





The action came because the Village has sufficient funds to service debts on Water and Lawrencewood TIF bonds.

At Trustee Bart Murphy's motion, the Board authorized the execution of a \$952,000 promissory note for fire station renovation.



The new dental scan unit, the Planmeca-PM 2002 CC, takes views of the mandible and sinuses. It also allows evaluation of temporomandibular joint dys-function (T.M.J.), tumors of the jaw, abscesses, sinus infection and sinus tumors. "Seniors registered for the Senior Citizen Exemption automatically qualify for the Homeowner Exemption," Hynes said. "They don't have to apply for the Homeowner Exemption. But they'll benefit from both, saving substantially on their property tax-

The general Homeowner Exemption can save hundreds of dollars on a homeowner's real estate bills, the exact amount depending on the local tax rate. The Senior Exemption can save homeowners 65 and over even

Both exemptions reduce the taxable value of a person's home. They are not cash rebates, but are deductions off secondnstallment bills that come out in the summer.

Properties that qualify are single-family homes, townhomes, condominiums, co-operatives, and apartment buildings up to six units. The current or previous owner must have lived on the property as a principal residence as of January 1, 1991.


