## District 207 budget hiked 2 percent

Maine Township High School District 207's budget for 1991-92, at \$62,394,532, is just slightly more than two percent higher than last year's \$61,152,815. The increase will coincide with a projected two percent growth in the area's real estate tax base, the

district's chief source of revenue. Other local sources of revenue include relatively small revenues from tuition money from summer school and out-of-district students; cafeteria fees and textbook sales, according to Merrillce

## Teaneck, N.J., Council sacks Hadge for 'alienating employees'

## Former Niles manager fired from N.J. post

Former Niles village manager Jack Hadge was sacked by the Teaneck Town Council, two-and-a-half years after he assumed the post of town manager, according to an article in a Teaneck, N.J., newspaper. The firing, effective July 1, followed a suspension in early June, with council members voting 5-2 in favor of the action.

Hadge's firing followed a stormy tenure, during which Teaneck voters overwhelmingly voted against a proposed seven per-

cent increase in his \$85,000 salary last fall and in which he withheld contractual workers to two groups of township employees, according to the newspaper.

In a resolution accompanying the vote, the council said Hadge had "unreasonably alienated township employees" and "caused a breach in the previously cooperative relationship with the Clerk's Office."

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase said Tuesday that someone sent

## Man who preys on elderly charged by Niles police

A 66-year-old convicted offender, who specialized in tricking and robbing older men and women, was arrested July 7 by Niles police in the Oak Mill Shopping Center parking lot.

Robert Wayne Womeldorf, whose last known address was 1702 Marlee Lane, Northbrook, was ordered held without bond pending a July 10 court appear-

ance on charges of possession of a stolen motor vehicle and failure to have a firearms owner identification card.

He was also sought for violating his probation on an unspecified previous conviction.

According to Sgt. Dennis McEnerney of the Niles Police Department, one of Womeldorf's Niles victims picked him out of a

police lineup, identifying him as the man who befriended him in Jewel and was invited to the elderly man's home June 20 on the pretext that he could help the older man with a knee problem.

After suggesting the 90-year-old victim remove his trousers and walk to the west wall of the living room, Womeldorf allegedly

Whatever your likes -- beer garden, music, dancing, carnival rides, bingo or worm races -- they were all there when Niles All American Festival opened July 10 at Golf Mill Park, Church Street and Cumberland Avenue. The annual celebration of Nilesites getting together for a good time continues through July 14.

The band stand featured American English Wednesday and will display other groups such as The Solutions, The Legends, Rare Earth, Greased Lightning, Cryan Shames and The Great Pretenders on other dates.

A Taste of Niles introduces food specialties from area chefs every day and a special carnival for the handicapped will be featured July 12, from 4 - 5:30 p.m. Emphasizing family entertainment, July 14 there will be a petting zoo; and a roving juggler and Ronald McDonald will stroll the grounds. The evening's Grand Prize drawing will be at 10 p.m. in the beer garden.

The festival is an off-shoot of the original "Niles Days" celebration begun by local businessmen in 1926. Festivities became so extensive, the organizers formed a non-profit entity in 1962, according to Elaine Heinen, vice president of the Niles Events Committee.

