





Morton Grove seniors (age 60+) can prepare for the winter flu season by receiving an influenza and/or pneumonia immunization coming up at five special clinics. A flu shot is strongly recommended for seniors who are at increased risk for complications of the flu. Flu can be particularly dangerous for seniors leading to the more serious, pneumonia. The best time to receive the flu shot is now, before the flu season really begins. Clinics will be held in the Flickinger Senior Center at the following times: - Saturday, Oct. 10, 9 a.m. to noon - Tuesday, Oct. 13, to 4 p.m. - Saturday, Oct. 24, 9 a.m. to noon - Tuesday, Oct. 27 1 to 4 p.m. - Tuesday, Nov. 10, 1 to 4 p.m.

Most people have no adverse side effects from flu vaccines. Flu shots are given by injection into the muscle of the upper arm. This may cause soreness for a day or two at the injection site and occasionally a fever or muscle ache for a day or two. People who should not get a flu shot include anyone who is allergic to eggs, chicken or chicken feathers or anyone who has been paralyzed with Guillian Barre Syndrome. Anyone who is ill or has a fever should put off getting a flu shot until the fever or other symptoms are gone. Also, anyone taking a blood thinner such as coumadin, warfarin or panwarfarin should bring in a release from their doctor in order to receive the flu shot. Appointments are required and can be made by calling the Morton Grove Senior Hot Line at 470-5223. Immunizations are free of charge but donations to offset their cost are accepted.

#### Low Back Pain a Universal **Problem**

Osteoarthritis is commonly considered a "wear-and-tear" process and is associated with degenerative changes in the disc. which results in an altered realtionship (derangement) between adjacent vertebrae. This derangement causes an increased strain, as well as a loss of motion of the gliding joints of the spine. These gliding joints (facets) are found in pairs, along the entire spine, and their function is to allow for movement and flexibility of the spine. When these facet joints are subjected to repeated trauma from excessive strenuous athletic activities, heredity, weak abdominal muscles, and the inevitable aging process, low back and/or leg pain is commonly experienced.

Degenerative changes in the disc or an altered function in the facet joints, for whatever reason, contributes significantly to the "wear-and-tear" process, placing a strain upon this important area of the spine. The ostcoarthritic spine becomes less flexible, and therefore becomes more vulnerable to injury. ter World War II. Aluminum is an excellent conduc tor. That's one of the reasons it is used so extensively in pots and pans. Thus, the problem was to discover a way to keep the aluminum frame from conducting the outside cold temperature to the inside warm temperature.

The aluminum window frame members are hollow. They are designed that way for maximum strength. In the case of thermal barriers, the metal frame exposed to the outside cold air is separated from the metal frame inside the house. This is done by using either high or low density polyurethane or rigid vinyl (PVC). Thus, the cold passing through the metal encounters a barrier and is stopped from entering the inside of the house.

Modern aluminum window frames are composed of three pieces: an outer extruded frame, a central core of insulating material, and an inner extruded frame. They work well in addressing the early problem associated with aluminum windows.

Aluminum replacement windows are strong, durable, energy efficient windows that won't swell, shrink, split, crack, check, rust, are ideal for refinishing, and not affected by the sun. For more information, write to the Aluminum Extruders Council, 1000 N. Rand Road. #214, Wauconda, IL
