The Trustees' decisions on the policies and regulations for the library operation are determined for the guidance of the Library Board.

## Construction on Dempster may reduce accidents

Shermer Road and Harlem Avenue are two parallel streets that lie only yards apart at Dempster Street. These high traffic areas are too close for comfort and are the sites for many car accidents.

Although both intersections are equipped with stop lights, many drivers traveling west on Dempster tend to overlook the Shermer light and focus in on Harlem Avenue ahead.

"The lights are very confusing," said Sergeant Roger Wilson of the Niles Police Department. "Sometimes you see the second light which might be green and you don't see your light at Shermer. You get a little hypnotized by the green light down the road and you run right through the red one. And generally, when someone runs the red light like that, they will insist that they didn't."

Niles Police Department files report that there have been nine accidents since June '92 at the intersection of Shermer and Dempster. The Morton Grove Police Department has many more.

This area of Dempster Street is currently under construction, which only adds to the confusion. The multi-phase construction project, due to be finished by October, is now putting in a new sewer system. The next phase is to completely redo Dempster and upgrade the street lights. While this construction is causing trouble now, these changes may help in the future.

"I don't know if there are any more accidents at those corners than any other real busy intersection in town," Wilson said. "But it seems like there are. There is a lot of traffic there and a lot of traffic has a tendency to generate a lot of accidents."

"The other problem is that the lights are so close. Maybe up-

## Niles OKs zoning for 126 condos & townhouses

In a meeting Tuesday night, the Niles Village Board unanimously approved zoning for a new housing development to be built adjacent to the Terrace Square Condominiums.

The land is located immediately east of that development, north of the Golf Glen Shopping Center and south of Commonwealth Edison Right-of-Way.

The new development will include 126 townhouses and flat condominiums over 12.6 acres with 10 units to the acre. Fifty-four units will be townhomes and 72 of those will be flats. The cost of the units will be approximately \$130,000.

The Niles Village Board denied a motion Tuesday night for the rezoning of the southwest corner of Greenwood and Golf Road to become a Best Buy store.

Numerous homeowners from the unincorporated area of Cook County, adjacent to the site, attended the meeting to demand that the area remain exclusively residential.

Since 1973, nine zoning petitions have been submitted and denied in order to keep the area residential.

"You have been fighting for us for 20 years," said area residents

Bill Foster, Sylvia Dalrymple and Jean Voght. "This will only bring in more commercial property. Keep our area residential."

Niles may not be seeing another Best Buy in its midst, but a petition for referral to the zoning board was approved for Circuit City Electronics and Appliance Store, to be located at 5701 West Touhy Avenue. The Board also voted in favor of a Checker Double Drive-Thru Restaurant at 8595 Dempster Street after some changes were made at the recommendation of the Board at the

