Selman told us Tuesday it will take 1 1/2 to 2 years for Niles 911 emergency telephone number to be put in place. Abe said it would cost about \$1 million to create the system.

There is a new enhancement system which Niles will be a part of when it is completed. It is a computerized system which will transmit pertinent information onto the emergency station's computer screen when it receives a call. When a caller dials 911 the screen will print the name and address and phone number of the caller at the station. Other information such as drug and allergy and other medical information will be available upon receipt of the call.

According to Selman, Skokie has had a 911 number for several years. Since the emergency number, 911, is the same in our local towns, Skokie has to approve an enhancement system to upgrade their older system. Selman said that has caused the delay.

Until the new system is in place, Nilesites will continue to call a police emergency at 647-2131 and a fire emergency at 827-2121. And Morton Grove must call a police emergency at 965-2131 and a fire emergency at 965-2121.

Always ride with the traffic flow as close as possible to the right edge of the road.

Obey all traffic signals and pavement markings. Use hand signals to let drivers

know your intentions.

Wear a helmet that does not block your vision or impair your hearing. Although helmets are not required by Illinois law, wearing one greatly reduces your chances of receiving a serious head injury in an accident.

Do not pass on the right. Motorists often will not look for pasing cyclists in that direction. When moving the same speed as traffic, ride in the middle of the lane, especially at busy intersec-

Be alert for cars pulling out in front of you, make eye contact with the drivers to ensure that you have been seen.

Avoid riding at night if possible. If you ride in the dark, your bike must have a front light that shines for 500 feet and a rear, red reflector that can be seen for up to 600 feet. Always wear lightcolored or reflective clothing when riding at night.

Commonwealth Edison helps clear the air

Commonwealth Edison has been dedicated to clearing the air in northern Illinois for many

The company's concern for the environment dates back to 1929, when crews first installed an electrostatic precipitator at one of its generating stations. The precipitator, installed in the fossil-fueled generating station's stack, was designed to attract most of the particulates (polluting particles) that otherwise would be emitted into the atmosphere. By 1966, the company had installed 56 stackcleaning devices, improved furnace combustion efficiency, and invested substantial funds toward research to improve the environ-

In the mid-1960s, Edison also committed to balancing its fossil fuel use with clean, efficient nuclear generation. Edison built the first privately-financed commercial nuclear generating unit, Dresden 1, which produced its first kilowatthour on April 15, 1960. On the cutting edge of the new technology with Dresden Unit 1, Edison began the huge undertaking of building its nuclear generating capacity to approximately 51 percent of the company's total capacity, (over 80 percent of its kilowatthour output for 1989), where it stands today.

In mid-1970, when environmental concerns were coming to the forefront of public debate, Edison took the lead once again by making a substantial commit-ment to low-sulfur coal. The use of this lower polluting but more expensive variety of coal would dramatically decrease emissions from the company's coal-fired generating stations.

pact on drug and alcohol use, we're going to have to go beyond the school and get assistance ty," said Principal Don Ring, a member of the school's Drug and Alcohol Committee. "The discussion in the committee showed that the most serious problem is impromptu, unchaperoned parties in student's homes, in addition to the post-prom and postgraduation celebrations."

The survey showed that parental concern and action does have an affect on alcohol and drug use by Niles West students. In analysis of the data, the committee found that parents can help by setting cerfews for their children and. spending more time with them.

More than 50 percent of the students who have curfews set have only tried alcohol one or two times, while only 4 percent of the students who use alcohol regularly have a curfew. In addition, the more time students spent with parents, the less they have been under the influence of alcohol while at parties. The frequency of

alcohol use also increased as parental involvement and questions about parties decreased. To hep parents set guidelines and find out how other parents are handling the situation, Niles West is starting a Parent Network to foster communication. The network will start with next year's freshmen and will be expanded to the entire school if parents find it useful. Parents who choose to join the network agree to encourage healthy, chaperoned activi-

Social Security taxes change for self-employed

Self-employed people can expect to find significant changes when they etimate their Social Security taxes for 1990. Both the Social Security tax rate and the formula used to compute the tax-

es have changed this year. The 1990 tax rate for selfemployed people is 15.3 percent, up from 1989's 15.02 percent rate. In 1989, a 2 percent credit reduced the effective tax rate to 13.02 percent.

Beginning with the 1990 tax year, the credit has been replaced by two new deductions which reduce the tax liability for the self-employed. The new deductions, which were provided for in the 1983 Social Security amendments, are designed to treat the self-employed in much the same manner as employers and employees are treated for tax purpos-

First, net earnings from selfemployment are reduced by an amount equal to half of the total self-employment tax. This is similar to the way employees are treated under the tax laws in that the employer's share of the FICA tax is not considered income to

Second, half of the selfemployment tax can be duducted as a business expense. This is similar to the deduction allowed to employers on the Social Security taxes they pay for their em-

Before you put away your copy of your 1989 federal income tax return, the Internal Revenue Service says, take a moment to check your withholding for 1990. You may need to give a new Form W-4, Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate, to your employer if too little or too much tax was withheld from your wages

during the year. If your refund was too large you may want to increase the number of allowances you claim so that you will have less tax withheld. The result will be larger

paychecks and a smaller refund. On the other hand, if you have less than 90 percent of your tax liability withheld, you will need to claim fewer allowances to avoid having to pay a penalty along with the taxes you owe. If you anticipate changes in your marital status, number of dependents, or deductions, the IRS says you

reflect these changes. Publication 919, Is My Withholding Correct for 1990?, free from the IRS, contains worksheets for computing the amount you should have withheld from your wages in order to closely match your tax liability for the year.
