Washington School staff seek retention of librarian

A petition asking for retention of a second-year nontenured librarian from Washington Elementary School was signed by 24 staff members of the school and presented Tuesday at a regular board meeting of East Maine Elementary School District 63.

Linda Zolt was notified at a February board meeting that she is to leave the district by the end of the school year.

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Eldon Gleichman said a first-year nontenured teacher may be dismissed without reason, but a second-year nontenured teacher must be given a reason.

He would not comment further. Zolt, although present at the meeting, said, "I'm not ready to say anything at this point."

She did note reasons for her dismissal, as given by the district, are not satisfactory.

The board's actions are being brought to the attention of other channels such as the teachers' union and parents, according to a friend of Zolt's.

Is the Niles Park District throwing the Niles Baseball League a curve ball? The district's Board of Commissioners wants to charge the all-volunteer baseball organization a yearly fee—around \$1,500—for use of the 11 district playing fields. The board can show it spends \$17,189 annually to maintain the fields.

But League official Steve Vitale said March 4 the League donates about \$1,000 annually to the district on their own and besides, the district doesn't need the money. Just recently, the League donated padding for Jozwiak Park light poles to protect the players.

But Interim Park Director Tracy Taylor can itemize the maintenance bill. The \$17,189 price includes the cost of infield mix, 20 tons of field maintenance materi-

als, the rental of a grader for two days, labor costs for dragging the fields daily and light bulb maintenance.

She explained, with the threat of a property tax cap hanging over the district, commissioners are looking for ways to keep costs down by having users pay the direct costs.

March 8 Commissioner Elaine Heinen, who heads the Park Board's Parks and Grounds Committee, said "I understand where they're coming from," but noted in the uproar that followed a tax increase not long ago, residents urged commissioners to make users pay for park facilities. She said users pay at Tam Golf Course, the ice rink and other recreational fees have gone up.

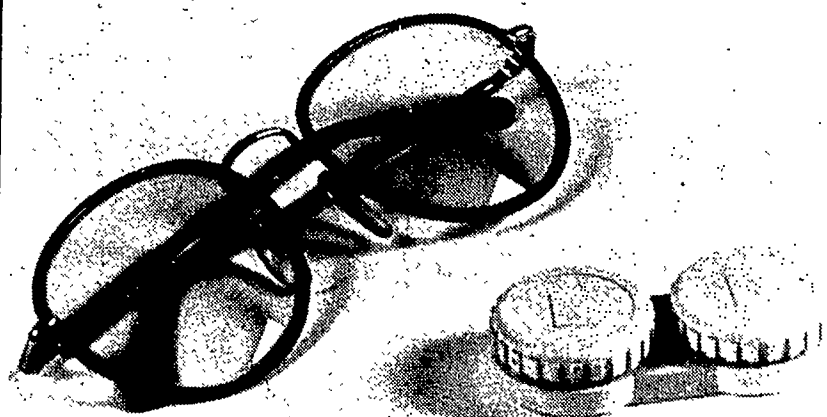

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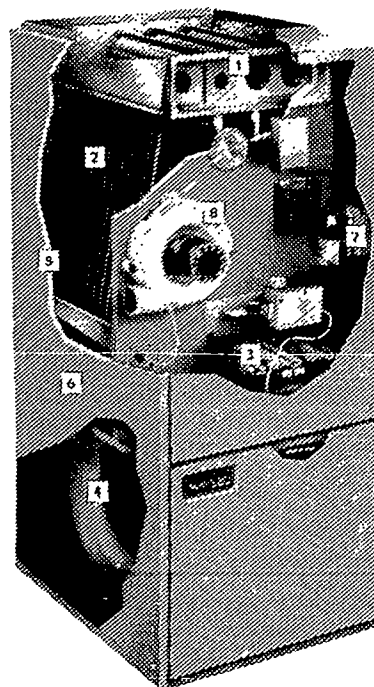

Health News

Most serious illnesses caused by negligence

Americans were criticized today for not taking better care of their health by doctor of chiropractic.