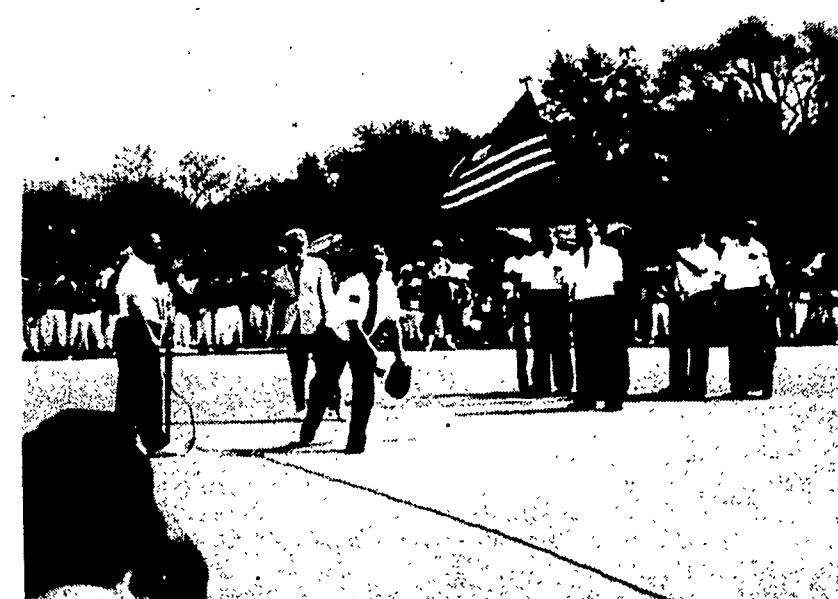

## District 71 complies with safety regulations

Painting some ceiling tile at Niles Elementary is all that remains of School District 71 to comply with state safety regulations. Superintendent Eugene Zaleski said that all the projects are done, but the district has no proof of this final step.

At its June 15 meeting, the District 71 Board of Education approved a motion to request another year from the state to allow for completion of projects.

Zaleski said that once every 10 years the district selects a certified architectural firm to check

the district schools. The architect looks for fire and life safety violations and gives the district a list of improvements to make.

District 71 was last checked in September of 1985. Zaleski said most of the improvements needed to comply with the state were completed within the first three years.

With the state's approval of the request, the remaining work will be finished during the 1993-94 school year.

Honorable Roman C. Pucinski is retiring after a lifetime of public service. Pucinski - congressman, alderman, and soldier - will be honored Tuesday, June 29 at 7:30 p.m. at the House of the White Eagle, 6839 N. Milwaukee ave., after devoting his entire life to serving the interests of the public.

Pucinski has been an active public servant from his early days as a Sun-Times reporter from 1938 to 1958. He took a leave of absence from the Sun-Times to serve in the Pacific Theatre as a bombardier in the United States

Army Airforce during World War II. In the early 1950's, Pucinski served as Chief Investigator for the Congressional Investigation of the Katyn Forest Massacre where 14,000 Polish officers and soldiers were slain during World War II.

In 1956, Pucinski first campaigned for a seat in the U.S. House of Representatives, and was elected to his first term in 1958.

After an unsuccessful bid for Senate in 1972, Pucinski began a second political career as Alderman of the 41st Ward in the city of Chicago from 1973 to 1991.

## MG Police seen as having no evidence in salon murder

# Area police expect no arrest in MG murder

Sources in surrounding police departments believe there will be no arrest in the murder of Niles resident Anna K. Lehman.

Following reports that investigators requested the widower, A. Scot Lehman, to take a polygraph test, high ranking police officials strongly believe Morton Grove has no physical evidence and were "grasping at straws."

"It is part of the normal routine in a murder case for friends or relatives to take a polygraph test," said Morton Grove Police Cmdr. Frank Pantaleo. "(Lehman) advised me that he's not going to take one."

Investigators say Lehman has been uncooperative in refusing to take the lie detector test on the ad-

vice of his lawyer. However, Lehman has met with investigators on several occasions, allowed them to search his Niles apartment, has given them his fingerprints and has a sound alibi as to his whereabouts on April 25 when his wife, Anna K. Lehman, was found stabbed to death inside her beauty shop at 9208 N. Waukegan.

According to the widower's alibi, Lehman dropped off his wife at her shop on that Sunday morning so she could do some bookkeeping. He then went to his grandmother's 80th birthday party in Lombard and then to his mother-in-law's house for dinner in Winnetka.

## District 207 budget increases

The proposed budget for Maine Township High School District 207 for the 1993-94 school year has been established at \$69,674,476. This represents an increase of 3.45 percent over last year's budget when interest

transfers which are not actually expenditures are taken into consideration, according to Donald E. Kenney, assistant superintendent for business.

The budget reflects \$2.5 million in cuts that were made last year and another \$2 million this year. Although cost cutting began during the 1992-93 school year in anticipation of the tax assessment freeze, this is the first

year that the revenue will actually be less than expected. The tax assessment freeze passed last year by the Illinois State Legislature required school districts in Cook County only to levy 1992 taxes on the 1991 tax base. District 207 lost an estimated \$8.5 million in revenue that it had expected to receive, according to Kenney.

