District 63 Board spells out which students move to Apollo

Following two public hearings, board members of East Maine Elementary School District 63 last Tuesday defined location changes for the entire Stevenson School body and some Mark Twain students beginning

next September in Apollo Junior High School.

Now a junior high school leased to two tenants, Apollo will be converted into facilities for grades one through six. Kindergarteners are placed in the

district's Melzer Kindergarten Center, in Morton Grove.

An original plan calling for redistricting of 55 Mark Twain students will drop to about 44 because in-coming sixth graders

Neighbor protests, parking problems doom Lone Tree plan

Trustees split vote on banquet hall

It will be "back to the drawing board" for designers of the proposed Lone Tree restaurant/banquet hall at 7710 to 7730 Milwaukee Ave., Niles.

Feb. 25 in a tie vote, Niles trustees split 3-3 on a move to approve the rezoning of Lone Tree property to allow construction of the restaurant/banquet hall and a parking variation of 19 percent.

With President Nicholas Blase absent and unable to break the tie, the motion died. Trustee Andrew Przybylo acted as board president pro tem.

Joe Salerno, Niles director of Code Enforcement, later explained if the petitioners changed their plans dramatically, they could re-file in a month; with the same plan, they must

wait six months to re-file.

Representing the property owners, lawyer Paul Kolpak and architect Chris Dabrowski attempted to meet every village condition for approval, but in the end, were stopped by a combination of neighbors' protests and a parking plan some trustees questioned.

Trustees James Mahoney, Thomas Bondi and Louella Preston tried to salvage the motion by banning use of the banquet hall until the parking lot was completed or until off-site parking could be found, although Mahoney voted against it.

Oketo Avenue opponents, residents Maria Salvador and Renata Simonson argued against the plan. Salvador presented trustees

First National Bank of Niles, Bugle honored

Following a state-wide competition, the First National Bank of Niles and The Bugle Newspapers were singled out for community service awards by the Illinois Park and Recreation Association (IPRA) and the Illinois Association of Park Districts (IAPD).

Feb. 18 the Niles Park Board presented First National Bank Vice-President and Cashier Rick Smith and Bugle newspaper representative Shellya Hackett with the awards for cooperation and service to the park district over the years.

Kay Forest, executive director of IPRA, said the winners were chosen from nominations sent by nearly 60 Illinois park districts, recreation departments and special recreation associations.

Waukegan Road slated for resurfacing

Asphalt re-surfacing of Waukegan Road, from Milwaukee Avenue, just north of the Touhy Ave. intersection, to Oakton Street, Niles, should begin in mid-April or earlier, if weather allows. Jun Noriega, Niles Director of Public Services, anticipates the project will take about 20 working days and with one or two lanes open, should not require traffic re-routing.

The re-surfacing project is in response to Niles' request the road improvement be added to the Illinois Department of Transportation's (IDOT) maintenance program, Noriega believes.

At an IDOT bid opening in Springfield in late January, Palumbo Brothers, Inc., of Hillside, Illinois, were the low bidders on the project expected to cost \$195,844.75.

Work crews will also check curbs and replace small lengths of curbs if needed, Noriega said.

Although the competition has been in place ten years, Forest said nominations for the award are made only when local districts feel they have an "outstanding" nominee in the different categories.

Niles Park Board Vice-President James Pierski called the recognition "quite an honor" since, although the choices for nomination and area of service are made locally, the competition is state-wide.

The Bugle plaque inscription read "In recognition and appreciation of outstanding contributions and unselfish devotion for the advancement of parks, recreation and leisure in the community and the State of Illinois."

Store lists 210 job openings

Niles home improvement store set to open in April

Homebase, successor to B.J.'s Wholesale Club at Niles Civic Center Plaza, Waukegan Road and Oakton Street, is set to open in mid-to-late April.

The Niles store, and the other six planned for the Chicagoland area this year, are the newest members of the California-based home improvement warehouse chain, Homebase, Inc. Expecting to provide a total of 1,000 job opportunities for the overall area, top officials of Homebase are screening applicants for Niles' 210 openings at Skokie's Holiday Inn Northshore, 5300 Touhy Ave., all week, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Mindful of wide-spread photos of thousands of applicants lined up for jobs at a Chicago Loop hotel in recent weeks, Homebase deliberately staggered its help wanted ads, according to Niles Homebase General Manager Larry Smith to avoid keeping people standing in the cold. In fact, he

musued Feb. 24, probably more journalists and TV cameramen showed up early Monday than applicants.

