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Bill requires AIDS-infected health care workers to notify patients

New AIDS law backed by area reps

In overtime session, the Illinois House of Representatives (Monday) passed a bill requiring AIDS-infected health care workers to notify their patients of possible exposure to the deadly virus.

The legislation, SB-999, was written by Representative Penny Pullen (R-55) in response to the documented spread of the HIV (AIDS) virus from a Florida dentist to five of his patients.

"When another legislator and I learned that a central Illinois dentist had died of AIDS last October and that the state's public health authorities had decided to keep his patients in the dark," Repre-

sentative Pullen explained, "we went to work on pressuring the Public Health Department and ultimately on crafting legislation to put patient notification into place as public policy in our state. Now that the nation's health authorities have determined there is an HIV risk in invasive procedures such as surgery or dentistry, the public deserves to be protected to the extent possible."

Representative Ralph Capparelli (D-13), a co-sponsor of the bill, said he believes anyone exposed to the AIDS virus, especially patients, should have the right to know if they have been

Last week's lead story reported former Niles village manager, Jack Hodge, was "sacked by the Teaneck (N.J.) Town Council, because he unreasonably alienated township employees" and "caused a breach in the previous relationship with the Clerk's Office". This took place about two-and-a-half years after he was hired to fill the post of town manager.

During Jack's five year tenure in Niles his personnel policies caused havoc down at the Scheel Administration Building. He operated a "no nonsense" business office segregating employees so they would have little chance to socialize during working hours. Potted plants replaced desks in the outer office and employees were shuffled off to other locations where their eight hour efforts would be confined strictly to the business at hand. Subsequently, longtime village employees were no longer working for Niles. We've been told since Abe Selman took over, some of the former employees have drifted back to the Niles work force.

It wasn't too long ago the Niles Library Board had problems with a former administrator in their district. Women employees complained he was verbally abusive to the female employees who worked at the library. When he left the district the library board did not mention any of these complaints but gave the adminis-



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


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Niles resident wins trucking trophy

Aging Dist. 63 schools in need of repairs

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Niles, MG researching water systems' operating costs

Local water rate hike appears to be inevitable

A boost in water rates looks inevitable for water users in Niles and Morton Grove. The boost would result from the Chicago City Council's approval of a six percent rate increase for customers of Chicago's lake water.

Morton Grove's Administrator, Larry Art, said he would "absolutely" ask the Village Board for an increase and he had tentatively notified the public and board members he was doing a rate study, preliminary to submitting an increase proposal at the July 22 board meeting.

Morton Grove will soon lose the money it now gains from selling lake water to the North Suburban Public Utility company (NSPU) in unincorporated Maine Township and that alters their expense picture. But Niles Village

Manager Abe Selman said the new money Niles will get when it begins selling water to NSPU this fall would "not necessarily" cancel out a rate increase in Niles.

Niles is also researching its water system's operating costs. July 10, Selman said Niles' water rates are low, compared to surrounding communities, and it has been several years since water rates were raised. He said the water expense was only one element of what it takes to run a system and pointed out mounting costs for salaries, insurance, gas and diesel fuel, electricity and other factors, such as replacement of aging water pipes.

Saying he is conscious of escalating costs to residents, Selman emphasized he would do every-

Dist. 207 administrators high on salary charts

As politicians struggle to balance next year's state of Illinois budget, High School District 207 easily managed to balance its own 1991-92 budget, including comfortable salaries for top administrators.

The district's school board recently approved a \$62 million budget, only two percent over last year's figure. The small budget increase can be attributed in part to a \$2 million decrease in funds needed, due to the completion of the Maine South library and the

asbestos removal project. Revenue from property taxes accounts for 91.5 percent of the district's budget.

Figuring prominently in the 1991-92 budget is the payroll for District 207 administrators. Topping the list is Superintendent James L. Elliott, who will earn \$110,400 next year. Following are John T. Benka, assistant superintendent, administration, and Donald E. Kenney, assistant superintendent, business, who will

Computer project fosters cooperative learning

Four computer camps will be held at Maine East over the next four weeks for students, who are participating in Project Home-

room. Project HomeRoom, which will place computers in students' homes and link them to the school's mainframe computer and computerized library via the telephone lines, is a joint venture between District 207 and IBM Ameritech Telephone.

At the computer camps, students will learn to operate the equipment and use the software. A meeting for parents is scheduled for Aug. 15 from 7 to 8 p.m. at which time families will take their computers home.

