

## Neighbors persuade developer to shelve restaurant plans

Residents opposing a Niles developer's plans to bring a new restaurant to the Dempster Harlem Shopping Center agreed to a revised proposal which would instead add additional retailers to the facility.

A group of about 24 neighbors met with H-C Developers' Jim Conroy, after Conroy asked the Niles Planning and Zoning Commission for a continuance on H-C's petition for a special use permit allowing a buffet res-

taurant on the site.

"It was more people than I was hoping to talk to," Conroy said, after the citizens refused to appoint two spokespersons to negotiate a settlement. Conroy

Commissioners say decision based on traffic, liquor license considerations

## Zoners deny request for Moslem Center

Assuring a Moslem group that their decision was motivated by concern for parking and future liquor license-holders, rather than religious considerations, Niles' Planning and Zoning commissioners unanimously denied a special use permit for a proposed Ismaeli Moslem Community Center to be established on the Caldwell Avenue property now owned by Tam Fitness Center.

The Ismaelis, who now worship in Rogers Park and in Northlake, are seeking a location in a north or northwest suburb to

accommodate young families who want to move out of Chicago.

Attorney Robert Kenny said the congregation will decide if they will appeal the decision of the recommending board to the Niles village board and revise plans to call for a smaller capacity remodeling. Expressing his "disappointment in the outcome" of the board meeting, Kenny said his clients did not voice a belief that the commission's decision was a by-product of prejudice.

Following detailed presentations by several professional and religious representatives of the small sect describing the "non-political, community-oriented, professional character" of its members, an animated exchange occurred between Commissioner Angelo Troiani and a traffic consultant hired by the Ismaelis.

Inquiring as to whether the engineer based his use projections on Niles' ordinance or on other considerations, Troiani turned to Niles Code Enforcement Director Joseph Salerno and asked how many parking spaces were mandated based on the overall use and capacity of the building.

Salerno responded that the ordinance called for at least 695 spaces based on plans for classrooms, offices, a cultural center, and 1,428 capacity prayer hall, with possibly more indicated for an 84-seat banquet hall on the site.

"I'm not trying to mislead you," protested traffic engineer Victor Lay.

"Yes you are," Troiani retorted. "What bothers me is this traffic guy is gonna come into my town (and tells me the cars) are not going to bother the man on the north (Box Car Willie's Restaurant). Well I wish you owned that restaurant. Tell us the facts! I hate a report that's one-sided."

Sunday's sentimental bash at Comiskey Park was a love affair with the past. It wasn't a celebration about baseball. And it had little to do with the shadows of past baseball greats. Rather, it was reaching back one more time and remembering.

Some 21st century historian may look up the report of Sunday's game and read that a fellow named Fletcher threw the last out in Comiskey Park to a first baseman named Lyons at 4:23 p.m. September 30, 1990. By then it will be just another paragraph in history. No big deal.

They were anticipating the end of an 81-year era. The Elgin clock in centerfield was edging its way past 4 o'clock. They just stood there mildly cheering the players on the field as they celebrated the last Sox victory in Comiskey Park.

Saying good-bye to a ball park is like saying good-bye to an old house. While it's made of bricks and mortar it's really made of memories. Without the memories the house means little.

# Senior Trans driver gives Morton Grove residents a lift

"Las Vegas! Everybody out!" Larry Northon shouts with a deep laugh.

Northon, 73, helps three women out of Morton Grove's Senior Trans as they prepare to shop at Dominick's. As chauffeur, counselor, comedian and handyman for Morton Grove's senior citizens, Northon is one of the most popular men in the village.

"It's a nice thing the village is doing for us," Virginia McKulski, 77, says as she gets in the

Senior Trans. "He deserves a tip," she says, pointing to Northon.

Morton Grove has operated its free Senior Trans since 1976. From 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. every Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, Northon picks up senior citizens at their homes and drives them to shops, doctors and social events in Morton Grove. On Tuesdays and Thursdays he drives them to Lutheran General Hospital and Rush North Shore Medical Center outside of the village limits.

