

Macken pleads guilty; receives probation

As anticipated, former Niles Library administrator Daniel C. Macken, III entered a guilty plea to one charge of felony theft June 25 and received the maximum possible sentence, other than im-

prisonment, of 48 months probation. Macken was arraigned on charges he stole \$165,000 in library funds between August, 1989 and April, 1991.

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New law establishes policy for water meter costs

Niles sets guidelines for raffles

The Niles Village Board on Tuesday, June 25, clarified the village stance on raffles.

An amendment to the village code specifies in part, the procedure of play, the reporting of finances and record keeping. It requires the raffle holder must be Niles-based and non-profit, a category which includes religious, charitable, educational, fraternal, veterans, labor and business organizations as well as certain non-profit fundraising groups.

The area in which raffle tickets will be sold must be spelled out. Convicted felons cannot hold a raffle, or can professional gamblers or persons of poor moral

character. A raffle license will be valid for a specific time period, not to exceed one year. The total value of all prizes offered in one raffle may not exceed \$250,000 and the maximum charge for one raffle ticket was set at \$2.50.

In other action, Niles trustees approved an ordinance introduced by Trustee Jeffrey Arnold, which establishes that business and commercial buildings and residential residences of more than four units must be equipped with water meters capable of being read by automated meter readers and the user must pay for the meter and installation cost. Niles' sister city, Pisa, Italy, has good news for those who have been worried about the "real" Tower of Pisa leaning over too far.

At the beginning of this year a group of specialists, appointed by the government, concluded the tower should be girded by steel rings to slow down the listing or tilting of the monument. Two months later the Tower had increased its tilt. But in a recent measurement the Tower began righting itself up slightly.

According to the experts the tower has "leaned back" several times during this century. According to the Associated Press, the back movement may be due to increased rainfall which raised the ground-water levels.

The tower leans about 13 feet to one side. When it was first built in 1173 it began its tilt because the ground shifted beneath the tower.

Since January 1990, tourists have been forbidden from making the twisting and turning climb up the tower because the experts were worried about its stability.

Here in Niles...not to worry. Leaning Tower Y director, Jim Kohler, said there has never been any tilt problem at the Touhy Avenue location. He noted there is a lip in the ground which counterbalances the verticle tower. He said if there was any move- Continued on Page 34

Board allows designated smoking areas at pools

Niles smokers won their hard-sought freedom to smoke in designated areas at both park districts outdoor pools June 24. However, board commissioners, meeting to review specific resident petitions, held firm about banning adult lap swims during Oasis Pool safety breaks.

The action followed a motion by Commissioner Bud Skaja, Jr. and came as a departure from a recently adopted board ruling that banned smoking in all Niles Park District facilities, in accordance with the Illinois Indoor Clean Air Act. But because this pertained to

the outdoors, some commissioners' concerns about health and safety hazards were put aside to accommodate resident smokers.

Currently, smoking is allowed at one table in the concession area at the Sports Complex pool and pool manager Jan Gerber indicated there had been no problem with it. Board President Carol Panek called for close monitoring of the smoking areas by all district staff members.

The distinction between a regular pool, such as the Sports Complex and a water park, such Continued on Page 34

Metra expands service for holiday

Fourth of July revelers can celebrate their independence this year from crowded highways and parking lots by traveling on Metra.

Those planning to attend the City of Chicago's fireworks display or "Taste of Chicago" festivities can avoid traffic congestion and downtown parking hassles by taking advantage of Metra's expanded service on Wednesday, July 3.

Regular weekday schedules are being adjusted on that day in anticipation of heavier-than-usual ridership. Extra coaches will be added to inbound midday trains to expand seating capacity. The Burlington Northern, Chicago & North Western West and Northwest, Milwaukee District West and Rock Island lines also will run extra inbound service, with schedules posted at all stations.

"After the blast" trains will be added Wednesday evening on the Milwaukee District North and West, Chicago & North Western and West Burlington Northern and Rock Island lines.

Holiday/Sunday schedules will be in effect Thursday, July 4 on all Metra lines.