Dr. Robert L. Richart, of the Richart Chiropractic Clinic, said, "We have excellent health practitioners in America. We know the rules for maintaining good health. Yet we neglect our bodies."

According to Dr. Richart, "the secret of a vigorous old age lies in the practice of a prevention program."

"We have our cars checked at regular intervals to insure their smooth running, but we don't seem to have the time or desire to have our bodies checked to avoid illness. Most people take their health for granted," the chiropractic doctor asserted, "and don't become concerned until it's too late. Non-emergency calls problem for paramedics

Most residents are aware of the fact that the Niles Fire Department Paramedics provide emergency service to the community, whether the incident occurs in the home, in a public building, industrial commercial establishments or the streets.

Two Mobile Intensive Care Units are staffed and available to administer life-saving treatment in the most critical, life-threatening emergencies. In order to best meet the community's needs, the units must be as readily available as possible. This does require judicious management of the program to assure that this goal is met. Niles residents are reminded that emergency medical service is intended to convey those in immediate need of aid and transportation to a hospital for medical treatment.

However, according to Fire Chief Kinowski, the paramedics are responding to an ever-increasing work load, which are not true medical emergencies. And while they are tied up assisting those who could otherwise seek medical treatment for minor injuries and ailments on their own, they are not available for those who really need them.

In order to keep our units available for emergencies, we must decline calls made for non-emergency purposes such as, a direct admission to the hospital, or transportation to a doctor's office for routine health care. Such service in most cases can be provided by private ambulance and are covered by health care carriers. Such service could severely inhibit our ability to serve those in need of aid.

A further restriction exists on the distance which we may travel in a timely manner and still give good service to the community we serve. Niles Paramedics are required to transport to the closest hospital, which can best serve the needs of the patient. Citizens should also be aware that the patients condition and travel time to the hospital are the guiding criterion made in concert with medical

supervision. Our units are part of a paramedic system and operate under the direct supervision of a doctor in radio contact from the emergency room, they will be directed to the nearest facility as directed by the patient's condition and need for immediate care by a doctor. (Under less severe conditions patients requests may be considered, but only within jurisdiction of department policies.)

Niles Fire Department personnel are firefighter/paramedics, which means they provide both services. When the ambulances are assigned to a incident this lowers the number of firefighters available to answer fire alarms. When ambulances are tied up on non-emergency medical assistance calls, someone in the community must wait a longer time for a mutual aid ambulance to arrive.

After all, how would you feel if one of your loved ones was struggling for life, but had to wait additional minutes while the nearest ambulance was tied up on a non-emergency call.

Waukegan Road to receive new surface

Nearly one mile of Waukegan Road from Milwaukee Ave. to Oakton St., in Niles, will be resurfaced, beginning April 15, announced State Rep. Ralph C. Capparelli (D-13th). Cost of the project is \$195,844.75, and is funded by the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT).

The project will include removing three inches of bituminous surface, patching the base where needed, replacing the removed material with 1.5 inches of partly recycled asphalt/cement mixture to absorb truck traffic, and then completing the road rebuilding by applying another 1.5 inches of new asphalt surface. Also included will be some curb and gutter removal and replacement, along with some drainage reconstruction and repair.