The senior citizens are "happy to get out," Ralph Birmingham,

Morton Grove's senior program information officer, says. "Especially in the winter time they're stuck in the house" without the

program, he adds. In December the village spent \$27,870 on a new Ford diesel minibus for the program. The village also pays Northon's part-time salary, annual fuel costs of about \$4,000 and annual maintenance costs of about \$150.

The program, which serves an average of 26 people per day, has never had a problem receiving funding from the village, says Bud Swanson, director of Morton Grove's senior citizens services. As Morton Grove's population grows older, the village may need to add another day to the program, he adds.

"It's the best job I've enjoyed in my whole life, talking to seniors," Northon says Thursday morning as he checks his reservations for the day. "They're very outgoing but honest. They've got nothing to hide anymore."

Most of his passengers are widows, he says, who use the Senior Trans once or twice a week. Stores are their most popular destination, he adds as he shoves a black baseball cap over

his bushy white hair.

"I think it's very important to give them attention, make them feel important, make them feel they've got a lot of dignity," Northon says. In February Mor-

ton Grove named Northon "Senior of the Month." At Christmas time he volunteered to drive passengers to look at local holiday displays.

When the Senior Trans stops to pick up My Iverson, a volunteer

at Lutheran General Hospital, Iverson hands Northon a cookie. All day Northon receives treats and tips from his passengers.

Northon says he has never received a traffic ticket while driving the 16-seat minibus. He describes with a chuckle how his passengers shake their canes out the window and berate other drivers on his behalf.

All day Northon crosses Morton Grove, picking up and dropping off passengers. While the radio plays talk shows and swing music, Northon and his passengers discuss taxes, friends, the weather and the Cubs.

After he drops Iverson off at Lutheran General Hospital, he picks up Deanna Rottner and drives her to her volunteer work at the gift shop of the Lieberman Geriatric Health Center next to the Rush North Shore Medical Center. She explains that without the Senior Trans she might have to give up her volunteer work because taxis would cost \$8 round trip.

Northon says that senior citizens' biggest problems are loneliness and fear of people taking advantage of them. When he picks up three women at their apartment to go shopping, they are afraid to give their names to a reporter. "When you live alone, you're a little wary of your name

and address in the newspaper," one of them explains.

"It's very wonderful to have something to depend on from the village," another woman says. "Thank God for this program."

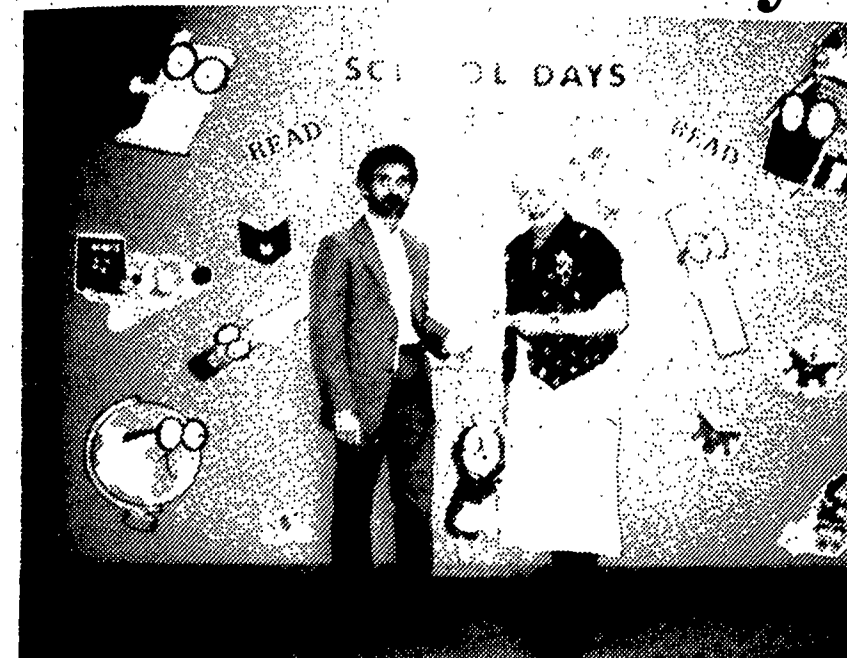

## Work begins on Twsp. disaster plan

Allen Graber, president of the board of the North Maine Fire Protection District, has been named Maine Township Emergency Services and Disaster Agency (ESDA) coordinator.