The two-year pilot project will allow about 100 students to attend special interdisciplinary classes in English, math, science, and social science that will be enhanced with computer technology.

Teachers for the program, who will also have home computers, will be available through a computer modem and message system to help students with their work after hours. The students will also be able to communicate through the computer message system with their fellow students in the program encouraging interaction between classmates and fostering cooperative learning.

By putting computers right in the home, District 207 will also increase the opportunity for parents to be involved first-hand with their child's learning. Parents will have access to bulletin board homework assignments and their child's academic record.

Some computer programs may

be created in different languages to help the district communicate in the 47 different languages spoken by Maine East students.

In addition to using the work processing, simulation, and research capabilities of the computer, students will be required to download homework assignments into the teacher's computer in the evening. Overnight, the system will analyze the homework and correct it.

The teacher will know before class begins what concepts students had difficulty learning, making it possible to review those concepts in class the next day.



Brochure outlines patient options

The Illinois State Medical Society offers a new, free brochure outlining patient options in end-of-life medical care and decision making.

"A Personal Decision" contains the forms required by Illinois law to establish a Living Will, Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care and organ donor status.

"As modern medicine saves and extends lives that only a few years ago would have been lost, patients and physicians alike have raised concerns about quality of life," said Robert M. Reardon, M.D., ISMS president.

"Lives artificially maintained by machines raise troubling questions about how we manage health care for incapacitated patients. Our goal is to help patients assure peace of mind for themselves and their families.

Comatose patients, those existing in a persistent vegetative state, and people suffering from dementia all lack the ability to make decisions about life sustaining efforts, the Society notes.

"Advance directives allow patients to select the care they will receive later when they may be unable to make or understand those decisions," Dr. Reardon said.

Illinois law assigns that right to the patient; it's up to patients, however, to claim their right by signing advance directives and discussing their wishes with their families and physicians.

Without advance directives, executed at a time when the patient's capacity to decide is not in question, families may be forced to go to court to have the right to make health care decisions assigned to someone other than the patient.

The most effective of the advance directives contained in the brochure is the Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care. It allows a designated individual to make health care decisions for a patient incapable of doing so; those decisions include starting and terminating life sustaining measures.

Using the form included in the brochure, patients can name up to five people to serve, in sequence, as their agents for health care. If the first person named is unavailable or unwilling to serve, the law specifies that the next person named will succeed as agent.

The second form in the brochure, the Illinois Living Will, directs hospital personnel not to use extraordinary lifesaving measures if the patient's condition is

terminal and death is imminent.

"The Living Will applies only under strictly defined conditions," Dr. Reardon noted. "The physician must certify that the patient's condition is terminal, that death is imminent, and that procedures such as CPR would do no more than delay death. A Living Will allows both patients and family the peace and dignity of a natural death."

The Society urges patients to sign both documents to be absolutely sure their wishes are followed. "Many patients assume their next of kin will have the authority to make those decisions," said Dr. Reardon. "But if that time comes, the family may find their hands tied by the law."

The brochure also includes information about organ donation, which offers the gift of life and health for other patients. In Illinois, drivers can mark their drivers licenses to indicate organ donor status; the state medical society brochure also includes a wallet-sized organ donor card.

A second wallet card describes the bearer as having signed advance directives concerning health care; this should be especially helpful to trauma teams, emergency personnel and physicians, Dr. Reardon noted.


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CONGREGATION BNAI EMUNAH welcomes **RABBI DANIEL EPSTEIN**, who will take up his duties on August 1, 1991 as Bnai Emunah's new spiritual leader. Rabbi Epstein brings to the congregation a varied and unusual Jewish background, combining traditional Yeshiva training with modern secular and religious education, experience in Israel and on American college campuses, and in Havurah groups as well as in the pulpit.

Rabbi Epstein's childhood home in the Upper West Side of Manhattan (New York City) was Orthodox in observance, combining Talmud with philosophy, Hebrew and fervent Zionism. His father, an ordained rabbi descended from generations of Lithuanian rabbis, devoted his life to study, teaching and writing Hebrew literature. Rabbi Epstein's grandfather served as Chief Rabbi of St. Louis, Mo., where a Jewish day school still bears his name.

After his graduation from Manhattan Day School and Yeshiva University High School, young Daniel Epstein studied at the Yeshiva in Israel, interrupting his studies to complete a Bachelor of Arts degree in Jewish Thought at Hebrew University in Jerusalem. He was drawn to political life on campus, and became active in some of the early Hayurot in Jerusalem.