"Although revenue in all funds will increase about 2.49 percent over the previous estimates for 1993, most of the growth occurs in special revenue funds such as transportation, working cash, and tort immunity, which cannot be used for general purposes," he

## Kohl's museum offers recycling exhibit

The environment is of increasing concern to the people of our nation. Experts strive to find the best solutions for the disposal of garbage while the general public tries to conserve resources at home. In an attempt to teach children the importance of preserving the world around them, the Kohl Children's Museum introduces its newest exhibit, Recycle: It's the Thing to Do.

"By role-playing, children will learn how to help the environment," says Mary Sinker, director of exhibits at the Museum. "Through this exhibit, we're acknowledging that youngsters can help make the world - and their future - a better place by learning how to live in harmony with the environment." Safety-Kleen Corp. and the Illinois Department of Energy and Natural Resources provided the key funding to make this exhibit possible.

The grand opening weekend of Recycle: It's the Thing to Do will be Friday, June 25 through Sunday, June 27. Recycle artists and special activities will highlight the theme and introduce children to each area of the exhibit. Artists will demonstrate their creative uses of "ordinary" objects. Wilhelm Hahn will help children create unique paper bowls on Saturday, 11:30 to 12:30 p.m.

Throughout the weekend representatives of the EPA, Ecology Center of Evanston, the Village of Wilmette and other organizations will be available to answer questions about environmental and conservation issues. Visitors may pick up literature on recycling, composting, lead poisoning, or radon.

Demonstrating concern for the environment, the Museum's daily craft activities have always used recyclable materials. In this exhibit, a new recycle arts center highlights this commitment by encouraging children to reuse industrial materials to

create various crafts. During the opening weekend, art activities will include building earth-friendly maracas, bird feeders and castles of recycled materials.

Each component of the exhibit, including an "environmentally friendly" home, a Safety-Kleen truck and the recycle arts center, emphasizes a different aspect of environmental conservation.

The child-sized Recycle House, complete with a solar panel on the roof, will provide a unique setting for children to learn about recycling in their homes. In the kitchen, youngsters will engage in pretend play to solve real problems as they sort materials for recycling and use reusable packaging to wrap the "lunches" which they create.

To teach about energy conservation and insulation, they will complete an unfinished wall in the living room, and lay face bricks and install vinyl siding of one of the exterior walls. In the garden, children can plant soft sculpture vegetables in a garden and use the compost bin.

The Safety-Kleen truck will demonstrate ways that industry recycles its by-products. As they don uniforms, children will become engineers, "cleaning" mechanical gears with a magnet or loading barrels of recycled material from a nearby garage.

The Kohl Children's Museum is located at 165 Green Bay Rd., Wilmette. Summer hours, effective June 21 through August 30, are Monday-Saturday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Sunday, noon to 5 p.m. Admission is \$3 per person; children under one year of age are free. For more information, call (708) 256-6056.

### Interest rates go along with inflation

Consumers who depend on borrowed money to buy their homes, drive their cars and run their businesses may wholeheartedly approve of today's lower interest rates. On the other hand, senior citizens who have structured their retirement around income from certificates of deposit (CDs) and other fixed-income investments want interest rates to remain high enough to provide a fair return on their investments. So, which way are interest rates heading? If history is any indication, they could be going down.

Interest rates are a function of inflation. As a rule of thumb, the rate of inflation plus two or three percentage points is a reasonable approximation of long-term interest rates.

For example, from 1978 through 1981, inflation averaged about 11 percent annually. During the same period, the yields on long-term government securities rose to record highs of 13 percent to 14 percent. As inflation declined, interest rates also fell.

It was not until inflation began a steady upward trend in the 1970s that long-term government securities broke the 7 percent level for the first time since the early 1800s. In fact, according to "A History of Interest Rates" by Sidney Homer, interest rates on long-term government securities have been below 7 percent more than 90 percent of the time since 1799.

One goal of the Bush administration has been to lower inflation and keep it at a manageable level of 2 percent to 3 percent. If this is accomplished, then long-term interest rates should see 6 percent or less, according to our rule of thumb.