Graber has been hired on a part-time basis to develop a disaster plan for unincorporated Maine Township and coordinate police, fire, public works and private sector services in the event of an emergency.

The disaster plan will meet Federal Emergency Disaster

Agency (FEMA) and Illinois ESDA standards for emergency action in the event of natural disasters, transportation accidents, technological or hazardous materials incidents, nuclear attack, and other catastrophes, Graber said.

A pharmacist, who earned a master of public health degree from the University of Illinois in 1975, Graber has had 15 years' experience in emergency and disaster services, primarily as a volunteer.

## Skokie receives bicycle path grant

The Village of Skokie will receive a \$60,000 grant for construction of a bicycle path along the North Shore Channel, the State of Illinois has announced.

The Village will use the money for the path and related landscaping along the North Shore Channel property between Main St. and Dempster St. Skokie will lease the property from the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago.

The grant will supplement \$210,000 in Community Development Block Grant money for

landscaping improvements along the channel. The project, which began this week, includes earth excavation, grading, hydro-seeding and landscaping. Most of the work is scheduled for completion this fall, with additional plantings to be completed in the spring of 1991.

The site is designed for passive recreation and is slated to become the location of the Skokie Sculpture Park. An independent not-for-profit organization, the Skokie Sculpture Park Inc. committee.

A 17-year-old Park Ridge girl on Oct. 2 told Circuit Court Judge Margaret Frossard about the spring afternoon in 1987 when she was allegedly sexually attacked by a District 207 science teacher.

The girl described events of that April 1 afternoon and the period over two years later, when she walked into her first physics class and recognized her teacher, Scott Welty, as her alleged attacker. Welty, about 40, of Chicago, is currently assigned to non-

teaching duties in the district, with full pay and benefits.

Prosecuting attorney Catherine Crowley, in opening statements told the court of the alleged attack and noted the girl specifically identified her alleged male attacker as bearded, taller than she and having chipped teeth.

Crowley described police efforts to establish a likeness of the man by using a method of interchanging photos of facial structures, hair styles and other facial

## Zoning code revisions allow for group homes

Niles Plan Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals approved state-mandated changes to the village zoning code in order to accommodate group homes for developmentally disabled adults. The change now needs the approval of the village board.

Mary Kay Morrissey, director of Human Services and village attorney Dick Troy appeared before the board Oct. 1 with the zoning amendment. The Illinois Community Residence Location Planning Act requires that all

home rule municipalities submit a plan so persons with disabilities can live in the community. Existing zoning restricts multi-member households to consist of persons related to each other.

Group home categories, which will not include those with drug or alcohol related problems, will be for groups of eight or less or a separate category for residences housing nine or more individuals. Spacing requirements will avoid concentrating more than one residence per block.

