

## Truck struck by commuter train

A truck was struck by a train at Dempster and Lehigh Streets Monday morning.

According to Morton Grove police, at approximately 7:06 a.m. Monday, Isaiah Robinson, Jr., 47, of Memphis, Tennessee, stopped his tractor-trailer combination on westbound Dempster Street behind a flashing railroad

signal, a lowered gate and a red traffic light.

The railroad gates for westbound Dempster began to rise and Robinson drove his truck forward, despite the flashing railroad signal, the partially raised gate and the red traffic light. The truck struck the gate, which never completely raised, causing it to

bend northbound.

Robinson continued to move the truck, crossing the railroad tracks and stopping at the westbound red light, leaving 12.5 feet of the trailer's rear section blocking the southbound railroad tracks.

A police officer, stopped

## Project park revenue up 15% in '94

Niles Park Board approved its 1994 appropriation at a special meeting Thursday night. It projects receipts for the coming year will increase \$700,000 to \$5,294,347, a 15% increase over 1993.

A 4.99% tax levy increase approved last September will raise park residents' taxes for the coming year. The 1994 appropriation decreased by \$1.1 million but it is the result of figures merely being moved around into different funds. Construction costs for the upgrade of the ice rink in 1993 was the cause for the difference in

the two years' budgets. But the almost \$2 million costs, not in this year's budget, can be found in a bond fund which will be paid over 10 years.

In a comparison of projected receipts, real estate tax revenue is expected to bring in \$2,933,838 in 1994 compared to \$2,394,075 in 1993. Replacement taxes are projected to increase \$17,000. Recreation revenue decreases by \$7,500 while ice rink revenue is expected to go up about \$58,000. Swimming pools' revenue is projected to increase \$33,000 while golf course revenue is projected to decrease \$110,000. Food operations revenue is projected at \$175,000. It was not listed in last year's projected revenue receipts.

In other actions Acting Park President Elaine Heinen announced park board president Buddy Skaja requested a "leave of absence" for a minimum of six weeks for health reasons. In granting the request Heinen wished Skaja a "speedy recovery."

## Man commits suicide at Niles YMCA

Niles police ruled suicide as the cause of death of a 30-year-old Morton Grove man found January 30 in the room he had been living at the YMCA.

According to police, Todd Aborkenhagen, formerly of Morton Grove, was found at 2:17 p.m. Sunday in room 217 at the YMCA, 6300 Touhy, after neighbors smelled an odor through the walls.

"There was no forced entry and the door was dead bolted from the inside," said Sergeant Roger Wilson of the Niles Police Department. "The medical examiner, Deputy Bucci, determined this a suicide. There were no signs of violence and we are now waiting for toxicology reports."

According to Wilson, Aborkenhagen had been recently divorced.

## From the Left Hand

When Nick Blase and Ken Scheel and Len Syzmanski et al upset the Village Trustee incumbents in 1961 it was the culmination of a crusade of young bright people who took over the reigns of the village. It was a genuine revolution. The old timers, who ran the village during the thirties, forties and fifties, had to move aside for the new wave of young bright people who came out of World War II, went to college under the G.I. Bill, and wanted to upscale a village which they believed was mired in the old ways of the pre-war days.

One of the major changes took place on the zoning board where the "best and the brightest" took over zoning matters.

In 1962-63 Grennan Heights' Jack Frick moved on to the board and his stamp of courtesy and seriousness of purpose and all-around excellence quickly came to exemplify the marks of the board. In 1964 he became secretary of the board and in 1968 was selected as chairman of the board. He remained at the head of the zoning board for 25 years until his recent resignation.

At lunch Monday, Jack told me his major aim on the board was to preserve the integrity of the village. He said it was important to keep the village balanced between residential, manufacturing and business interests. He said the job was

## Niles senior citizens offered low-cost wills

Eligible senior citizens are offered low-cost will preparation services through the Senior Citizens Will Program, Friday, Feb. 18, at the Niles Senior Center. Appointments will be scheduled from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. that day.