In its 1991 year-end review, the United States Office of Management and Budget seems to agree with these assumptions. Estimates for interest rates on 10-year Treasury bonds range from 7.9 percent in 1991 progressively decreasing to 6.6 percent in 1995 and holding steady until 1997.

Although these are long-term estimates, short-term Treasury bills and CDs generally react similarly. From the same report, 91-day Treasury bills were estimated to yield an average of 5.4 percent in 1991, fluctuating within a narrow range to 5.1 percent in 1997.

As the chart illustrates, unusually high interest rates existed for only about 15 years. During the same period, we also saw our highest rate of inflation. No one, of course, can or should attempt to predict the future. The history of interest rates, however, is a matter of record. They are more predictable than the stock market because emotions and market psychology play a lesser role in their function.

Where are interest rates heading? Probably the same way as inflation. So, if you don't want to see your buying power eaten away by big bites of inflation, think again before you petition for higher interest rates.

### The Ideal Investment

1. *The ability and desire to put a regular and systematic flow of money into the investment.* After all, if you are driving from Chicago to California, you have to keep putting gas in the car. You can't coast the whole way. It's the same with an investment. You have to be able (and want) to keep putting money into the investment on a regular basis.

2. *A return on the money.* The money should earn something. The investment doesn't have to provide the absolute best rate of return to be ideal; but there must be a high degree of assuredness that a reasonable "real" rate of return will be earned. What is a "real" rate of return? It is a return that is greater than the total of inflation and taxes. No amount of return, regardless of how large it is, is worth anything if it is not higher than inflation and taxes.

3. *Availability of the money when it is needed.* Since you never know when you might need the money, it should be liquid and available. For instance, an investment in real estate may not be liquid when it is needed.

4. *Minimum taxes to pay while the money is accumulating.* Every time you pay \$1 in taxes, that money is no longer available to grow in your investment. Depending on the number of years you will be investing your money, each \$1 paid in taxes could cost you up to \$10 in lost opportunity.

5. *Minimum taxes on the distribution of the money.* It's nice to avoid taxes while your investment is growing, but it's really great to also avoid taxes when you actually use the money in your investment for whatever you planned. That's why the IRA and 401(k) programs may not be as attractive as they appear. Yes, taxes are deferred during the accumulation period, but taxes must be paid when the money is taken out of the investment...and possibly at a higher tax rate than you would pay currently. Taxes have been going up and that trend appears to be continuing.

6. *Ease of distribution of the money.* This means you can get the money without any penalties, without negative tax rules like the 10% tax penalty on withdrawals from an IRA or 401(k) plan before age 59 1/2 or the requirement in those types of retirement plans that the money must start to be withdrawn at age 70 1/2 (and taxes paid) whether we want it or not or whether we need it or not.

7. *Contingencies for any interruption of the investment due to death, disability, law suit, business reversals or any unforeseen factor.* For instance, if you accumulate a lot of money over a period of years and suddenly you are sued (for any reason) and must pay a substantial judgment over and above your insurance coverage, you'd like your investment to be creditor-proof by law. In other words, you'd like no unforeseen event to rob you of the money you've accumulated, just when you're getting ready to enjoy it. An ideal investment must be able to withstand virtually any contingency.

8. *Minimum risk of the potential loss of the money.* If the ideal investment can reach your objectives without taking excessive risk, why do anything else? Many people fail in their long term investment programs by taking excessive risk and, very often, make bad or losing investments.

9. *Flexibility to modify or change the investment, if necessary.* The only things that are sure in this world are death and change. We can't do anything about death, but we should have the flexibility to react and respond to change.

There you have it: The nine essential characteristics of the ideal investment. Do they make sense? If so, would you agree that if one or more of these essential characteristics are missing from an investment it would be less than ideal? And do such ideal investments actually exist?

Yes, such investments do exist, and for some unexplained reason, most people have not been made aware of them.

last year to serve those borrowers who have been working, have a good credit history and can afford to make monthly payments but have not been able to save enough money for a down payment.