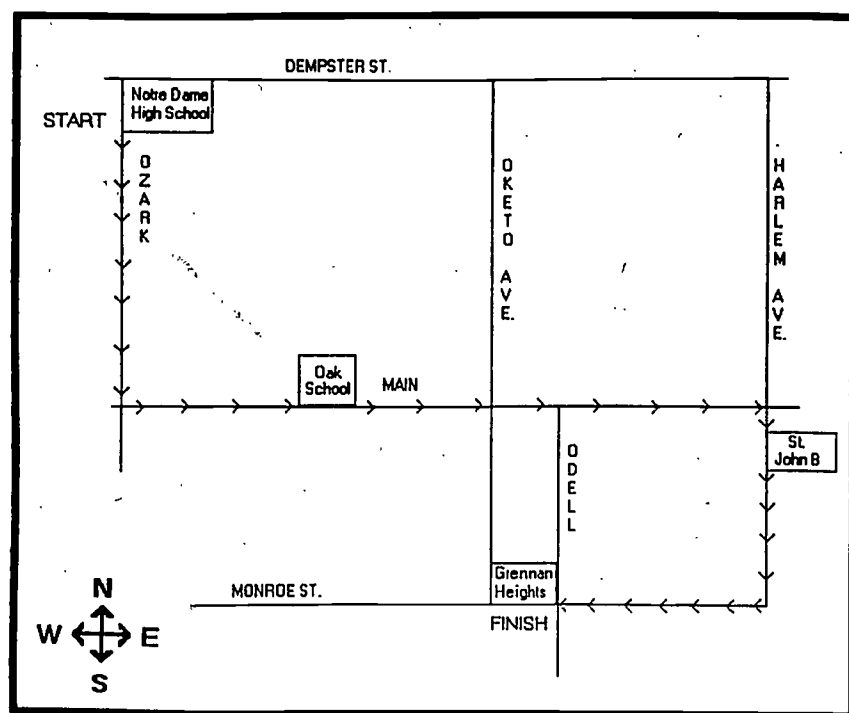

Each year tragic and needless accidents occur through the careless use of fireworks during the 4th of July and other celebrations. During the month of July, 1990, the Illinois Office of the State Fire Marshal conducted a survey throughout the state and found that 291 persons were injured by fireworks or fireworks-related mishaps. This number covers only the reported incidents. The Skokie Fire Department

estimates there are many unreported incidents. As a reminder, all fireworks that must be ignited with a match are illegal in the Village of Skokie. This includes snakes, sparklers, etc. The only legal fireworks are caps, poppers and devices with 25 grams or less of powder. District 63 could face future space shortage

East Maine Elementary School District 63 gained more than 200 students in the last two years, according to a report presented to board members last Tuesday.

According to Superintendent of Schools Dr. Eldon Gleichman, an increase of more than 200 students is half a school full. If the district continues to enroll 100 additional students a year for five years, there may be difficulties providing enough space, he said.

The administration probably will present a recommendation to the board in October based on projections for the 1991-'92 school enrollment.

This report follows a plateau in the student population preceded by several years of declining enrollment. During the decline, four of the district's elementary schools and one junior high school were closed.

Village board declines mandate to join JULIE

Citing cost and home rule considerations, Morton Grove and most Northwest Municipal Conference member communities are ignoring an Illinois General Assembly mandate to join JULIE, the state underground utility locator service.

"JULIE is a good organization," commented Village Administrator Larry Arft, after apprising the village board of the NWMC's recommendation, "But municipalities don't need this."

The goal of JULIE is to provide a central locating service, preventing contractors from unwittingly damaging underground electrical, gas and phone lines. In passing the legislation last year, the legislature provided no funding for the mandates it contained.

JULIE is set up as a private corporation and municipalities balk at using public funds and man-

Police enforce water sprinkling regulations

Its summer again in Niles and with the heat and humidity comes lawn sprinkling restrictions.

The restrictions have been ordered by the Federal Water Administration and the Illinois Department of Water Resources. The federal government has threatened to cut Niles water allocation if the sprinkling restrictions are not properly enforced.

Water sprinkling rules begin on May 15, each year. Sprinkling is allowed for even numbered addresses on even numbered calendar days and for odd numbered addresses on odd numbered calendar days through Sept. 15. All watering between the hours of noon and 6 p.m. is prohibited on every day of the week.

All Niles citizens are urged to follow the sprinkling restrictions in order to maintain adequate water pressure for fire suppression as a protection for their homes

Center would siphon profits from curbside program

Niles recycling center set to close by Aug. 1

Niles will close the entire recycling center at Oakton Street and Waukegan Road, now a depository for newsprint, glass, plastics and aluminum cans.

Reynolds Aluminum company received notice their trailer must be gone by Aug. 1, the date Niles starts curbside recycling.

The village has three reasons to close the center.

Niles is spending nearly \$250,000 on its new curbside recycling program, which is run by Haulaway Scavengers, according to Assistant Village Manager John Coakley. If residents sell their aluminum at Reynolds' trailer, rather than recycling it with the village, Haulaway's profit from the sale of the recyclables is less and Niles' piece of the profit is less. Niles gets ten percent off the top of Haulaway's recyclables profit.

Haulaway now pays about \$5 a ton to dispose of the newsprint, Coakley added and its agreement with Niles to accept newsprint at the Civic Center expires when the curbside program becomes effective.

Sheriff branch proposed in Skokie

More Cook County Sheriff's Police would be headquartered at District 2 courthouses in Skokie under a plan proposed by Cook County Sheriff Michael Sheahan.

The 500-member force patrolling the unincorporated areas has been stationed in Maywood, where prisoners must also be brought. Fifteen years ago, there were also district stations in Niles and Homewood, but these were closed down due to economical considerations.

Sheahan recommends that district stations be established at Maywood and the other district courthouses, including Skokie, Rolling Meadows, Bridgeview and Markham, utilizing their jail space as well.

Library Board begins search for administrator

Board members of the Niles Public Library District are in the first stages of conducting a search for a new administrator following the resignation of Daniel C. Macken III. Action was reported on at last Wednesday's regular Library Board meeting.