An attorney from The Chicago Bar Association will provide free consultations about wills to seniors who register for the service. At a client's request, the attorney will also prepare a simple will for a reduced fee. The cost for drawing up a will is no more than \$50 for an individual (\$75 for a couple).

A senior may also ask the attorney to prepare a Durable Power of Attorney or Living Will document. A Durable Power of Attorney allows a senior to designate

another person to make property or health care decisions in the event the senior becomes physically or mentally unable to do so. A Living Will allows an individual with a terminal health condition to express his or her desire to have death-delaying procedures withheld or withdrawn.

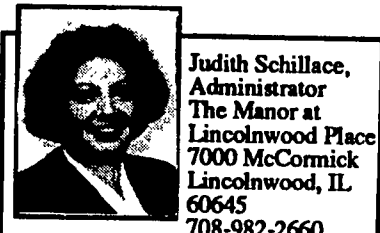
The fee for completing a Durable Power of Attorney document is \$75 maximum for an individual (\$125 maximum for a couple). The cost for establishing a Living Will is no more than \$50 for an individual (\$75 for a couple).

To be eligible for the Senior Citizens Will Program, a client must be age 60 or over. Annual income must not exceed \$15,000 (\$20,000 for a couple); and assets, excluding a home and personal car, should be worth no more than \$30,000.

The Senior Citizens Will Program is sponsored by The Chicago Bar Association, the Suburban Area Agency on Aging, the Chicago Department on Aging, and the Cook County Legal Assistance Foundation.

Appointments for the Senior Citizens Will Program must be scheduled two weeks in advance. To register, call the Niles Senior Center at (708) 967-6100, ext. 376.

