The proper procedure for appealing a conviction is through the criminal justice system. If these women were unable to present domestic violence issues to their satisfaction in their first trial, they should go (or have gone) through the appellate process where their rights should be protected. If the Project circumvents the judicial system and files clemency petitions for women only, the Project may frustrate the judicial process and disregard the plight of battered men. Society has been socialized to view women as the weaker of the

sexes and tends to see the woman as the potential victim. This onesided perspective leads to greater inequality between men and women and results in viewing social problems as affecting women only or men only. Since society views domestic violence as a wom-en's issue, men who are in abusive relationships are less likely to seek help for fear of ridicule or not being believed, and possibly less likely to receive help, too. There have not been recent studies or re-ports to my knowledge focusing on battered men because of society's biased view that only women are abused, and if men are abused, they deserved it. Domestic violence is a social issue that affects both genders. The Project's mass petition movement may add to gender inequality and bypass battered men who deserve to be released as much as the battered women.

Project To Free Battered Women From Jail -**Leaves Men Behind?**

During the past decade, domestic violence has garnered public attention and the primary focus has been on the woman as the victim. However, there are men who are also victims of domestic violence and their plight is often ignored. The lack of attention, information, and support for battered men indicates to me a possible "gender bias" in favor of women by domestic violence advocates. For instance, The Illihois Clemency Project intends to present mass clemency petitions to Governor Jim Edgar in the hopes that he will grant the release of convicted killers. But will any of these petitions seek clemency on behalf of men? An interesting question. Also, by requesting clemency for battered women, the Project seems to possibly be asking that the Governor accept and validate the killings that these "battered women" have committed.