But there has been a steady stream of job seekers since, he said and Homebase is being aided in the application screening by the state Job Service Department. On the basis of a market survey, Homebase wages should be competitive, Smith noted and both managerial and support staff are needed.

New Chicagoland stores will be slightly larger than others in the chain, due to the area's diversity of climate, which allows a wider spectrum of products, Smith explained.

Joe Salerno, Niles director of code enforcement, said the approximately 105,000-square foot site at Civic Center Plaza will be expanded to include a 10,000-square foot, fenced-in area for evergreens. And village permission

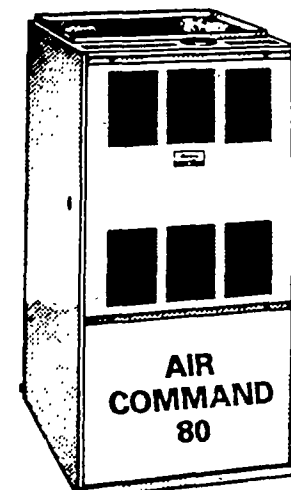

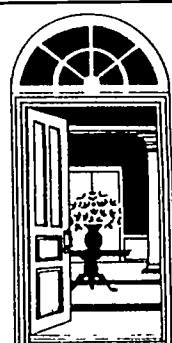

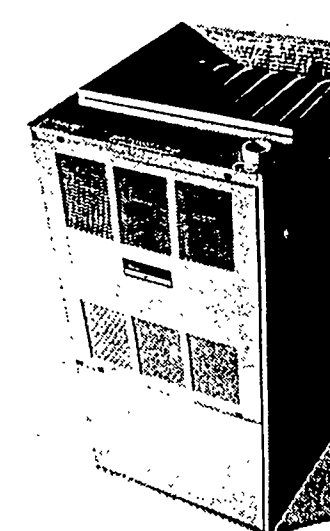

Surgeon uses new orthopaedic technique

A new type of laser surgery for orthopaedic patients was used for the first time on Chicago's North-west side at Resurrection Medical Center, 7435 West Talcott Avenue, Chicago. Gregory Fahrenbach, M.D., an orthopaedic on staff at Resurrection, was among the first physicians in Chicago to use the new Contact Laser Arthroprobe, manufactured and designed by Surgical Laser Technologies specifically for orthopaedic patients who need arthroscopic surgery.

The Contact Laser Arthroprobe is a one-piece fiber optic handle with an attached ceramic probe. It delivers laser energy to provide cutting, coagulating and vaporization of tissue during arthroscopic surgery.

During arthroscopic surgery, the surgeon inserts the laser into the knee or shoulder and removes abnormal tissue. The laser instrument is like a scalpel and is more precise than other mechanical in-

struments, according to Dr. Fahrenbach. Because there is little bleeding with the laser, the surgeon's visual field is not impaired. The surgeon also uses the laser to stop and bleed before withdrawing the arthroscope from the knee. "That means fewer cases requiring aspiration or drains, less patient discomfort and faster rehabilitation," Dr. Fahrenbach said.

This versatile surgical instrument meets the demands of various arthroscopic procedures. "The primary advantage of the laser is that it reduces the danger of damage to the joint surface and other tissue of the knee," Dr. Fahrenbach said. "It does not produce as much stress on a joint surface as other conventional instruments, which benefit the patient. In addition, the laser resects tissue quickly, seals nerve endings and prevents unnecessary bleeding."

Holy Family implants two more insulin pumps

The StableLives Diabetes Program at Holy Family Hospital is pleased to announce that they have successfully implanted two more insulin infusion pumps on Jan. 16, bringing the total to five Illinois residents now having the implantable pump. These patients are part of the research study being done at Holy Family, to have the implantable infusion pump approved by the FDA.

Paul Zager is a 37-year-old Lutheran Minister at St. Timothy's Church in Lombard. Paul has had diabetes since age 6 and had been wearing an external insulin infusion pump prior to the recent surgery. Paul has 4 children and has been married 14 years.