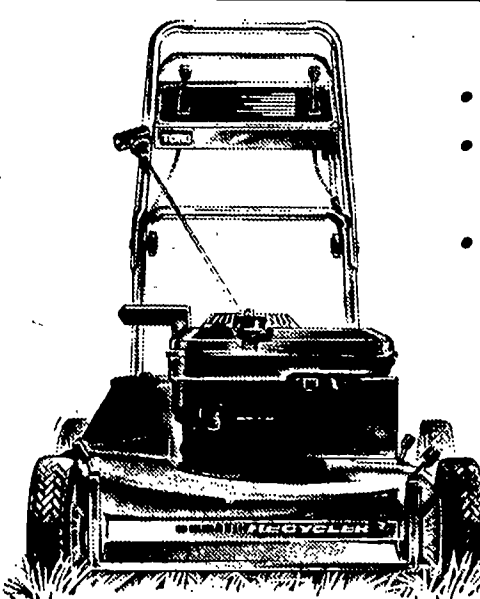

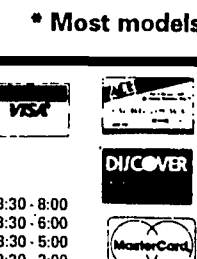

### Annunzio urges local input for airport policy

Congressman Frank Annunzio (D-Ill.) called recently for the Bush Administration to seek local advice in developing a national policy to provide air traffic growth at the country's busiest airports such as O'Hare International.

"The Federal government has an important role in insuring that the United States maintains a modern and safe national and international aviation system," Annunzio said in a House Floor statement. "But the government must also make sure that local residents are included in the formulation of any policy dealing with the nation's airports."

"Too often, solutions to the problems are made without any substantial input from the segment of the population that is most affected by the traffic at the busy airport - the local residents. It is about time this situation is

changed," he said.

Annunzio pointed out he has received thousands of letters during his 26 years in Congress from residents living near or beneath the flight paths into and out of O'Hare International Airport, the busiest in the country.

Most, he said, complain about noise pollution, the major environmental headache for the many communities near O'Hare.

He also said he would take an active role in hearings by the Aviation Subcommittee of the House Public Works and Transportation Committee later this month when the panel receives testimony on the subject of noise pollution, including federal versus local rights in limiting the burden on communities surrounding an airport.

"There is no reason that the Federal government cannot exert a strong hand in seeking a solution to the cries for help from the noise emanating from the airport," said Mr. Annunzio. "I will do everything within my power to prevent an increase in the noise pollution in the area. I hope the Bush Administration will do the same."

### Mucci backs income tax cut

Democratic candidate for state representative for the 55th District Robert R. Mucci stated he supports rolling back the temporary one-percent increase in the state income tax by one-half.

The result would keep intact monies earmarked for education while providing some relief back to the taxpayer.

The other one-half, Mucci stated, was directed to municipalities to provide property tax relief that never materialized. Much of this money was sopped up by government in administrative and operations costs, the public defender went on to say. Whenever, there is a choice between who can spend the money best, the government or the taxpayer, I'll give it back to the taxpayer every time, Mucci declared.

### Psychiatrist urges awareness of teen behavioral changes

Dr. Hakimi urges parents and teachers not to minimize the threats of suicide, but to understand the source of unusual comments and behavior and to seek professional help.

As a psychiatrist who is specifically trained to deal with children and teenagers' emotional and behavioral problems, Dr. Hakimi is able to address the needs of these age groups using special techniques. He believes that poor self-esteem is at the core of every psychiatric problem, including

characteristics to arrive at a reliable composite likeness.

She spoke of the girl's dissatisfaction with the composite results and her artist-mother's sketch that more nearly matched the man's likeness.

Crowley told of the girl's disbelief when, upon entering class in August, '89, "She sees the face of her attacker."

In his remarks, defense attorney Raymond Garza stated "Scott Welty is an innocent man, no question." He cited the girl's accusations as "her opinion...a mistaken opinion." He said the defense would show Welty to be a "person of impeccable integrity...and character...who's devoted his life to helping young people grow."

He called the accusations "so inconsistent, it's mind boggling...every person's nightmare," and declared he would prove the girl mistaken and ask the court to find Welty innocent.

In her testimony, the girl told how, as a freshman at Maine South High School in Park Ridge, she argued with her mother that day after school, then walked to the nearby woods and an open area named "farmer's field."

The area was edged by brush and trees and she stood alone, thinking. As she started to go home, she realized a man was walking toward her, between her and the path.

He asked "Have you seen my dog?" She had seen a dog in the area and turned to point in its direction, then turned back and found the man pointing a screwdriver towards her chest.