The 30-year, fixed rate mortgages are available to borrowers whose incomes are less than 115 percent of the median level for the county where the property is located. For example, in Cook County, borrowers' incomes must be less than \$53,935. To help insure borrowers make an informed decision, the program also requires they participate in a buyers education program and obtain a detailed property inspection.

To date, the Bank has originated more than \$3 million dollars in mortgage loans under the Community Homebuyers Program.

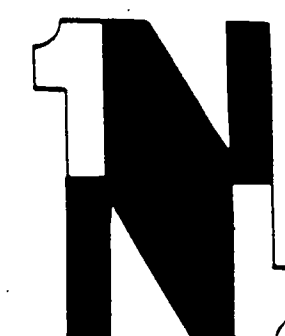

### Power-of-Attorney Agreements and Joint Bank Accounts Are Not Enough

When a person who gets Social Security or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) checks is unable to manage benefits in his or her own best interest, the Social Security Administration appoints a representative payee to assume these responsibilities. In these cases, the Social Security or SSI benefits are sent directly to the representative payee. The payee takes care of using funds for the personal care and well-being of the beneficiary and agrees to report certain changes in the beneficiary's circumstances that could affect the continuing eligibility to receive benefits.

Social Security representatives often come across situations where family members have worked out other agreements for handling the benefit checks of a family member. Joint bank accounts and power-of-attorney agreements are common methods used to allow one member of a family to control funds belonging to another family member.

Such common practices however, are not acceptable ways of managing Social Security benefits. While joint bank accounts and powers-of-attorney may be convenient ways to pay bills, they

do not provide for the responsibility and accountability that Social Security requires.

If the beneficiary is unable to manage benefits, applying to be the representative payee is the most appropriate step for a responsible family member to take. A payee will be appointed only if medical and other evidence establishes that the beneficiary cannot manage his or her own finances because of severe mental or physical limitations.

Another misconception Social Security representatives run into is the belief that legal guardianship is a sufficient basis for managing someone else's benefits. If a Social Security or SSI beneficiary has a legal guardian, the legal guardian or a close family member should apply to be the representative payee. The accounting that a guardian makes to the court does not cover all of the aspects of responsibility required from a representative payee.

### Centel-Illinois petitions for rate increase

Centel-Illinois, a division of Sprint, filed a request with the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) today, seeking a 10.9 percent increase in annual operating revenue to offset an anticipated annual shortfall of \$10.2 million.

In making the announcement, James D. Ogg, Sprint/Centel-Illinois President, pointed out that the company last filed a request with the ICC for a general rate increase 10 years ago, in December 1982, which took effect in November of the following year.

The company's proposal would bring the average residential customer's monthly bill to a total of \$30.95, an increase per month of \$1.01. Variations in usage and features would produce lower bills for some customers and higher charges for others.

Bills for business customers would vary significantly, due to a wide selection of rates and features.

Ogg explained that the company wants to itemize the monthly charge for an access line on each customer's bill, to separate it from usage charges. An access line, which is a fixed cost, is the local loop or wire that connects a customer's telephone with the local network to provide dial tone.

The company is seeking to establish calling rates based on usage. "We are proposing to price all local residential calls on an unlimited, per-call basis," Ogg noted. "This approach is straightforward, usage-sensitive, and it will provide billing that is easier to understand."

Residential customers would be charged an unlimited rate of 5 cents for each call placed to another customer within Centel's local calling area. Calls placed to locations beyond the local Centel calling area would incur added charges based on the duration of a call, the time of day and the distance.

All business calls would be charged on a per-minute basis, in addition to time of day and distance. Usage volume discounts would apply to business calls, and to residential calls as well.

Ogg also pointed out that more than half of the company's total revenue request is based on changes, directed by the FCC from the mid-80s. He said that the changes have created an annual shortfall in the company's local revenue of \$5.5 million.