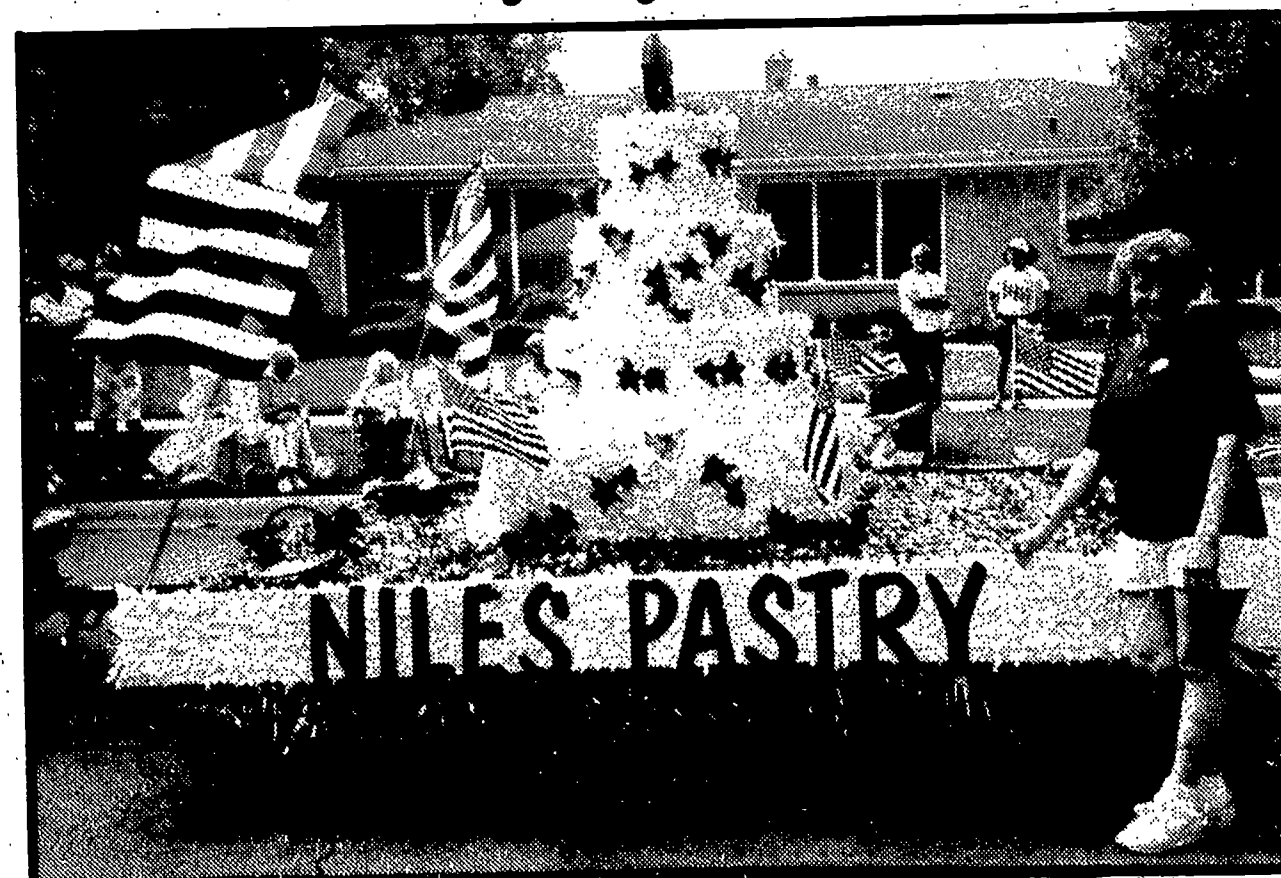


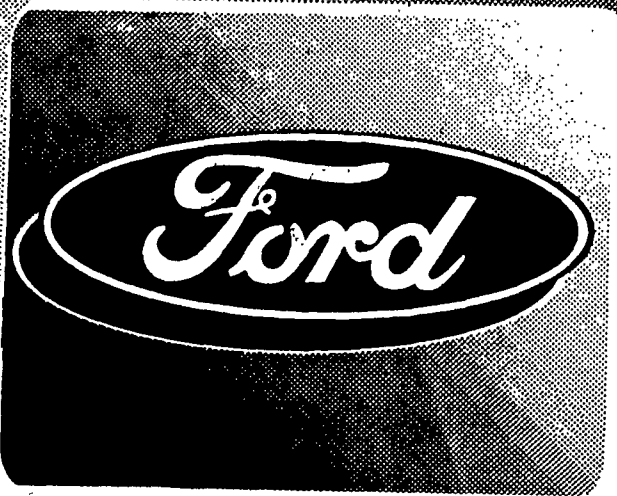

## Niles finds no cause for complaints against eatery

Niles' housing director Todd Bavaro disputes allegations by neighbors that three rooms behind a barber shop in the 7900 block of Waukegan Road are being used to house employees of a nearby restaurant.

Director Todd Bavaro visited the premises both on July 5 and on July 9, when Niles Police reported men living in the rear of the building. Reports described the men as non-English speaking and the premises containing mattresses and tables. Police did not investigate if the men were undocumented aliens because they

were victims of a small electric fire rather than suspects in a crime. They referred the matter to the village to investigate for possible code violations.

"They're not living there. That appears to be a rest area," Bavaro said, indicating he interviewed the restaurant owner. "Some of these busboys work 12 hours."

Three Neva Avenue residents who declined to be identified by name said the practice of busboys sleeping behind the barber shop has been going on for a long time. "Oh that's been going on for

## Fire Department warns residents about solicitors

Chief Morris Farman of the North Maine Fire Protection District would like to notify all residents of the Fire District that the North Maine Fire Department is in no way associated with the North Suburban Professional Firefighter's Association.

The Fire Department has not authorized any person or organization to solicit funds by telephone, in person, or in writing from any individual or business in the district.