An advertisement for an administrator was placed with the job placement center of the American Library Association. Also, two resumes have been received. A committee will meet soon and discuss how resumes should be handled.

Former administrator Macken resigned not long after his arrest. An internal audit discovered he may have embezzled as much as \$150,000. He has since paid back the money along with another \$50,000 to compensate for auditing and legal fees.

The board discovered Macken hired two friends without board authorization and falsified his job resume, claiming he had a master's degree. See related story on his trial on page 1.

In a letter hand delivered to the board Wednesday, Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase praised the board for acting in "a timely way" and securing restitution for the people of Niles. "It is not often public bodies are able to get this type of restitution from such an incident," he continued.

"I know each of you feel the system has let you down and there is no question this type of incident is not one that is easily

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Mobile ID cards available to seniors

Ryan reminded senior citizens in the Chicago area recently that mobile identification card units are available for those who need state IDs to obtain Regional Transit Authority discounted fare passes. Ryan said increased demand for the no-fee ID cards stems from the RTA's recent announcement new discount cards will be needed by Sept. 1. As a result, mobile ID units are traveling to 63 community and senior centers throughout the Chicago-area through Aug. 29. On June 27 the unit will be at the Smith Activities Center, Lincoln and Galz in Skokie. During this same period, four Chicago-area driver services facilities have special hours on Wednesdays (8 a.m. to noon) specifically to issue on-fee ID cards to seniors age 65 and older. The facilities are the:

- Chicago North facility, 5401 N. Elston Ave.,
 - Chicago West facility, 5301 W. Lexington Ave.,
 - Charles Chew, Jr. facility, 9901 S. King Drive in Chicago and
 - Bridgeview facility, 7200 W. 84th.
- To obtain new RTA cards, citizens age 65 or older will be required to provide a state ID card, drivers license, passport, Social Security Administration verification letter, or alien registration card. "Senior citizens traditionally have relied on the RTA, which operates PACE, CTA and Metra, to meet their transportation needs," Ryan said. "I want to make obtaining a state ID and a discounted fare pass as simple as possible for the 400,000 seniors affected by the new RTA policy." 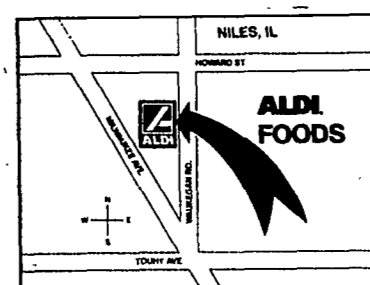

Brides need to report name changes

June brides should keep Social Security in mind when making their wedding plans. It is very important that a new bride report her change of name to Social Security. Unless the new name is reported, her earnings may not be posted properly to her Social Security record.

Failure to report a change of name to Social Security is one of the most frequent causes of errors in wage records. Since eligibility and benefits for Social Security retirement, disability, and survivors insurance are based on the earnings in the records kept by Social Security, incorrect records could mean lower benefits, delayed benefits, or ineligibility for benefits.

To change a name in Social

Security records, a bride must complete Form SS-5 (Application for a Social Security Card) and submit supporting evidence, which identifies her under her old and new name. An original marriage certificate is the best evidence, but the application lists other acceptable evidence.

To obtain Form SS-5, a bride should contact her local Social Security office. The staff there will tell her how to apply and will send her the application form. In most cases, the entire process can be handled by phone and mail.

Women who have had a name change, but do not file an SS-5, should do so regardless of the amount of time that has passed. Call 1-800-2345-SSA(772).

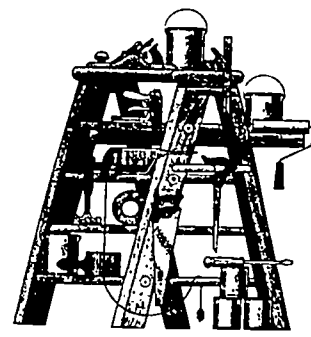
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Book encourages females to be mathematicians

Do multiple choice tests favor men over women? Are they a major reason that American females appear less gifted mathematically than American males?

According to Anne Leggett McDonald, associate professor of mathematics at Loyola University Chicago and editor of the newsletter of the Association for Women in Mathematics, research conducted in the Netherlands by Jan de Lange of the University of Utrecht indicates that Dutch girls achieve higher than boys on open-ended mathematics tests, although boys score higher than girls on multiple choice tests.

McDonald says there are some cultures where girls' mathematical achievement surpasses that of boys'. She cites a new book, "Winning Women Into Mathematics", written and published by the Washington D.C.-based Mathematical Association of America (MAA), which includes such examples as a chapter on "55 Cultural Reasons Why Too Few Women Win at Mathematics." Another chapter tells of successful programs that redress the imbalance in our country and suggests steps that can be taken to correct this.

"Winning Women Into Mathematics" is written for concerned citizens and professionals, who want to promote a wider base of technological expertise among the American population.

The 88-page paperback, "Winning Women Into Mathematics," is available for \$11 from the Mathematical Association of America, 1529 Eighteenth St., NW, Washington DC 20036.

