Seek employers for disabled Job Fair

Compensation hikes total \$4.2 million

District 207 teachers ratify 3 year contract

A three-year contract has been ratified between District 207 and the Maine Teachers' Association. The contract provides for a four and a half percent increase in the compensation schedule in both 1993-94 and 1994-95 and a four percent increase in 1995-96. The total cost of the increased compensation over the three years is \$4,233,518. "We want taxpayers to know that financial projections are more positive now than they were at the end of last year," said James L. Elliott, superintendent. Five plus five, an early retirement incentive program which allows

teachers to buy five years of experience, was passed in February by the Illinois State Legislature. By encouraging teachers at the top of the pay scale to retire, it opens positions for younger, less experienced teachers who receive lower salaries. According to the new contract, a beginning teacher with a bachelor's degree will make \$28,010 next year; a teacher with a doctorate and 20 years experience, \$64,550. By the third year of the contract, those salaries will rise to \$30,440 and \$70,150, respectively.

In one of its first actions, the new Maine Township Board voted to change its board meeting schedule to the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month. Supervisor Mark Thompson said, "The board meetings had been changed to Mondays during the past four years to accommodate the previous supervisor. Run helps bring hope for a CF cure

When Gay and Bob Meier were told in 1971 that their two-year-old daughter, Michelle, was a victim of cystic fibrosis, there was little hope that she would live to see her teen-age years. The disease took her life at age 12.

Years of fund raising and research have brought scientists to the brink of saving 30,000 lives. Glenview's Michelle Meier Memorial Run has contributed more than \$90,000 toward the effort to cure CF. Organizers help that the 12th annual race will bring that total to \$100,000.

The 1993 Michelle Meier Memorial Run will be held Sunday, June 6 at Hoffman School, 2000 Harrison St. in Glenview. Races begin at 8 a.m. (7 a.m. check-in). The entry fee, which includes a durable shirt for the first 600 registrants, is \$12 prior to the run and \$15 on race day. Runners can choose between a 5K and 10K run and a one mile fun run/walk. The annual Michelle Meier Memorial Run was started in 1982 at Michelle's grade school, Hoffman, by a small group of her

family and friends. It has grown from about 100 participants in the first year to nearly 600 in 1992. The 1993 run will add a raffle with an impressive list of prizes, including sports memorabilia signed by Michael Jordan, a 12-speed bicycle, a Glenview Park District family pool pass, several restaurant gift certificates and tickets to see Chicago sports teams.

In 1989, scientists isolated the fatal cystic fibrosis gene, clearing the way for testing of new medications that break down the thick mucus that builds up in the lungs of children with CF. This mucus contains bacteria that results in lung infections and early death.

Scientists recently announced the most major breakthrough. A process has been developed to alter the CF gene and carry it into the lungs of laboratory animals. This normal gene appears to reverse the complications caused by CF. The next step, and possibly the final step, will be to test these discoveries on humans. If test results are the same as they have been on animals, CF will be cured.

