a tank that collects water or oil that might be mixed with the gas and the tank is cleaned on a periodic basis.
