Zoners balk at more parking lot variations at Sportmart Plaza

Niles Zoning Board on April 6 balked at giving more parking variations to Sportmart Plaza, Harlem Avenue and Dempster Street. Two board members came down hard on Jim Conroy, construction director for the plaza

builders, H-C Developers. Commissioner Angelo Troiani called Conroy's description of variable peak parking times in the plaza "double talk." He recalled parking credits given the builder two years ago for an outlot build-

ing at the northeast corner of the plaza and said "I'm afraid if we keep doing it we'll have to rewrite the (code) book. Parking is tough but we've got successful shopping centers. You're short like

Fundraiser to support camp for youthful burn victims

Local kids check out firefighting equipment and youthful burn victims will benefit from area fire department efforts April 12. Niles, Morton Grove, North Maine and Glenbrook firefighters are distributing fire safety and burn prevention flyers with coupons redeemable at local Burger King restaurants this Sunday between noon and 4 p.m. Firefighters will also be on hand to talk about the equipment on display in the restaurant lots.

A percentage of store proceeds in this period, above the usual

amount, will go to the Illinois Fire Safety Alliance to support a summer camp for youthful burn victims in Ingleside, Illinois, near Fox Lake. The local fire departments are among those in the Alliance who sponsor the youths for a week-long stay at the YMCA Camp Duncan, in Ingleside.

Last year, 45 area burn victims attended the camp located .55 miles northwest of Chicago, said Chief Ed Cavello of the Mount Prospect Fire Department, director of the Alliance.

If funds are available, the

group plans to expand the camp's scope and also include burn victims from Indiana, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Missouri, in addition to Illinois, he said.

Local Burger King restaurants participating include those at 7133 Dempster St., Niles and 9850 Milwaukee Ave., Des Plaines.

Members from the private sector and the Loyola University and University of Illinois hospitals, along with state fire services, make up the Illinois Fire Safety Alliance.

Says he would recommend village take over parks if voters approve referendum

Blase would bring parks under village

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase said on Monday he would recommend to the Niles Village Board that it absorb the Niles Park District, if a citizens' referendum was approved to dissolve the park district.

In a written statement Blase said, "The advantage of having the Village of Niles run local Park District affairs is simple. And it all has to do with money."

Blase noted that the future of park facilities, such as the ice rink, have been jeopardized by constant money problems at the park district.

Closing facilities, said Blase, would be to "go backwards....If the expenditure involved in repairing the rink is extensive, then this could well take away from

other programs that are necessary for Park Recreation programs."

Additionally, Blase said a village-run park district would not have to rely exclusively on property taxes for money. "The Village of Niles Government, because of the variety of ways that it can raise money, is in a better position to fully fund recreation pro-

grams in this community than is the Park District which has to rely almost entirely on the Real Estate Property Tax."

In another development, the Illinois Association of Park Districts, an organization represent-

Niles Park District Easter Egg Hunt

The Niles Park District Easter Egg Hunt on Saturday, April 11 will be restructured this spring to accommodate suggestions made by the previous years participants.