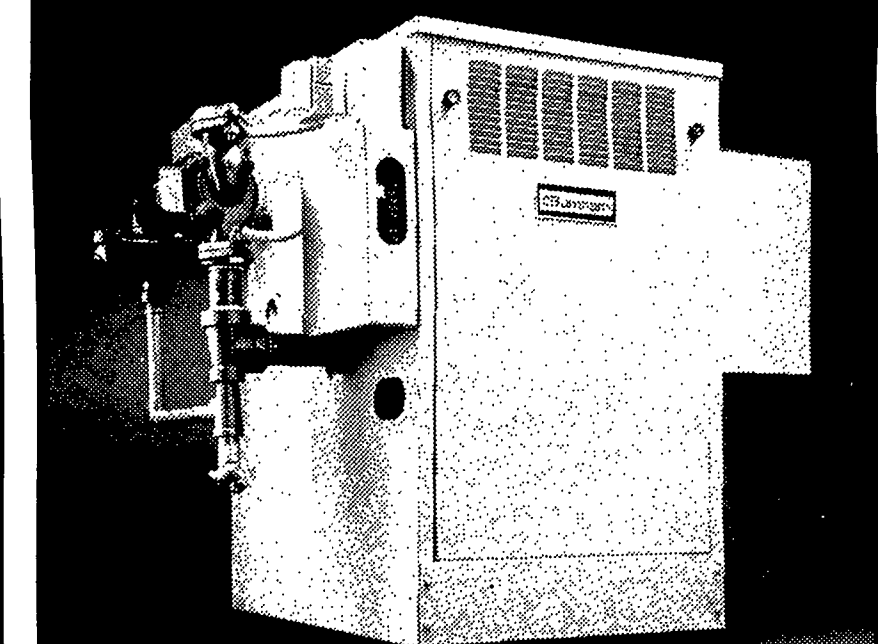

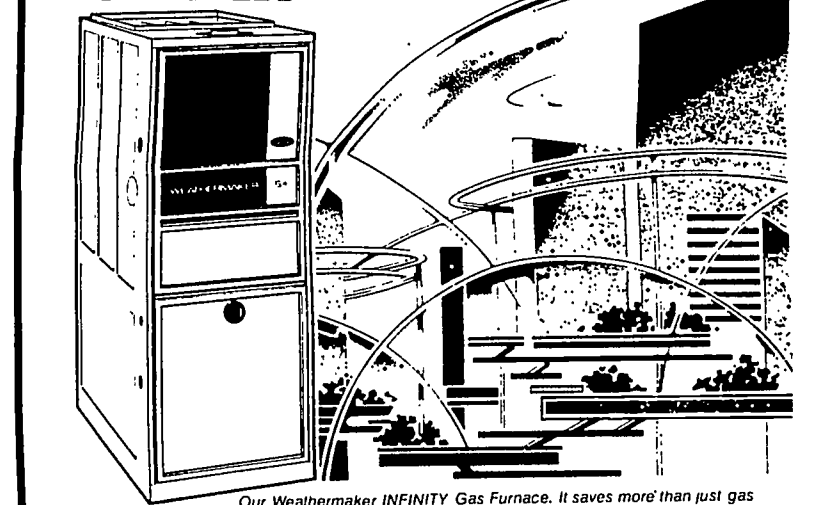

Burris warns against home repair con men

Illinois Attorney General Roland W. Burris recently issued a warning to Illinois consumers to be on the lookout for home repair con men.

"The flooding that has occurred in several Illinois counties along the Des Plaines, Fox, Illinois, Rock and Mississippi rivers will undoubtedly increase the need for home repairs due to flood damage," Burris said. "Although there are many reputable and competent home repair contractors doing business in Illinois, there are also hundreds of con artists looking to make a fast buck. Homeowners will need to be on the lookout for fraudulent home repair contractors who do little or no work for as much money as they can get."

Burris offered the following tips for homeowners:

- Conduct business only with licensed contractors and never with unsolicited callers or door-to-door salesmen.
- Obtain referrals from friends and family members who have

had similar work performed. Ask contractors for references and call people to see how satisfied they are with the job. Be suspicious if a contractor cannot or will not give references.

- Always obtain a written contract and make sure the contract contains the contractor's name, business name, phone number and address. Verify the business address and telephone number. Some con artists are transients who stay in an area just long enough to take your money, but not to make promised repairs.

- Read the contract carefully before signing it and make sure it includes start and finish dates for the work.

- Do not pay the full amount until all the work has been completed, including the cleanup.

Last year, Attorney General Burris indicted 17 home repair con artists. Several of those indictments resulted in convictions for home repair fraud with jail sentences of up to four years in prison.

Those with concerns about a solicitation for home repair work or who think they have been cheated by a home repair contractor, should call or visit the Attorney General's Regional Office in their area or call the Consumer Fraud Hotline at 1-800-252-8666.

Study police pursuit methods

The Illinois Senate has adopted a resolution sponsored by Assistant Senate Majority Leader Walter Dudycz (R-7th, Chicago) that calls for a study of police pursuit methods used to train law enforcement officers in Illinois.

Senate Resolution 143 directs the Illinois Local Governmental Law Enforcement Officers Training Board to evaluate all available police pursuit procedures and recommend a standardized model for training law enforcement personnel.

"There are currently several different pursuit procedures taught in the six police training academies in Illinois. We are asking the Board to convene a committee with representatives from different law enforcement organizations and evaluate all police pursuit models," Dudycz said. "They are to recommend a standardized model to the General Assembly by Sept. 1."

The 7th District Senator says the committee is to include representatives from the Illinois Local Governmental Law Enforcement Officers Training Board, Illinois Sheriffs' Association, Illinois Fraternal Order of Police, Illinois Police Benevolent and Protective Association, Illinois Chiefs of Police Association, and the six police officer training academies in Illinois.

Women's health vs. the tobacco industry

Lieutenant Governor Bob Kustra launched a statewide television public service campaign to discourage Illinois women from smoking and to discredit multi-billion dollar advertising campaigns by the tobacco industry.