She said he told her "Do what I

said and you won't get hurt," and started shoving her towards the brush. The girl recalled she tried to talk him out of it, but he knocked her to the ground. She testified he held her down, though she scratched him and screamed and even faked an asthma attack. He muffled her screams, hit her and partially disrobed her and himself.

She said the man performed certain sexual actions, but he could not continue and spoke an expletive. At this, she asked if she could go and he replied "yes."

The girl's mother later told the court of her daughter's shaken, dirty and disheveled condition when she returned home and told her mother "a man grabbed me." When the mother hugged her, the girl said, "I'm all right. I got away."

Park Ridge police responded quickly and the girl was taken to Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, where she was examined by a Dr. James Reeder, who agreed with the girl's description of the attack. She later attended several police photo line ups, but no suspect was found.

During the ensuing period, the girl said she told only her parents, a few close friends and her high school guidance counselor, Victoria Smith, of her experience. The girl's mother identified a photo of the girl taken from her 1987 yearbook, depicting her with short hair and a fuller face. The mother explained by 1989, when the girl began the physics class, her daughter had grown, she wore glasses, her face was thinner and her hair was worn long.

Maine East's director of television, almost a third of the school's student body are Nilesites, as are members of his student staff.

"We're very excited about his new development; it's a dream come true," Wunderlich said. Now, he explained, the Niles students, their families and friends will be able to view their productions in their own homes.

According to Ken Tremback, Cablevision programming director, this is the first microwave interconnect to be inaugurated by his company in the Chicago area.

Besides Niles, Cablevision serves 30 other communities locally.

Initially, programming will consist of two and one-half hours weekly on Channel 29. Air time will be from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Tuesdays, and 6 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. on Thursdays.

David Jeffers, chairman of the Fine Arts Department at Maine East, said the school has the old-

est high school broadcasting department in the country, going back 30 years. Their student-produced videos have been honored by Olinchey Communications of Los Angeles and the Illinois Student Media Festival. One public service announcement was selected to appear on a new NBC program called, "My World on Video."

Mayor Blase commended the efforts of Irene McPhail, general manager of Cablevision, and the management of TCI/Cablenet, for bringing the interconnect to Niles. It took almost two years to obtain FCC approval for the project and hundreds of engineering hours to design the system.

"Even though initially we're pleased with the entertainment value of this new format," Mayor Blase said, "We're also looking to its long-range educational potential. The possibilities are limitless."

The girl testified she entered her physics class and the teacher "looked just like the guy who attacked me." After class, she consulted with Smith, asking her help to rule out the identification by proving the teacher didn't wear a beard in 1987 or had commitments which kept him elsewhere in the time period at both Maine East and Maine South high schools.)

The girl continued with the physics class, not telling her parents for fear of worrying them, but consulting with her counselor almost every day. She testified "If I didn't decide whether (it was) a positive identification - I couldn't live with that."

After two weeks, she was left alone with him after class and as he corrected papers, she could see his teeth. They were "the way I remembered my attacker's teeth being," she said. She told Smith: "I'm certain it's him."

During cross examination, attorney Garza disputed the girl's estimate of her alleged attacker's height, compared to her own, and submitted as evidence her driver's license application in which she noted her height differently. He questioned the use of a Kenny Loggins album photo as a guide for the mother's sketch of the attacker and alluded to her inability to remember the color of the attacker's shoes or the screwdriver. Judge Frossard twice interrupted the girl's nearly 90 minute testimony to ask if she wanted a break, but she replied "I'm okay."

## Deerfield Federal and Norwood Federal merge

key Park in 1933 when I was 8 years old. We went down into the dugout and he introduced me to Manager Jimmy Dykes and Al Simmons and Mule Haas, who he had previously met at the Chicago Beach Hotel in Hyde Park. That was a great thrill being down in the dugout with the ballplayers.