Tom Schenfeld is a 27-year-old Chicago resident who has had diabetes since age 10. Tom is a CPA and has been on the external pump for a year. He works for Goldwell Cosmetics in Addison.

With these implants, the StableLives Diabetes program at Holy Family is half-way in completing the target of ten patients for the research program. Free monthly orientations are being held on the infusion pumps to advise participants of the mechanics, operation of, time commitment, and cost of pump therapy. 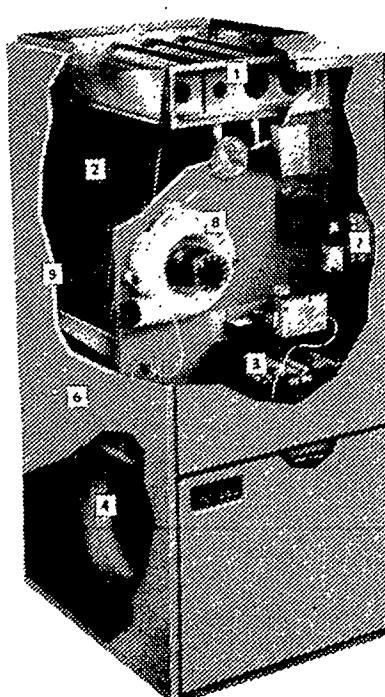