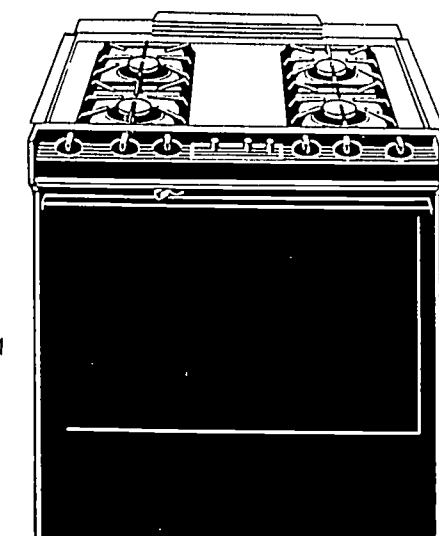
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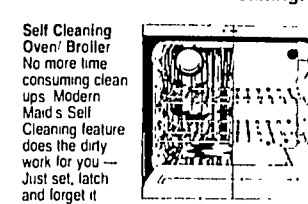

Caught in the wrong place at the wrong time

It's nearing midnight on a warm, summery Saturday night when a call comes in. "Niles Unit 119 we have a robbery in progress at 7815 W. Dempster. The offender is described as a male white, 35-40 YOA, 5'10", 170lbs with brown hair, wearing blue jeans and a white T-shirt. Offender last seen westbound on Dempster Street driving a red GM product. Offender is armed with a blue steel revolver."
"119 is 10-4"

You, Joe Citizen are on your way home, also westbound on Dempster Street in the 7900 block in your red Chevrolet. You happen to be a middle-aged white male wearing blue jeans and a white shirt. You happen to be driving a little faster than the traffic around you. Unit 119 sees you and your auto and you fit the description of the armed robbery suspect although you don't know it. Unit 119 is now calling for back up units and soon several additional squads are positioned behind your car with their lights flashing and their sirens blaring.

As you pull over to the curb your thinking maybe you were speeding, but when you stop you hear the bark of a PA system directing you to put your hands up to the ceiling of your car. In your rear view mirror you can see numerous police cars parked at different angles ringing your car with the police officers crouched behind their squad cars with guns drawn pointing in your direction. You know this can't be for speeding, but you can't think what you might have done to incur this type of attention! Next the PA is directing you to pull the keys from your ignition and throw them out on the street. You are told to slowly exit your vehicle, interlock your fingers and hands on top of your head, walk backwards slowly away from your car and then to lie face down on the pavement extending your hands out in front of your body.

Soon you are surrounded by uniformed police officers and your hands are being cuffed behind your back. Out of the corner of your eye you can see officers searching through your car with their flashlights. Momentarily another squad car pulls up and you are told to stand up and look in its direction. You can observe two people in civilian dress in the rear seat of the squad talking to officers and shaking their heads "No". An officer is now removing the handcuffs from your wrists and explaining the circumstances for stopping you. You're angry and embarrassed even though the officer has apologized for the inconvenience.

Could this happen to you? It certainly could! Although you would really have to be in the wrong place at the wrong time for it to take place to this extent. There are street stops made every day for identification purposes by police, and although most will not involve restraint or arrest it still can be an aggravating experience to be detained and questioned.

Without getting too legally technical Chapter 38 of the Illinois Revised Statutes gives police officers the authority to arrest or temporarily detain for questioning any person whom the officer has "reasonable grounds" to believe has committed a crime, is committing a crime or is about to commit a crime.

The above scenario with the traffic stop on the armed robbery suspect is a felony stop, and among the riskiest of police procedures. Any time an officer stops a suspected felon in a vehicle it's a potentially life-threatening situation and the officer has to always assume the passengers are armed and dangerous. Over the last 10 years approximately 123 police officers nationwide have been killed answering robbery in progress calls or pursuing robbery suspects. When a police officer is dealing with a felony suspect his first actions will be to restrain the suspect to insure the officers' safety and anyone else's who may be in the area. Most stops by police for identification purposes will not be felony stops and will be brief assuming you check-out OK and you will be on your way without too much delay. If you do get stopped by the police cooperate with them and once they determine you are not the person they are looking for, you will be headed back for your destination none the worse wear.

Sprinkler stolen

Morton Grove's Department of Public Works reported persons unknown took a sprinkler with metal wheels from a landscaped

area at Dempster Street and Central Avenue the night of June 20. It is considered an \$100 loss.

Basketball card stolen

An employee of a trading card shop in the 5700 block of Dempster Street, Morton Grove, reported a "Fleer" Michael Jordan rookie basketball card was taken from a display case between June 15-18.

He valued the card at \$550.

Elementary schools remaining open are Nelson, Stevenson, Mark Twain and Washington while seventh and eighth graders attend Gemini Junior High School.

To alleviate space problems at the elementary level, board members agreed to establish a kindergarten center at Melzer this last school year. Formerly, space in Melzer was only rented to organizations or used for special programs such as the East Maine Multicultural Education Program.

Gleichman said the center was created to place the district in a "holding pattern" and indicated this would give the district time to consider options and better predict its needs.

