## Professional certification awarded

Eli Pick, Executive Director for Ballard, a healthcare residence in Des Plaines, was recently awarded professional certification by the American College of Health Care Administrators (ACHCA) for a second five years. Certification is an individual quality assurance procedure that involves the completion of self and peer-competency assessment followed by a professional development plan that includes continuing education and professional activities based on the individual's assessment.

"With the concern of politicians and consumers on quality in nursing home care, certification is the number one mechanism to assure this quality," said Gordon D. Grown, Ph.D., Professor and Director of Health Service Management at the University of Missouri-Columbia and Chair Person of the Professional Certification Committee.

The Professional Certification Program is open to administrators who hold a valid nursing home administrator's license that has been in effect for at least two

years and who have had at least two years' administration experience.

ACHCA, a nonprofit professional association representing administrators of long-term health or residential care facilities, agencies, or programs, has more than 5,000 members in all

50 states, Canada, and other countries. Its purpose is to promote and advance the professionalism of long-term care administration.

### A Golden Time



A study presented at a National Institute on Aging symposium last month suggests that a gene called apolipoprotein-E, or apoE, may protect some people from getting Alzheimer's disease. A flawed form of the same gene, called apoE4, may cause others to suffer from the disease. Duke researchers found that people with two copies of E4 have a 11 to 17% greater risk of developing Alzheimer's. These people are also more prone to develop Alzheimer's at a younger age. On the other hand, people with two of the E4 genes are less likely to develop the disease. Possibly the discovery about the Alzheimer's genes could eventually lead to drugs to simulate the protective action of apoE4.

The Circuit Breaker Tax Relief Program helps reduce the burden of property, mobile home and sales taxes on senior citizens and disabled persons in Illinois through a grant administered by the Illinois Department of Revenue. A pharmaceutical assistance feature also helps pay for some prescription medications.

The Circuit Breaker grant is available to property owners and renters, and residents of retirement facilities subject to property tax. People are eligible if they are age 65 or older or disabled who live in a building in Illinois subject to property tax, and have

### Seniors offered low-cost wills

Eligible senior citizens are offered low-cost will preparation services through the Senior Citizens Will Program, Wednesday, Jan. 5, at the Center of Concern in

Park Ridge. Appointments will be scheduled beginning at 9 a.m. that day.

An attorney from The Chicago Bar Association will provide free consultations about wills to seniors who register for the service. At a client's request, the attorney will also prepare a simple will for a reduced fee. The cost for drawing up a will is not more than \$50 for an individual (\$75 for a couple).

A senior may also ask the attorney to prepare a Durable Power of Attorney or Living Will document. A Durable Power of Attorney allows a senior to designate another person to make property or health care decisions in the event the senior becomes physically or mentally unable to do so. A Living Will allows an individual with a terminal health condition to express his or her desire to have death-delaying procedures withheld or withdrawn.

The fee for completing a Durable Power of Attorney document is \$75 maximum for an individual (\$125 maximum for a couple). The cost for establishing a Living Will is no more than \$50 for an individual (\$75 for a couple).

To be eligible for the Senior Citizens Will Program, a client must be age 60 or over. Annual income must not exceed \$15,000 (\$20,000 for a couple); and assets, excluding a home and personal car, should be worth no more than \$30,000.

The Senior Citizens Will Program is sponsored by The Chicago Bar Association, the Suburban Area Agency on Aging, the Chicago Department on Aging, and the Cook County Legal Assistance Foundation.

He had served many positions during his 15 years on the Board, including Board President in 1983, 1984, 1986, and 1991.

He had been presently serving his third six-year term.

During his tenure on the Board, all park playgrounds had been replaced, a new park was acquired, new facilities were constructed and the Morton Grove Park District received numerous awards for facility design, financial reporting, safety and outstanding service.

A 24-year-old Chicago man was arrested Dec. 26 in connection with two armed robberies in Niles.