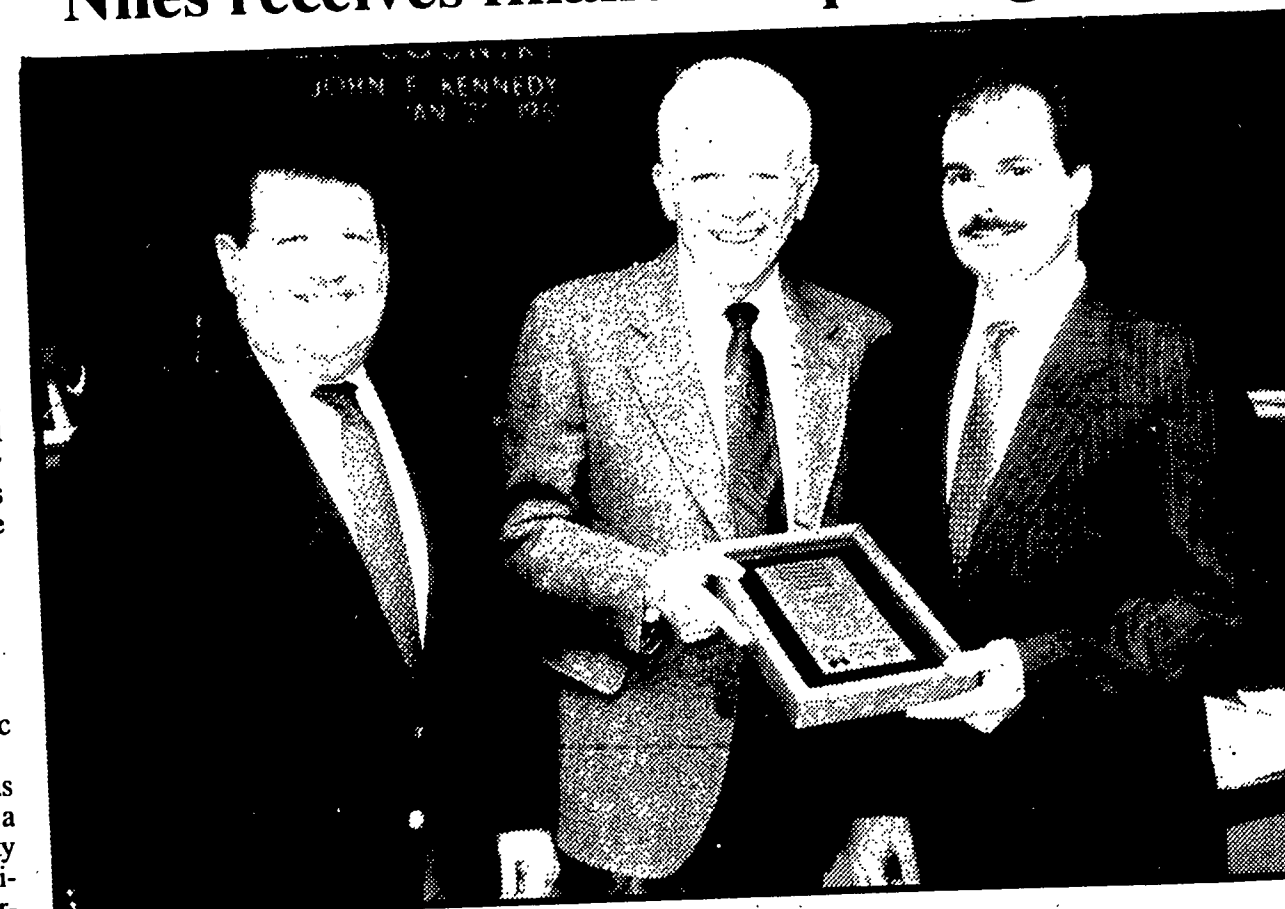
nications and marketing/public relations.