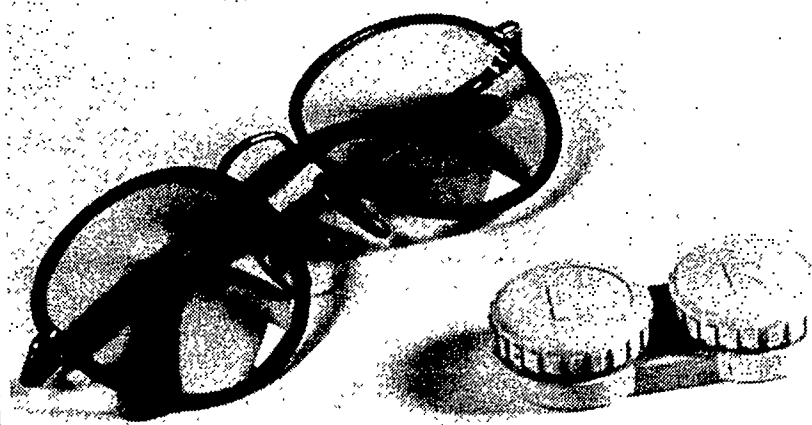

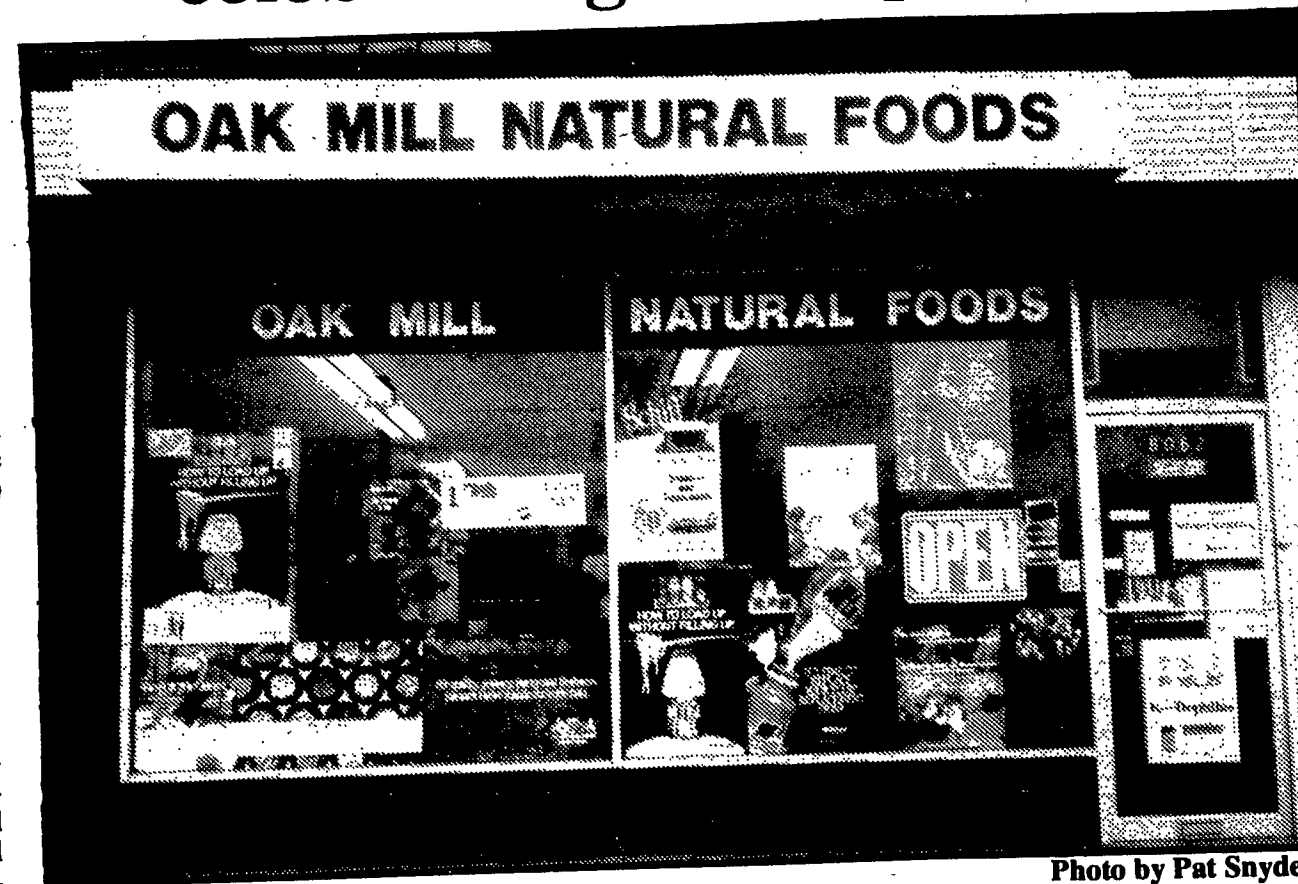

What's the first thing you do when you buy cough syrup? Chances are you rip open the box, pull out the bottle, and throw away the box and instructions.

Not so fast! Information on the box and package insert isn't there just to make layers happy. That information could help you get better faster.

"Among other things, the package tells you if your medicine reacts with food or other medications," said Joe Cramer, a pharmacist with Walgreens. "If you don't pay attention to what you're taking and how, an interaction might give you a stomachache or make your medicine less effective."

Most interactions are fairly minor -- but others are quite serious. Examples of interactions that frequently occur:

•Decreased effects. Calcium in foods or vitamins decreases the

effect of tetracycline, because the two form compounds your body cannot absorb.

•Delayed absorption. Taking an antibiotic on a full stomach slows the medication from getting into your bloodstream. (Your body can't "concentrate" on the medicine -- it has to digest all that food, too.) You should take these medicines 30 minutes before or two hours after meals.

•Increased effects. Drinking alcohol while taking drugs that cause drowsiness -- such as non-prescription antihistamines -- will increase your sleepiness.

Packaging tells you about side effects, too. For example, ibuprofen (Advil, Nuprin, Motrin) can upset your stomach unless you take it with food or a full eight ounces of water.

Doctors increase or decrease prescription dosages depending on what you tell them.

Control cavities with cheese

Forget the old adage about an apple being "nature's toothbrush." While the nutrients in an apple make it a healthy snack, research shows apples have no special benefit to your teeth.

Instead, wind up your meal with a piece of cheese, which studies show reduces your chance of developing cavities.

In experiments conducted in England and in the United States at the National Institute of Dental Research, scientists found that consuming a one-half ounce piece of cheese increases saliva production, which neutralizes acids formed in the mouth while eating. These acids break down tooth enamel, allowing a bacteria to enter the tooth and eventually form a cavity. Eating cheese also exposes tooth enamel directly to calcium, thereby helping prevent cavities. It's especially effective

if consumed immediately after other foods.

As the American Dental Association marks its annual National Children's Dental Health Month in February, nutrition experts at the Dairy Council of Wisconsin remind you that cheese and other dairy products also are an excellent source of calcium, which is so important in children's diets for developing and maintaining healthy teeth. Milk also is fortified with vitamin D, which helps their bodies put that calcium to use.