The most recent incident occurred on Dec. 21 when Imad Dajani, from the 8000 block of Churchill, Niles, went into First Chicago Bank, 8510 Golf Road, and obtained \$6,000 which police say was to buy a new car.

Dajani returned to his home on Churchill and parked his car on the north side of the street.

As he was exiting his vehicle, he was approached from behind by an offender who demanded that Dajani give him his wallet and coat. Dajani refused, and the offender said he was going to shoot him in the head.

According to police, as Dajani turned and faced the suspect, the offender fired one round into the air from an unidentified caliber and then a second round, which hit the Niles resident in the left hip.

Dajani fell to the ground and the offender reached into the victim's coat, pulled out the white bank envelope holding the \$6,000, and fled in a 1979 to 1981 model brown Oldsmobile with no front license plate, witnesses said.

Earlier that week, at 8:12 p.m. on December 18, witnesses saw a man roaming around Jewel Food Store, 5667 Touhy, Niles, before he walked up to the counter, pulled his coat open, displayed a silver gun and demanded an employee to put all the money in a bag.

The employee filled the bag with \$800 and the offender fled Continued on Page 26

### Youths charged with attempted murder in Niles North shooting

The Skokie youth and two Chicagoans charged with first degree attempted murder in the November 15 shooting of Joel Galutan were arraigned December 15 in Cook County Circuit Court in Skokie.

Richard Ponzalan, 18, of 9151 Lowell Ave. Skokie, a Niles North student, and John D. Angeles, 17, of 1615 Howard St. Chicago, a Mather High School student, were indicted by a Cook County grand jury for first degree attempted murder, aggravated battery with a firearm, aggravated battery, obstruction of justice, and unlawful use of a weapon on school property.

Police said Nunez faces the obstruction and weapons charges because he allegedly took the .22-caliber Magnum five-shot revolver used in the shooting into Continued on Page 26

With winter approaching, 55 Alive/Mature Driving, a classroom refresher course of the American Association of Retired Persons, offers the following suggestions for driving in poor weather: • If driving in snow or ice conditions, reduce speed and increase distance between cars. • Keep all windows and lights free of ice and snow. • Bridges and overpasses freeze first, and retain ice longer. • Icy or snowy roads are more slippery at 32 degrees than when colder. • In fog, turn on low beams for greater visibility. • Chain reactions are common in fog. Pull off in a safe area and wait for conditions to improve. Do not creep along at five or ten miles per hour. • Make sure wiper blades are in good shape. It's not a bad habit to replace them once a year.

### Taxing bodies' increases confuse residents

Dear Editor:

It never ceases to amaze me how some people allow others to confuse them. I'm referring to the recent confusion arising out of taxing bodies' increases.

For example, Maine Township wants to add an addition on their building so the teens in the area have a drop-in center. (Currently, the township is renting space for that purpose). Hundreds of residents showed up at a recent town hall meeting to protest a 46.9% increase. However, not one resident in School District 63 showed up for the meeting regarding the school district's increase of a 22.7% increase.

Now, at first glance, you'd say that District 63 was asking for less than half of what the township was asking. Right? Wrong! The "key" is a percentage of what? These percentages are increases in the portion of which ever entity one is referring to. The percentage increase refers to the existing percentage; NOT to the entire tax bill.

My tax bill for 1992 was \$3,977. Of that amount \$35 was

for Maine Township. The increase, which will be for one year only, that the township is asking for would be an additional \$18. On the other hand, School District 63 took \$1,226 from me in 1992. A 22.7% increase means that next year I'll be paying \$1,506 to the School District 63 amounting to a \$280 increase. Add to that the additional \$90 that High School District 207 will get (they already take almost 25% of my entire tax bill) and \$3 to Oakton College and my tax bill for 1993 has just increased by \$392.

Out of which, I might state once again, Maine Township will get \$18. That comes to less than a nickel a day to keep our youths off the streets and give them a place to gather; something our local villages or churches are not doing these days.