Another time my Dad asked a baseball clown, Al Schacht, to roll a ball over to us, as we watched his act during batting practice. That ball sat on my dresser until the day I left for the army ten years later.

A lifelong friend, Merv Block, went to many Sunday afternoon games with me when we were in our pre-teens. One time we stood alongside the Sox dugout. When Manager Dykes went onto the field he placed his cigar on a dugout ledge. Friend Block grabbed the cigar, and stuck it up on his wall in his bedroom with the Dykes identification under the cigar.

Another time he went down to the announcer behind the homeplate screen and told him his little brother was missing. The announcer said little Buddy Besser should come down behind homeplate. When I got home from the game my mother met me at the door and asked me what I had done at the ballpark. Many friends had called her and said they heard my name called out at the park. I never realized what a closely-knit community Chicago's southside was.

Another summer, another Sox game at Comiskey Park: An uncle gave me his 25-pass baseball book and I gave the passageway attendant one ticket to get into the game. I then passed the book through the iron fence to a friend who was outside the park. When he tried to hand another pass to the attendant, he noticed the number on the passbook had already been used that day. He

confiscated the passbook and I had a problem. I marched up to the office of the park and Dorothy Comiskey was told of my dilemma with my uncle, if I didn't get back his passbook. After a motherly lecture she called down to the gate and I retrieved the passbook.

Those were memories. Memories of people.

Another friend invited me to Comiskey park to see my first nightgame. The vice president of the Sox was named Harry Grabner. His brother was alleged to be a notorious gambler of some repute in Chicago. My friend had a passbook from Grabner. For whatever it was worth I found out many years later my friend's father had been bondsman for Al Capone.

Not once did I mention Ruth and Gehrig and Foxx and Greenberg and Williams and Apppling and Lyons and Mino-so and Dick Allen. They were among the best ballplayers I have ever seen. And they gave me much pleasure. But I remember my Dad, who was a pretty good catcher in his day. And I remember my friends who were there with me through those early years. There in Comiskey Park.

When I bought hot dogs at lunchtime I told the girl behind the counter I was buying my last hot dog at the park. And while I laughed at such sentimental hogwash I wondered why I even thought about such trivia. And when a young musical group named Stix, led the singing of "Take Me Out To The Ballgame" in the 7th inning, I must admit I choked up a bit and felt a nostalgic tear sneaking up on me. The tear was for the link with the past with my friends who were there at Comiskey Park in the thirties. And it was a tear for "Little Buddy Besser" of 55 years ago. And it was a tear for my Dad.

er when representatives said they would agree to a cap on occupancy, if necessary. The board said enforcement would be too troublesome for police and public employees.

Troiani also reacted to a representative citing prior use precedents set by other denominations along Caldwell Avenue. "Any house of worship deserves that (consideration of its right to establish itself in a community)," argued the architect for the project.

"I have nothing against any religious body," Troiani said. "They need to know there's decent parking and the building works no matter who you are. I hope that's what you meant."

Commissioner Sydney Mitchell also mirrored commissioners' fears that the 3,000 or so Chicago-area members would overflow the approximately 281-car parking spaces during the group's two major religious holidays in mid-July and mid-December, necessitating that the congregation open up the cultural center room to handle the extra attendees.

Mitchell's measured inquiry focused on how attendance at prayer services is monitored at the group's current two Chicago area mosque/communities, com-

paring it to the practice of Jewish synagogues of selling tickets for services during High Holy Days.

"If this is the best facility and the newest and the nicest, they all may decide to come," Commissioner James Callero observed, noting that many Roman Catholics from other parishes visit new churches.

Callero also asked if the presence of a liquor licensee as a north neighbor would offend the teetotaling Moslems and received a conciliatory response from petitioners.

Village Attorney Richard Troy later agreed with Troiani and Mitchell who observed that if Box Car Willies went the way of its two predecessors, a new owner could not get a liquor license if the congregation was established on the 7686 Caldwell Ave. property.