If you are contacted by any organization trying to solicit funds, Chief Farman states "make no contribution. Contact the Fire Department at 297-5020, let us know who called and what name they used. If they left a phone number of mailing address, make note of that information also. It is not the policy of the North Maine Fire Protection District to solicit funds from any resident or business."

## Police enforce water sprinkling regulations

Its summer again in Niles and with the heat and humidity comes lawn sprinkling restrictions.

The restrictions have been ordered by the Federal Water Administration and the Illinois Department of Transportation's Division of Water Resources.

The federal government has threatened to cut Niles water allocation if the sprinkling restrictions are not properly enforced. Water sprinkling rules begin on May 15, each year. Sprinkling is allowed for even numbered addresses on even numbered calendar days and for odd numbered addresses on odd numbered calendar days through Sept. 15. All watering between the hours of noon and 6 p.m. is prohibited on every day of the week.

All Niles citizens are urged to follow the sprinkling restrictions in order to maintain adequate water pressure for fire suppression as a protection for their homes and businesses. The police will issue tickets to all persons not complying with the law. Residents may call the police at 647-0400 to report violations.

## Judge rules bafflell site restraining order stands

### Drive-thru vandals run up a \$12,000 tab

A car full of young men caused \$12,000 worth of damage at the Burger King restaurant, 7133 Dempster St., Niles, drive through window July 6, according to reports.

Sometime between 1:50 and 1:55 a.m., the red Pontiac coupe entered the lot and the driver used a one-foot square concrete block to smash windows, price displays and the speaker system by the menu board.

The driver reportedly made an obscene gesture at the witness. A 22-year old Chicago man will be questioned regarding the incident.

### Firecracker burns Skokian at MG carnival

An exploding firecracker burned the feet of a 16-year-old Skokie girl the night of July 4 as she and her mother walked through a Morton Grove carnival at 6140 Dempster St.

The girl's mother, 45, and two carnival workers complained of hearing loss from the detonation. One carnival worker, a Florida woman, 44, identified an 18-year-old Niles man whom she said bent over and lit what she thought was an M-80, then walked away. The Niles man denied the charge when confronted by police and carried no other

Bafflell supporters found both good and bad news in a recent court decision.

On the plus side, Kane County Circuit Court Judge Michael Colwell dismissed most of the counts against bafflell, the proposed depository for solid waste near south suburban Bartlett. But he let stand an order temporarily restraining further construction and a suit brought by Kane County State's Attorney Gary Johnson requiring Kane County board approval of construction on the site.

He denied a request for a change of venue from bafflell developer, the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC). Niles and Morton Grove are among the 26 northern suburbs who financially support the project through SWANCC.

The judge's order, received by

SWANCC July 1, but written June 18, allows the plaintiffs of the dismissed counts - the towns of Bartlett and Elgin; a group of citizens called Citizens Against the Bafflell (CAB); and William McHugh - 28 days to amend their complaints, but no further court date was set.

The judge denied SWANCC the change of venue from Kane County court, even though bafflell is wholly within Cook County.

He cited a statute that said "... actions... may be brought in the county where the real estate or some part of it is situated." A small section - 123 acres - of the 490-acre bafflell property lies within Kane County, but it is not to be part of the bafflell project.

SWANCC spokesman Brooke Beal on July 3 said the agency

## Glenview blood bank seeks expansion

Illinois' largest blood center is trying to overcome a space shortage by purchasing a larger Glenview headquarters.

Lifesource, whose employees work at two Glenview locations and at 530 E. 31st St. in Chicago, will seek \$5.5 million in tax-exempt industrial revenue bonds issued by the village of Glenview if it purchases the now-vacant Moore Business Forms building.

Lifesource is also looking for other potential locations, according to its manager of marketing services, Linda Dillman. She in-

dictated the non-profit organization needs to hire blood recruiters in order to supply area hospitals, but has no space for new employees.

The company headquarters is at 1255 Milwaukee Ave., with storage facilities elsewhere in the village. The Chicago site houses laboratory and operational facilities.

The Glenview village board has indicated it will support the bond request, if the Moore sale goes through.