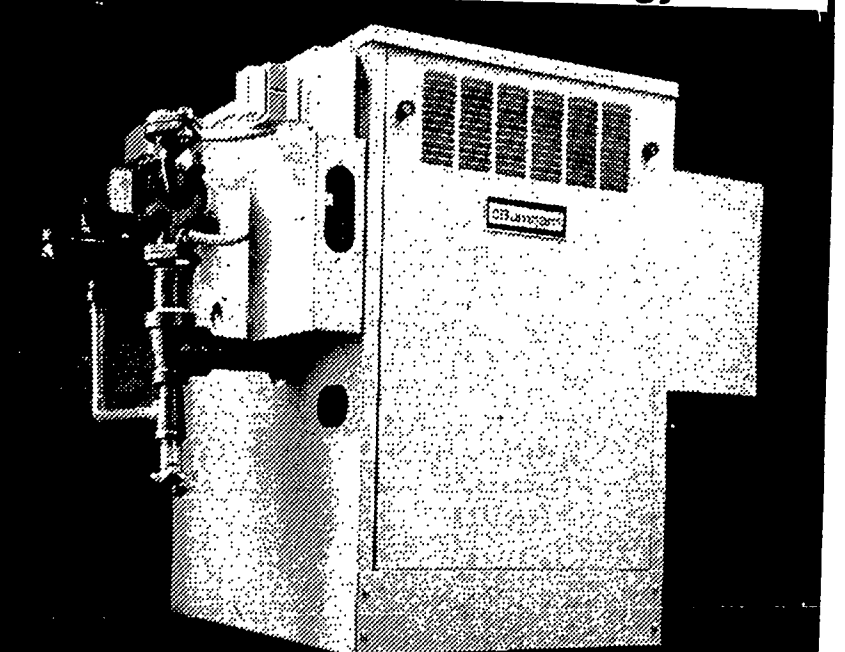

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With a couple of tubes of caulk costing about \$3 each, you can seal your home against the sort of air infiltration that wastes energy dollars. The object here is to stop air infiltration before it reaches the insulation buffer.

By far the worst cold-air offenders are mechanical openings - those that pass plumbing, ventilation and electrical lines through exterior walls.

Gas lines, phone cables, dryer vents and air conditioner refrigeration lines are among the biggest offenders, but exterior light fixtures and receptacles are also troublesome.

In addition, joints allow cold air into the insulation space. In fact, it's not uncommon for exterior caulks to fail before the house paint does, especially on heavily painted, older surfaces.

As for which caulk to buy, choose one that is able to flex with the seasonal shifts of your home, such as a siliconized acrylic caulk.

When it comes to applying caulk, resist the temptation to smooth every joint with your finger. A smoothed 45-degree joint will produce thin edges, which will be the first to lose their grip on the caulked surface. Instead, cut the applicator tip at a 30-degree angle and let the tube form the caulk in a neat, uniformly thick bead. This type of bead will last longer and is sufficiently inconspicuous when painted.

Start your project with a careful inspection of your home's exterior. Look for existing caulk that's cracked and any obvious service openings, especially those made by utility companies.

For example, if your telephone company has recently added a line, and has drilled through an exterior wall, there's a good chance the opening will be larger than the cable and it will be unsealed.

Especially troublesome will be any flat-surface fixture or vent that spans lapped or grooved siding. Light fixtures and dryer vents often leak badly in these instances. As for lap siding, it's possible to splice a plastic or wooden adapter between the fixture and lap.

When replacing cracked or separated existing caulk from siding seams, first cut away old caulk with a carpet knife. Its curved, hook-like blade, lets you slice into the joint from both directions, lifting much of the bead intact.

Scrape out any waste that remains in the area. In the case of older wooden siding, the paint that supports the caulk will lift off, too. Before caulking a new bead, it's best to paint the joint with a high-quality exterior primer, which offers better adhesion than topcoat paint.

After allowing the primed areas to dry at least a day, recaulk the seam with a flexible, exterior-grade caulk. Resist the temptation to smooth out the joint. When the caulk has set long enough for it to skin over, in roughly 30 minutes, paint the joint, caulk and all.

