

## Woman finds sister strangled at Leaning Tower YMCA

The body of a West Virginia woman was found Nov. 8 in her room at the Leaning Tower Y, (LTY) 6300 Touhy Avenue, Niles. Helen Cardwell, 35, of Huntington, West Virginia, was naked, except for a pair of white

socks and had been sexually assaulted, said Niles Police Investigator Sgt. Dennis McEnerney. The incident caused the YMCA of Metropolitan Chicago, the parent organization, to hire a security firm for the Niles facility

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## Reusch Garage locks doors after 70-year history

This Saturday the Reusch Garage closes its doors. In turning the key in the lock, the Reusch family ends 70 years of servicing trucks and buses at 8650 Shermer Road, Niles. They do not leave voluntarily, but as the result of a Village 1991 legal suit which charged the business was in non-

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## Niles Village Board moves to take parks

At a special meeting Nov. 5, Niles Trustees officially recognized the results of the Village canvass of the Park District referendum vote taken Nov. 3. They acknowledged Niles President and Board of Trustees as the acting Board of Commissioners for the Park District and they took steps to manage all business affairs of the Park District.

The Board resolved to continue employment of current District employees "provided, the Acting Board of Commissioners do not assume, ratify or acknowledge any employment agreement...for a term longer than six months" from that date.

Under this resolution they also

## One-man-one-vote at issue in Niles Park court challenge

Niles Park attorneys contend that a majority of registered, rather than actual voters, was necessary to dissolve the Niles Park District. According to Niles Village Attorney Dick Troy, with 17,000 registered voters in the Niles Park District, a minimum of 8,500 votes would have been needed to approve the referendum.

Troy also noted:

- All non-voters would have been counted as "no" votes.
- All dead voters still on election rolls would have been included in that count.
- All voters who had moved from the district, but still on voter rolls, would have been included as legal voters.
- All voters whose right to vote had been suspended due to criminal convictions, but still on voter rolls, would have been included in the vote count.

## Attorneys battle at Park Board meeting

A crowded post-election Niles Board meeting pitted Village officials against a majority of Park Board commissioners on Wednesday, Nov. 4.

Park District Attorney Gabe Berrafato said the announced result of a Nov. 3 referendum, registering a 2-1 vote in favor of dissolving the Park District, was insufficient. He cited a Illinois Board of Elections advisory opinion requiring the vote for dissolution be by the majority of all registered voters in both the Village and Park District, not just the majority of votes cast. The 6,738 votes cast for dissolution were short of the 8,956 minimum needed, he said.

The Judge of the Circuit Court must canvass and declare the election results, he said, adding "We are still an existing district until (there is) a ruling by the Circuit Court."

With Village Manager Abe

Selman and Village Clerk Kathryn Harbison in attendance, Village Attorney Richard Troy disagreed. Troy said the wishes of the majority who voted on the question must be respected. He said "the Park District is automatically dissolved and the Village Board of Trustees are to, by law, act as the Board of Commissioners of the Park District."

He said we "respectfully disagree with (Mr. Berrafato's) opinion and alert the Board they will be acting at their own peril if they continue to function and spend public funds to fight the result of the vote."

Board President Carol Panek said since the Board was unaware Troy planned to speak, there would be no comment at that time.

Declaring it was his duty to defend and protect the interests of the Park District, according to his

## Niles Park attorneys try to overturn citizens' vote

# Court to rule Friday on referendum

At a Tuesday noon hearing, Circuit Court Associate Judge Marian Staniec continued to Friday at 4 p.m. a decision to determine whether the November 3 village takeover of the Niles Park District was a legal referendum.

Attorney Michael LaVelle, representing the Niles Park District, requested the continuance to answer memorandums presented to the court Tuesday morning by Niles village attorney Richard Troy.

One of the memorandums cited by Troy is an 1884 U.S. Supreme Court decision of a similar case to the present Niles case. It ruled the majority of those voting resulted in a decision.

The conflict between the two sides concerns interpretation of statutes. LaVelle claims park statutes indicate a majority of the registered voters in the district have to favor a referendum to have it pass. LaVelle defines legal voters

as "all persons qualified to vote." Troy, citing the election code, contends a majority of those voting determines the outcome of a referendum.

The November 3 vote had 6,738 voters favoring the village take-over, which was 64.6 percent of those voting. 3,688 residents voted against the referendum.