If you really want to know how much your increases are going to be, take your last years tax bill and multiply the Equalized Valuation (found on the right side of the bill) by .00118 for the total you will be paying to Maine Township. Then multiply the Equalized Valuation by .0331 and you will have the amount you will be paying to School District 63 (if you reside in that district, of course).

On a closing note I'd like to say that it always makes me wonder why people who take pride in their homes are taxed to the hilt and those who draw graffiti all over their domains are given government subsidies.

### Resolutionary Wars: New Year's Resolves

In one year and out the other. By now, most people probably don't even remember making any resolutions last year. Well, habits do die hard. Who can be blamed, isn't it human to err?

What makes up a resolution? Usually, it is some habitual thing that bothers us about ourselves. The only problem is that it really must not bother us too much, otherwise it would have never become a habitual thing! So why do we fail? Most failures occur because we pick faults that we have no idea how to change, or set goals too lofty to achieve.

The biggest problem that I see is that most people do not have much luck with getting rid of the old habit. That's why smokers can't quit even after getting rid of every cigarette they own. For example, when the urge comes, nothing replaces the satisfaction of a puff and you end up bumming a smoke from the nearest person. Some people can, and some habits are, the type that you can get rid of and never look back. Most habits must be slowly altered until a new behavior pattern evolves.

Here's a classic story. The New Year's resolution is to take off fifty pounds and get back to a size 6 in time for spring break. January 1st, you're too tired from partying the last night, you sleep in, and wake up in time for supper. "Golly, what a great way to start, I'll just eat one meal a day and in two months I can be on the cover of Cosmo!" By January 2nd, this is getting old. "After all, a person has to eat food to stay alive." Two weeks later, you've lost four pounds and are ready to hang it up. What's wrong? First of all, the goal was impossible to reach. Next, the habit changed too drastically at one time to be acceptable. Finally, the means to reach the goal was unsound, unwise, and unhealthy.

What is there to do? Learn about your habit, what triggers off certain behaviors, why you derive satisfaction from it, and get informed on how to change it in a healthy way. Seek medical advice when appropriate. Find an achievable goal and replace one habit with another. That way, your urges begin to be satisfied in new ways. If stress or boredom is contributing to a habit, seek out recreational alternatives by exercise or hobbies. Be realistic and have a positive attitude.

Before we eat up all of our time (OOPS, slip of the tongue), here are some good resolutions for the next year.

1. Less is more. Food, that is. Three meals a day and fewer calories at each sitting. Reduce fat calories to 30% or less in your food. Eat from all the food groups. Get lots of fiber! Drink enough water each day.

2. Foot power - Exercise! Walk regularly if you can't do anything else. Three times a week, minimum. If nothing else, it saves on gas and doesn't cause air pollution.

3. Buckle up - The seat belt is that shiny thing you sit on when you get into the car. It's supposed to go around you to keep you from getting hurt. (For kids, car seats!)

4. Smoking - Ask yourself if it is worth continuing to smoke cigarettes if the price per pack goes up much more.

5. Let's get physical - Yes Virginia, doctors do physicals to diagnose as well as to prevent problems. Call your doctor to see if you are due.

Enough is enough. A happy and joyous holiday to all! May the next year bring good fortunes and good health.

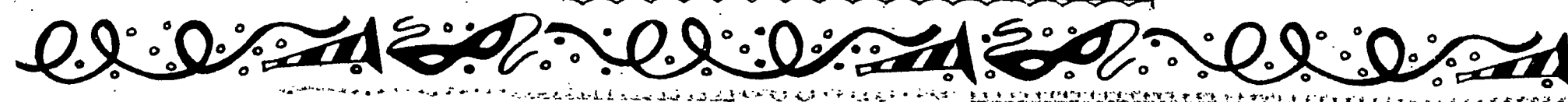

## Breakfast is fuel for thought

People who skip breakfast tire more easily, react more slowly and work less effectively in the late morning hours - even if they've had a good night's sleep. They also tend to have more difficulty losing weight.