The Yom Kippur War erupted just after his return to the United States, and Daniel Epstein immediately returned to Israel as a volunteer, working and teaching on a kibbutz. His sister's husband was a casualty of that war, leaving a widow and two children.

When the war ended, Daniel Epstein came home to study psychology and work for the Hillel Foundation. He was still enrolled in Columbia University when he entered Rabbinical School at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. By the time he was ordained, four years later, he was Director of the local Hillel Foundation, and active in the Havurah movement. He became Chairperson of the West Side Minyan, a committed group of dynamic young adults who worshipped and studied together, striving to create an alternative Jewish community.

After ordination, Rabbi Epstein served as Hillel rabbi as Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland. He has held pulpits in Virginia, Massachusetts, and (most recently) Long Beach, California. He comes to Bnai Emunah with his wife, Joanne, daughter Shira (age four) and son David (one year old). Rabbi Epstein's variety of experience and training has provided him with many advantages in taking over a well-established congregation like Bnai Emunah. His enthusiasm in dealing with children and young families is contagious; but Rabbi Epstein has also taught at nursing homes, and organized adult courses in Jewish mysticism, the changing role of Jewish women, and the Israel-Palestinian conflict.

Rabbi Epstein plans to make Torah study and discussion part of each Shabbat morning service at Bnai Emunah. He intends to teach and lead study groups of interested Jews, both Shabbat and weekdays, daytime and evening.

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Needle biopsy for the breast available

Patients of Lutheran General Hospital (L.G.H.), 1775 Dempster St., Park Ridge, will now have access to the latest in breast health care—the Mammotest, a new non-surgical mammography unit which locates and helps the physician perform a fine needle biopsy of breast lesions which may be so small they cannot be felt.

"The American Cancer Society says that one out of every nine women will develop breast cancer sometime during her life," explains Nicholas Kinna, M.D., director, mammography. "Research has shown that as many as 75 percent of breast lesions that are surgically biopsied are benign. Until the advent of the stereotactic biopsy procedures, needle biopsies could only be performed on tissue that could be felt. Therefore, the vast majority of cases required surgical biopsy to determine whether or not the mass was benign. The Mammotest affords us accurate diagnosis of lesions that are identified by physical examination and those identified only by mammography."

During the stereotactic biopsy procedure, the patient lies on her stomach on a padded table with her breast suspended through an opening in the table. Two stereo views of the suspicious lesion are x-rayed and, with the aid of a computer, the lesion's exact location is determined in three dimensions.

A thin biopsy needle is then passed within one millimeter of the suspicious mass and a tiny section of tissue taken for examination.

The technique minimizes pain and cost and leaves no scarring that could interfere with later mammographic follow-up.



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

Lifeguard training program explained

The Niles Park District is continually growing and changing to meet the needs of its diverse population. Included in those changes was the construction of a water park to replace the old traditional pool at the Recreation Center.

Waterparks, in general, are a new concept across the country. Agencies, such as the American Red Cross, that were traditionally relied upon for answers are also finding themselves in new and unfamiliar territory.

Last year, three Park District Risk Management Agencies experienced the terrible effects of a drowning. To help prevent these incidents in the future, the Niles Park District, based on the recommendation of PDRMA, decided to participate in the Ellis program.

How to achieve financial freedom in the 1990's

What does financial freedom mean to you? No more mortgage payments? Enough money to live on comfortably for the rest of your life? No worries about investments? The assurance that you will be taken care of no matter what happens to you?

Financial freedom can be all those things—and more. Essentially, you are financially free if you only concern yourself with those financial matters that interest you.

Do you hate paying bills and watching your investments? Then your financial freedom will come when you are liberated from those tasks.

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Tax planning questions answered

These are typical questions asked by taxpayers and are presented as a public service of this publication and the IRS.

Q. I keep hearing about tax planning. I am not wealthy, so I do not have to bother with it, right?

A. A good time for tax planning is when you have finished your federal income tax return for the previous year. Also, tax planning should be done any time something happens that could affect your future tax returns.

Q. Can you give me an example of something that could affect my tax return?

A. Yes. Buying a house, which often brings large interest payments, may affect the amount of your deductions. Also, even smaller things such as whose name and social security number go first on a joint savings account can affect your return. If you open a joint savings account with a dependent, either child or adult, your dependent's name and social security number must go first if the money and interest it earns belong to the dependent. Otherwise, the interest income will be taxed as your income.

