In addition, the village showed the U.S. Census Bureau areas of the Terrace Square multi-family and other single-family dwellings that had not been tabulated but the bureau again did not include all the amended dwellings.

The resulting loss of income is sure to be a topic when Morton Grove's public budget workshops begin in early February.

Arft told village board members that figures compiled by Finance Director Spyro Hountalas project a \$96,000 decrease in revenues beginning as early as March of this year, from state income tax, which will be reflected by a comparable decrease from the General Fund. An additional \$40,000 will have to be lopped off the village's motor fuel tax revenues.

Niles stands to lose as much as \$167,110 from combined state income and motor fuel tax revenues, based on Illinois Municipal League estimates of \$80.38 annual tax income per resident.

Niles intends to challenge census figures with the help of the Northwest Municipal Confe ence but Morton Grove has decided, in Arft's words, "not to shoot the messenger," for informing it of a fact that planners are already aware of: landlocked communities with older populations do not produce population in-



Morton Grove's taxi discount program has been revised slightly from the \$.35 fare that was formerly charged for a ride in Morton Grove provided by the American Taxi Company. The Village will now be issuing new coupons worth \$2 off the metered fare for these rides.

Upon completion of a taxi ride, the rider must present a discount coupon (attainable at the Flickinger Municipal Center) to the driver and also pay the balance of the fare.
