After an initial swearing-in ceremony for the successful candidates for the office of village trustee, Jeffrey Arnold, Tom Bondi, James Mahoney, Jr., Bart Murphy and Andrew Przybylo,

the Niles Village Board on April 23 formally appropriated \$33,657,113 for all expenditures budgeted for the fiscal year 1991/92. The amount is 12.9 percent

higher than last year, with the largest amount of the money due to additional expenditures in the water fund. Trustees also levied

Park Board elects Panek new president

The Niles Park Board on April 18 unanimously elected Commissioner Carol Panek its president for the 1991-92 term. Commissioner James Pierski was chosen vice president.

Then, in a pairing of names reminiscent of their recent write-in campaign for village trustee, Panek appointed Mary Marusek park treasurer. Park Director Tom Lippert was retained as board secretary.

April 22, Panek said of Marusek: "She's a comptroller, capable and conscientious...I wanted it away from the board and staff. That would help us look at our financial department different-

ly...monthly reports; beginning and ending balances; look at the money we have, are we making enough money off it...she can advise."

Bringing in a treasurer from outside the immediate board and park staff is not without precedent, Panek said. She pointed to the terms as treasurer held by current village trustee Jeffrey Arnold and Peerless Savings and Loan executive Timothy Sheehan, a non-Niles resident.

Marusek told The Bugle in her position as comptroller for a point of purchase advertising firm she is responsible for preparing financial department different-

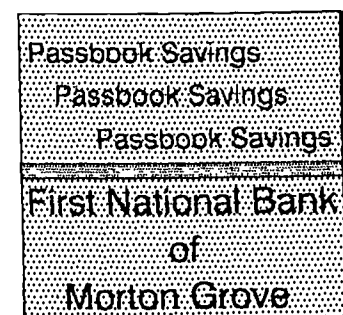
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Skokie yard waste collection resumes

Regular collection of yard waste by Village of Skokie crews has resumed, and residents can also bring yard waste to the village's drop-off center.

Residents who choose to put their yard waste out for collection by village crews must use the special bags with the Skokie recycling logo. Bags that have yard waste mixed in with garbage will not be picked up. Village crews will not collect yard waste placed in the "generic" yard waste bags available at many retail stores.

Skokie residents served by village collection crews may also bring their yard waste to the village's yard waste and recycling drop-off center, located at the Public Works Garage, 5015 Davis St. Residents going to the drop-off center do not need to use the special bags. The drop-off center is open on Saturdays and Sundays from 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Many residents leave their grass clippings on the lawn. This is better for the lawn and reduces the need for fertilizer.

Yard waste other than grass clippings can be disposed of as follows:

- Leaves, weeds and other

plant material should be placed in the special yard waste bags or brought to the village drop-off center.

• Small brush and tree trimmings may be put in the bags or may be bundled and left out for collections. Any trimmings too small to be bundled must be placed in the special bags or brought to the drop-off center.

• Large brush, branches and limbs must be cut into lengths no more than five feet long and must not exceed three inches in diameter.

Park Board approves \$4.2 million budget

Morton Grove Park commissioners approved a \$4,197,309 budget for 1991-92 on April 18.

This figure represents a 5.3 percent increase over the 1990-91 budget of \$3,983,442. Residents' property taxes are expected to be only minimally affected, according to Superintendent of Finance Ken Swan.

Reasons for the budget increase include material and supply cost hikes, a \$12,500 increase for pension and retirement fund contributions, a 6.5 percent salary raise for employees and a \$9,500 contribution increase to the Maine-Niles Association of Special Recreation (M-NASR). The budget allocates \$1.3 mil-

lion over a 2-year period for capital improvement projects and includes \$753,000 for Phase II of the Harter Park Redevelopment Project. Another \$93,000 is slated for new playgrounds at Austin and Oketo Parks.

Other board action included:

- The approval of a \$440 bid for the eleven 70-foot athletic field light poles and fixtures to Moss Recreation Ltd., in Hinsdale.

- The appointment of Morton Grove resident Bill Archer to M-NASR's Liponi Foundation Board of Trustees.

- The approval of a \$14,335 contribution payment the district owes M-NASR.

Butane refill cans are also used in the same manner. It does not matter what the brand name is, as it can be obtained in any community.