"We must challenge tobacco advertising that tries to persuade women that smoking is healthy and care-free," said Kustra, who coordinates the state's anti-drug abuse efforts. "We must be as aggressive as the tobacco industry is with its advertising efforts, and we must launch public service campaigns to provide everyone with the facts about the dangers of tobacco."

The state's public service campaign features two spots produced by a Minneapolis advertising agency for the Minnesota Department of Health. Minnesota used cigarette tax revenues to pay for production of the ads and made them available to Illinois at Kustra's request.

Kustra has asked all television stations in Illinois to use them as public service announcements.

The spots are hard-hitting but deliver a serious message with humor.

"Tobacco companies spend nearly \$4 billion every year to peddle this addictive and often lethal drug," Kustra said. "Given the amount of money that tobacco companies spend to market their products to women, it is no surprise that an estimated 2,000 young women begin smoking every day in the United States."

Faced with declines in cigarette sales, Kustra said tobacco companies target their advertising sales pitches to specific audiences - women, African-Americans and young people.

Recent Centers for Disease Control and Prevention statistics indicate that nearly 40 percent of women who smoke don't begin smoking until age 18. In focus groups, young women have pointed to manipulative tobacco advertising as part of their decision to begin smoking.

"It was not long ago that smoking was thought to be sophisticated."

"But as a society we have learned there is nothing sophisticated or glamorous about the tragic results of smoking - lung cancer, heart disease and emphysema. More than 7,000 women die each year in Illinois due to smoking-related illness. In addition to affecting their own health, women who smoke during pregnancy are endangering their child and are more likely to have miscarriages or give birth to dangerously small babies."

In Illinois, direct medical care costs attributable to smoking among women are estimated at \$450 million annually. The annual indirect cost of lost income attributable to premature death has been estimated at \$325 million.

Statistics compiled by the Minnesota Department of Public Health indicated adult smoking rates dropped from 29 percent to 21 percent during the time that the public service program was implemented and that smoking among teens dropped from 16 percent to 14 percent.

The Lieutenant Governor's public service announcement campaign has been endorsed by the American Cancer Society, American Lung Association, American Lung Association of Illinois, American Medical Association, Chicago Heart Association, Chicago Lung Association and the Illinois Public Health Association.

and financial support from their parents. There are too many non-custodial parents that get away without paying their monthly support or any support at all. The state needs to do something to prevent this child deprivation from continuing," Lang said.

The bill, as amended, will provide that the willful failure to pay child support may be subject to summary criminal contempt proceedings and may result in the suspension of any professional license.

The bill further requires state agencies to suspend professional licenses issued until defaults on payment of child support are satisfied.

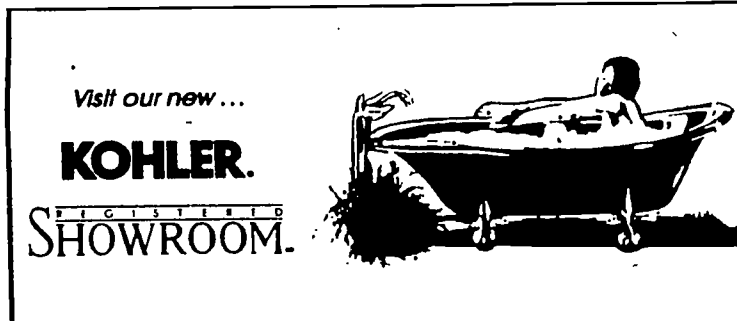
"Most parents with a professional license can afford to pay child support, but many avoid payment and are committing one of the greatest crimes of all-neglect of their own child," Lang stated.

States Attorneys and other appropriate state officials would be empowered to obtain information from employees, telephone companies, and utility companies to locate individuals who have defaulted on child support payments.

House Bill 92 passed out of the House of Representatives by 105-5-2 and is expected to receive a favorable review by the Senate.

Butler reports grants for area recreation

Three area recreation facilities have been approved for state grants to develop their sites, according to state Sen. Marty Butler (R-Park Ridge).

Buffalo Grove was approved for \$127,500, the Park Ridge Recreation and Park District for \$54,800 and River Trails Park District and the city of Prospect Heights for \$200,000.

Butler said the grants are funded through the state's Open Space Land Acquisition and Development Program and the federal Land and Water Conservation Fund.

Buffalo Grove will use its grant to develop a baseball field, picnic area, basketball court, two tennis courts, a fully-accessible playground, extension of the

communitywide bike path, landscaping and site amenities.

The Park Ridge grant will be used to redevelop the 10-acre Maine Park. The existing playground will be removed and replaced with a fully-accessible community playground. A pier, also fully-accessible, will be installed on one of the existing ponds.