Q. Do you have any other suggestions on tax planning?

A. Yes. Establish a recordkeeping system that works for you. Good tax planning takes you entire tax situation into account, and good records help you keep the whole picture in view.

Government and tax-free mutual funds popular

There are two groups of specialized mutual funds that have gained popularity in the past few years. Managers of the first invest in securities issued by the U.S. government and its agencies. Managers of the other invest in securities exempt from federal taxes. Both are income oriented, so the investments the manager of both types of funds usually select are bonds, notes or U.S. Treasury bills.

Many people fear the risk of investing in an economy they see as uncertain. For this reason, they avoid stocks or corporate bonds and are comfortable only in securities backed by the full faith and credit of the U.S. government. Investing in government securities, however, generally requires large sums of money. An investor with limited funds is at a disadvantage when competing with professional traders in the complex government market.

A need for professional representation for the individual investor was the reason managed mutual funds with the objective of high current income in addition to the protective guarantee of the U.S. government were created.

When you invest in tax-free mutual funds, your money is pooled with the money of thousands of investors and is invested in 30 to 100 individual federal tax-free municipal bonds. Like the individual municipal bonds, the interest you earn on these funds is federally tax exempt, and because you are investing in a mutual fund, you have the benefits of professional money management.

The benefit of these mutual funds is the security of regular interest with the amount of the interest affected only by current interest rates. Some government funds offer the added attraction of a monthly check, which is not available through many individual investments.

If your investment need is current income and safety of principal, you owe it to yourself to look into mutual funds which invest in securities issued or guaranteed by the U.S. government or its agencies. If your need is current tax-free income, wouldn't it be nice to earn interest free from the bite of Uncle Sam and still be safe?

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

Tax strategies for investors

If you think you're paying Uncle Sam too much of what you make on your investments, you may want to take a closer look at tax-free and tax-deferred investments.

In the last few years, the municipal bond market has become a more complicated place for investors. In the past, all municipal bonds were exempt from federal tax, but changes in the tax law created three different tax treatments of municipal bonds.

The interest you earn on the traditional obligations of state and local governments remains tax-free. And, in most states, if the bonds are from your home state, you generally escape state and local taxes as well. However, certain bonds issued for private purposes, such as industrial development, now generate interest that can be subject to the alternative minimum tax.

Still other bonds, including those issued to finance sports stadiums and convention facilities, no longer qualify for any federal tax exemption.

To determine if municipal bonds are the right type of investment for you, you should compare the return you can collect from a tax-exempt investment to the return you would get from a taxed investment. You should also weigh the security and the term of the bond under consideration.

In addition, keep in mind that if you need to sell a municipal bond before its maturity, you must report your capital gain or loss on your tax return. What's more, you cannot deduct investment expenses associated with tax-exempt investments.

By transferring money from an investment that accrues interest at maturity, such as Treasury bills, you can defer the taxes due on your investment earnings.

Treasury bills are issued in denominations of \$10,000 and up, and mature in three, six, or 12 months. The bills are issued at a discount, with the interest paid when they are redeemed at ma-

tors a way to earn tax-free interest income. Issued by state and local governments, municipal bonds help raise money to build schools, roads and other projects.

Interest on T-bills is completely exempt from state and local taxes; federal taxes are not due until the year the bills mature.

Many banks, brokerage firms and other financial institutions offer Certificates of Deposit (CDs). The interest earned on CDs is subject to federal, state and local taxes. But, because earnings on CDs are taxed in the year you receive them, you can use CDs as a means of deferring interest income.

When you buy a CD that matures next year, the interest it earns is not taxable until then.

However, you should keep in mind that early withdrawals from a CD are generally subject to an interest penalty.

Savings bonds have two special tax appeals. First, interest earned on savings bonds is exempt from state and local income taxes. Second, since you collect your interest when you redeem the bonds, the interest is generally not subject to federal tax until then. However, you can choose to report the interest annually.

If you select this option, and later you decide that you would benefit more from reporting the interest when you redeem the bonds, you can switch methods only with the consent of the IRS.

Beginning Jan. 1, 1990, a new tax benefit was created for certain U.S. savings bonds. Interest on these bonds is not taxed if the bonds are redeemed to pay college expenses.