Citing specific examples of continuing service improvements, Ogg described several efforts that improved service and choices for customers since the company's previous rate increase 10 years ago:

"Its local network became totally supported by digital telephone switching. The equipment makes it possible to offer and expand new software-driven service."

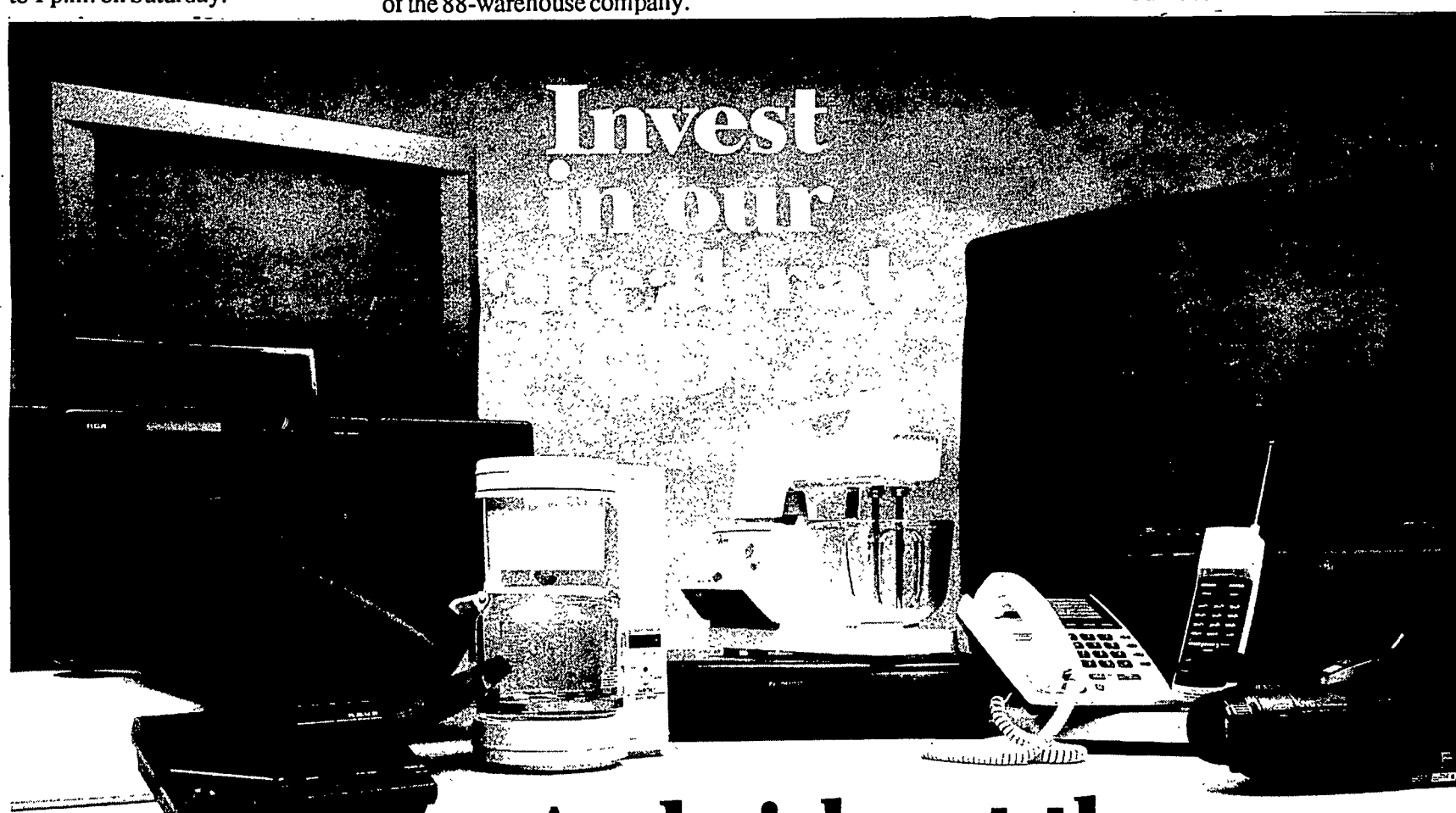

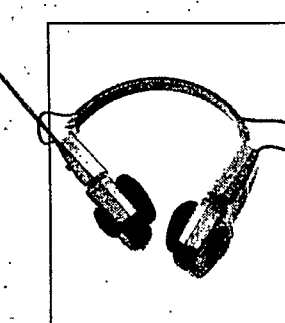

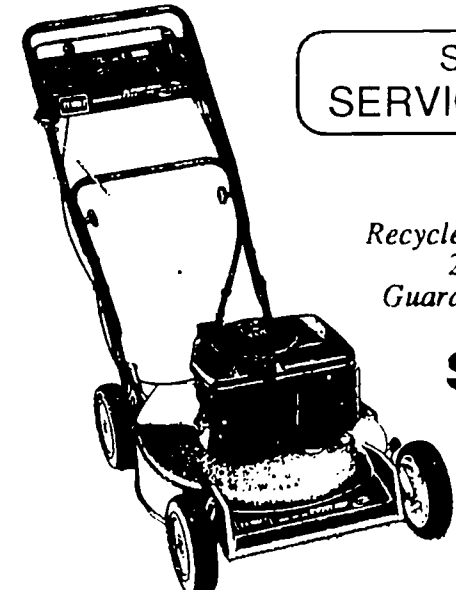

## Visitation assures father's role in family

"Ominously, the best predictor of crime is not race or poverty, but the increase of the fatherless family." An interesting quote from an issue of Fortune magazine dedicated to children in which they hit the problem right on target. However, the general pro-female bias in our divorce (pre- and post-dissolution) legal system at times ignores the enforcement of paternal visitation rights, resulting in certain families becoming fatherless.

In addition, the aggressive and punitive measure often taken against fathers (both employed and unemployed) in seeking child support arrearages as compared to weak and at times ineffective measures directed toward mothers accused of visitation abuses tells me our society places the collection of child support above the enforcement of visitation rights.

Unfortunately, in our society, it just might not be stereotypical noble or chivalrous to give fathers equal protection, regardless of the benefit resulting to children and society.

But don't just rely on my opinion. Let's look further into this by examining some statistics.

The Center for Disease Control was conducting a study into what may be causing the disturbing increase in the number of children with behavioral disorders. They found that 85 percent of them came from fatherless homes. And, more than 82 percent of all criminals sitting in prisons today grew up without a natural father present pursuant to a study quoted in "Our View".

If we know we are paving the way for increased crime in our society, we should work together to reverse the current trend and treat visitation abuse with as much emphasis as we treat support abuse.

## MG park qualify for aquatic award

After its pool staff was audited three times last summer, the Morton Grove Park District has qualified for the National Aquatics Silver Elite Award.

Geralyn Konsewicz, fitness and aquatic supervisor, said that the audit took the form of three videotaped tests performed by a national pool and water park organization of which the district is a member.

The first test was a videotaped session outside of the fence area at one of the district pools. The recording was done without notification to the district; it checks if lifeguards are doing their job and acting professionally.

The next two phases test the guards lifesaving skills. A CPR skills test was also given.

Point scores for performance were then averaged and, based on

how high the average is, park districts won awards.

Morton Grove scored in the 83 to 93 percent range to earn a silver award.

The pool organization tests all of its 152 aquatic clients, located in the United States, Canada and Europe. Konsewicz said that between 35 and 40 park districts in Illinois belong to the organization.

Of the district's 30 lifeguards, 10 were involved in the random testing, she said. Four of the guards also won excellence in professional lifeguarding awards for scoring 100 percent, she added.

The award was won for the 1992 operating season; June 6, through August 23.

The award was announced at the last Morton Grove Park Board meeting held June 17.