Please be alert to these products and any supply of balloons, which are used as the coolant chamber transfer device from which the fumes are inhaled. Let's keep our kids safe!

Schoenberg, Lang property tax bill a 'bad idea'

The property tax bill introduced by Rep. Jeffrey Schoenberg (H.B. 427) is a bad idea. What will happen is Illinois' taxing bodies will create a new level of government employees to go out and snoop around.

It is evident by Representatives Schoenberg's and Lang's comments that they don't know very much about commercial real estate assessments. Commercial assessments are not based on the original cost of a building, nor are they based on the increased value due to inflation. They are based on occupancy. If shopping centers, such as Old Orchard, have empty buildings, such as the former Wards store, the building has very little value to anyone since it is not generating income, thus it is entitled to be assessed at a lower value.

Representatives Schoenberg and Lang are way off base when they say business isn't paying its fair share. Commercial property owners currently pay at the rate of 38 percent of assessed valuation,

whereas home owners only pay at the rate of 16 percent of their assessed valuation. This is just another way to hide the taxes the taxpayer will ultimately pay for. If the building owner has to pay higher taxes then he has to raise the rent. The business that rents the store has to raise the prices that the consumer has to pay.

If this bill passes it will drive more businesses out of our area into the surrounding counties where the tax base is lower for commercial property. To the average resident of our area that means a narrower tax base, which means higher taxes for the homeowner. It will also mean a loss of jobs.

The ONLY solution to the whole problem of high property taxes is government must live on a budget that the taxpayers can afford. The taxpayers pockets are not bottomless.

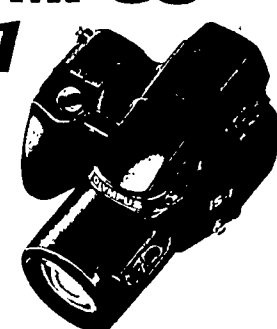

Lower your odds of being victimized

The weather is starting to warm up and hopefully we will be able to spend more time working on the yards or just sitting on the patio. It's probably a safe assumption to make that while sitting in the back yard or working out there you will probably leave the doors open to let the fresh air into the house. But sometimes more than just fresh air comes into the house!

Don't leave your front door open when you are in your back yard because if an opportunistic thief sees you in your back yard it can become an invitation to burglarize your home. Don't leave purses or wallets visible to strangers who can momentarily enter your home and steal them while you are outside. And be wary of strangers who stop and strike up unusual conversations with you outside your home because they may have an accomplice who entered through that open door and is going through your dresser drawers while you are talking with your "new friend".

The nice weather will also bring out the con men with the "driveway scaling scams" and the home repair frauds, so be wary of these types of solicitors. If you have any questions on any suspicious people call the Niles Police at 647-0400, but most of all be cautious of who you let in your house or who you give money to!

Your home is not the only area that con men and con women work. They are also busy working the shopping mall parking lots with that age old, but still highly successful "pigeon drop scam" which certainly appeals to the greed in one's self with the offer of "found money". In the pigeon drop scam you are approached by a stranger who is extorting the fact that he or she has just found a large amount of money and would like to split it with you!

Think of it, your lucky day, no meddlesome IRS or spouse involved! Sounds good? Sure anybody could use a few extra bucks these days. But there are a few strings attached. Usually your new found friends, and they work in pairs, will want a show of good faith before they split the booty, so they will want you to withdraw a couple of thousand or maybe more so they can go to their boss for a little advice on how to make the split. It won't be long after that and your new found friends and your hard earned money will both disappear. It sounds trite and there are variations, but it still works. If you are approached by people with a con like this call the police and if we can find them maybe we can keep them from preying on some other victim in our town or clear up some other successful pigeon drops they have been involved in.

When you are in the stores, ladies, don't leave your purse or wallets vulnerable to a pick pocket. Keep your hands on your purse and keep it zipped or buttoned shut until you are ready to pay the cashier. And if someone bumps or jostles you, make sure your wallet doesn't leave when they do.

If you just exercise your common sense and use a little precaution you can lower the odds of being victimized by a con or thief at home or on the street.

This was Stoklosa's second road race win in a row on the CARA Circuit as he has previously won the half marathon at the Cary March Madness Race with a time of just over one hour.