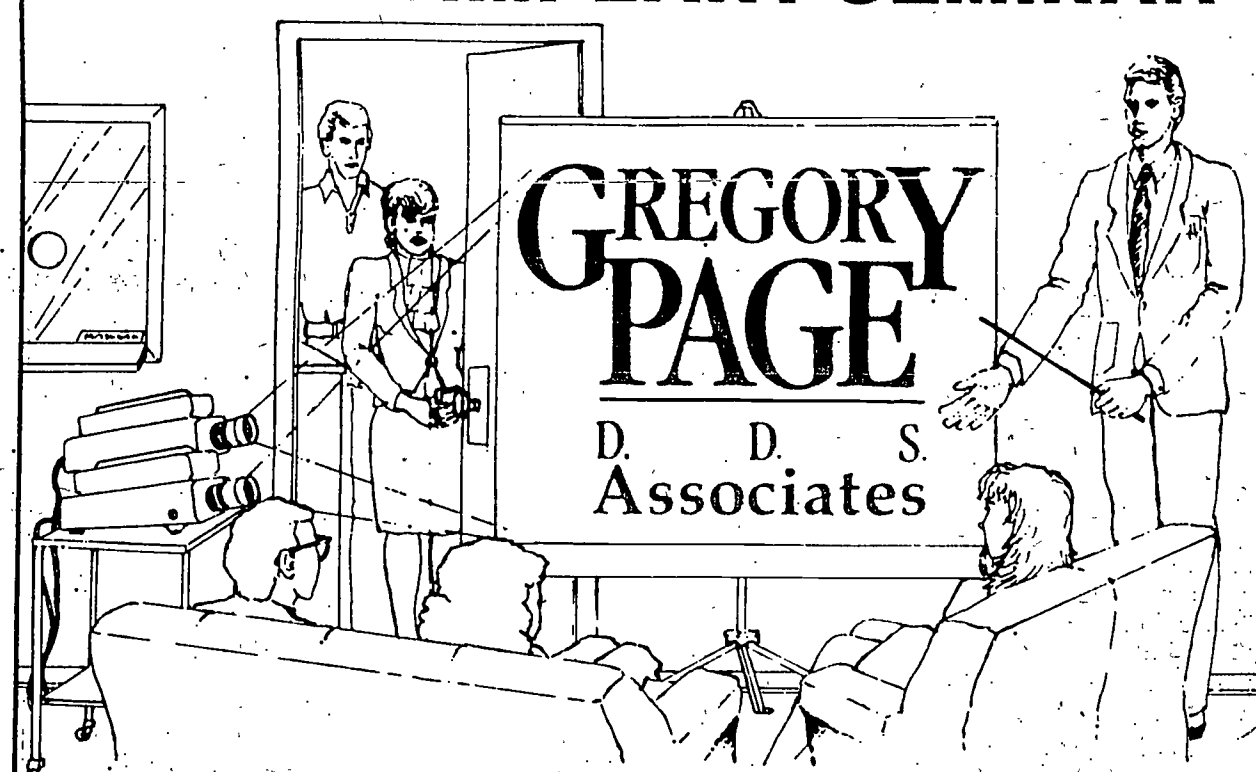

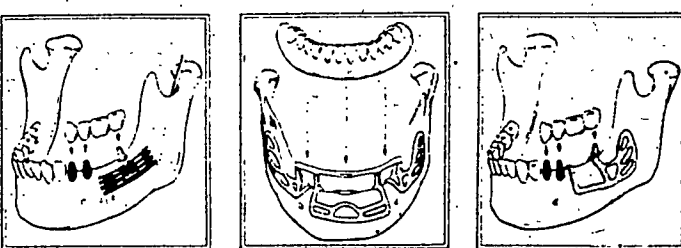

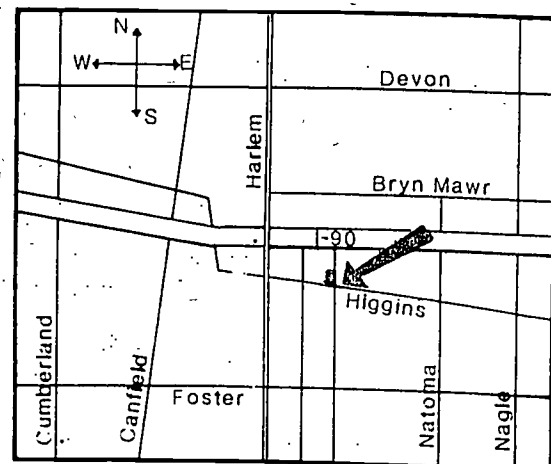

Mayor comments on efforts to dissolve park district

To all Niles residents:

I have been asked to comment on the proposed effort to dissolve the Niles Park District and have its functions taken over by the Village of Niles.

I want to point out first that the Village of Niles Government is separate from the Niles Park District Government and the Niles Library Government. All of these bodies are separate taxing bodies which have their own elected Board and run separate from one another.