Tougher penalties needed for gang-related crimes

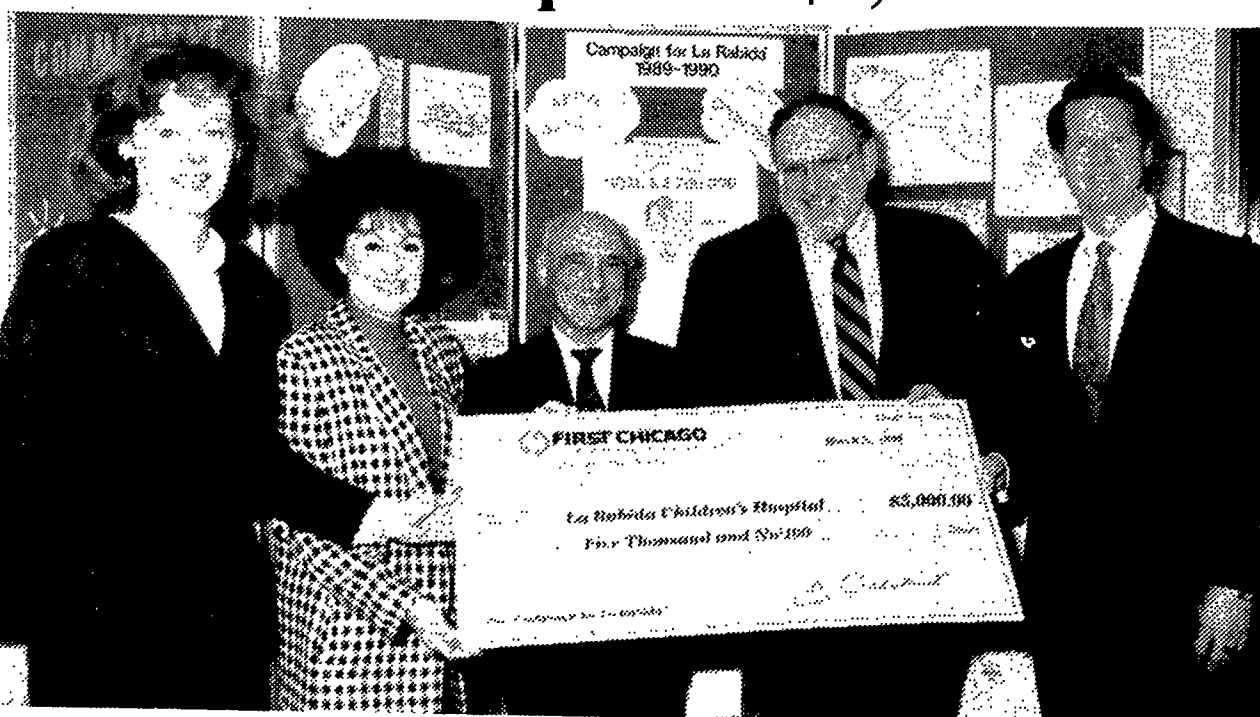
Terry O'Connor said he supports a House bill to ensure that violators of weapons offenses receive stiff penalties upon conviction.

Hynes calls for tax, spending caps

Cook County Assessor Thomas C. Hynes said he is urging the Illinois General Assembly to extend the recently passed property tax caps to Cook County.

Senior PAC endorses Rostenkowski

The National Council of Senior Citizens' Political Action Committee (PAC) has endorsed Congressman Dan Rostenkowski (D-5th) for reelection. Last month, President Bush proposed a \$3 billion increase in Medicare premiums. Rostenkowski promptly wrote a letter to the President promising that when the proposal came before his committee, it would be "dead on arrival."

"We have to be vigilant," Rostenkowski told the assembled senior citizens. "There will be more assaults upon Medicare and Social Security, but I will be ready, as usual."

Don't tack election posters on utility poles, Edison asks

With the March 17 primary election campaign entering the home stretch, Commonwealth Edison makes the following appeal to all candidates and their supporters, regardless of party: please don't tack posters, notices or the like on utility poles. The same plea is addressed year-round to people who want to promote garage sales or reach the public for any other reason.

Anything tacked on utility poles can cause trouble for the line crews. Too often, utility workers suffer cuts and gashes from encounters with nails and tacks used to affix the posters. The hardware lurks, awaiting a chance encounter with an unsuspecting overhead electrician's hands or legs on a dark, stormy night when he or she is restoring power to homes and businesses.

Although utility crew members carefully inspect each pole before climbing, it's easy to miss a nail or tack in the dark of night. Climbing spikes need the soft wood of a utility pole to be effective, but nails and tacks defeat them, often causing the wearer to slip and suffer injury. This can delay the restoration of service.

So please, Mr. and Ms. Campaign Worker: do your best to get out the vote, but don't tack anything on a utility pole.

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State Rep. Capparelli honored by National Taxpayers group



State Rep. Ralph C. Dudycz said, "A good business climate is crucial to a healthy economy and the creation of jobs."