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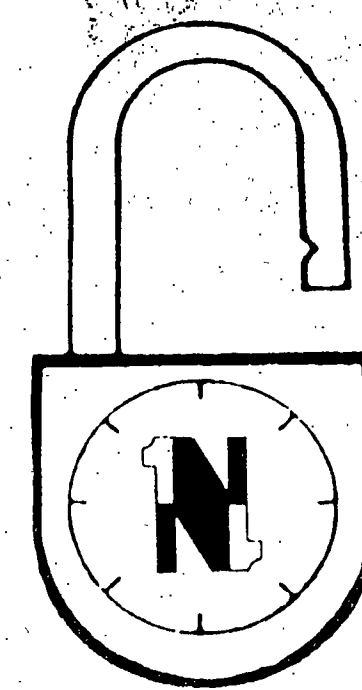
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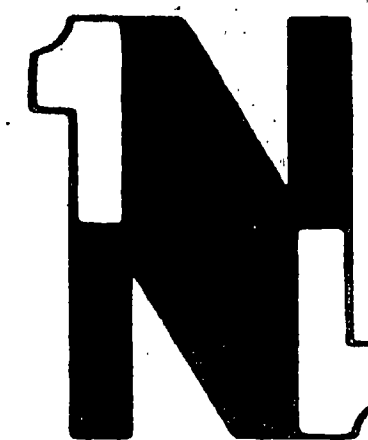

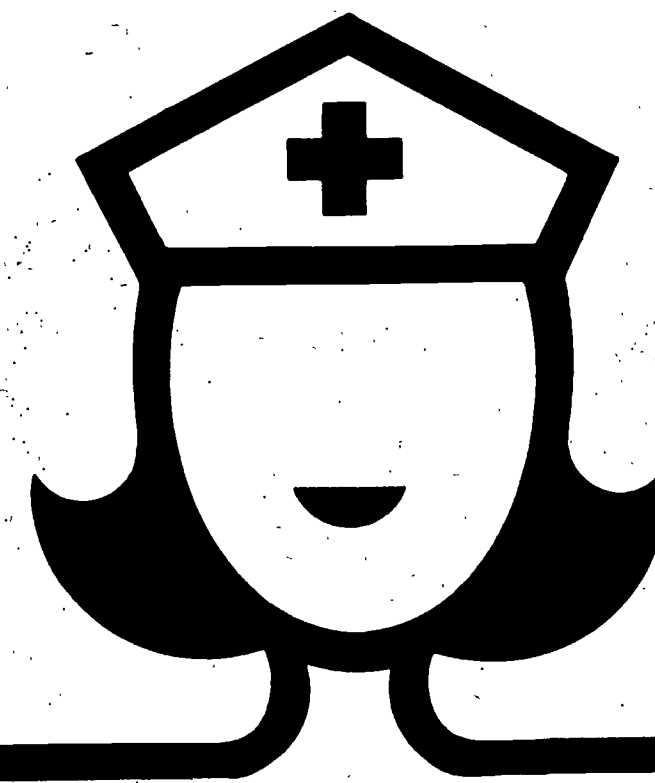

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Tanning salons pose health risks

The bold headline reads: "Got a Minute? Get a Tan." The smaller print goes on to say that it's one of the oldest and safest facilities of its kind.

Such is a typical advertisement for the current rage of salons promising a golden tan. These popular tanning parlors claim a single session will begin to make you look healthy, feel healthy and soften your skin so that it becomes more "healthy."

But buyer beware. If ever there was a time for an educated consumer to read between the lines, this is it.

Tanning salons first appeared several decades ago. But you could always tell a real tan from a fake one. The old tanning booths used sun lamps that produced ultraviolet B (UVB). These usually produce more of a sunburned appearance that doesn't look anything like spending a week in the Caribbean.

In the past decade these tanning parlors have once again become popular as new "technology" has produced sunlamps that do give you a natural looking tan. And the amount of time you need to spend under the lights is a fraction of the time it would take sitting on the beach.

So far, so good? No, not so good. Dermatologists today agree that sunbathing solely to work up a nice tan is not healthy.