In other business, board members consented to establishing a computer laboratory at Gemini at a cost of almost \$60,000. Thirty-one IBM compatibles will replace 16 Apple II E's. Software will cost another \$3,653. The systems are scheduled to be in place by September.

Gleichman said the entire computer curriculum was changed and has been extended from six weeks to nine weeks. Students will work with word processing, data bases and spread sheets.

Board member Scott Kriesman said, "A lot of work went into this presentation and I think the students will benefit greatly."

A payment of almost \$102,000 was made to Illice Construction Co. for contractual services and life/safety work while an emergency resolution of \$1,549 was authorized to replace electrical parts at Apollo.

In other action, board members approved \$2,163 for surveying and mapping the east boundary of Mark Twain School. Total cost of surveying all boundaries will amount to more than \$6,000.

Following this survey, board members will have a legal description for all district schools, but boundary and topographical surveys only for Mark Twain and part of Stevenson.

According to state statutes, a district committee has prepared for distribution to students a handbook on the administration of medication and emergency medical care procedures.

In other school acquisitions, board members agreed to purchase a software license site for Washington School and supplementary music and drama materials for Gemini.

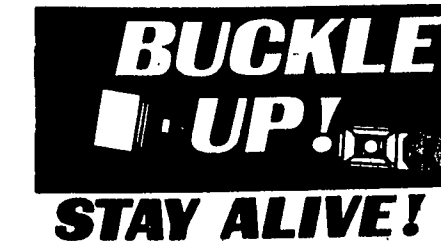
Also, board members agreed to fees for both books and towels during the following school year. Books will cost \$27.50 for kindergarteners and \$32 for students in grades one through eight. Towels will be rented to junior high school students at a cost of \$12 a year.

forgoten by an elected public official. In my mind, I believe the Library Board has acted properly and prudently. This was one of those acts that could, and in fact has, happened to many public bodies in the past," wrote Blasse.

In a related incident, Niles resident Avis Gibbons asked the board to withstand public pressure for requesting the village to annex the library. Any annexation would have to follow as a result of the village agreeing to a request by the library board and a successful referendum.

Trustee Robert Quatrochi said the process is very difficult and has never been accomplished in the State of Illinois. "I don't think there should be any concern (on Gibbons part)."

Chief of Adult Services Judith Zelter has been acting administrator since Macken's resignation. Board members agreed to give her a temporary increase in salary

of \$625 a month for work above and beyond her normal duties.

In other business, board members consented to issuing library cards this summer to children even though they cannot print their name on the card, a previous requirement. Library personnel will attempt to determine whether or not there is more patron satisfaction and responsibility on the parts of the children. Parents will continue to be financially responsible.

In response to the board's change of officers, board members authorized signing of checks or drafts by either the president, vice president or treasurer.

With the new fiscal year beginning July 1, trustees transferred monies between some line items on the budget.

At upcoming meetings, board members will discuss the new budget and long-range service plans.

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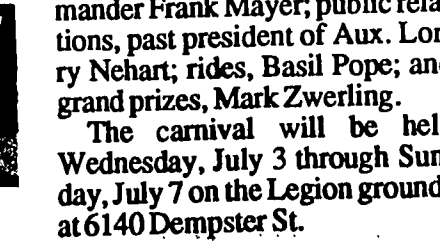

According to Arft, Morton Grove's annual assessment would be about \$3,300 plus additional costs in manpower. He indicated the village would cooperate with requests from JULIE, however.

Arft also indicated the current law would probably be amended next summer, addressing the issues of funding responsibility, liability and the public right-of-way concerns.

Take precautions when using fireworks

The Fourth of July is almost here. Parades, picnics and public fireworks displays are great ways to celebrate this Nation's birthday. The Cook County Department of Public Health suggests the following safety tips to keep the holiday enjoyable.

Every year, thousands of people are treated in hospital emergency rooms for injuries associated with fireworks. Most injuries involve burns on the head and face. A good majority of the victims are consistently under age 15.

The laws governing the sale and use of fireworks vary from state to state. Illinois only allows the use of sparklers. Whether or not they are legal, fireworks are still widely sold, bought and used. Due to their unpredictable nature, it is strongly recommended that fireworks not be used at all. If people do use them in spite of the dangers, the Cook County Department of Public Health recommends the following precautions.

1. Provide adult supervision for all children. Do not allow very young children to handle fireworks.

2. Store fireworks in a dry, cool place. Avoid rough handling which might damage the fuse.

3. Light only one firework device at a time.

4. Light fireworks outdoors in a clear area away from houses, people and flammable material. In this dry weather, even your grass could start a fire. Keep a bucket of water nearby for emergencies and for pouring on fireworks that do not go off.

5. Do not try to relight malfunctioning fireworks. Soak them in water and throw away.

6. Parents should supervise the ordering and the use of mail order "Make Your Own" Fireworks Kits.

The Cook County Department of Health wishes all a happy and safe Fourth of July holiday.

Ecology Center of Winnetka, which maintains the recycling center, may soon charge for carting away the recyclables. They currently dispose of the products, aside from the newsprint, at no cost to Niles.

Now, with more suburbs moving to curbside recycling, North Shore is turning to the educational aspect of recycling, Coakley said.

