Antique guns exempt from Niles ban

At the February 22, Village Board Meeting, the Board voted to prohibit the sale of handguns, except antique handguns. An antique handgun is one which is incapable of being fired or discharged, or any firearm manufactured before 1898 since cartridge ammunition is not com-

mercially available. The Village of Niles hopes this step toward gun control will also send a message to other communities. Also, perhaps the federal and state government will enact legislation that is more restrictive, therefore making a greater impact on society.

Mother charged with neglect, endangerment in 2 deaths

'Home Alone' children die in fire

A 43-year-old woman was at a bar buying beer and cigarettes while a Niles house fire killed two of her children left home alone.

Beata Manini, 27, was charged with two counts of endangering the life of a child and two counts of contributing to the neglect of a child after a fire killed a two-year-old and a four-year-old who were left alone at home.

At approximately 2:02 p.m. February 23, Niles police received a 911 call reporting a house fire at 6646 Albion Avenue in Niles.

The two officers on the scene, Sergeant Donald Leavitt and Officer James Zimmerman, ob-

served heavy smoke being emitted from the house. The officers spoke with Manini at the site who stated that her two small children, Michelle, 4, and Marek, 2, were inside the burning home. The officers made several futile attempts to enter the house, but were pushed back due to thick black smoke.

The Niles Fire Department arrived, entered the house and located Marek in a front bedroom and Michelle in the living room near a bed that the parents used.

Both children were unconscious, covered with soot and had burns on their bodies. They were transported to Lutheran General

Oakton Community College Task Force to study college funding

The 450th meeting of the Oakton Community College (OCC) Board of Trustees was held on February 15, 1994.

President TenHoeve began by saying the State of Illinois' financial picture, as it applies to community colleges, has not improved. He also noted that they are soon to appoint a task force to look at all of the major components of funding community colleges, including the funding formulae, reimbursements, revenues, and perhaps incentives for fund-raising. He expects a major

undertaking around these issues during the next twelve months.

Boyd Block, the project manager for the construction at both campuses, gave an update about the construction. He showed slides of everything that has taken place to date. Special coverings were used to enclose the steel work so that the masonry could continue all during the cold weather. Right now both projects are pretty well on schedule, within budget, and the contractor is feeling confident about the ongoing progress.

Paul Gilson and Harold Hansen appeared on behalf of the Centre East Board and the Centre East Authority. They introduced the project manager of the newly planned North Shore Performing Arts Center. This new facility will be on Skokie and Golf by the North Shore Hilton and will house Centre East, Wisdom Bridge Theater, and North Shore Hilton as permanent tenants. The center will have an over eight hundred seat theater, a large undefined space for conferences,

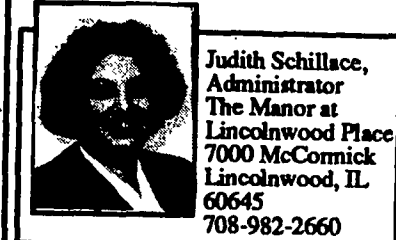

One recent study found that dementia in the elderly is more commonly caused by reduced blood supply to the brain-vascular dementia-than had been previously thought. In other words, Alzheimer's disease may not be the cause of dementia in the elderly as often as currently believed. A study followed 143 men and 351 women over 65 and found about 30% suffered from dementia. Initial findings were that 47% of the dementia cases were vascular in origin vs. 43.5% from Alzheimer's Disease. Of course, all the diagnoses were tentative, but the researchers say their techniques-studying neurological symptoms and infarcts detected by a brain scan-are 90% accurate.

In Morton Grove, from now through April 14, Tax-Aide volunteers will prepare income tax returns at no charge or gratuity. Seniors who wish to have their tax returns done should bring copies of their 1992 federal and state tax returns; tax forms for the 1993 tax year, and W-2s, SSA-1099s and other relevant data showing income for 1993. Morton Grove seniors can make an appointment by calling the Morton Grove Senior Hot Line at 470-5223. The Tax Aide program is co-sponsored by the Internal Revenue Service.