The sun gives off dangerous ultraviolet rays that can lead to wrinkles, dry skin and skin cancers. The indoor tanning machines produce those same ultraviolet rays and produce those same skin problems.

The people who work at the tanning salons may tell you that their rays are safer than the sun's, but it just isn't so.

Many of the newer tanning lamps produce ultraviolet A (UVA) light. UVA does not in itself produce a burn. It does produce a somewhat immediate darkening of one's pigment, resulting in a tan. If that was all UVA did, there would be no argument. But there is more to the story.

Scientists have discovered that UVA light penetrates much deeper into your skin than UVB or burning rays.

This light can interfere with the body's immune system, leading to an increased chance of cancer internally as well as on the skin.

New procedure revolutionizes appendectomies

A new surgical procedure recently started at Rush North Shore Medical Center in Skokie enables a person to undergo an appendectomy with far less physical and emotional stress than would have been experienced through an invasive operation.

In most cases, a person has a hospital stay of about 12 hours, can return to normal activity within days and has no visible scar. The procedure is called laparoscopic appendectomy.

Few surgeons in the Chicago area are performing this procedure. Dr. Jose Velasco, chairman of Rush North Shore Medical Center's Department of Surgery, began performing the procedure at Rush North Shore in late March.

This minimally invasive procedure employs optic technology called laparoscopy, used since the early 1970s for abdominal diagnostic and exploratory procedures. Since the early 1980s, laparoscopy has been increasingly

used for gynecological surgical procedures. By 1989 the technology expanded to gall bladder removal—called laparoscopic cholecystectomy.

During the laparoscopic appendectomy, which in most cases takes approximately 40 minutes, three tiny incisions are made in the lower abdomen. Tubes are inserted through these incisions: one tube carries a lens and is attached to a video monitor; the other two are used to insert a variety of operating instruments.

"Most patients with acute appendicitis are candidates for this surgery," reports Dr. Velasco. "Because there is such a small incision and minimal disruption of muscle and other tissue, patients experience less bodily trauma."

Dr. Velasco anticipates that it won't be long before surgeons will start using laparoscopy for hernia repair, bowel resection, treatment of ulcer disease, and cancer surgery.

Exercise can help reduce back pain

Exercising regularly and properly is one of the best ways to prevent or alleviate back pain, according to experts.

"Regular exercise tones and strengthens not only your back muscles, but also the muscles that support the back," says Diane DeMarco, executive director of The National Exercise For Life Institute.

With as many as eight out of 10 Americans likely to develop back pain at some time in their lives, and the greatest risk occurring between the ages of 35 and 55, half the working population will be affected during their most productive years, according to a recent article by Steven R. Weiner, M.D., chief of the Rheumatology Division of Olive View Medical Center, Los Angeles.

Why do so many people suffer from back pain? The causes can be related to any one of several reasons, including: poor health, lack of fitness, stress, smoking and drug abuse. Certain job categories can also cause employees to be more prone to back problems.

"The bad news for white collar executives is that prolonged sitting can also promote back injury. Indeed, where lower back pressure is concerned sitting is the worst physical position," says Dr. Weiner in "Oh, My Aching Back," in the July issue of *Management Review*.

If ignored, notes Dr. Weiner, back pains are burdensome to both the patient and his or her company.

The good news for back pain sufferers is that, when tackled early, back problems are usually curable. Long-term preventive measures against back pain should include daily exercises, such as warm-ups, stretching and conditioning exercises for the back. Improved posture, strong abdominal wall muscles, and losing excess weight are also important.

"By strengthening muscles such as the abdominals, gluteals, hamstrings, erector spinae, (which is located in the lower back) latissimus dorsi in the mid-back region and the trapezius or shoulder muscles, you protect your spine from shock," explains Jeff Zwielfel, exercise physiologist with The National Exercise For Life Institute.

For example, Dunphy says, if you lift something and your arms are weak, the force from the lifting must be loaded somewhere else, so it goes to the back. If your arms and legs were strong, then they could absorb that shock.

Consult your local back specialist for recommendations on the exercises best suited to your particular condition, says The National Exercise For Life Institute.

House approves bill opposing phone surcharge

The 15 cent surcharge is one step closer to being permanently removed from phone bills after the Illinois House of Representatives approved a bill sponsored by State Representative Ralph C. Capparelli (D-13).