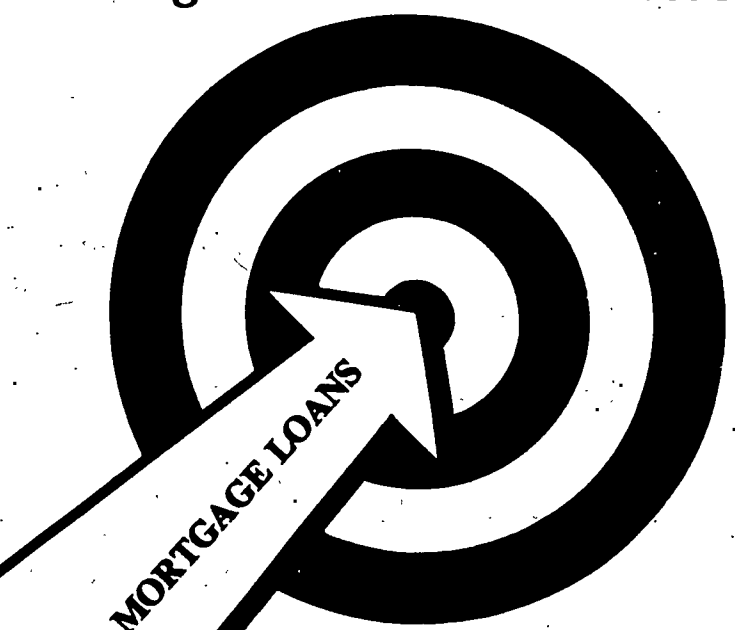

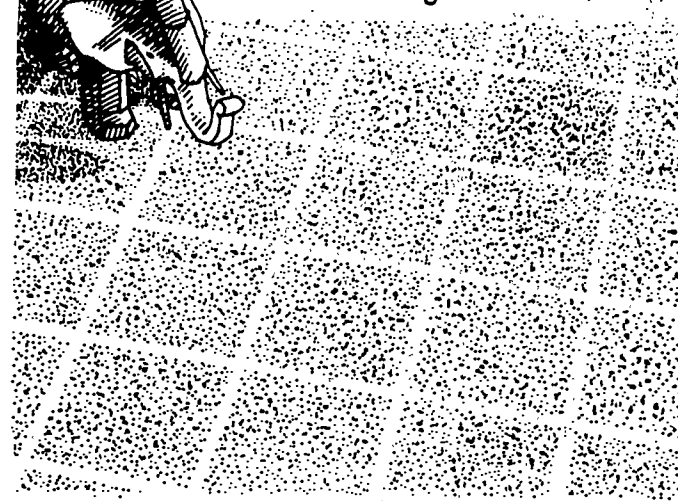

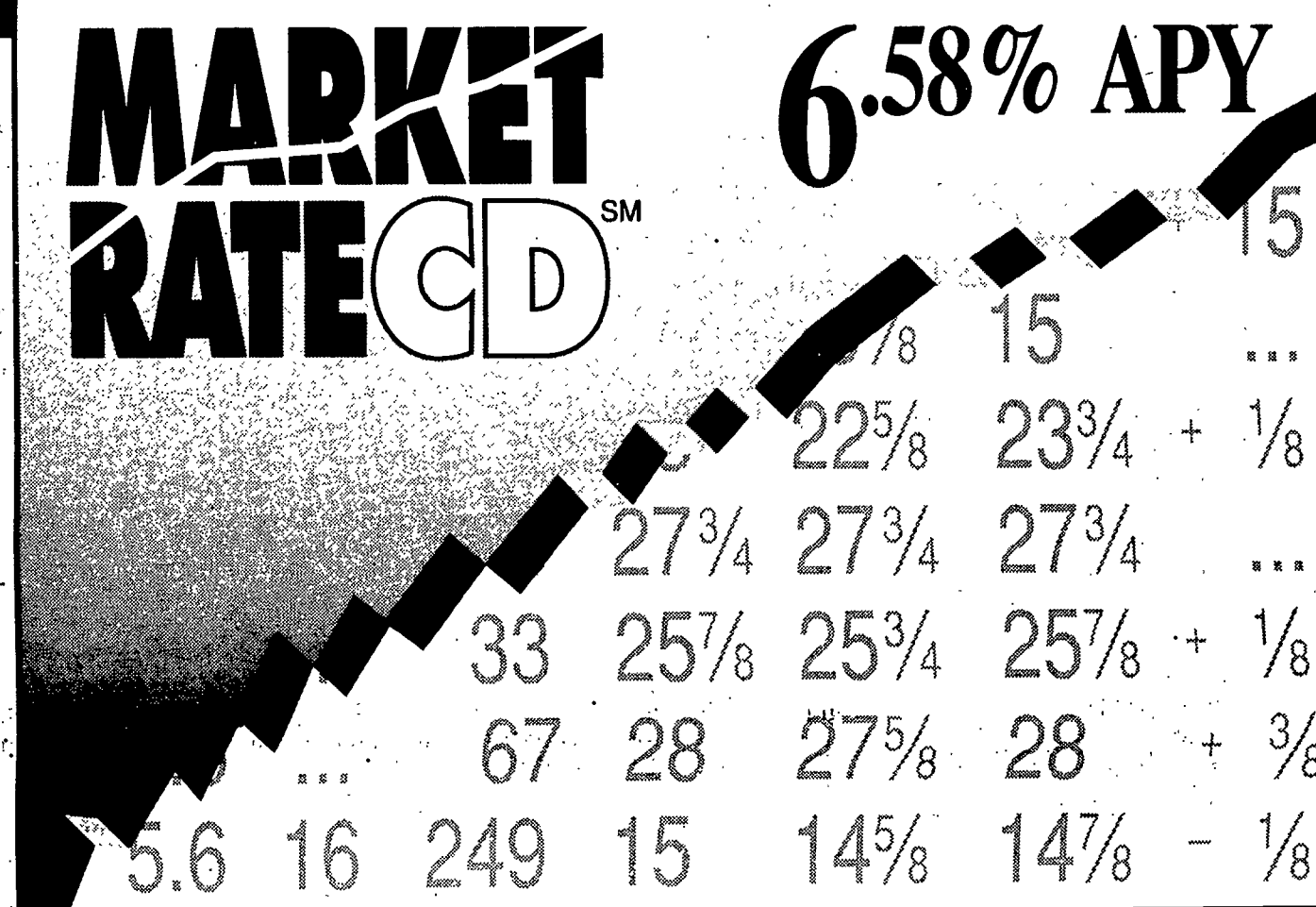

When Filing for Social Security...  
Have documents handy

"When a person files a claim for Social Security benefits, they will be asked for documents to help decide whether they are eligible and when their benefits will begin," said Thomas Curin, Social Security Manager in Des Plaines. He added, "if a person is retiring, we'll ask to see their birth certificate. If their spouse is filing too, we generally need his or her birth certificate and we also need birth certificate for any children who are eligible for benefits." If you're filing for survivor's benefits, we'll need to see the deceased's death certificate.