## Visiting nurses provide home health care

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that if no petitions are filed with the Board of Library Trustees by July 24, 1993, thirty (30) days after the aforesaid publication, the District shall then proceed with the levy of said additional tax. However, if within the thirty (30) day period a petition is filed with the Board of Library Trustees, signed by electors of the District equal in number to 2,771 or more of the electors in the Library District, asking that the question of levying such a .02% tax be submitted to the electors of the District, the question shall be submitted at the next regular election, November 2, 1993, or at the next proper election held in accordance with the general election law. If a majority of votes cast upon the question are in favor thereof, the Board of Library Trustees may levy the additional tax. said. "Balances will decline in the education fund by about \$3.7 million during 1993-94," said Kenney. To return that balance to the 25 percent level, a tax levy that is sufficient to guarantee full extension of the maximum rate for the 1993 tax year is necessary, according to Kenney.

District 207 has traditionally maintained a 25 percent cash balance in each fund of the budget. The tax freeze was causing those balances to dip below that figure. Since the district receives almost 92 percent of its revenue from local tax collections only twice a year, it must maintain those balances to pay its day-to-day expenses in much the same way that self-employed workers might bank part of their paycheck to cover times when they earned no money.

"Financial projections are more positive now than they were at the end of last year," said James L. Elliott, superintendent. Next year although cash balances in the education fund will decline by about \$3.7 million, these cash balances will be \$700,000 higher than had previously been projected.

"Reducing expenditures, combined with five plus five, is helping us handle the effects of the tax assessment freeze," said Elliott. Five plus five, an early retirement incentive program which allows teachers to buy five years of experience, was passed in February by the state legislature. The pro-

## Guidelines set for Niles mortgage program

The Village of Niles Mortgage Credit Certificate (MCC) program helps make home ownership more affordable. The MCC program allows first-time homebuyers to take a direct federal income tax credit of up to \$2,000 every year they live in their new home and pay interest on their mortgage loan.

The number of tax credits is limited so interested homebuyers should act as soon as possible. Homebuyers may go to any lending institution of their choice but, they must be approved for the MCC before they close on their

loan. There are purchase price and income limits associated with this program that are set by the federal government. The income limits are \$47,600 for a family of two or fewer, and \$54,740 for a family of three or more. The purchase price limits are \$165,510 for a new home, and \$106,290 for an existing home.

"Citizens in Niles can play a critical role in protecting our waters by joining the Illinois PIRG campaign, and signing a postcard," said Kioha. "Our goal is to generate enough public pressure nationwide to get a strong Clean Water Act reauthorized during this Congressional session. We'll be bringing our message door to door in Niles and in towns across the country making it easy for citizens to get involved."

## 1992 Property tax equalization factor set

A tentative 1992 property tax equalization factor of 2.0897 for Cook County was announced today by Acting Director of Revenue Sam McGaw.

The Department is required by law to calculate the factor, often called the multiplier, to achieve uniform property assessment throughout the state.

The 1991 equalization factor was 2.0523. The increase in the equalization factor means that property in Cook County was, on average, more underassessed than it was on year before.

The department determines the equalization factor for each county by comparing over a three-year period the actual selling price of individual properties to the assessed value placed on those properties by the county assessor. If the median level of assessments varies from the 33-1/3 percent level, by dividing Cook County's three-year average 15.95, into 33.33.

The equalization factor does not cause individual tax bills to go up, McGaw pointed out. Tax bills are determined by local tax-

ing bodies when they request the dollars needed to provide services to citizens. The assessment process simply determines how the bill will be divided among taxpayers.

McGaw said that Cook County will always have an equalization factor greater than 1.0 because: (1) it classifies property and assesses property at different levels; (2) it reassesses one-third of the property each year; and (3) the county assessor lacks the power to equalize assessments between assessment districts.

A Cook County ordinance requires that residential property (homes, condominiums, apartment buildings of six units or less) be assessed at 16 percent of market value; all other residential property (apartments with more than six units), 33 percent; vacant lots, 22 percent; property owned by not-for-profit corporations, 30 percent; commercial, 38 percent; industrial, 36 percent; and commercial or industrial property being developed in economically deprived areas, usually 16 percent.