"The consumers of Illinois finally beat the ICC," Capparelli said. "Today's vote by the House reaffirms just how wrong the ICC was in putting this surcharge on phone bills."

House Bill 290 prohibits the ICC from imposing surcharges on utility bills in order to subsidize service for a particular class of phone or utility users. The "Link Up II" program was designed to subsidize phone service for low-income people who otherwise would not be able to afford phones.

Com Ed says 1991 year of 'Cautious Optimism'

Commonwealth Edison Chairman James J. O'Connor welcomed stockholders to the company's 104th annual meeting, held in Rockford to commemorate the 25th anniversary of Edison's merger with Central Illinois Electric and Gas Co., a Rockford-based utility.

The occasion marked the first time in Edison's history that its annual meeting had been held outside Chicago.

Stockholders learned that disappointing earnings of 22 cents per share in 1990 (down from \$2.83 in the previous year), were due mainly to the effects of a

1989 Illinois Supreme Court decision, which reversed an earlier Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) approved rate increase.

The court ruling in effect rolled back electric rates to 1985 levels and led to a refund in 1990 of all revenues collected under the reversed rate order, O'Connor stated.

On the positive side, said O'Connor, Edison's continuing effort to obtain fair rate treatment to reflect the company's investment in its newest generating units, culminated in a March ICC decision to grant Edison a 14 percent rate increase to be phased in over three years.

While the ICC rate order has been appealed by several intervenors, O'Connor told stockholders, "we are cautiously optimistic that it will be sustained by the Supreme Court, thus concluding the process begun five years ago to adjust our rates in recognition of the completed Byron 2 and Braidwood units." O'Connor noted that the three units collectively provided 25 percent of Edison's output in 1990.

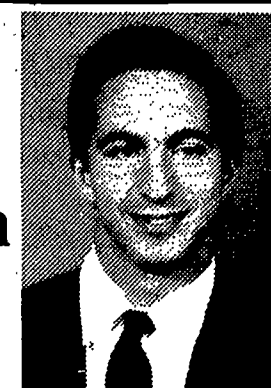
Perhaps most importantly, O'Connor concluded, the rate order "recognized that our last three generating units are fully used and useful." In addition, he noted, the rate order allows the recovery of deferred charges on the three units, which have accrued since they were placed in service beginning in 1987.

Despite the favorable rate order, O'Connor cautioned that the company faced continuing challenges in the year ahead. "Besides the fact that all of our costs were not allowed in establishing the new rate levels," he noted, "Edison continues to experience upward pressure on operation and maintenance expenses."

Start saving for your child's college education

If your child is an above average academic achiever, don't start packing his or her bags for college just yet. These days it takes more than good grades to get a degree.

If your child will begin attending a state university within the next four or five years, you'll pay roughly \$26,000 for a four-year education. That's quite a burden when you consider the average annual income per two-salary household is less than \$45,000.

Worse yet, college costs continue to climb. If your child won't start college for another 15 years, you'll pay nearly the same amount, \$24,000 for one year of college education. Remember these are the costs of state universities; the price tag for a four-year private school is even steeper.

While there is no way to completely eliminate the sting from saving for your child's education, a number of investments are available for making the savings process as painless as possible, including zero-coupon bonds, annuities, and mutual funds.

There are two types of zero-coupon bonds. Both offer tax advantages. The first type of zeros, zero-coupon government bonds are backed by the U.S. government. With this investment you set aside a smaller sum today. The money grows at a compounded rate to a much larger sum by the time your child finishes high school. The interest is automatically reinvested, so your money grows more quickly than if you take possession of your earnings. Best of all, you don't have to pay state income taxes on the earnings.

The other type of zeros is zero-coupon municipal bonds. These bonds are backed by the city, state or local government that issues them or are guaranteed by an insurance company. Zero-coupon municipal bonds work similarly to zero-coupon government bonds, zero-coupon municipal bonds save you tax dollars. All zero-coupon municipal bonds are exempt from federal income taxes.

Although annuities aren't as familiar to us as CDs, they also provide an excellent means of accumulating wealth over a longer period of time. Plus, with annuities all taxes on your earnings are deferred until you begin withdrawing them. There are basically two types of annuities. Both combine insurance coverage with the opportunity to invest. Fixed annuities guarantee the return of both principal and interest. The return of variable annuities, on the other hand, fluctuates because it is dependent upon market performance.