"There's no such thing as the grandfathering in of a license," Troy explained. "It applies to that licensee only and (the right to forbid liquor sales by a future owner of a property) cannot be waived by the church."

there would not be a fast turnover of patrons, according to Tomaska.

Conroy described H-C's alternative plan of building an outlot structure on the north end of the parking lot which could accommodate up to three small retailers and allow for a major hardware or houseware anchor to lease the now vacant 27,000 square foot space formerly occupied by Uniforms Unlimited and SaveMore Drugs.

"We would withdraw our request for a special use permit (for the eatery) Conroy said, noting the village board and zoning commission would still have the final say on the proposed renovation of the property where Ponderosa Steak House, Lee Ward crafts, and Radio Shack also rent space.

"This corner will be a jewel out here for the village of Niles to be proud of," Conroy promised.

Damage to the squad car was in excess of \$250 according to reports. Details of the Chicago accident involving the suspect's car were not available at press time.

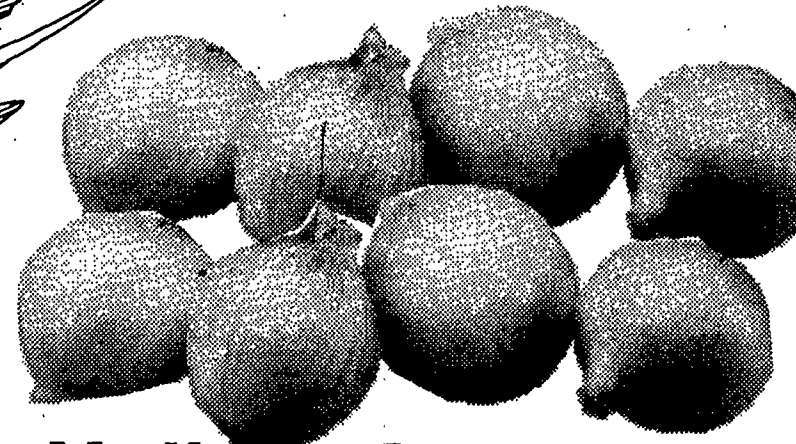
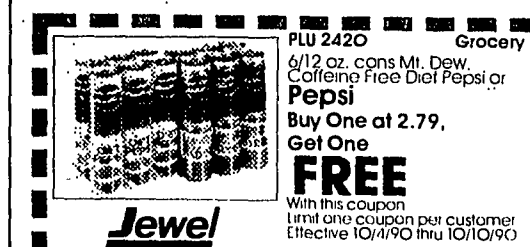
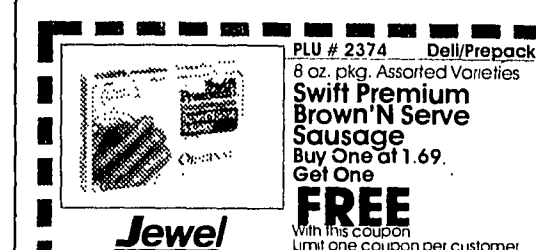
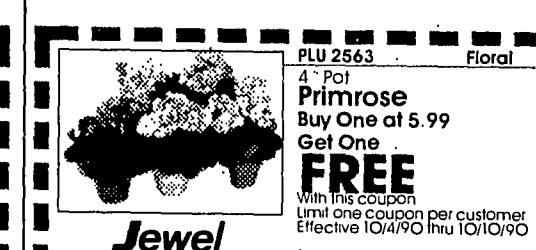
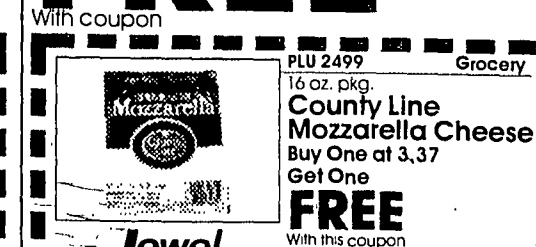

bration cost 500 hours of staff labor and occupied at least 18 staff members the day of the parade.