The present problem involving the Park District has to do with money. It is not a matter of who the people are that serve on the Board, but it is strictly a matter of money. Unfortunately, Park Districts function almost completely on revenues produced by the property tax. Their only other real source of revenue is money they receive from individual programs they provide. As we all know, reliance on the property tax is not favored by the general public. Compounding this problem is the fact that the Park District is limited in the amount of money they can raise by property taxes. This forces them to concern themselves about all recreation programs because they always have to ask, "Can we afford to do this?" For instance, at present there is a question of repairing the ice rink. If the expenditure involved in repairing the rink is extensive, then this could well take away from other programs that are necessary for Park District recreation purposes. Yet, to close the ice rink would be a bad idea. Our ice rink is one of the few around. Ice skating is a great recreation activity and must be preserved if we are to have first-class recreation facilities. We should not go backwards!

Unlike the Park district, the Village of Niles has a great variety at its disposal in terms of ways of raising money. It does not have to rely on the property tax. The Village does not have a limitation on its ability to raise money. The Village of Niles Government is capable of providing the best of services to its residents. Under the circumstances, therefore, I as Mayor, would say to you the residents of the Village of Niles, that if you decide to dissolve the Niles Park District at a property called referendum, I, as Mayor, will recommend to the Village Board of Niles that the Village of Niles assume the responsibility of running all Park District affairs.

The advantage of having the Village of Niles run local Park District affairs is simple. And it all has to do with money. The Village of Niles Government, because of the variety of ways that it can raise money, is in a better position to fully fund recreation programs in this community than is the Park District which has to rely almost entirely on the Real Estate Property Tax.

Again, I repeat, the Park District's inability to raise monies to do all the things necessary to run a first class recreation program is caused not by any failure on the part of the Commissioners of the Park District, but by laws of the State of Illinois which limit the Park District in its ability to raise monies other than by property taxes.

"Officer safety and quick response to 9-1-1" are why Niles Police Chief Ray Giovannelli wants vehicle locator units (VLU) in squad cars.

Giovannelli said on-duty officers routinely report in before making a stop, but those reports can be garbled and lost in radio transmissions.

When a small VLU transmitter is installed in squad cars, police dispatch can quickly pull up the car's location on a computer screen. But having to "dial up" a squad each time precludes the idea of "Big Brother watching," Giovannelli explained.

In case of a 9-1-1 call, dispatch uses the computer screen to find the squad nearest the emergency.

The computer can be programmed to include maps of adjoining communities in case of

"hot pursuit" through several towns. It also records data needed in those cases such as route traveled, distance and rate of speed, Giovannelli said.

For the installation of VLUs in Niles' 13 squad cars, plus the computer and software to go with them, Niles Village Board will have to approve paying the VLU manufacturer, Teletrac, \$16,255, plus \$260 a month for accessing the computer 1,000 times a month. Each access beyond 1,000 costs six cents.

Teletrac representative Stacey Harris noted Rolling Meadows and Oak Lawn police currently use the VLU system and Illinois State Police are planning to.

Jewel food stores and several trucking companies also use VLUs to monitor their fleets, she said.

Board raises fees to curtail deficit

School fees for the 1992-93 school year will increase about \$36 per student in Niles Township High School District 219 in an effort to curtail a potential \$1.2 million deficit.

The action, which was approved by the board of education at its March 16 meeting, was recommended by a districtwide budget task force. The district has also taken action to reduce expenditures in several areas.

Required fees for 1992-93 will increase from \$94 to \$130 to cover textbook rental and materials. In addition, the schools will implement two new fees, including an optional \$40 per year parking

fee and a \$25 fee for drivers education. The fee increases are expected to raise an additional \$138,000 in 1992-93.

Even with the increases, District 219's fees remain comparable to most north shore schools. In Maine Township District 207 and Glenbrook District 225, students must purchase their textbooks for between \$200 and \$230 per year. Textbook rental fees for 1991-92 range from a high of \$150 in District 113 to \$55 in Arlington Heights District 214 and \$20 in Palatine/Schaumburg Township District 211. Districts 214 and 211 charge \$30 and \$40

Ballard may have to be closed legally July 1

Dear Editor:

Legally the Ballard Ice Rink's annual closing must be permanent on July 1, 1992. It will then be unlawful for anyone in the maintaining, servicing or repairing business to vent, release or dispose of refrigerant gas in a manner that permits the substance to enter the environment.