REVERSE MORTGAGE

The reverse mortgage enables seniors to live in their homes for life, while converting some of their built-up home equity into cash to be used at the home owners discretion. There are several different ways to convert home equity into cash. Below are just a few examples:

Mrs. Jones, a 75-year-old widow, owns a home appraised at \$100,000. * Mrs. Jones may choose to take a lump sum of \$38,000 to help cover health care costs incurred by a recent illness. * She may prefer a term plan and receive a monthly payment of \$500 for ten years. * With the tenure plan, Mrs. Jones may receive a monthly payment of \$350 for as long as she lives in the home. * She may establish a personal cash reserve or line of credit and select the timing and amount of the cash advances for emergency or occasional expenses she may encounter. * Mrs. Jones may choose a combination of these options would best fit her needs. For example, she may select a term plan in conjunction with a line of credit. There are though, significant interest rates and service charges associated with reverse mortgages. Since there are so many options available and since reverse mortgage loans may not be appropriate for everyone, potential borrowers must receive counseling from a government approved reverse mortgage counseling agency prior to the closing on a loan. In the Morton Grove area, Evanston Neighbors at Work (708/328-5166) provides this counseling. Currently, eight companies are offering FHA-insured reverse mortgage loans in the State of Illinois. Jewish council reacts to apprehension of suspects in arson

Responding to the arrest today of two individuals charged with arson and burglary of the Friends of Refugees of Eastern Europe's (FREE) synagogue and headquarters, Robert Adler, Chairman, and Michael Kozin, Director, of the Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) issued the following statement:

"The Jewish community together has shared the pain felt by members of FREE regarding the destruction of their synagogue and religious objects in it, which was made particularly poignant given the discrimination and persecution which Jews historically have suffered in the former Soviet Union. We have welcomed the diligent attention which the Chicago Police Department has given to this incident, and we are gratified to know that two suspects have now been apprehended and charged with responsibility for the fire and theft. As serious as this crime was, had it been motivated by bigotry the implications would be even more distressing, and we are relieved that at this point the investigation has not determined that this was a hate crime."

The fire at the FREE Synagogue, 6335 North California, took place November 5, 1993. The Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) is the umbrella body for 40 major Jewish organizations in the Chicago area and is the community relations arm of the Jewish Federation/Jewish United Fund of Metropolitan Chicago.



Burglar caught

An officer was traveling northbound in the 7600 block of Milwaukee Avenue February 17 when he observed two males dressed in dark clothing walking on the east side of the street.

The officer drove past the two subjects and around the block and then stopped without lights to observe the two go to a closed gas station.

The officer observed one of the offenders bend over by the center gas pump and pick up an object that looked like a tire iron. The offender walked towards the front door, but then ran back to the pumps, dropped the object and walked towards Milwaukee, as several cars drove past at that instant.

When the cars were gone, the offender picked up the object and walked to the front glass door. At this point, the officer relayed this to the Niles Dispatch. When the offender smashed the front glass door with the object, the officer radioed in a burglary in progress.

The officer observed the offender reach through the shattered glass and open the door, then turn around and start running.

The officer turned on his lights and proceeded in pursuit of the

offender, who fell on ice and was placed under arrest.

A claw hammer was recovered and inventoried as the object used to break the glass.

At the police station, the offender, a 24-year-old Chicago man, told police that he was an employee of the gas station and had decided to commit a theft of the day's receipts equaling \$565.

Upon closing the gas station that evening, the offender put the money in a paper bag, placed miscellaneous merchandise about the store and turned on the video cameras towards the walls.

He went home with a 22-year-old Chicago man who agreed to pick him up at work. About 2:20 a.m., the two returned to break the glass door.

The offender stated that the money could be recovered at his home and he was escorted by Chicago police to retrieve it. The offender signed a search consent and gave a written statement, and an assistant state's attorney approved felony theft and criminal damage to property charges.

The subject's 22-year-old friend was taken into custody in Chicago while using a public telephone, but was released without charge.

Battery incident no accident

On February 3, police responded to a report of criminal damage to property at a condo unit in the 8800 block of Golf Road.