But, in order to qualify for this tax treatment, certain conditions must be satisfied: the bond must have been issued after Dec. 31, 1989; you must be 24 years old or older at the time the bonds are purchased; and you must use the bond's proceeds for qualified educational expenses incurred by you, your spouse, or dependents for higher education.

This exclusion is phased out if your adjusted gross income falls within certain ranges.

Q. I received a letter in the mail telling me my federal tax return was selected to be examined. What should I do?

A. The first thing you should do is read the letter carefully. The letter will tell you the time, date and place scheduled for the examination, as well as what parts of the return will be examined, or audited, and the type of records you will need.

Q. How can I prepare for this audit?

A. Assemble any records suggested in the letter, plus any other evidence to support the income, deductions, adjustments and credits that will be examined. Check to see if there are any missing records that you will need to find before your audit.

Q. Can I bring someone with me to the audit?

A. You may bring with you an attorney, certified public accountant, enrolled agent, the individual who signed your return as preparer or anyone who is knowledgeable about your tax-related books and records. However, generally only an attorney, CPA or enrolled agent may represent you. Your representative will need written authorization to represent you in your absence.

Q. What happens if the auditor feels my records do not support the items I have claimed on my return and I do not agree?

A. You and the auditor should discuss the reasons behind his or her decisions. If it is a matter of insufficient records, ask what other kind of information would be necessary to support the items in dispute. Regardless of the reason, you should discuss the findings with the auditor to make sure you understand what the problem is and what solution, if any, you can come to. One of your most effective tools in an audit is communication.

Q. What options do I have if we cannot come to an agreement on the results of the audit?

A. Your first step is to request an interview with the auditor's supervisor. Many audit conflicts are resolved at this level. If you still cannot reach an agreement, the auditor or supervisor will explain your appeal rights. **Social Security covers
more government workers**

Part-time, temporary, and seasonal workers employed by state or local governments are the main group affected by new Social Security legislation that went into effect for services provided after July 1, according to Thomas A. Curin, Social Security manager in Des Plaines.

The change in the law provides mandatory Social Security coverage for about 2.3 million state and local government employees, who are not covered by any retirement system at this time. Social Security coverage for these workers is important, Curin said, because workers who are not covered by Social Security often do not arrange for alternative retirement, survivors, or disability protection.

Unlike private industry, where

Social Security coverage is mandatory, the decision to provide Social Security coverage to state and local government employees has been at the option of each state. Some state and local governments have chosen to provide their own retirement systems instead.

But with the addition of part-time, temporary and seasonal workers covered by the new legislation, 77 percent of state and local government workers are now covered by the Social Security system.

dered two gowns by phone, giving the credit card number of an Alsip man. The credit was cleared and a messenger picked up the gowns and delivered them to a south side Chicago address. The scam was repeated, using a different charge, July 3. The credit card company again approved credit and a messenger again picked up the dresses. The caller asked the store not to bother mailing the bills and said he would pick them up himself. But Margie's mailed the bills anyway.

July 7, the wife of the Alsip credit card holder received the bill and called Margie's, saying she had not ordered any gowns. July 10 Santiago allegedly again phoned in an order for two more gowns and gave another credit card number, but this time, the credit company rejected it because the account was closed.

The store contacted Morton Grove police and investigator James Mandik was on the scene when the same messenger appeared for the third order. The messenger described to police how he would leave a package in the phone customer's door and pick up his delivery fee from an envelope taped to the door. The messenger added he also was scheduled to make another pickup for the customer at a north Michigan Avenue, Chicago, jewelry firm.

Morton Grove police contacted the property crimes unit of the Chicago Police Department and the jewelry store. July 12, Morton Grove Investigations Commander, Sgt. Frank Pantalco, picked up a fake package from the jeweler.

Investigator Daniel Donoghue posed as a messenger and at about 8 p.m., he, Commander Pantalco, investigator Mandik and officers Matthew Pankow and Ed Mahanke joined Chicago detectives Robert Kocan and Greg Geisbush at the caller's Chicago address.

When Santiago signed the delivery receipt the messenger gave him, he was arrested by Chicago

police and charged with forgery. While in custody, the man agreed to talk with the Morton Grove officers.

Describing his method of operation, he said he took credit card numbers from car rental receipts given him by a friend named "Bugs", then called and ordered gowns sent to his home. Morton Grove charges against Santiago/Sandoval are pending for unlawful use of a credit card and he has an Aug. 13 court date.