Coopers & Lybrand is not needed to verify known facts, such as taxpayers are not willing to subsidize a loser, and the users of the facilities are not willing to pay the true cost of operations. Therefore, close it.

Park Assoc. objects to village taking over Niles Park District

Dear Editor:

This is in response to the fallacious editorial appearing in The Bugle on Thursday, March 26, entitled, "It's Time For the Village of Niles To Take Over the Niles Park District."

Turning over a park district to a municipality does not make for better parks and recreation. Studies have been done over the last hundred years showing parks, recreation and conservation priorities are better served by a special district.

The park district system began in Illinois in 1869. We currently have 367 park districts, with 2,100 locally elected (nonpartisan elections) park board members, and 42,000 employees. The professionals employed by these agencies have college degrees and backgrounds in the management of parks, recreation and natural resources.

The National Gold Medal Award is the most coveted award given to park and recreation agencies in the United States. Illinois leads the nation in the local delivery of park and recreation services. Park districts in Illinois have won almost twice as many National Gold Medal Awards for local parks and recreation as any other state.

There are fourteen states that have park district systems. We know that, in an overwhelming majority of cases, when parks and recreation become a department of the city, the first thing to get cut is parks and recreation. Mayors, city council members and city managers have to distribute funds to meet all the services of the community, such as police, fire, roads, garbage collection, etc. Parks and recreation is not better off in a city system.

One of the worst fallacies that

you pointed out in your editorial was that the park district should be dissolved and then put under the city government. It is distinctly pointed out in the Illinois Revised Statutes and the Illinois Park District Code, that in a case like the Niles Park District, the park district boundaries are not coterminous with the city boundaries, and, therefore, if the park district were dissolved, the assets would be distributed to the various schools throughout the district -- not the city.

I also think that you really need to question the city. They receive \$5 million in sales taxes, but that certainly is not sufficient funds to operate the ice rink and the multitude of other facilities and services that the park district is currently offering. In addition, how will they meet the future needs of the residents in the community?

Perhaps the city should abate some property taxes for the \$5 million surplus monies derived from sales taxes. Give some relief to the property owners. The schools and city receive the lions share of property taxes. Only five to six percent of local taxes are for parks, recreation and conservation.

It is our understanding that the park district board is currently in the process of hiring a topnotch professional as their director. I hope that you will give the new director an opportunity to reorganize the district and develop a strategic plan for the future.

The 1990's will be the decade that sees the consolidation of park (and library) districts with their local villages. There simply will not be enough money to support these independent districts.

The death-knell for these independent taxing districts will be the demand by residents for caps on property tax; the only source for revenues for parks.

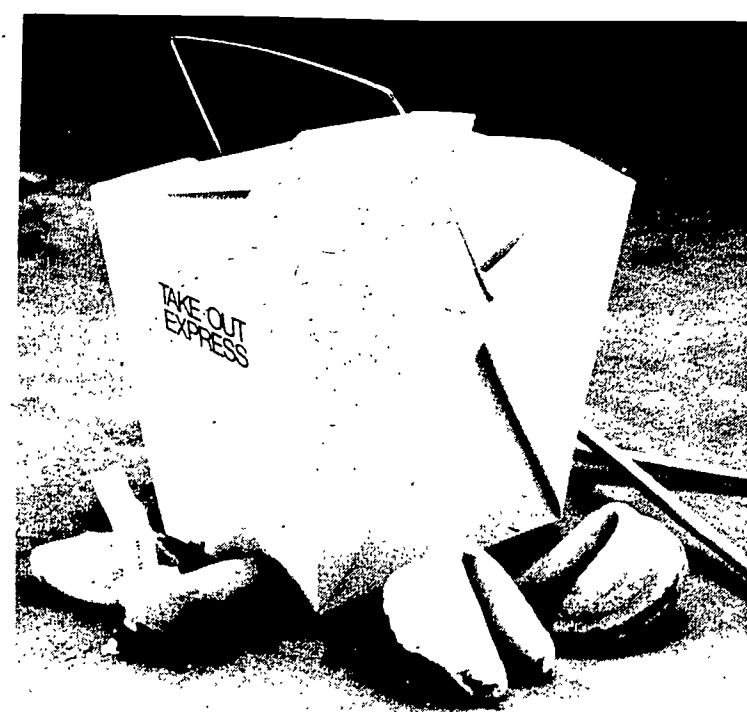
If the Illinois Association of Park Districts wants to make a meaningful contribution during this consolidation, it might want to find ways to maintain excellent park services within the framework of village governments.