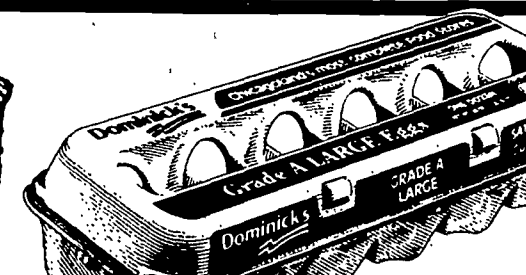

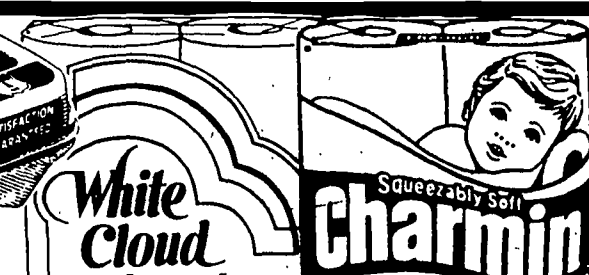

To keep cool, elderly individuals should spend as much time as possible in cool surroundings; cool baths or showers provide amazing relief from the heat; wear as little clothing as possible; wear a hat or use an umbrella when outdoors; drink plenty of fluids; slow down, and take it easy. ## Summer earnings may require special reporting

Young people who take summer jobs such as farm work, service jobs involving tips and sales commissions should report their wages as reported for Social Security purposes.

Unlike regular wages, which are reported by employers for Social Security credit, persons earning tips and sales commissions must report their own earnings to Social Security.

If you are a farm worker, be sure to keep a record of your wages. That's because your employer only needs to report your wages if he or she paid you at least \$150 in cash. You also should ask Social Security for a free statement of your earnings every three years to verify your wages have been properly reported.

If you work at a job where you earn tips, you must report them if they exceed \$20 or more a month from one employer. The tips must be reported within 10 days after the month ends.

The report is given to the employer in writing and should include your name, address, Social Security number, employer's name and address, total tips, and the period earned. The employer is then required to report those tips to Social Security along with other wages you received.

Persons earning sales commissions may be treated as self-employed workers under the Social Security law. Self-employed workers, and employees who are treated as self-employed, must have earnings of at least \$400 a year before the earnings are covered by Social Security. If you make that much, you must file a federal income tax return and pay any federal taxes due and the Social Security tax.

## Capparelli disappointed AIDS bill fails

Legislation that would require doctors and dentists to tell their patients if they have AIDS failed to gain approval in the House of Representatives, according to State Representative Ralph C. Capparelli (D-Chicago), who supported the measure.

"There is a growing fear among patients that they will contract AIDS from their doctor or dentist," Capparelli said. "By requiring them to disclose an AIDS condition, we can make sure patients feel safe when they visit their doctor. This is something that can protect both the patient and the doctor."

The measure to require doctors and dentists to tell their patients they have AIDS, which was an amendment to the Senate Bill (SB) 263, failed to gain approval

## Schoenberg commends Sheahan policy

State Representative Jeff Schoenberg (D-56) commended Cook County Sheriff Michael Sheahan for his new policy initiatives.

"I am very pleased with Sheriff Sheahan's plans to establish district stations at suburban courthouses," Schoenberg said. "Sheriff's patrol officers coming from Old Orchard are much better for the community than those coming from Maywood," Schoenberg said.

Sheahan's plan would divide the 518-member sheriff's department located in Maywood, and set up district offices in Markham, Bridgeview, Rolling Meadows and Skokie. The district offices will help prevent and protect against gangs and gang crimes in unincorporated areas as well as act as a resource center for other suburban police departments. "The increased accessibility these district offices will provide along with increased protection provided by the Sheriff's new suburban gang crime unit are essential for communities, such as the unincorporated area west of Golf Mill," Schoenberg said. "I fully support Sheriff Sheahan's initiative and plan to work with him again in the future," concluded Schoenberg.

## VA Secretary vows to fight for cemetery

Edward Derwinski, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, has told Congressman Frank Annunzio that funding squabbles shouldn't stall efforts to establish a National Cemetery at Fort Sheridan.

"Putting the cemetery system on hold while we wrestle with budgetary difficulties could mean missing prime opportunities, such as the land at Fort Sheridan, to serve the aging veteran population," Derwinski said in a letter received by Congressman Annunzio (11th Dist. - Ill.). Annunzio previously had inquired about funding needs for the National Cemetery System.

Derwinski said Congress is responding to the VA's tight budget for National Cemeteries by seeking a transfer of \$3 million to the cemetery budget from other VA programs. That hike, and a separate \$10 million increase for the System's FY 1992 budget was approved by the House on June 6 as part of a larger appropriations bill. Action on the appropriation request is expected shortly in the Senate.

Annunzio voted for the appropriation bill, and said he'd continue the fight for adequate funding of national cemeteries.