Margie's Bridal salon is out the nearly \$4,000 cost of the dresses. Because employees at Margie's did not check the actual credit cards, but only ran them through for approval of sufficient funds, Margie's must absorb the nearly \$4,000 cost of the stolen evening gowns.



The village has tried to notify residents of the sprinkling ban through a mass mailing, signs at the village hall, and in local newspapers. However, it seems there are a number of residents who are either unaware of the regulations or choose to ignore them.

From May 15 through Sept. 15, residents are asked to refrain from watering between the hours of noon and 6 p.m. In addition, those with odd numbered addresses can water on odd days of the month, while residents with even numbered addresses can water on even days of the month.

While some residents complain that the sprinkling regulations in Niles are too complicated, other area villages are enforcing similar bans. In Des Plaines, police found verbal warnings had little effect, and began issuing \$50 tickets to offenders.

thing he could control the frequency and size of the increase and still keep the water self-supporting.

When Chicago initiated the rate increase, a Chicago official warned suburban users would use the raise as an excuse to raise their rates even higher. Arft recently retorted "The water bill we pay to Chicago is about half of what it costs to run (the water system)."

He noted for years, suburban water purchasers were also paying Chicago sewer fees. After several years of litigation, Chicago was ordered to refund the sewer fee, but that refund is still pending.

Niles residents currently pay \$1.84 per 1,000 gallons of water; Morton Grove pays \$2.06 per 1,000 gallons. Among other purchasers of Chicago's lake water, Des Plaines' water customers pay \$2.16 per 1,000 gallons; and Park Ridge bills on a graduated scale, according to the amount of water used. Its water users have already absorbed one water rate increase this year, in May. Glenview buys its water from Wilmette; Skokie from Evanston, and rates vary.

Safety rules for driving in fog

Rapidly changing temperatures can cause fog, which reduces visibility and makes driving hazardous. Be prepared to change your driving habits if fog appears suddenly.

The best safety rule is to avoid driving in fog whenever possible. However, if you must drive, take the following safety precautions:

1. Dim your headlights. You not only will see more clearly, but other drivers will see you better. Low beams direct light onto the road ahead, while the light from high beams hits the fog and is reflected off it. Illinois law prohibits driving with parking lights only.

2. Slow down. Reduce your speed even more if you see headlights or taillights in front of you. Headlights may be on a vehicle coming down the center of the road, and taillights can indicate a stopped vehicle or one that is barely moving.

3. Do not overdrive your headlights. Keep within the limits of your vision and be prepared to stop in an emergency. If the fog becomes so dense that you can hardly see, pull off the road and stop. Do not drive on a highway at five or 10 miles per hour.

Driving safely in fog requires concentration and patience. Remember to dim your headlights, slow down and pull off the road if visibility is zero.







Capparelli survey shows opposition to tax hikes

Of the many issues affecting northwest side Chicago and suburban residents, property taxes overwhelmingly remain the number one concern, according to a 13th District survey conducted and tabulated recently by State Rep. Ralph C. Capparelli. Sixty-five percent of the more than 3,000 responding indicated that property taxes were the major issue affecting their quality of life. Other categories noted in the survey, such as jobs, education, drugs/crime, the environment, all received far less attention. However, in determining whether a temporary income tax increase could be made permanent as a way of holding down property taxes, respondents were nearly divided - 46 percent said "yes," while 52 percent said "no."

Of the 46 percent that said "yes," 15 percent thought it (about \$400 million each) should be split equally between education and local governments, which is the current law. Fifty-seven percent said it should be split equally between education and local governments only "if they use their share exclusively for property tax relief." Twenty-three percent supported Gov. Jim Edgar's proposal of 56 percent (\$450 million) to education, 31 percent (\$244 million) to local governments and 13 percent (\$106 million) to the state. Only 33 percent supported the governor's plan of putting a five percent cap on the amount prop-

House resolution commends boy scouts

The Boy Scouts of America have come under attack from the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) because the Scout Oath and Law calls upon Scouts to do their duty "to God," according to Illinois House Assistant Minority Leader Penny Pullen (R-55th). For that reason, Rep. Penny Pullen co-sponsored House Resolution 737 in support of the Boy Scouts of America and commending the organization for teaching about traditional values, including the importance of duty to God and country. The resolution was adopted unanimously Thursday by the Illinois House. Rep. Pullen noted the ACLU has recently targeted the Boy Scouts for their non-sectarian religious beliefs. The organization has launched legal action against the Boy Scouts on behalf of atheists who oppose the "duty to God" section of the Boy Scout Law.