In the bedroom of the unit, a ball peen hammer had been thrown through the patio window by an unknown person outside.

A Niles man, who resides in the unit below the victim, became a suspect in the case after he allegedly admitted to the victim that he had caused the damage.

The victim called police and an investigating officer contacted the offender and asked him to come to the police station. The offender agreed, but never appeared.

Numerous attempts to contact the offender proved negative. However, during a court proceeding on February 18 in which the offender appeared on another criminal damage to property charge, the subject and his attorney told the investigating officer that he would appear at the police station regarding the latest incident on Golf Road.

The offender did appear, was read his rights per Miranda, was taken into custody and was ad-

vised that he was being arrested for criminal damage to property at the condo unit on Golf Road.

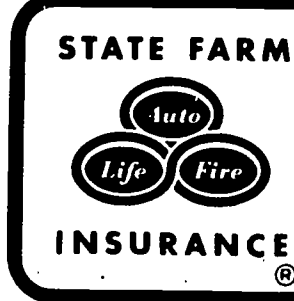
The offender said he understood his rights, but refused to sign an acknowledgement or waiver. Although the officer informed the offender that he did not have to answer any questions, the offender admitted that he did, in fact, break the window in the unit above his.

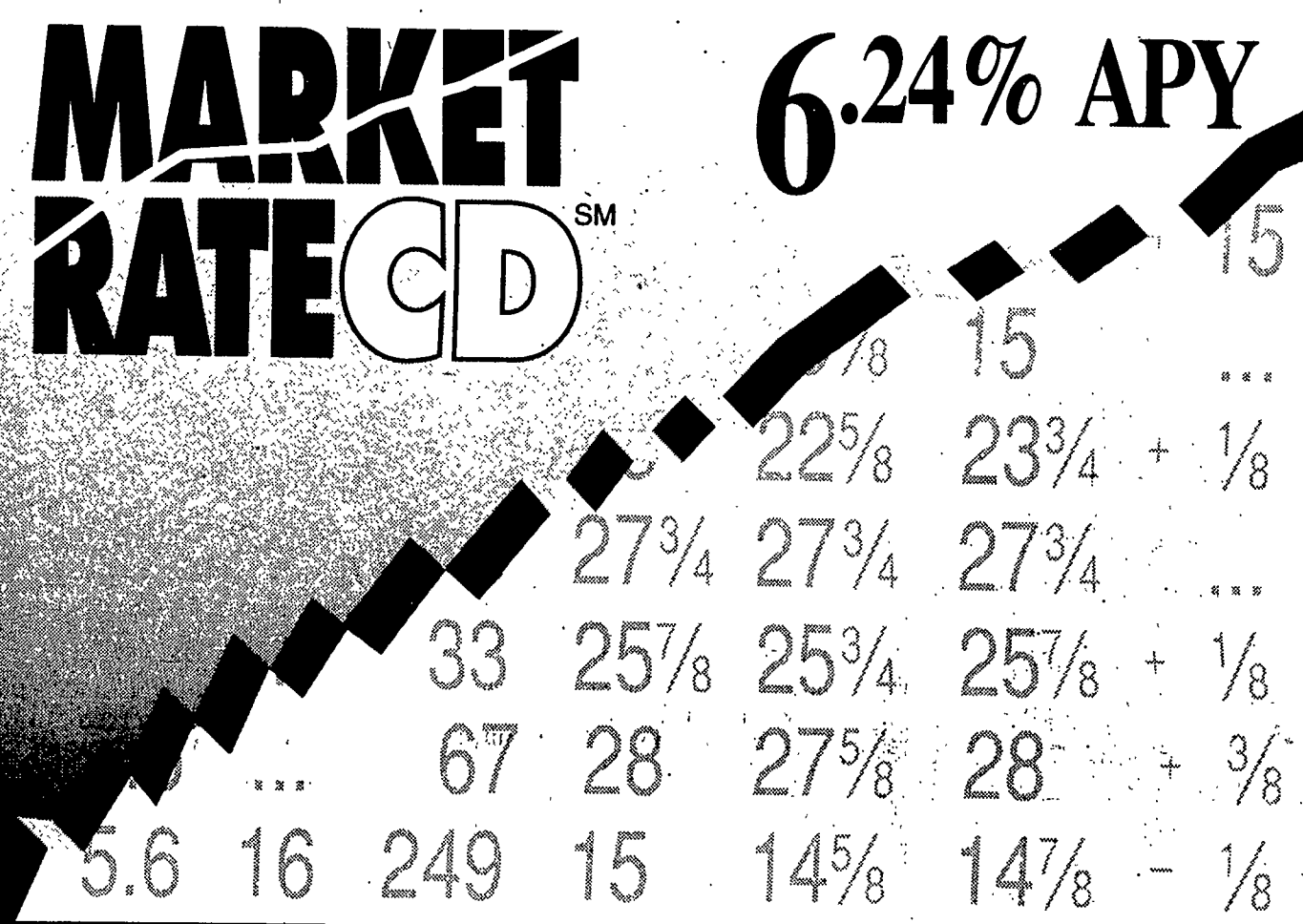

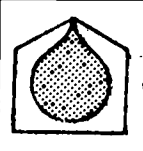

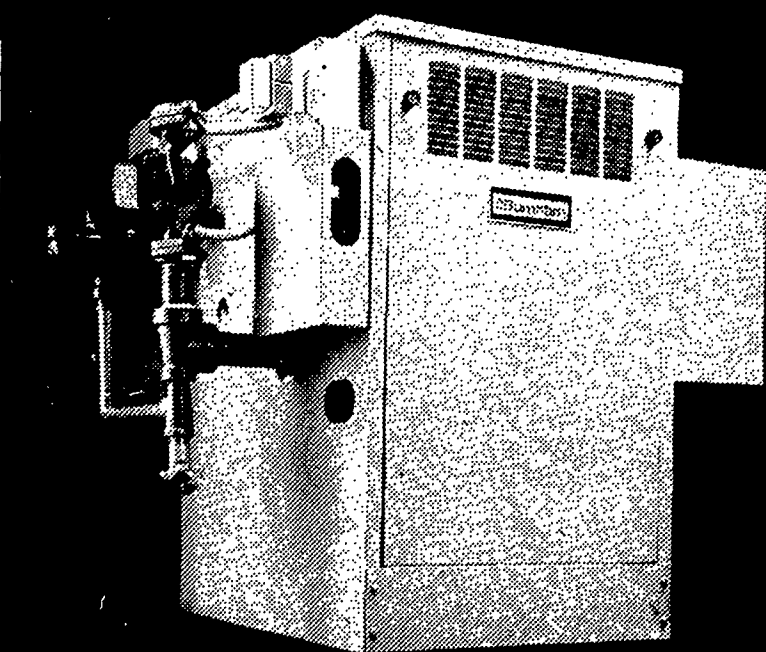

How to treat sinuses

The three groups of sinuses - frontal, maxillary and sphenoid - are lined with mucous membranes and connected to the inside of the nose by extremely narrow passages. Frontal sinuses are just above the eyes and maxillary sinuses are in the cheek bones, where most infections occur.

"When the passages are blocked, pain and swelling can occur," says Dr. Tim McCulloch, assistant professor of otolaryngology at the University of Iowa College of Medicine and staff physician at UI Hospitals and Clinics. As air and secretions are trapped in the sinuses, bacteria grow, causing an infection.

"Major symptoms of sinusitis include facial pain and nasal discharge. Sometimes you may have facial swelling, dental pain or numbness and headaches in the front of your head," McCulloch says.

Sinus infections are quite common, affecting more than 20 million Americans each year. A common cold or any respiratory illness that causes swollen mucous membranes or thickened mucous secretions is sufficient to block sinus drainage, he says.

If you think you may have a sinus infection, stay indoors and add moisture to the air with a vaporizer or humidifier. Blow your nose gently, using tissues. Remember, a sinus infection is not a viral infection, so antibiotics are not necessary.

lieve the pain by inhaling steam from a shower. Be careful not to burn yourself on the hot steam.