Additionally, Mr. Flickinger, you understand the board is in the process of hiring a "topnotch" new park director.

This none-too-smart move will result in over \$10,000 of taxpayer monies being spent on a search firm followed by probably an \$8,000 increase in what was being paid the previous director.

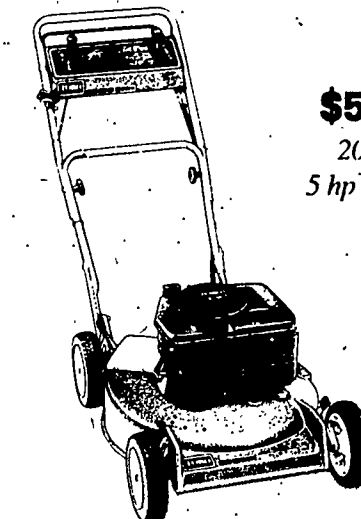

Homeowners bush broken off



Baby facts & fancies

Did you know that during the first month after birth babies may sleep up to 23 hours per day? At the age of 18 months, most babies need about 14 hours of sleep daily.

During these first months, babies also develop important motor skills. At five to six months baby can probably sit erect if propped up. At six to seven months baby may be able to shift objects from hand to hand. When baby is nine to ten months he or she may begin to creep and crawl. At a year old, most babies can stand briefly.

Then keep a list, and whoever guesses the closest to the actual number spotted, wins the game. To add a different twist, take along a map of the United States, and have the children color in the state as they spot the tag.

•The House Game - each person takes turns giving an example of a house, i.e., a barn is a house for a cow, a lake is a house for a fish, a glove is a house for a hand, etc. Scorekeeping is optional, but if you keep score, an extra point is given if the example rhymes with the one just given, i.e., a bee hive is a house for a bee, a dog is a house for a flea. If anyone goes out of turn, they lose a point. If anyone gives an example already used, they're out of the game or, if keeping score, they lose a point.

Paternity Summons seems anti-father?

The pre-printed Paternity Summons used in the Circuit Court of Cook County is often the first thing many men see when paternity cases are brought against them in court. Yet, the summons appears sexist in that it threatens a remedy against only one gender, namely, the male gender.

Therefore, I can not use this summons in its present form if I am initiating a paternity case as attorney for a man who wants to establish paternity and visitation (or custody). The summons would have to be modified, especially the provision that states, "You may have to pay the pregnancy costs of the mother." It would possibly seem confusing or unusual to have a mother served with a paternity complaint accompanied by a Paternity Summons threatening her with the payment of her own pregnancy costs.

A further reading of the summons reveals the following additional language, "If you do not appear as instructed in this summons you may be required to support the child named in this petition until the child is at least 18 years old." This language would also appear odd during the mother's reading of it if the father was only seeking visitation and wanted to pay child support to the mother.

This summons is a good example of why some distraught fathers believe our system is sexist and will not afford them equal and fair protection.

Many fathers want gender bias eliminated, and want their roles as nurturing parents accepted and supported. Many men believe society and the legal system place minimal importance on their roles in parenting. However, failure to eliminate gender bias and recognize the importance of paternal parenting can cause conflict and endanger cooperative parenting.

Let's take a step forward and try and eliminate all gender bias, even if an example of it seems minor, it is still wrong.