Yet another type of investment that offers potential rising income and appreciation of principal is mutual funds with growth or growth-and-income objectives. Because mutual funds represent the pooled investment dollars of many investors, you gain the advantages of professional management and diversification. Many conservative funds have excellent records of staying ahead of inflation and the rising costs of education.

Depending on your situation, any one or a combination of these investments can provide an opportunity for you to save for your child's college education. What is vital is that you begin studying the costs now. It doesn't take a lot of money to start

Many of them devoted as many hours to this so-called avocation as they did to their daily work. There were often three and four meetings a week they attended. There were week-end meetings out-of-town. And their daily visits to the park offices and facilities made their job as a public representative almost too consuming.

In many cases these non-professional, non-recreation people got carried away by their efforts. They often would be reviewing the daily work of employees and watching over the parks as if they were their own private domain. Their motives were well-intended. But they were somewhat overwhelming in their involvement in the district.

Board members are elected

to assess information from the people they hire, and create policy from the reports they receive from the professionals. They get a bit out of hand when they snoop into the corners of the district getting in the way of the people hired to run the district.

We've often thought there should be a limit to the number of years a public official should serve. After many years on a board re-elected officials often pose a proprietary interest in the district. Their position of representing becomes one of ownership. It becomes "their" district and it often places blinders on their vision.

After two 4-year terms it would be beneficial if new blood is transfused into a public district.

financial statements and during her nine-year tenure on the Niles Park Board, was concerned with the financial aspects of the district.

Referring to Panek's move, she said "I think the appointment is her's, and the (board's) organization and committee structure--it's really up to her. (The treasurer's job) is done differently in different park districts. She has a direction in which she'd like to see it go."

Panek told The Bugle her "...big goal is reorganization of the board to give every member the ability to grow in committees; work hand in hand with the staff, though not in the day to day operations."

As a first step, the new president is forming three major committees on the board: administration and finances; recreation and parks, buildings and grounds.

Assigning three board members to each committee, she wants the committees to "...review issues appropriate for that department, or policies and what the director wants to see done. Do the nuts and bolts and bring it back to the full board (for action)."

The new plan changes the old procedure of members considering issues as a committee of the whole board.

Panek said "My aim is to de-

velop (the board) and bring better service to the residents of the Niles Park District."

Other points on her agenda include the possible expansion of the board from five to seven members; town meetings to get citizen input on their needs and their opinions on park programs and the idea of a park walkway for Niles walkers that would include distance markings.

Panek wants...a thorough investigation of all Niles' parks--how they're used and who uses them.

The president hopes to see the Niles Park District getting more grants. She said "We've been deficient; so much money is given out...we haven't taken advantage of the grants."

With village elections looming again in 1993, will the two-year park commissioner, ten-year village trustee and candidate for the Illinois Assembly in 1986 be tempted to run again for village office?

Panek said "Who knows? I'll give this all I have right now (and give) the board the ability to function on its own; seek out other policies that will aid the district and encourage the staff to be creative...in the hope that it will bring better leisure services to the residents of Niles."

\$2,139,893, a figure that translates into a 4.9 percent rise in property taxes.

In another effort to boost revenues, trustees boosted Niles' sales tax by a half percent, bringing the amount to 7 1/2 percent, effective Sept. 1. The tax does not affect food or drugs.

Continuing with financial matters, the board approved reimbursing North Suburban Public Utility company (NSPU) for land, engineering, legal and out-of-pocket costs in the purchase of property once planned for a new water reservoir and pumping station.

Since Niles ultimately decided to build its own water facilities, rather than use NSPU's, NSPU sold the land and Niles agreed to reimburse them for the other expenses involved. The payment was \$139,120.

The trustees put Niles' firmly on the side on conservation when they authorized a recycling procurement policy for the village.

Under the policy, the village agrees to use recycled products whenever possible, to review product and service specifications to determine whether new or recyclable products are required and to alter the situation in favor of recyclable materials whenever it is feasible and it still can maintain a certain performance standard.

The ordinance calls for outside contractors bidding products or service, including printing service.