## Legislators focus on reapportionment



The issue of reapportionment will be a major factor in the 1992 elections because boundary lines of all House and Senate districts will be redrawn. At a recent hearing of the Illinois House Reapportionment Committee, State Reps. Ralph C. Capparelli (D-Chicago), Roger McAuliffe (R-Chicago) and Penny Pullen (R-Park Ridge) conferred on several presentations made by those presenting testimony. The committee held statewide hearings on the population undercount, minority representation, and legislative, congressional and judicial redistricting in order to provide input on drawing new districts based on population. It is anticipated that the final reapportionment map proposed by the Illinois General Assembly will be vetoed by the governor and will ultimately end up in the courts, if history repeats itself.

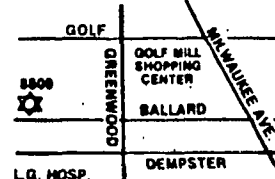

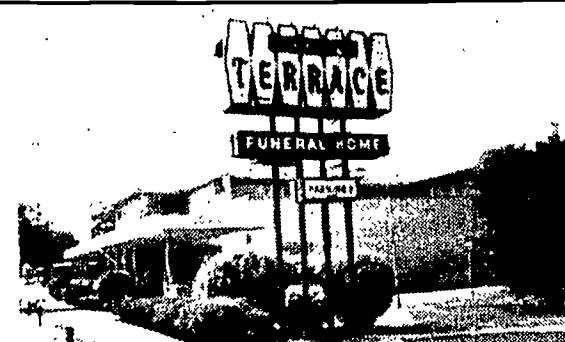

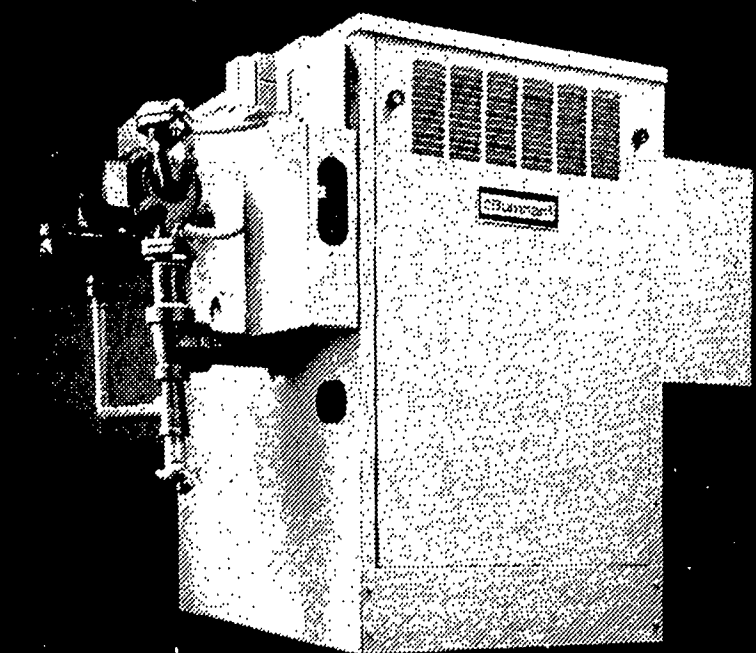

### Telephone company tests new service

AT&T Network Systems and Central Telephone Company of Illinois are testing a potential new service that would make two or more telephones in different places ring when one of their numbers is dialed.

This service is tentatively called "dual ringing." It would, for example, also ring a customer's cellular telephone when a call is placed to his or her office, and vice versa.

In the near future, telephone companies expect to offer customers Personal Communication Networks (PCNs), which would allow people to use very small, wireless telephones anywhere they go. The ability to be reached by phone at the office, home, automobile or elsewhere, one of the attractions of PCNs, is a key feature of this trial.

The companies said they think the service has great potential for customers such as professionals, who have two offices, people who work both at home and at an office, and mobile sales and service people.

The joint, one-month trial involves prototype equipment working in Central Telephone's network. Ten customers, all employees of the telephone company, are participating in the test.

Based on its analysis of the trial results, AT&T said, the company may make dual ringing service capability a regular offering in the equipment it sells to telephone companies.

**Viewing eclipse can cause eye damage**

Directly viewing the upcoming solar eclipse could cause severe eye damage, even blindness, cautions the Illinois Optometric Association.

The next solar eclipse will occur on July 11. At the eclipse's midpoint, the moon will cover part of the sun but it is still not safe to look directly at the sun. Looking directly at the sun, during an eclipse or not, allows the sun's invisible rays to painfully burn the eye's retina, which contains the sensitive receptor nerve cells needed for seeing.

During the 1970 solar eclipse across the eastern United States, 140 injury cases were reported. Forty percent thought they were using safe viewing methods; the other sixty percent looked directly at the sun without any protection.