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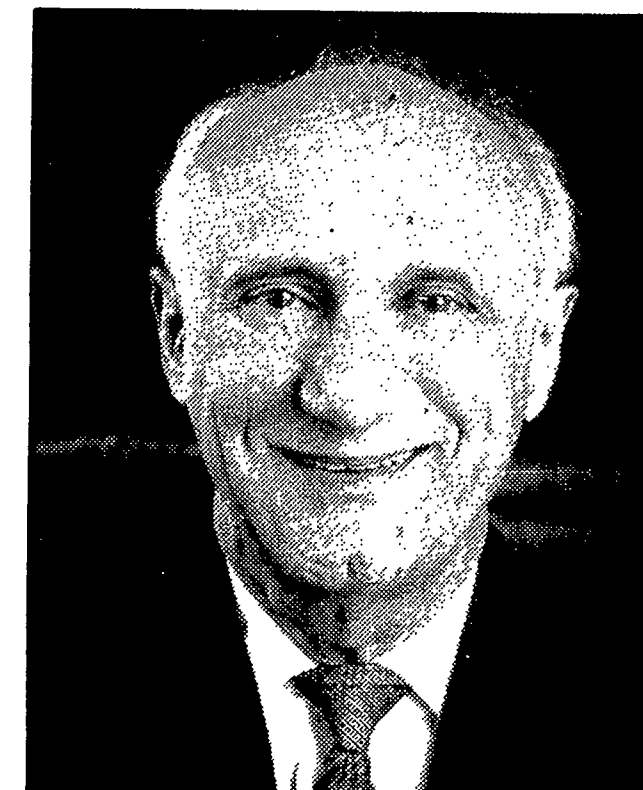
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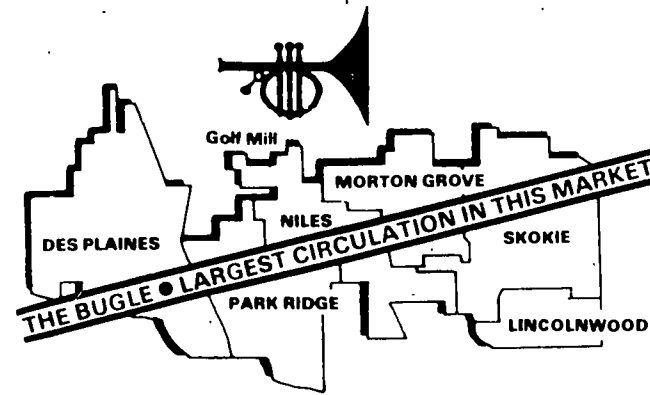
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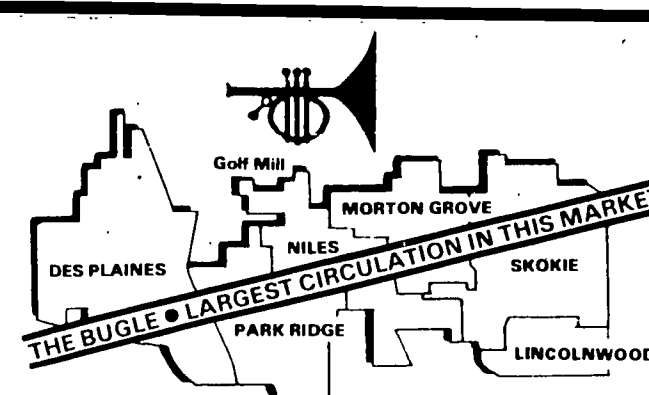

ize the money is not going very far."

Complying with Americans with Disabilities Act requirements in the parks and at the Recreation Center alone will cost the District \$19,000, she noted, adding, "My feeling is, we've got to start somewhere. When the five percent cap is on...it will cut us really bad in the park district." She said if the league's membership drops, it will not be pressured to pay the full \$1,500.

According to League Commissioner Tim Posedel, 427 kids, from seven to 17 years of age are involved in League teams. The League organization finds sponsors and team managers; schedules umpires and photo sessions; inventories and repairs equipment; organizes tournaments, Thillen stadium trips and fundraisers.