A third consideration is Niles' desire to clean up their property at the north end of the plaza where the recycling center stands. Niles has tentative plans to develop the property.

Coakley noted the dirt piles and trucks associated with construction of Niles' water transmission lines will soon be gone, since that project is nearly complete.

But Reynolds Aluminum is hoping Niles will reconsider. Nilesite Maggie Anderson, a supervisor of Reynolds' recycling centers, said the aluminum trailer in Niles serves 10,000 people a year and in its 16 years of operation has helped recycle 90 million cans.

Niles views the trailer as competition, according to Pat Madison, Reynolds' business manager for northern Illinois.

He added "We're offering the option (to sell cans for cash) at no cost to Niles; we won't take that much revenue away."

Madison emphasized Reynolds is in favor of curbside recycling, but said a certain percentage of customers want to get value for their recyclables, for example, grandparents saving for a child's bike or cub scout groups raising money.

He suggested Reynolds would

work along with Niles, using advertising and marketing procedures they have used in other suburbs, which began curbside pickup of recyclables. Reynolds operates 26 aluminum recycling centers in the metropolitan Chicago area.

House approves funding for river cleanup

Congressman Frank Annunzio (11th Dist. Ill.) has announced the House of Representatives has agreed to provide \$150,000 in matching money to pay for next year's annual cleanup of the North Shore Branch of the Chicago River.

"I'm delighted to inform the residents of the 11th Congressional District that funding is now well on its way to final approval for the upcoming year's cleanup of the North Branch of the Chicago River," Annunzio said.

"Since 1972, this cleanup effort has greatly enhanced the environmental quality of the river and its surroundings through the removal of more than 23,000 cubic yards of refuse, including cars, railroad ties, benches, bicycles, household trash and tree limbs. That's about 1,000 truckloads of junk removed over the past 19 years. Money for these kinds of projects was tight this year, but I knew the continuation

of the North Branch cleanup was vital for the prevention of flooding of basements and for the overall, environmental quality of the area."

The U.S. House of Representatives approved the North Branch cleanup funding as part of a larger piece of legislation known as the 1992 Energy and Water Development Appropriations Bill.

The legislation calls for total spending of \$21.5 billion for water projects under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Departments of Energy and Interior. The U.S. Senate will take up a similar bill shortly.

Local officials are expected to provide funding for the project on a 50-50 matching basis with the federal government, Schiele said. The areas designated for cleanup this year include the west fork of the river from Dundee Road to Lake Cook Road.

Bill protects private flag displays

The Illinois Senate has passed legislation sponsored by State Sen. Walter Dudydz (R-7th, Chicago) to limit local governments' control over the display of United States or Illinois flags on private property.

Senate Bill 333 exempts the display of state and national flags from the regulation of local ordinances unless the unit of local government has just cause. The legislation limits "just cause" to issues of public nuisance, public health and safety.

"This legislation is the result of a dispute between the Village Board of Schaumburg and a local businessman. The board told a local auto dealer he had to move a flagpole 50 feet from his property line. The flagpole had been in the same place for at least five years without any problem, so the reason for the sudden demand is unclear," Dudydz said.

House passes Annunzio money laundering bill

The House passed 406-0 June 11 bank money-laundering legislation sponsored by Congressman Frank Annunzio (D-Ill.) and designed to crack down on what he described as "the drug dealer's

life-line to profitability." Annunzio, chairman of the House Banking Subcommittee on Financial Institutions, said a vast majority of the drug dealer's profits would be choked off with-

out illegally passing money through the nation's financial institutions. And, he said, without the huge profits, there wouldn't be much drug business in the country.

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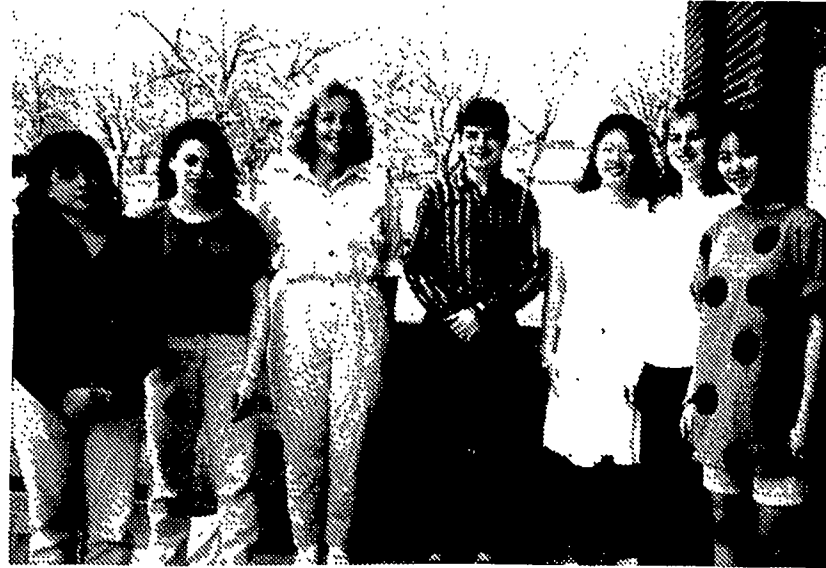

Certificates and medals were presented at the ceremony to students who placed in the national competition; this year in Chicago alone 950 students participated in four levels of competition.