Curin stressed, "Regardless of the documents we need, it's important that they are the originals or certified copies. We can't accept a photocopy unless the official custodian of the original document certifies that it is an exact copy of the original."

If a person doesn't have the document that is needed, there are often other kinds of records that may be acceptable. Curin clarified by saying, "If someone doesn't have a birth certificate, for example, we may be able to use a religious record of their birth." The general rule he cited is that the sooner in life the document was recorded, the more accurate it is.

"Many people file their claims by telephone," Curin said. "In those cases, we ask them to mail the documents to us," he said. He explained that Social Security certifies and returns the documents soon after they are received. For those who are reluctant to mail their documents, they can file the claim by telephone and then take the document to the Social Security office. Someone on the staff will certify that the evidence is acceptable.

Curin added that people with questions concerning what evidence will need to complete their claim should call Social Security's toll free 800 number to clarify exactly what evidence will be required. The number is 1-800-772-1213 and can be called any week-day between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Senior and disabled citizens have until December 31, 1994, to submit their 1993 Circuit Breaker claim forms to the state in order to qualify for the Circuit Breaker grant or Pharmaceutical Assistance coverage. Circuit Breaker tax relief is available to persons who are 65 or who are 16 years old and totally disabled, when their household incomes are less than \$14,000. The program also includes Pharmaceutical Assistance for Circuit Breaker claimants who use prescription heart, arthritis or diabetes medicines.

Under the program eligible persons can purchase an identification card which helps them to pay for approved prescription medications. Taxpayers can call the department's toll-free Circuit Breaker line at 1-800-624-2459 to get answers to any of their Circuit Breaker questions. The hearing impaired can call 1-800-544-5304 for TDD service.