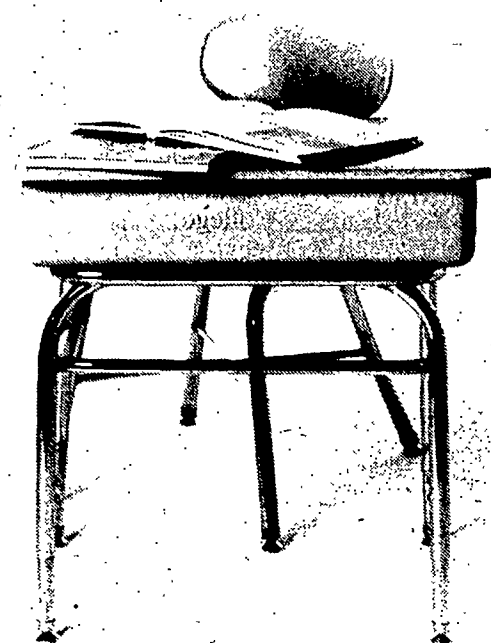

Without any budgetary chang-
es, District 219 would expect a
potential \$1.2 million deficit in
1992-93, and a potential \$4.7

the one-year legislative freeze on
the equalized assessed valuation,
which will cost the district about
\$1 million in revenues for the
1992-93 school year. In addition,
health insurance costs have in-
creased more than 35 percent in
1992 and state and federal grants
have decreased.

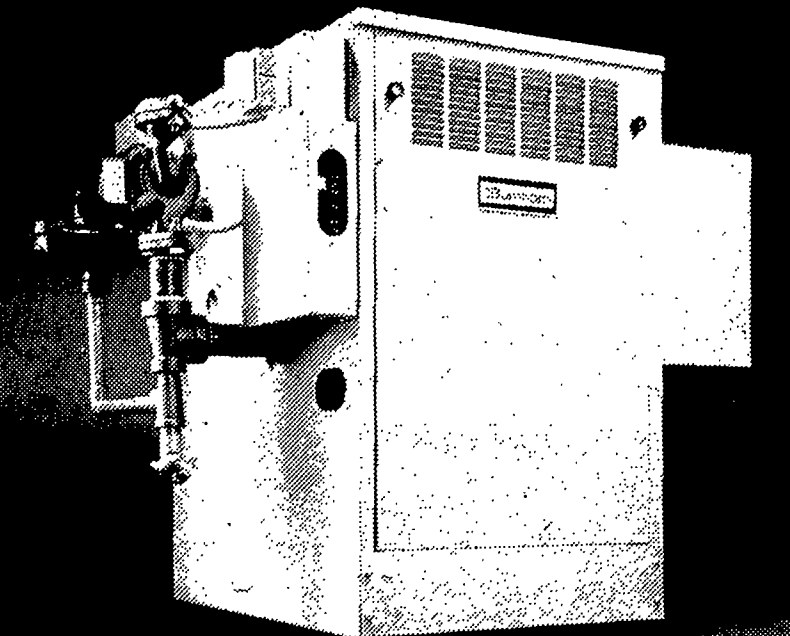

A retail store in the outlet building would call for fewer parking spaces than a restaurant, but Conroy said leasing to a restaurant is the only viable alternative in a flat real estate market. Tax form for late filing

Procrastinators, take heart. A special tax form can be of great help in the eleventh hour of the income tax filing season, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

To get an automatic four-month extension of time to file your 1040 or 1040A, fill out and mail in Form 4868 by the regular April 15 tax deadline.

Filing the extension form does not give you extra time for paying taxes owed, the IRS emphasizes. Payment for any amount due must be included with the extension form.

According to the IRS, you will owe interest on any taxes paid after April 15. In some cases, a late payment penalty may also be due. By accurately filling out Form 4868 and mailing it by the deadline, you will get out of the much larger late filing penalty. This penalty can amount to as much as 25 percent of the unpaid tax, the IRS says.

You can order the extension form by calling the IRS toll-free at 1-800-TAX-FORM (829-3676). For more details on the extension form, call Tele-Tax, the IRS' automated system of prerecorded tax information. Dial 1-800-829-4477 and request tape number 457. Tele-Tax is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

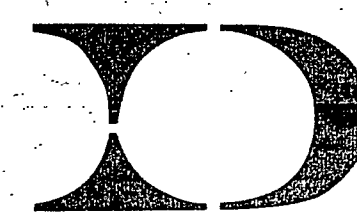