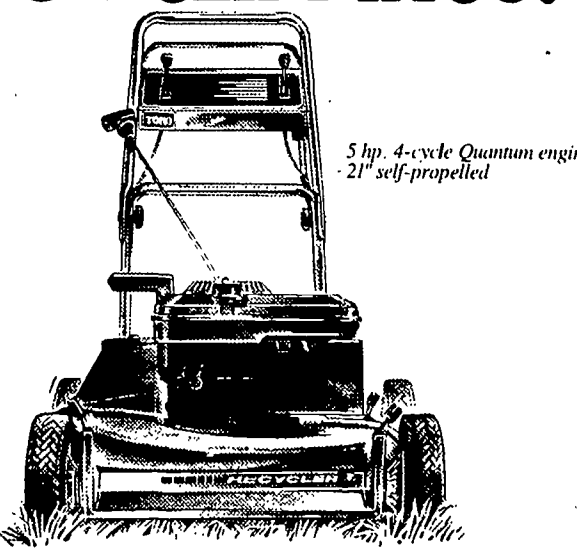
Principal receives recognition award

Ailing Dist. 70 Education Fund in need of a remedy

Dear Editor:

Morton Grove School District 70 needs additional monies in the Education Fund; there's no disputing that fact. Whether that need is permanent or temporary is what is in dispute.

A good allegory comes to mind: You're sick and need medicine in order to recover. The choice is do you want to get the medicine intravenously for a short period of time, experience immediate effects or take and oral/topical dose for a long period of time with gradual results? Either way, you have to take the medicine.

The bottom line is that you are sick. (The bottom line is that Park View has a sick Education Fund, and money is the medicine). You're going to have to take medicine. (Taxpayers will have to pay, unless educational programs are cut). The question is, do we want to be taxed short term (5 to 8 years) via the sale of working cash bonds, and then see where we are at that future point in time, realizing that cash immediately after sale? Or do we want to be taxed permanently via a permanent tax hike, (to be assessed at higher than truly needed by the fund at this point

in time in order to avoid another request for funds in the future), and wait for up to 18 months for the cash to come to District 70 from the county after assessment? (We won't be paying Fall, 1991 property taxes until Fall of 1992, plus processing time by the County.)

I'm not convinced the financial need District 70 may experience will be a permanent one. There's the possibility that two of our most destructive board members, who are up for election could be replaced as a result of the November elections. A lot could change, financially, just based on that much hoped for event. (Maybe we could get board members that read and research, rather than pick up a phone and pay a consultant each time they aren't knowledgeable in an area.) Personally, I'd like to see the attorney retained on an "as needed" basis only, rather than having him attend each month's board meeting. This could save the Education Fund at least \$6,300 a year.

Unfortunately, the Mayer/Quinn/Miletic petition to stop the sale of working cash bonds until approved by referendum presents the possibility that NEITHER the sale of working cash bonds NOR the permanent tax hike would be approved by the less informed voting public. At that point, we (District 70) won't be sick; we'll be dead.

Kunkle said a breach of express warranties against the corporation and a breach of implied warranty of habitability favored the condo owners.

A jury handed down the decision last Thursday in Judge James Bailey's courtroom, after an hour's deliberation.

Builder Ray Adreanni told The Bugle Tuesday his group will appeal the case. Adreanni criticized the verdict and said he's built 700-800 homes in this area implying he has always been an honorable builder who has satisfied the needs of homeowners who bought from him.

Another local story concerns the plea of guilty by a 25-year-old Nilesite, Harry Gio, to two counts of mail fraud. Gio and a Lake Zurich resident pleaded guilty in federal court of collecting in excess of \$200,000 in bogus insurance claims from 1983 to 1987.

Macken pleads...

Macken entered the guilty plea to one Class 1 charge and the state agreed to drop a second Class 1 charge of theft by deception.

During such pre-trial conferences, the judge is allowed access to potentially damaging information about the defendant before rendering a verdict if there is a guilty plea.

Acknowledging the mitigating factors that Macken had no previous criminal record, that he had repaid the library district and his crime did not physically injure anyone, Pheimeister argued for the maximum penalty of 48 months probation.

"This was a violation of the public trust," the prosecutor told the court.

Judge Jordan imposed three other conditions on defendant Macken: that he perform 25 hours of community service, that he receive psychological and psychiatric counseling for a condition not specified in court and that he not be employed by a governmental entity for 48 months.

"He's sorry that this happened and on his own and without the necessity of any court order he cooperated, made full restitution, identified funds and paid interest, accounting and attorney fees included by the board," Mogul commented after the sentence, adding praise for both the library trustees and their legal help, Dennis Walsh, Laurie Weiner and E. Kenneth Friker.

"The Board (Niles Public Library) was very aggressive in re-

covering their funds." Mogul indicated the restraint by library board members helped bring about the speedy conclusion to the legal process, begun two months ago on April 25 when Macken was arrested by Sgt. Dennis McEnemey of the Niles Police Department, accompanied by an assistant state's attorney.