The Friday hearing, which was to be heard in front of Judge Francis Barth was transferred at the request of park attorneys to Judge Staniec.

Court observers noted Barth had previously ruled against the Niles Park District on August 31, allowing the referendum for the dissolution of the park district to be placed on the ballot, which may have been why their attorneys were anxious to be heard by a different judge.

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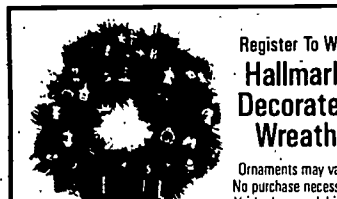
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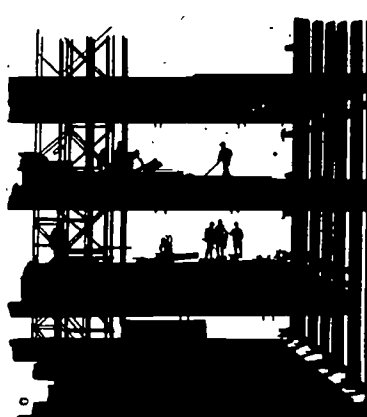

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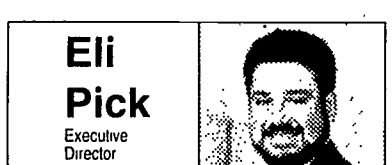
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## Ballard Among Top Illinois Nursing Centers Picked for Tough Accreditation Program

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## How to use your customer base to develop new business

IF NEW PRODUCTS are the lifeblood of a manufacturing company, NEW BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT is the lifeblood of a professional service organization.

Yet, getting started on a program of new business development can be a formidable task. One easy way to do this is to start with a listing of your present and past customer/clients along the following dimensions:

- Types of industries by SIC Codes. You'll probably discover a skewing of existing business along specific industry lines.
- Geographic dimensions. Are your customer/clients local? Regional? National? Where are the clusters?
- Industry expertise. Where are your professional "Niches"?
- Size and structure. Analyze your customer/client base by sales, revenues, numbers of employees. Also, what percent are corporations, partnerships, sole proprietorships?
- Buyer behavior characteristics. How do your client/customers buy products and services and how do they pay for them? You may not want to do business with a company that subjects each purchase to the "bidding" process or who pays its bills in 90 or 120 days.

### DEVELOPING YOUR PROSPECT LIST

Once you have determined your criterion, developing a prospect list is perhaps your easiest and least-expensive task.

The most obvious way is by obtaining business directories. They provide comprehensive information such as the names of officers, sales data, number of employees. The difficulty in using directories is that you have to manually develop a prospect list.

This task can be simplified through dealing with a direct mail list vendor. Virtually every directory has its listings computerized and rents its mailing lists. Costs range from \$35 to \$100 per thousand with minimum orders of around \$250. You can also get a separate printout of telephone numbers. The best way to obtain your list from this source is to sit down with a sales rep and tell him the specific dimensions you seek: (1) SIC codes; (2) size of companies in terms of numbers of employees; (3) geographic areas. If your initial count is too small you can expand it by changing your parameter. If it is too large, you can pare it down by making your criteria more selective.

A final technique is to make a "wish list" of say 100 or 200 firms you'd like to do business with. Take this list and use your directories to find the decision-maker. Then, assign special potential accounts to specific members of your professional marketing team.

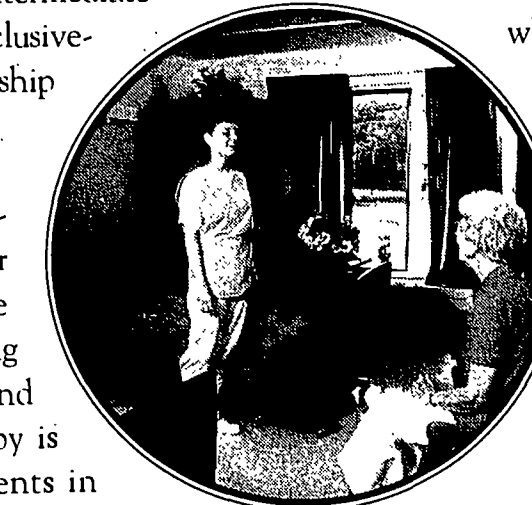

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### Rush studies women with osteoporosis

Rush North Shore Medical Center in Skokie is looking for post-menopausal women with osteoporosis who would be willing to participate in a study testing a new drug.