Nutrition experts at Dairy Council of Wisconsin offer these quick suggestions for a day's most important pit stop:

- Have fruit-flavored yogurt with a muffin or slice of toast.
- Combine milk with your choice of yogurt, fruit, creamy peanut butter, honey, wheat germ or other ingredients for a blender shake.
- Split an English muffin and top it with pineapple and shredded

cheese, then broil.

- Sprinkle granola over plain or flavored yogurt.
- Place slices of Cheddar or Swiss cheese on toast or a toasted English muffin.
- Make breakfast kabobs with fruit and cheese.
- Spread thinly sliced Italian bread with preserves and top it with mozzarella cheese; broil just until the cheese melts.
- Top toast with cottage cheese, sprinkle with cinnamon and broil.
- Microwave left-over rice, mix in raisins fruit and add milk; serve as a cereal.
- Spread a bagel with cream cheese and add fresh fruit.

## Causes of headaches discussed

When is a headache only a headache? The cause of persistent headaches can be difficult to pin down. Eyestrain, stress, allergy or flu symptoms may cause discomfort. So can a brain tumor.

Brain tumor symptoms appear gradually, often mimicking other health problems which can delay diagnosis, says the American Brain Tumor Association (ABTA).

Vomiting, with or without nausea, or headache, soon after waking, are among brain tumor symptoms. Other common ones are a clumsy, uncoordinated walk; one-side smile or drooping eyelid; difficulty in talking, swallowing or seeing.

Brain tumor signals may appear so gradually that personality changes, hearing loss and even unusual droopiness may not seem significant or alarming.

The cause of primary brain tumors is unknown. Environmental agents, familial tendencies and viruses are under investigation by medical researchers, according to the nonprofit ABTA, which nationally funds brain tumor research.

1994-1995 school year. There will be discussion at the next meeting about how to deal with this budget problem.

The Board appointed Lawrence "Larry" Goldberg, of Des Plaines, to fill the vacancy left by Trustee Bill Spaulding who is resigning for health reasons. His appointment lasts until November of 1995 when an election will take place.

Goldberg has extensive experience in marketing and management. He currently is the manager of market development for Zurich-American Insurance Company. He has chaired the Clean Community/ Beautification Commission of Des Plaines since 1992, is active in the Association of Condominium, Townhouse, and Homeowner Associations, and is a member of Oakton Affiliates, a group of community leaders who act as college liaisons to the community.

A motion for the Oakton Foundation to begin a Coffee/Expresso Service for students was passed with significant changes. There are concerns about whether the Foundation can raise funds in this manner, so the College itself will run the service and donate proceeds to the

does not come through with," he added.

The distribution of the E.A.V. for 1993 was what, Korpan termed, a "tremendous impact" on homeowners. The bulk for the increase will be in the residential category of distribution, he said.

Money given to the district is also determined by the tax rate.

A freeze in the tax rate in 1992 lowered the amount the district had available, Korpan said. To determine the amount available, the E.A.V. from the previous year is used.

The tax freeze, consequently, has amounted to two years of losses for the education fund.

Korpan said that the difference between tax rates cost the district \$1.4 million in 1992 and another \$550,000 loss this year.

In Korpan's report, he also included a breakdown of how the lottery dollar is spent. He said that lottery proceeds are used to replace money from the general fund used to pay for education.

Fifty three cents of every lottery dollar are used to pay for prizes, with 38 cents going to the common school fund.

The District typically levies more than will be needed as a safety net, so the district can recoup the money it has coming, Korpan said.

If the county clerk levies more, changes the multiplier, or there is a change in the assessed valuation, the district will get less.

Only one school board member voted no, as the 1993 property levy was passed later in the evening.

Zalewski compared the Niles Elementary tax rate to other local districts and found many neighboring rates to be double that of District 71. "We are the lowest in this immediate area," he said.

Calculating how the increase in the levy would affect the local taxpayer, Zalewski based his figures on a home worth \$100,000 without taxing any exemptions. He said that such a homeowner could expect a \$26 increase.