"We've gone 38 years without a charge...it's not like we're the only ones who use the fields...We'll have to pass the cost onto the kids," Posedel said.

John Jekot, park district athletic and facility supervisor, said the park district has 144 kids enrolled in T-ball. Thirty girls are registered for Girls' 11-inch softball. There are 20 teams in men's 16-inch softball; 12 teams in women's 12-inch softball and six teams in men's 12-inch softball.

ings of \$45,000 per year in air conditioning costs," according to Donald Kenney, assistant superintendent for business. The district will also receive a \$26,200 cash incentive from Northern Illinois Gas when the new air conditioning equipment, a by product of the cogeneration project, is installed.

"Once the installation costs are paid back, the district will have half a million dollars a year that can go toward the education of the young people of Maine Township instead of energy costs," said Kenney.

Cogeneration plans are still

pending for Maine East and Maine West. Kenney is recommending that once the system is installed at South, the district monitor the project for about six months to determine if estimated savings have been accurate and then move on to the other two schools.

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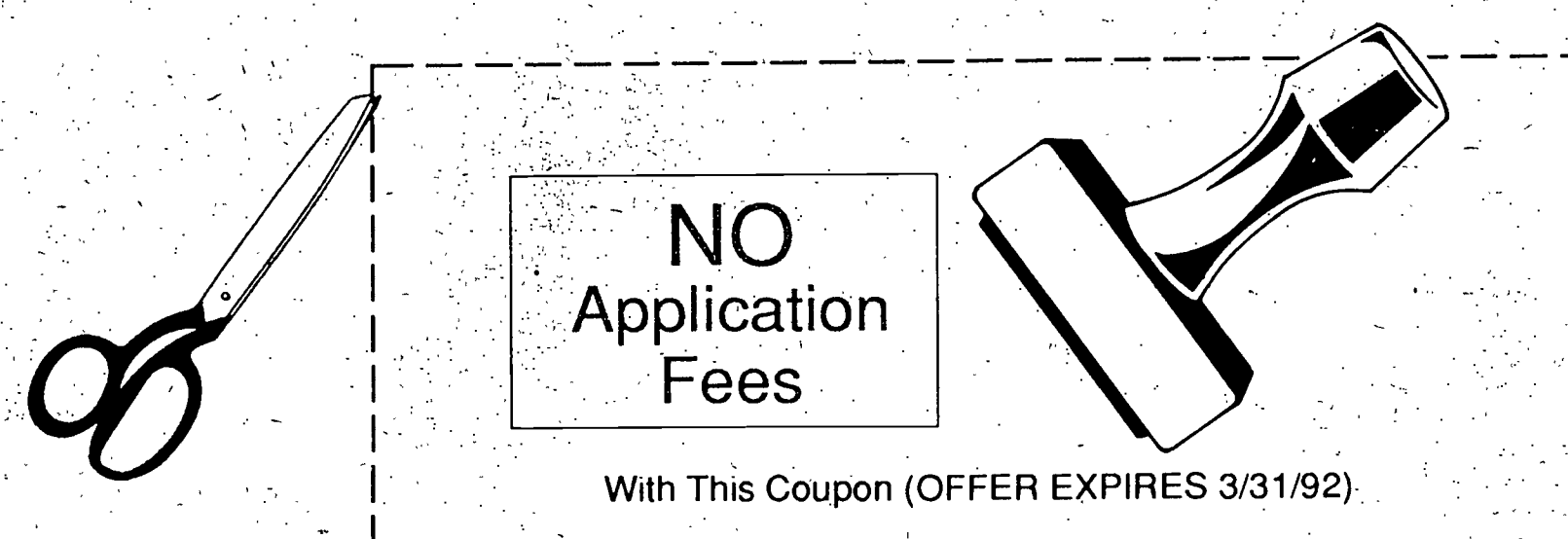
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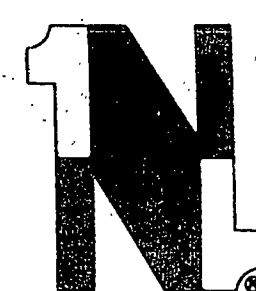
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