Peter Curran, M.D., of Rush North Shore Medical Center, and Will Ryan, M.D., of Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center, are in charge of the study for the Chicago area.

Osteoporosis is a disease of the bone in which bony mineralization is decreased. The bone is thus weaker, and the risk of fractures may be markedly increased. This disease is especially common in women who have reached menopause, particularly white women. It is estimated that 30 percent of post-menopausal white women will have at least one osteoporotic fracture during their lives.

Several drugs are available to treat osteoporosis. The FDA has approved the use of estrogen and

calcitonin for this disease, but both of these agents have several serious drawbacks. The drug etidronate (Didronel) is a new agent that has recently been shown to be promising in preventing further deterioration of the bone in osteoporotic patients. Unfortunately, if used continuously, it may eventually further weaken the bone through a separate mechanism.

The drug Tiludronate is a member of the same group of drugs as etidronate (the bisphosphonates). Its advantages are that it is more potent, and that it does not cause this secondary weakening of the bone. The drug has passed initial trials for efficiency and safety, and is now undergoing further large-scale testing before it can be approved for the FDA use in osteoporosis.

### New HIV regulations benefit women and children

Social Security recognizes that HIV - the virus that causes AIDS can develop differently in women and children than in men. Social Security Administration has published proposed regulations and also issued new operating guidelines that are now being used to assess all HIV cases, including those for women and children with HIV infection.

The new criteria list certain gender-specific manifestations of HIV infection - such as gynecological cancers and infections - that are considered in evaluating a woman's disability claim. In addition, the new guidelines note that the course of HIV disease in children is also different from that in adults, and contain a specific list of criteria severe enough to prevent a child from functioning the way that a healthy child of the same age would.

This is the first time that Social Security has provided such a list for HIV-infected children. The evaluation of claims filed by women and children with HIV is not limited to the criteria on the list. All claims are afforded the appropriate steps in the disability decision-making process. SSA considers all evidence relevant to a woman's or child's claim, not just evidence of HIV-infection included in the guidelines.

This is important because it means that all Social Security disability claimants with HIV infection are evaluated under the most up-to-date medical criteria. And their claims can be approved faster, and payments made more quickly, once all other eligibility factors are met.

Latest statistics show that approximately 10 percent of Social Security claimants with HIV infection are women and this percentage is expected to rise in the future.

More than 2,000 cases of AIDS have been reported in children under 13 years old. Most of these children acquired the disease before birth from their mothers, who were infected with HIV. The number of children with HIV infection is, unfortunately, also expected to rise.

Social Security administrators two separate programs that pay benefits to people disabled as a result of HIV infection, the Social Security Disability Insurance

(SSDI) program, and the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program. Under both programs, applicants must meet the definition of disability in Social Security law, basically, for adults, the inability to work because of medical impairments that are expected to last at least one year or to result in death. For children to be found disabled, they must have an impairment(s) of comparable severity.

SSI makes monthly payments to people with disabilities, including children, whose income and assets are below a certain level.

Social Security's proposed rules also significantly expand the authority of SSA field offices to presume a person is disabled and make immediate payments to SSI claimants when it is confirmed that the impairment due to HIV infection is severe enough to keep the person from working. These payments can continue for up to six months while the formal disability determination process takes place.

### Revised domestic violence law helps women

Illinois Attorney General Roland W. Burris says the state's newly-revised domestic violence statute, signed into law by Gov. Jim Edgar, "opens a new era in legal protection for women in the state of Illinois."

Burris proposed a number of changes in the law during the spring legislative session, after conducting a statewide series of hearings on the topic of domestic abuse. Based on the testimony of victims, service providers and medical and legal experts, the Attorney General and his staff drafted the legislation in the new law.

The legislation makes several significant changes in the law, including:

- adding dating relationships to those covered by the domestic violence law;
- eliminating the fees charged when an individual seeks an Order of Protection;
- requiring a "no-contact" provision as a condition of bond in domestic violence cases;
- adding domestic battery to the crimes eligible for reimbursement under the Crime Victims Compensation Fund, which provides money to cover a victim's medical expenses.