When the retina is burned or scarred, permanent vision loss, even blindness, can result. Sunglasses, smoked glasses, photographic film of any kind, welder's goggles or photographic filters are not considered safe.

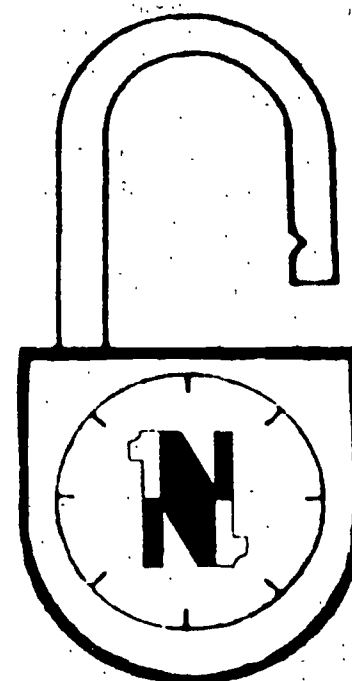

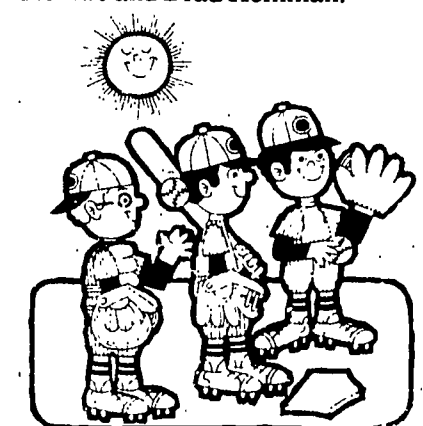

was still reviewing the decision and would move forward as soon as they determined what to do. Beal noted the Kane County state's attorney's suit was the same one he voluntarily withdrew two years ago.

Recently, Assistant Kane County State's Attorney Patrick Jaeger said the initial suit in 1989 was withdrawn because SWANCC indicated they did not plan to use the Kane County land. Jaeger said the suit was re-introduced because the county "now believes to the contrary," that SWANCC does plan to use it.

Judge Colwell dismissed claims SWANCC exceeded its authority because it was denied a permit by the U.S. Corps of Engineers.

Among other counts dismissed were "allegations SWANCC failed to consult with the Department of Conservation; SWANCC did consult."