CTA, RTA should provide service disruption notice

State Rep. Jeff Schoenberg (D-56) on July 1, 1991 introduced legislation urging the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA) and the Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) to provide advance written notice of its intent to interrupt commuter service for routine maintenance. The CTA recently announced that the Skokie Swift, a major transportation source for 3,000 commuters, would be closed for 11 weeks for rehabilitation work. The sudden closure resulted from the CTA's failure to obtain permits from Evanston to continue its repair work during weekends and nights. Schoenberg's resolution calls

on both the CTA and RTA to publish a notice 14 days prior to service interruption and to provide written notice to municipalities within a five mile radius. "There is no valid reason for the CTA or RTA not to provide notice that gives commuters time to make alternate travel plans," Schoenberg said. "The loss of the Swift for three months is bound to result in higher transportation costs and added travel time for many commuters. Giving them ample advance notice helps to cushion the inconvenience that service interruption causes. It's the least the CTA and RTA can do for its riders," he added.

Edgar announces MG man's appointment

Gov. Jim Edgar has announced the appointment of members to various boards and commissions. One local resident, Kenneth Soloman, of Morton Grove, was appointed as a member of the Illinois Development Finance Authority. Soloman, 48, is an attorney with Shefsky and Froelich, Ltd. in Chicago. He replaces John Rogers in this position. The appointment requires Senate confirmation.

O'Malley backs legislation on gun buyers

Cook County State's Attorney Jack O'Malley joined Governor Jim Edgar and law enforcement officials Thursday in support of legislation that will provide faster and more complete information about a gun buyer than is currently available. "I can support any gun legislation, which would cut down on the violence in our neighborhoods and in our streets. Our murder rate (currently 410 homicides in Chicago since Jan. 1, 1991) and the spread of firearms into the hands of offenders under the age of 21 is intolerable," said O'Malley, who appeared at a press conference with the governor in Springfield.

O'Malley cautioned while he supports the legislation, which sets up a hotline for sellers to use to receive instant information on the gun buyer's status, he will further push for laws that effectively deal with the growing problems of guns. Be alert to drunk drivers

Approximately one of every two Americans will be involved in an alcohol-related accident in their lifetime, and over half of all fatal accidents are alcohol-related.

Therefore, the ability to detect a drunk driver could save your life.

The following clues indicate that a driver may be under the influence:

- turning too widely, abruptly or illegally
- swerving on and off the road or between lanes
- stopping without cause in a traffic lane
- responding slowly to traffic signals
- signaling inconsistently with driving actions
- following other vehicles too closely
- If you spot a suspected drunk driver, keep plenty of distance between you and that vehicle. If you must pass, do it carefully. If a vehicle is approaching rapidly from behind, allow it to pass. However, be aware of the driver's position at all times.
- Do not attempt to stop the impaired driver. Stop at a rest area or gas station and notify the police. Give the police a description of the vehicle, the license plate number and its location.
- Reporting a drunk driver helps keep the road safer for all motorists. But most importantly, do not drink and drive yourself.

Use caution when turning right on red

The right-turn-on-red law is a popular time saver for busy Illinois motorists. However, turning right on red has become so automatic that many motorists fail to stop and yield the right of way.

Help prevent an accident by coming to a complete stop before you turn at a red light. Look for traffic on the street you are entering and yield the right of way to any vehicles or pedestrians in the crosswalk. Then make the right turn cautiously.

Before turning right at a red light, stop sign or uncontrolled intersection, look down the sidewalk and past parked cars for pedestrians and cyclists. Watch for and obey "no turn on red" signs at intersections where making a turn at a red light is prohibited.

Making a left turn at a red light is permitted from a one-way street to a one-way street heading left. Be sure to come to a complete stop and yield the right of way to other drivers, pedestrians and cyclists before turning.

trator a free pass which would not hinder him in seeking his next job.

In both the village manager and the library administrator actions the personnel problems the two men had were never mentioned. In both cases the two districts did not want to hinder the men's future advancement in their professional fields. But we often wondered how prudent the districts were in not reporting these shortcomings?

In this day of lawsuits it is likely both districts preferred to whitewash these men's resumes rather than be confronted by a possible legal action. Matter of fact, when we told one of the Buglers we intended writing about this matter, we were warned about the potential for a libel suit.

Because both men exhibited behavior which proved detrimental in Niles, it could be assumed they would carry these problems to their next jobs. And if they did, would Niles be doing their next employers a favor by not reporting their shortcomings?

