A study presented at a National Institute on Aging symposium last month suggests that a gene called apoliporotein-E, or apoE, may protect some people from getting Alzheimer's disease. A flawed form of the same gene, called apoE4, may cause others to suffer from the disease. Duke research from the disease. Duke researchers found that people with two copies of E4 have a 11 to 17% greater risk of developing Alzheimer's. These people are also more prone to develop Alzheimer's at a younger age. With winter approaching, 55 Alive/Mature Driving, a classroom refresher course of the American Association of Retired Persons, offers the following suggestions for driving in poor weather: • If driving in snow or ice conditions, reduce speed and increase distance between cars. • Keep all windows and lights free of ice and snow. • Bridges and overpasses freeze first, and retain ice longer. • Icy or snowy roads are more slippery at 32 degrees than when colder. • In fog, turn on low beams for greater visibility. • Chain reactions are common in fog. Pull off in a safe area and wait for conditions to improve. Do not creep along at five or ten miles per hour. • Make sure wiper blades are in good shape. It's not a bad habit to replace them once a year.





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

**Resolutionary Wars:** 

New Year's Resolves

In one year and out the other. By now, most people probably don't even remember making any resolutions last year. Well, habits do die hard. Who can be blamed, isn't it human to err?

What makes up a resolution? Usually, it is some habitual thing that bothers us about ourselves. The only problem is that it really must not bother us too much, otherwise it would have never become we pick faults that we have no idea how to change, or set goals too lofty to achieve. a habitual thing! So why do we fail? Most failures occur because

The biggest problem that I see is that most people do not have much luck with getting rid of the old habit. That's why smokers can't quit even after geting rid of every cigarette they own. For example, when the urge comes, nothing replaces the satisfaction of a puff and you end up bumming a smoke from the nearest person. Some people can, and some habits are, the type that you can get rid of and never look back. Most habits must be slowly altered until a new behavior pattern evolves.

Here's a classic story. The New Year's resolution is to take off fifty pounds and get back to a size 6 in time for spring break. January 1st, you're too tired from partying the last night, you sleep in, and wake up in time for supper. "Golly, what a great way to start, I'll just eat one meal a day and in two months I can be on the cover of Cosmo!" By January 2nd, this is getting old. "After all, a person has to eat food to stay alive." Two week later, you've lost four pounds and are ready to hang it up. What's wrong" First of all, the goal was impossible to reach. Next, the habit changed too drastically at one time to be acceptable. Finally, the means to reach the goal was unsound, unwise, and unhealthy.

What is there to do? Learn about your habit, what triggers off certain behaviors, why you derive satisfaction from it, and get informed on how to change it in a healthy way. Seek medical advice when appropriate. Find an achievable goal and replace one habit with another. That way, your urges begin to be satisfied in new ways. If stress or boredom is contributing to a habit, seek out recreational alternatives by exercise or hobbies. Be realistic and have a

Before we eat up all of our time (OOPS, slip of the tongue), here re some good resolutions for the next year: 1. Less is more-Food, that is. Three meals a day and fewer calo-

ries at each sitting. Reduce fat calories to 30% or less in your food. Eat from all the food groups. Get lots of fiber! Drink enough water

2. Foot power - Exercise! Walk regularly if you can't do anything else. Three times a week, minimum. If nothing else, it saves on gas

and doesn't cause air pollution.

3. Buckle up - The seat belt is that shiny thing you sit on when you get into the car. It's supposed to go around you to keep you from getting hurt. (For kids, car seats!) 4. Smoking - Ask yourself if it is worth continuing to smoke cig-

arettes if the price per pack goes up much more.

5. Let's get physical - Yes Virginia, doctors do physicals to diagnose as well as to prevent problems. Call your doctor to see if you