Dairy Council of Wisconsin (DCW) is a non-profit nutrition education and marketing association whose work in Wisconsin, northern Illinois and northwestern Indiana is made possible through funds provided by dairy farmers.

Spinal exams a requisite of health care

New procedure for colon surgery

A new surgical technique being used at Lutheran General Hospital (LGH), 1775 Dempster Street, significantly reduces the amount of pain and recovery time for a patient who requires colon resection, the removal of part of the colon. Using the laparoscope, a small telescopic device, patients go home 4 days after surgery and return to normal, non-strenuous activity 7 days after surgery.

Surgeons at the hospital have been one of the first in the area and, in some instances, first in the country to perform certain types of surgery using the laparoscope. This procedure for colon resection joins the growing list of those which are performed at the hospital with the laparoscope including gallbladder, hernia repair, in-

ferility treatments, appendectomy and removal of stones from the common bile duct.

Colon resection is required when cancer is found in the colon, and for some stages of diverticulitis, twisted blood vessels, ulcerated colitis, large bowel obstruction and inflammatory bowel disease.

To perform this procedure, instruments are inserted into the abdomen through small incisions and surgeons work from a television monitor to perform surgery. Small incisions help prevent scarring and reduce the chance of wound infection.

The first colon resection using the laparoscope at LGH was performed in mid July.

'The World of our Fathers' lecture series at Kol Emeth

On Thursday, Feb. 6, at 8 p.m., an overflow crowd, estimated at 350 people, listened in rapt attention at Congregation Kol Emeth, Skokie, as Barry Schechter began his 6-part lecture series "The World of our Fathers Before Ellis Island" - The Story of our Jewish Origins in Eastern Europe. The crowd was so large that the social hall at the back of the sanctuary had to be opened to accommodate the extra people.

The audience responded warmly to this account of their ancestors' lives. Schechter pointed out that the overwhelming majority of Jewish people in Chicago hail from Russia, Poland and other parts of Eastern Europe, and came over to the U.S. in the great migrations of 1880-1929.

The first lecture summarized the history of Jewish people in Eastern Europe through nearly a thousand years, and traced the bewildering changes in political boundaries, and the ups and downs in the fortunes of Jewish people there throughout the period. The audience clearly identified with the subject, showing concern at the description of the difficult times experienced by their ancestors, but also laughing at the humor that sustained their ancestors through those times. The lecture was followed by a lively question-and-answer session.

Schechter, in addition to being Cantor of Congregation Kol Emeth, is a familiar and popular lecturer in the area. A graduate of Cambridge University and Gateshead Talmudical Academy in his native England, he also did graduate work at Essex University and Northwestern University. He speaks 7 languages, including Yiddish, Russian and Polish, and is an authority on Eastern European Jewish history. He has lectured on Yiddish at the University of Chicago, and

been a professor at Oakton Community College and North Central College. Schechter has appeared on WBBM, WBEZ and WGN radio and WMAQ TV, and published widely, including the much-acclaimed "The Day My Father Escaped from the Nazis" in the "Washington Post."

Other lectures in the series are on Thursday evenings, through March 12, beginning at 8 p.m. Congregation Kol Emeth is located at 5130 West Touhy Avenue in Skokie, 1 1/2 blocks west of the Touhy Avenue exit off Edens Expressway.

gan Road, Morton Grove. Niles police arrived to arrest his female companion, 21, when she left the appliance store. After the pair were taken to the Niles station, a search uncovered \$800 stuffed inside the male's trousers.

The couple, Chicagoans, apparently used charge card receipt carbons to get credit identification information, then gained additional credit cards by claiming a change of address; they charged numerous items before the card owner knew of the fraud; they used the cards to open check accounts, then wrote checks on them from deposits from bogus accounts.

Over \$4,400 was scammed from one account; a \$2,000 cash advance was obtained from another card.

Investigation determined the two allegedly were involved in several cases of deceptive practices, including six instances in Niles, two in Morton Grove, one in Chicago and one in Arlington Heights.

When it was determined the U.S. Postal Service had been interested in the case for several months, it was turned over to them so it could be prosecuted through the federal court system.
