This past year Assell told me that his employer was being subjected to an unfairly restrictive village ordinance seeking to minimize his quite prominent display of the U.S.

The controversey began when the Schaumburg Village Board passed ordinance #3149 on March 28, 1989. The action was taken in response to complaints that the U.S. flag was being subjected to visual exploitation by certain businesses in Schaumburg, and in some cases placing public safety in jeopardy. With the new ordiance enacted, many businesses voluntarily complied. Jeep Eagle of Schaumburg did not. The village then attempted to enforce the new ordinance upon

The owner of the car dealership, Mr. Sid Sherman refused to comply with the contention that although his 45 ft. flagpole had been affixed to his property just one foot inside the property line, the new ordinance required the flagpole to be moved an additional 49 feet. Such a move would place the flagpole either in the middle of the parking lot, or in the middle of the showroom.







Construction underway for 9-1-1 center

If you plan on stopping by the NPD in the near future you're going to find our front door locked! And in the semi-circular front drive out front rather than finding a Niles squad parked you will now notice a large red dumpster. Are we closing? Not hardly! Are we moving? Nope! We're now into the hands of our 9-1-1 transi-

A construction contract was awarded for the 9-1-1 project as the February village board meeting and the contractor is now in the process of demolishing the old comm center and preparing for the new comm center. The construction is estimated to be completed by the end of June.

For the last two weeks the police department has been swarmed with telephone, radio, computer, and electrical technicians moving our radio and phone communications into a temporary location until the new center is finished. Our front and side door have been locked and there are large signs compliments of Terry Gondola and the Niles Public Works directing visitors and other citizens with police business around to our rear entrance.

This entrance will now serve as our main entrance until our construction is done. So, if you are coming to the PD park your car on the Milwaukee Avenue or Touhy Avenue side of our lot and enter through the rear door on the west side of the police department. After 11 p.m. at night and until 7 a.m. in the morning the door will be locked but an intercom is there to let you speak with the dispatcher who can "buzz" you in. Signs on the inside of the building will direct you to the desk. We're still open seven days a week, 24 hours a day, all we've done is changed our entrance for now. Once this construction is over our front desk operation will again be accommodating people through the front days. dating people through the front door.

Our cut over date to the 9-1-1 emergency number is not until May, 1992 so if you have a police emergency still use our 647-2131 exchange and for non-emergencies use 647-0400. To contact the Niles Fire Department and paramedics for an emergency call 827-2121 and for non-emergencies 967-6100. When the time comes to cut over to the 9-1-1 number you will be given ample notification, but we still have a ways to go.

Needless to say we will be anxious to finish up with this project as it is a lot of work and inconvenience, but we feel when the 9-1-1 service is initiated it will be a great benefit to the community.