### Reduced fare RTA riders need new IDs

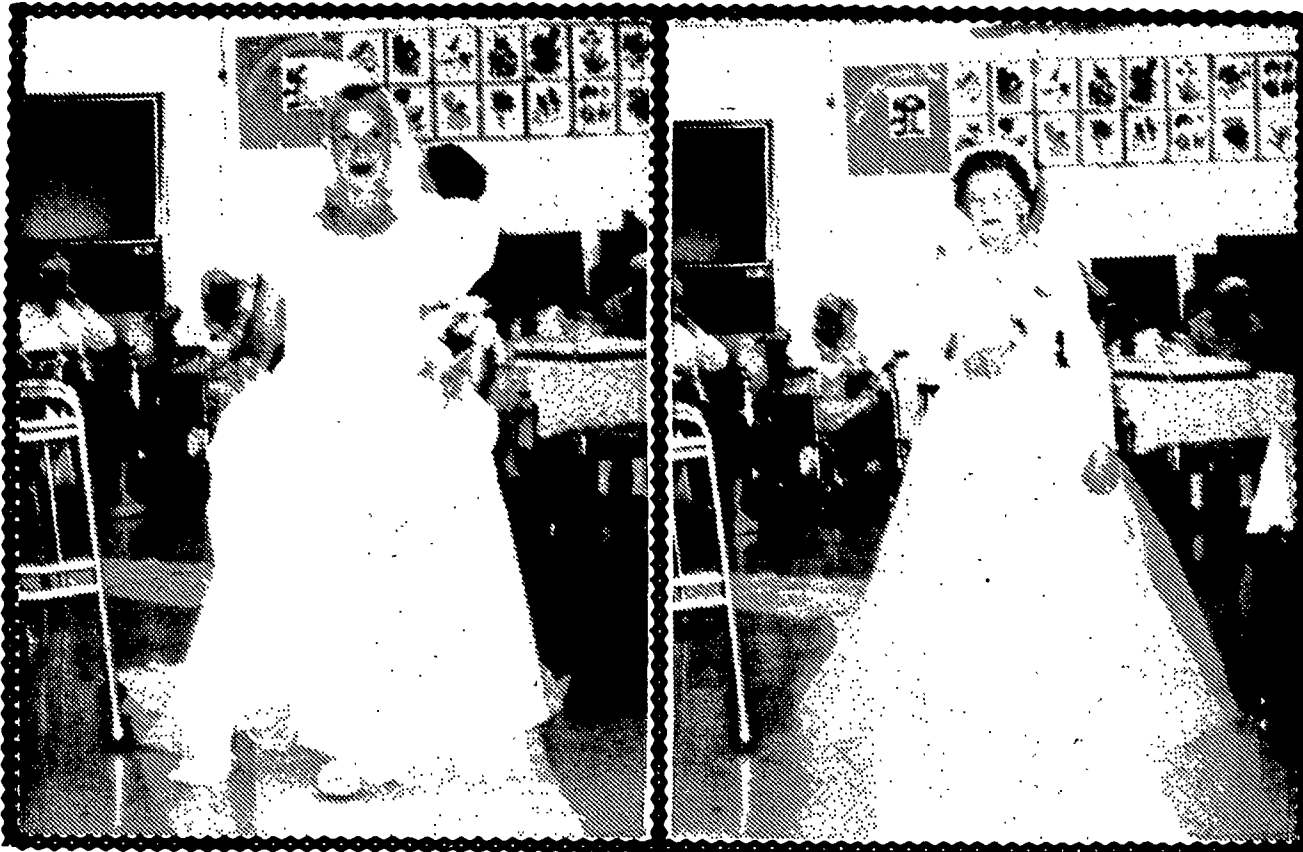

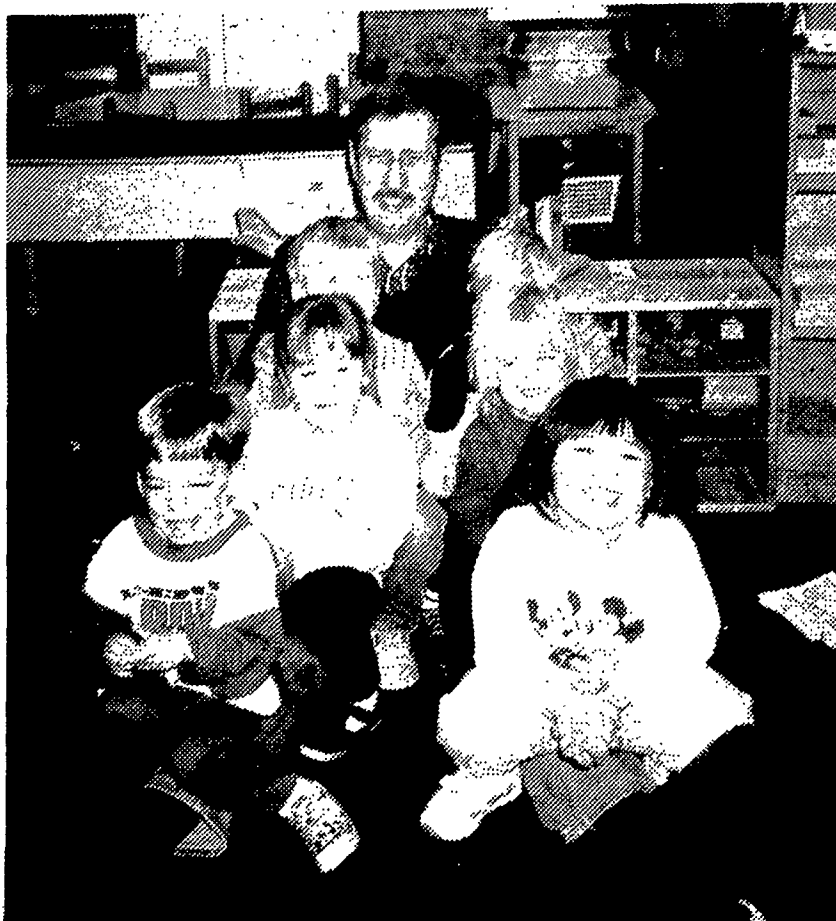

#### Legislature adopts Social Security resolution

The Illinois General Assembly has adopted a resolution co-sponsored by State Senator Walter Dudyecz (R-7th, Chicago) to urge President George Bush and members of Congress to repeal the Social Security earnings limit.

"The earnings limit keeps many talented and productive people out of the workplace, merely on the basis of age. It also hurts people who need a job to supplement their Social Security checks," Dudyecz said. "House Joint Resolution 1 asks that the federal government lift this limit, which was created during the Depression, when jobs were scarce. It is outdated and should be repealed."

der to erect the residences in the manufacturing district at 6401 Lincoln Ave., a 1.7 acre site now occupied by Hoffman's Morton House Restaurant.