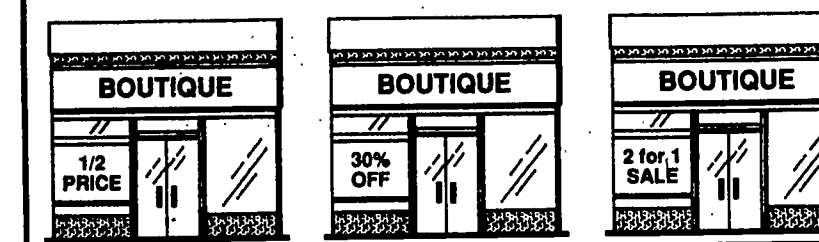

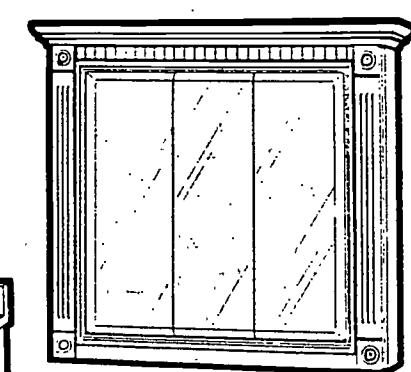

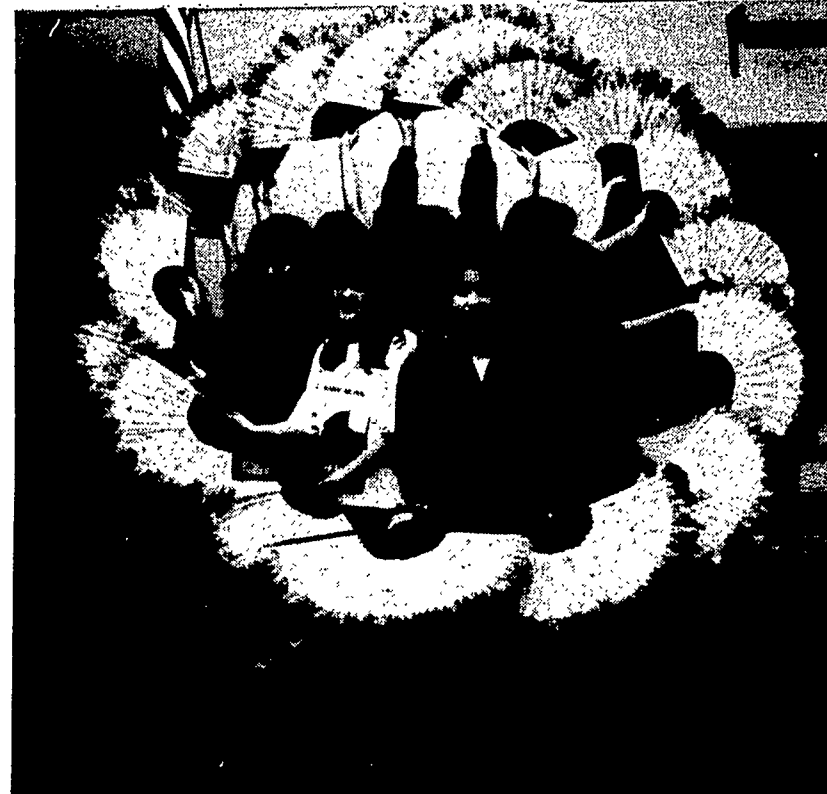

### A Tale of Two Flus:

It was the best of times, it was the worst of times. For viruses, this sure seems to be a good time this winter. Unfortunately for us, not everything flying about is The Flu. Just as a whale is different from a guppy, Influenza A is different from what we call the "stomach flu."

Imagine a recent conversation in a doctor's office. "Doc, I've got the flu." The doctor continues, "Which flu, the Real Flu or the stomach thing with diarrhea?" This is a baited question that begins to sound like Abbott and Costello. "Yeah, the diarrhea... You mean the one where you just move your stools or the watery kind of diarrhea that goes whoosh and gushes out." Sounds frustrating, doesn't it?

Viral gastroenteritis, better known as the "Stomach Flu," may have fever and muscle aches, but that's where the similarities with Influenza end. Two viruses cause epidemic diarrhea, Norwalk-like agents or rotaviruses. These are usually non-threatening, inconvenient illnesses of five to eight days in duration. Both feature low grade temperature, abdominal cramps, and vomiting and/or diarrhea.

All that is needed is rest, plenty of fluids, and a gradual advance of your diet as tolerated. On the first day, drink clear liquids: fruit juice, broth, Gatorade, and jello (but not red colored jello, since it looks like blood when it comes out and can be confusing).

Day two allows a slight increase in proteins to full liquids: yogurt, pudding, ice cream, orange juice, or any other liquids. On the third day, try soft foods including pasta, casseroles, and soups. Finally, on the fourth day attempt a regular meal. If symptoms recur, stop advancing the diet until the next day. Good over-the-counter anti-diarrhea formulas are helpful. Good hand-washing is vital in preventing spread within your household.

Influenza is a horse of a different color, since this is a potentially life-threatening illness. That's why vaccination is available for prevention of the disease each fall. Now that it is too late to get immunized, what can be done? For some, prevention still is possible with two prescribed drugs, amantadine or rimantadine. These are taken daily during an outbreak of influenza to prevent infection. For most of us, this is costly.

If you unfortunately become infected, symptoms rapidly develop: high fever, muscle or joint pains, headache, runny nose, and dry cough. If you are still within the first two to three days of illness, using the above drugs may still shorten symptom duration in half. Typically, untreated "Flu" lasts two to three weeks. Importantly, drug treatment may not prevent complications of pneumonia.

Next time you get sick with one of these illnesses, remember it's Influenza or gastroenteritis. It's time that "Flu" as a term files out of the coop.

made easier by the co-  
operation with the village  
board which agreed with the  
zoning board 96% of the time.