While Macken, 42, declined comment, Mogul indicated the defendant's need for psychological help was manifested by the fact the stolen funds, received as payments for books never received by the library, were put into bank accounts and never spent by Macken, as if he were asking to be caught.

"I've never encountered this type of situation before," Mogul said, noting the unusual aspects.

In addition, the defense counsel alluded to a personality conflict between Macken and his predecessor Duncan MacKenzie, as a precipitating factor rather than greed.

"There were some problems between a former employee of the library board (MacKenzie) and Mr. Macken which led to a series of incidents," Mogul said, explaining a possible motive for the theft. Mogul could not account for the fact the false invoice scam continued for a year after MacKenzie left his post other than to say it demonstrated Macken's psychiatric problems.

"I kind of expected he wouldn't get any jail time," commented McEnemey. "He got the maxi-

mum the judge can hand him without sending him to jail. As long as the library is happy and we did our job, then justice was served."

Library Board President Ted Przybylo expressed the board's satisfaction with the conclusion of the incident and took the opportunity to discuss the library's future.

"I'm very relieved that this whole episode is over and that Dan Macken and his schemes and cronies are behind us. Now we can move forward with the business as usual."

Przybylo said he would support a new audit process, continuing regular annual audits but having a fraud audit on alternate years.

Macken set up two bogus book companies and forged the signatures and used the names of other employees in the scam "without their knowledge or involvement."

The court information states Macken forged the initials of chief technical services Linda Weiss on invoices in order to acknowledge receipt of nonexistent books.

Judy Zelter has been acting administrator since Macken's May 15 resignation. Przybylo indicated the board is using a national search firm to find a new administrator. Money returned by Macken will be passed through to next year's budget.

"Hopefully we can use it to lower taxes," Przybylo added.

as the Oasis Pool, became evident in the safety procedures. The water park has a variety of water depths and recreation areas, requiring different staffing procedures.

A vocal number of residents backed allowing lap swimming during safety breaks at the Oasis Pool as had been allowed at the former pool. The breaks come at ten minutes to the hour at Oasis; fifteen minutes to the hour at the Sports Complex. Pool Manager John Langton emphasized he would need additional guards if a safety break swim were allowed.

Langton recently told the Board when dealing with hundreds of swimmers, guards can lose their concentration after 45 minutes and need a break to maintain safe efficiency. At the Oasis Pool, the previous 15-minute break was reduced to ten to accommodate swimmers, but Langton emphasized even ten minutes was brief.

To Skaja's suggestion of lowering the guards' break to seven

minutes and rotating the guards, it was noted it was barely time to walk to the pool house and back.

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Compounding the problem is the time needed to recruit and train new guards as the summer wanes and guards return to school. Langton noted even now, competition among pools for guards is keen.

Commissioner Mariene Baczek was reluctant to commit to hiring more staff until revenue figures were available.

President Panek underscored that lap swimming is currently available at the Sport Complex pool during safety breaks and mornings.

June 25, park officials confirmed adult swim is available from noon to 1 p.m. Monday through Friday at both the Oasis

and Sports Complex pools and on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 6:30-9 a.m. at the Sports Complex pool.

But some residents continued to be unhappy about the safety break lap swim ban at the Oasis. Rita Rademacher of West Touhy Avenue said "You're pushing the Niles people out; you should have just replaced the pool as it was."

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Rademacher pointed to a list of pool rules she received when she bought a pool pass in June. One read: Adults 18 and older may swim during safety breaks and adult swim.

Judy Boysen, of Riverside Drive, explained "I don't live near Ballard (Sports Complex)...I live on this side of town. Why should I waste my time?"

The board will continue its study of hiring problems when financial figures are available.

The board members referred to the Zoning Board four requests for re-zoning to allow six foot satellite antennas at Radio Shack, 8349 Golf Rd. and at three Jewel/Osco stores, 5665 Touhy Ave., 8210 Golf Rd., and 7900 Milwaukee Ave.

The Department of Public Works was authorized to accept bids for the external cleaning and repainting of a 250,000 gallon el-

evated water tank on Oriole St. Public Works Director Keith Peck noted the structure was peeling and had not been painted in over ten years. The department wants to complete the rejuvenation by Oct. 31.

In other Public Works-related business, trustee Andrew Przybylo gained a waiver of bid for contracting with the only supplier of a root dissolving system for village sewers.

Rademacher pointed to a list of pool rules she received when she bought a pool pass in June. One read: Adults 18 and older may swim during safety breaks and adult swim.

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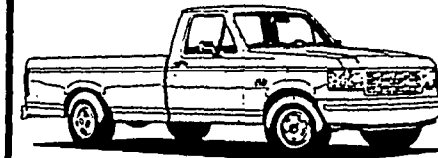
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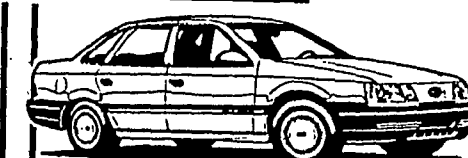
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