"You can treat sinusitis with a non-prescription oral decongestant, or by using a topical nasal spray," he adds. Try not to over-use non-prescription nasal sprays or continue use of the sprays for more than three days. "Nasal sprays can eventually aggravate the very symptoms they are supposed to treat."

"If the infection is serious - if your teeth ache, or the mucous is green or yellow, - see your physician," McCulloch says. "He or she will probably prescribe an antibiotic. Decongestants can help relieve some of the symptoms, but taking an antibiotic is most important because it treats the infection."

trade shows, banquets, etc. and perhaps a smaller theater. It will also have a rehearsal space, meeting rooms, and catering through the Hilton. Occupancy is planned for March, 1996, and they hope Oakton will be able to take advantage of many of the facilities.

Jordan Wolf, the student trustee, informed the Board that the students have collected over two hundred pairs of eyeglasses and 1,500 toys during two recent donation drives. The eyeglass drive is so successful that it will continue.

Wolf also noted that everyone in the student affairs office has been trained to register voters.

Black History Month is being commemorated by the Black Student Union. A panel discussion about contemporary perspectives on black history and several musical performances are among the planned activities.

The next event in the Political Science Series is "Will Israel Survive Rabin-PLO Pact?"

Trustee Ami Mader spoke about the recent concert trip in the Emeritus tour. The groups went to Orchestra Hall and saw the Chicago Symphony Orchestra perform Mozart. The final concert will be Friday, April 29, and information is available by calling (708) 635-1414.

Mader also attended the Teams Luncheon for Junior Engineering Society awards given to high school students in the district, and a Counselor Workshop and Luncheon. More than sixty professionals from the area attended.

Vice-President Ray Hartstein informed the Board that a new piece of legislation he worked on has been passed. The Board will now be allowed to go into executive session to evaluate themselves as trustees.

Hartstein also suggested that OCC consider installing fibre optic cable during the construction to assist in keeping up with future technology.

It was suggested that future reports from the President include hearing directly from students about their academic work and needs, and reports about program and curriculum review.

The payment of bills for January was approved. The treasurer's report was accepted.

The actions of the MONNACEP Executive Board were ratified.

The nomination of Sylvia Footlik was accepted as a Director of the Oakton Community College Educational Foundation. Footlik has a very active interest in Oakton, and is very successful in her own foundation. The Board is also pleased to be seeking more females to serve as Directors for the Foundation.

Donated gifts and services, including much needed road salt, were accepted.

A resolution calling for the election of the student member of the Board was accepted.

A resolution allowing the student trustee to cast advisory votes was discussed and held over for vote at the next meeting.

The supplementary authorization to pay professional personnel was given.

The notice on non-renewal of short-term faculty was accepted with this note that this is a legal requirement and no reflection on the personnel, many of whom will return.

Tenure was awarded to nine faculty members, and two new certificate programs were approved.

A policy for responsible use of information technology was proposed for review.

The Board went into executive session for the purposes of discussing possible litigation. No action was to be taken and they were not to reconvene following the executive session.

The next meeting will be Tuesday, March 1, 1994.

Manini also admitted that she had had approximately four Vodka and orange juice cocktails earlier in the morning.

almost unparalleled and his knowledge about the schools and his respect in the community will be an invaluable asset."

Hosler served as District 219's associate superintendent in charge of personnel and other matters for eight years. In addition to serving as principal of Niles North and Niles East high schools, Hosler has held the positions of director of social studies, department chair and teacher of history, sociology, English and political science. While a school administrator, Hosler was involved with many community organizations, such as the Niles Township Drug Task Force, Rotary Club, Kiwanis Club, United Way, Private Industry Council and others. He was recognized for his dedication to education with an award of Merit in the State Board of Education's "Those Who Excel" awards program.

Under the terms of Hosler's contract, which has not been finalized, the interim superintendent will be paid a pro-rated share of an annual salary of \$118,000.

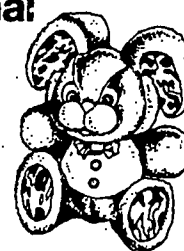