"Please do not allow variations in density, height or parking spaces," pleaded resident Harold Cohen, reading a letter from a number of neighbors of the project. At earlier Zoning and Plan Commission hearings on the matter, other residents had expressed support for the project but concern about potential flooding problems. Two Plan Commissioners Harry Grand and Sidney Blonz voted against the project.

The proposed building will be 48 feet high, have more than the allowed 42 units for the property size, pave 68 percent of the land rather than the allowable 60 percent and permit front yard parking. Two bedroom/two bath units will range from \$160-180,000 for about 1,400 square feet of space.

"The developer will be responsible for this sewer connection no matter what," promised Plan Commission Chairman Leonard Bloomfield, presenting the case before the board, after other residents expressed concern about who was to pay for the new sewer.

"Whatever we do for this project does not set a precedent for any other spot in the village. This is a special use permit," said Trust-

tee Lewis Greenberg, responding to residents' worries that the condominiums proposed for Hynes School will be affected by the board's ruling.

"It really and truly is not a residential area," said Callero and Catino's legal representative Donald Sterno, arguing for the variances. "The developers are prepared to pay their fair share on a pro rata basis. We shouldn't have to pay for the entire sewer."

Director of Community Development Charles Schebeck estimates the condominium buildings would be responsible for between \$87,000 and \$140,000 in sewer costs, depending on whether the sewer would need to be oversized, though he indicated the developer would probably not be asked to pay for oversized. The new storm sewer would not be built until 1994, so the building would have to be tied into existing combined sewers along Lincoln Avenue.

Village Administrator Larry Arft indicated Morton Grove is not alone in asking for concessions from developers and that assessing sewer money after the building is about 60 percent occupied is reasonable.

In other communities, builders are asked to donate land for parks and have to pay impact fees for increased water, maintenance and sewer costs as well.

McCracken, director of fiscal services for District 207.

The State of Illinois' aid to the district is projected at 6.8 percent, down from the 7.04 percent of last year. McCracken noted the aid has declined steadily over the past five years as the state had less money to spend. The monies are supposed to reimburse the district for state mandated programs.

The Educational Fund receives the lion's share of budget expenditures, with the monies covering increases in teacher salaries, medical and life insurance and retirement costs. Several new teachers will be added to the current faculty of about 400 teachers, but according to district spokesperson Karen Larsen, new

him an "anonymous clipping" of the newspaper article.

"I sent a letter after that wishing him (Hadge) well," Blase said.

Regarding Hadge's five-year tenure in Niles, which ended with his resignation at the end of 1988, Blase said Hadge "did not make a lot of friends or create a lot of good will, but he achieved what he was supposed to."

"We needed a shaping up of the administrative part of our function," Blase continued. "We needed some tightening up. His job was not a pleasant one. I liked him and expressed that in my letter."

"He has chosen, more often than not, to be unresponsive, when reason and practicality dictated otherwise," the Teaneck Council resolution said, regarding Hadge's dealings with the media and the public. "As a result, false impressions have been created of the manager's inability to answer or his arbitrariness in refusing to answer."

The two dissenting council members said the termination process was unfair and Hadge should have been allowed a time to "correct his shortcomings."

According to the New Jersey newspaper, a councilman had introduced a similar resolution in May, which was tabled in order to

allow council members to evaluate Hadge in executive session. Hadge offered to resign during the evaluation process but the council refused to accept his terms, according to members. He was given three months salary, as required by state law.

Hadge's prepared statement to reporters read, in part: "I have during my tenure as town manager...have enjoyed knowing and working with the employees of the township of Teaneck. I believe that together we have fixed some problems."

"We have some changes, and in general, we have worked hard," the statement continued. "I personally take pride and satisfaction in the work I have done."

Hadge's lawyer praised his client as an "efficient, competent administrator...there are many towns that will enjoy his services in the future."

Two members earlier supported Hadge and later switched sides.

"We thank you, Mr. Hadge, for all of the hard work that you have spent," a council woman said. "But it is our duty to cast our vote as our consciences demand...He did the best he could and it just didn't work out."

Hadge is temporarily succeeded by his assistant.

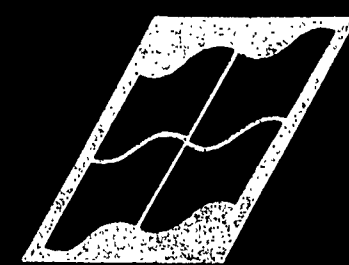