The 1993 tax levy will be used to fund the 1994-95 school year and the total levy this year is \$3,676,650.

"The district has always only levied what it needs for the immediate future and for whatever projects there might be," Zalewski said.

# MWRD budget shows levy increase

The Board of Commissioners of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago today passed the final amendments to its 1994 Budget. The budget totals \$752 million, and reflects a 4.9% increase over 1993.

Thomas S. Fuller, president of the Board of Commissioners, said, "This is the fifth year in a row that the District has kept its tax levy under our self-imposed 5% tax cap. The 1994 budget enables us to control costs and provide sewage treatment at the lowest cost of any large city in the country. It also includes \$191 million for the next portion of the Deep Tunnel, to be built under the Des Plaines River, and for construction to begin on the McCook Reservoir, which will provide flood relief for thousands of homes in the area."

The total appropriation request of \$752 million is for collecting and treating more than 550 billion gallons of wastewater from Cook County residents and industries, while meeting all environmental requirements for plant operations and quality of the treated wastewater.

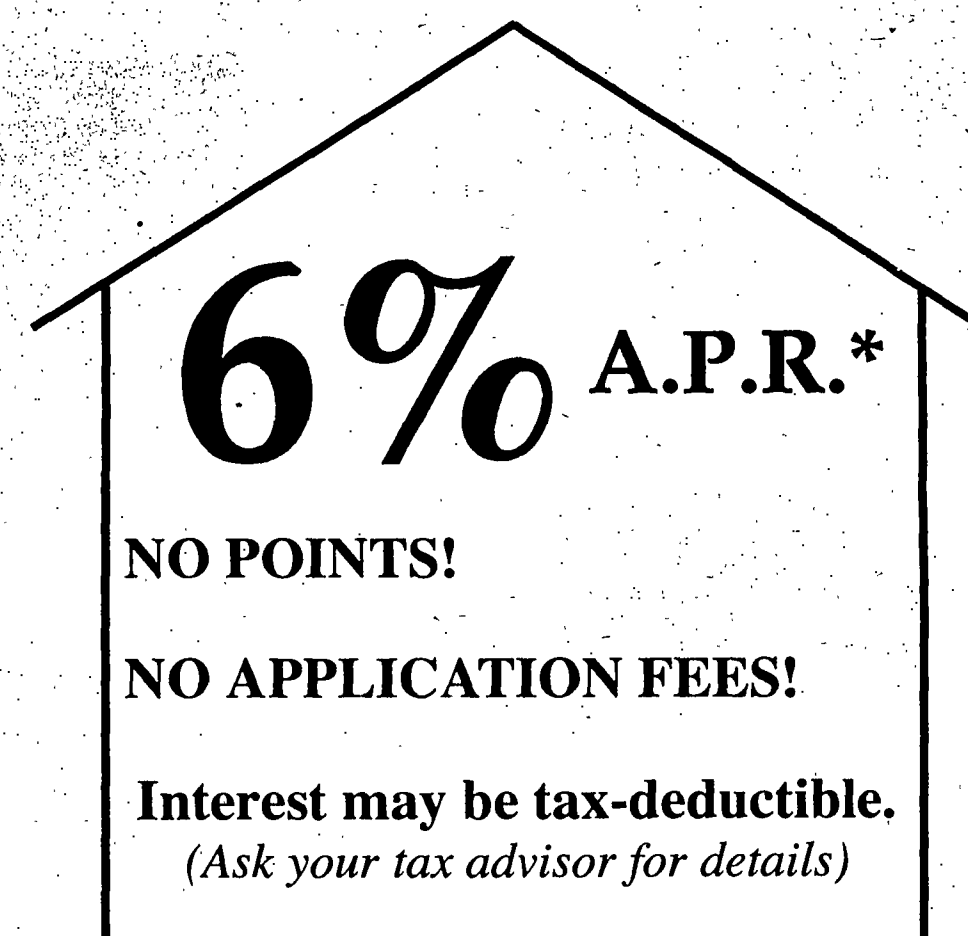