Years ago we received a very good recommendation for a man we hired who was an excellent salesman. And the recommendation was true. He was one of the best. But he had a many-year problem with stealing money which the man who recommended the salesman must have known about. But he thought he was being kind and helpful by not mentioning the man's problem. We

suffered from this bad recommendation and learned the hard way such a kindness proved to be a disservice.

In the case of the former Niles village manager, we were told he was a whiz at dealing with financial matters. But his personnel relationships were harmful which eventually proved his downfall in his Teaneck job.

Would Niles officials have been kinder to him by letting him know his shortcomings and asking him to change? Or were they better letting things slide, losing several longtime employees and eventually causing similar problems at his next job?

exposed. "AIDS is very dangerous, and anyone -- especially doctors or dentists -- should voluntarily tell their patients. People must know," Capparelli said.

Senator Martin Butler (R-28) also voted in favor of the bill, stating, "I believe it is every person's right to know if they were exposed in any way." He added, "Back when I was a kid, they posted signs when someone had scarlet fever, and no one thought their rights were being abused. It was protection for everyone.

HIV is a greater threat. This is what public health protection should be. People have a right to know if they've been exposed," he concluded.

Senator Walter Dudyec (R-7) also supported the measure.

This legislation was part of a bill that allows rape victims to go to the state's attorney, prior to conviction but when probable cause has been established, and demand AIDS testing for accused

were "sick messages on my answering machine" that told him to change his vote.

Commissioner Elaine Heinen, who had voted for allowing smoking in a previous action, explained her vote switch, saying she had monitored the pool unannounced, found smokers were not staying at the table designated for smoking and kids were around the area. She too, received numerous phone calls, even at work, urging her to vote against smoking. She said "I feel if people can't abide by the rule of the board, I'll change my vote tonight."

President Carol Panek reflected on her concern after seeing parents sitting and smoking at the water park with their little children playing about them.

Board members returned to another contentious issue and approved keeping the adult swim during safety break policy as it is. This policy bans adult swimmers during safety breaks at the Oasis water park, but allows it at the Sports Complex pool. The policy will be reviewed before next year.

Commissioner Marlene Baczek noted more staff would have to be hired if break swimmers were allowed at the Oasis and commissioners still "didn't have the full picture on expenses" because the utility bills had not come in. Nor was hiring guards feasible at this time of the year, she added. Five lifeguards are now scheduled to leave in August.

President Panek said she held from consideration a petition requesting the dismissal of Ellis Associates, the firm that establishes safety procedures for the district water facilities. She bolstered her action by presenting the results of a surprise audit Ellis performed in the past month. The report stated "staff performance is outstanding." Superintendent of Recreation Nancie Boland also reported both Niles water facilities were rated excellent.

In his report, Park Director Tom Lippert introduced Jay Jedinak as the new assistant business manager.

Jedinak has over 20 years of experience as a business and fi-

rapists. Previously, victims had to wait until conviction -- an event that often does not occur, as rape charges are often plea-bargained down to lesser charges.

Previous AIDS disclosure legislation was vetoed by Governor Jim Edgar. It had included a measure to require prisoners to be tested for AIDS before leaving jail. Governor Edgar rejected the legislation, opting to wait for a more specific determination on the issue from the Center for Disease Control.

The bill also provides for warning to health care workers if they have done invasive procedures on a patient, who later turns out to be HIV-infected.

The vote was 104-5 on the landmark legislation, the first such bill to pass a legislature in any state. The Senate had earlier adopted the measure 53-0. The measure now goes to Governor Jim Edgar for final action.

Authorities speculate the strong currents pulled Ryan's body out into the lake. Members of the Lake County Sheriff's Police, Waukegan Fire Department, U.S. Coast Guard and others searched for Ryan from approximately 3 p.m. until late Sunday evening. According to the coroner's office, Ryan's body washed up on the beach and was discovered early the next morning.

Josh Cole, 16, one of Ryan's friends, was rescued Sunday afternoon as he began to lose consciousness in the water. He was treated at Victory Memorial Hospital in Waukegan and released.

Although signs are posted that prohibit swimming in the area, the group apparently ignored the warnings. Since 1988, three other drownings have taken place in the same spot. Diane Emerson, an Edison spokesperson, said that apart from posting signs, the company is not sure what else can be done to prevent future tragedies.

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


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
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
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