The River Trails/Prospect Heights project will include an intergenerational activity area, two sand volleyball courts, a baseball field with backstop, two tennis courts, two youth playgrounds, basketball courts, a fully-accessible playground and picnic area, an ice skating rink, two soccer fields, a BMX track, a bike path and landscaping.

Orr announces new Deputy Director of Elections

At a press conference recently, Cook County Clerk David Orr announced Kathy Twine as the new Deputy Director of Elections for Cook County. Twine is the first African-American to hold this position.

"Kathy Twine will be a key figure in achieving our goal of bringing accountability back to county government," Orr said.

As the Deputy Director of Elections, Twine will oversee operations in the second largest

county in the United States, which includes 1.35 million suburban voters. Her responsibilities include management over staff in the binders, mapping, and data processing divisions, as well as overseeing the activities of the front counter of the elections department.

With Twine at the helm, Orr hopes to improve customer relations and increase staff development.

College financial aid guide available at Dudycz's office

Information about financial assistance for college students is now available at the office of Assistant Senate Majority Leader Walter Dudycz (R-7th).

The 7th District Senator has a copy of the Illinois Student Assistance Commission's guide to colleges and universities in Illinois and the kinds of financial assistance available to students.

"With the cost of a college education increasing every year, financial aid becomes more and

more necessary. The Illinois Student Assistance Commission has compiled an invaluable guide about the many federal, state and private financial assistance programs," Dudycz said. "I don't think people realize just how many programs are available."

The Illinois Student Assistance Commission's guide is available at Dudycz's office at 6143 N. Northwest Highway in Chicago.

House approves Lang's legislation to fund education first

State Representative Louis Lang (D-Skokie) passed legislation which would require that, over time, public education would be funded at 50 percent by the State of Illinois without a tax increase.

Starting in 1995, the State of Illinois will be required to dedicate one-third of all new revenues, in addition to the 1994 total for education, to be invested in elementary and secondary education under the terms of House Bill 98 which passed out of the Illinois House of Representatives.

"At the last election, fifty-eight percent of all voters in Illinois demanded that education should become the number one funding priority of state government," said Lang. "This bill simply responds to the demands for adequate funding for education."

House Bill 98 allocates two-thirds of the new funds to be appropriated for elementary and secondary programs and one-third of the new funds to be for higher education programs.

The bill also requires the Governor to include in his annual budget an allocation for elementary, secondary and higher education which conforms to the funding formula.

House Bill 98 passed out of the House by a margin of 100-11-2 and will now be considered by the Illinois Senate.

Carroll calls for universal health insurance form

Assistant Democratic Leader Senator Howard Carroll (D-8) has passed a plan out of the Illinois Senate to save people of Illinois several million dollars in health care costs.

Currently, health care providers regularly use over 47 forms to process patient information for insurance companies and have over 100 others in storage. Hospitals risk losing reimbursement dollars from the insurance company if they do not use the correct form. Carroll's plan addresses that problem by calling for one universal insurance form in Illinois.

A representative from the Illinois Hospital Association points out that there is currently a nationally recognized form that meets the requirements of the measure Carroll is sponsoring. The Hospital Association agrees that the measure is beneficial, "if everyone can agree on a universal form."

"This will save the state, health care providers, and, therefore, individuals hundreds of millions of dollars from this point forward," Carroll said.

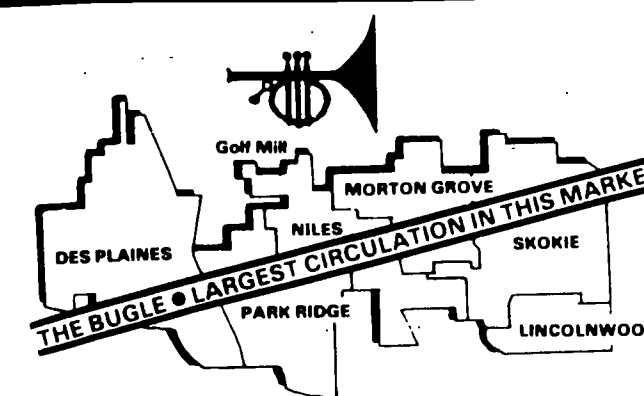
Carroll is quick to relate an experience he had while inspecting Canadian hospitals. An administrator for a Canadian hospital had just come from an American hospital where they had 240 administrators on the staff just to handle insurance forms and paperwork. In the similarly sized hospital in Canada, the staff for the one insurance form and paperwork was only seven people.