Because the village board is  
an elected body and the zoning  
board is an appointed body,  
the village board has veto pow-  
er over most of what the zon-  
ing board does. But in only  
4% of all zoning matters did  
the elected village trustees  
contest the decision of the zon-  
ing board members.

Jack said his earmark for  
running the board was to treat  
everyone courteously and ac-  
cept the fact the zoning board  
"takes the heat" when contro-  
versial issues are decided. He  
said it wasn't possible to please  
everyone, and at least 50% of  
the time decisions were ac-  
ceptable to people who attend  
board meetings.

Jack said the final decisions  
of zoning matters are reviewed  
and approved by the village  
board and the additional input  
by departmental heads enables  
them to make a more educated  
decision.

Frick said he had four rules  
which he gave to new board  
members when they began  
their terms on the board. He  
told them to use common  
sense, to do what is in the best  
interest of the village, to know  
the ordinances and never to ab-  
stain from voting.

Jack said he always appre-  
ciated people coming out and  
expressing their opinions. He  
said final decisions are not al-  
ways what you would like

them to be but they're based on  
the best that you can do.

As chairman, Jack said you  
should conduct meetings with  
a fair hand but you don't al-  
ways express yourself. He  
said there are positions of neu-  
trality which the chairman  
should retain and the "chairs"  
input should aid in moving the  
meeting progressively toward  
a decision.

The zoning chairman said  
there were no alliances on the  
board, the Mayor didn't inter-  
fere with board decisions and  
board members would con-  
scientiously go out to the prop-  
erty under consideration and  
personally view the property  
before reaching a decision.

Jack speaks very highly of  
Joe Salerno, who was the right  
hand of the zoning board mem-  
bers, in his role as head of the  
department of code enforce-  
ment. He said, Joe, who also  
recently retired, will follow  
Jack into the Zoning Board  
chairman's chair.

Talking to Joe, he said Jack  
is very intelligent, is a thinker  
and foresees problems and re-  
solves them before they be-  
come problems.

Jack is now 77 years old and  
said it's time to "take it easy."  
He likes to travel, enjoys can-  
oeing and sailing and will  
have more time for such activi-  
ties. His wife, Eleanor, passed  
away three years ago. He has a  
son Terry, who's a gastroen-  
terologist at the University of  
Wisconsin.

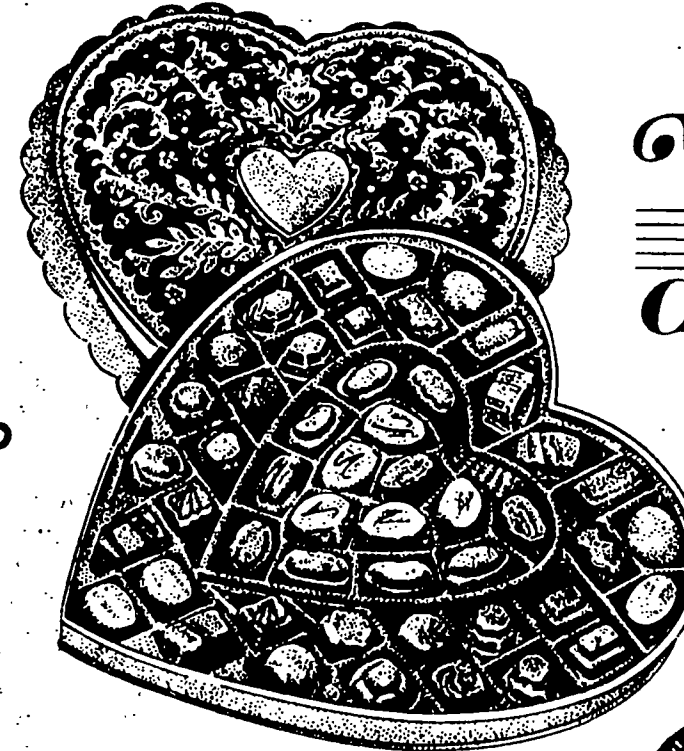
