





Establishing trees on a lot is an important step, and landscaping professionals suggest buying the largest trees possible. However, there is another factor even more faster the trees grow, the sooner

or stunt young trees because of some common mistakes. Lack of water is the biggest danger. It takes a new tree up to three years to develop roots to make up for those lost in transplanting. During that time, they are vulnerable

Moreover, when first transplanted, trees have so few roots that they may not even be able to take up all the water available. If new trees wilt badly, prune some of the top branches to balance the loss of roots. Shower the foliage until wilting stops. To water the roots, make a doughnutlike depression a few inches deep 2 to 3 feet from the trunk so water will not run off. Not long ago, a dishlike depression extending the same distance around the tree was considered ideal. But the doughnut works better because it prevents puddling around the trunk, where water could cause rot.

Water deeply - as much as 5 gallons for a 3- to 4-foot tree - each week that there is less than 1 inch

Wrapping and staking is sometimes required by nurseries i their guarantee is to be honored. Wrapping the lower trunk with tree wrap or heavy paper will prevent sunburn until the canopy of leaves grows enough to shade the power tools, such as lawn mowers and trimmers. Use masking tape, and leave the wrap in place. It will eventually rot off.

Staking was, until recently, a rule without exception. New research, however, has shown that some sway is necessary for trees to develop strength and resilience. Too much swaying will keep the roots constantly under tling and spreading. So, use the minimum staking necessary, perstrength, and take out stakes

dling. This often happens to new trees that come with a wire label loosely attached. As the tree grows, the trunk or branch grows wire is embedded in the bark.

Girdling can kill a tree quicker than any type of injury because it can entirely cut off the flow of nutrients and water to the branches farther up the tree. To avoid girdling, remove anything that could ever bind. Run guy wires through pieces of hose, and remove them as soon as they are no longer needed. When possible, tie branches with soft string or pieces of nylon hose that will stretch

or break before they bind. Nicks and injuries from power tools probably kill more trees than anything. Modern lawn mowers can skin away bark and leave the inner layers open to insects and disease. String trimmers can do even more damage. The best way to avoid this is to mulch the area around the trunks

For larger jobs, however, epoxy and latex patching compounds tend to be too expensive and dry too fast. Instead, use a standard commercial patching mortar; follow directions on the package.

You can also make your own patching mortar by mixing one part portland cement with three parts sand, then stirring in enough water to form a stiff paste.

· A dense tree canopy will screen out at least 80 percent of the full-sun radiation that falls on a human being, outdoor living area or building. Miller and Sacamano estimated such screening can reduce maximum high temperatures inside a typical house by 20 percent.

Much of Arizona receives about 80 percent of possible sunshine and triple-digit summer temperatures, so the figures may or may. not apply where you live. But the basic idea will be correct for any.

Heat or cooling is also lost or gained, of course, through the home's building materials. Insulation will help and sealing cracks around doors and windows is a must. But there always will be some conduction through the building, no matter how good the

insulation and sealing. Properly placed plants reduce differences in inner-outer wall surfaces. And directing the air flow around a home contribute to energy conservation and comfort of living, too. Plant windbreaks perpendicular

to the wind direction to reduce the wind's effect. Channel cooling breezes by creating an opening at appropriate places in the windbreak planting. Be sure you know the direction of your winter winds usually from the north or west. Positioning of landscape plantings to save energy requires some knowledge of the sun's move ment. While the sun always travels on an east-west arc during daytime, the arc varies as the sun moves from the southern sky in
