District 71 Board studies retirement plans

Two plans District 71 teachers can choose to retire under were questioned at the last Board of Education meeting held March 15.

Carl Traver, an industrial arts, math and science teacher at Culver School, gave his opinion on the differences between the Early Retirement Option (ERO) and the Early Retirement Incentive (ERI).

"What I'm suggesting is that the local ERI benefits and the ERO benefits are not similar," Traver said, wondering about receiving what other teachers had in the past.

In the past, under State of Illinois guidelines, teachers who were 60 years old or had 35 years of experience qualified for retirement benefits. If they did not meet those guidelines, penalties were assessed.

In 1986, the Early Retirement Option (ERO) was introduced for teachers between the ages of 55 and 60. Teachers paid seven percent and the district paid 20 percent of the teacher's last year's salary for each number away from the requirements at the time of retirement.

Under the ERO plan, sometimes the district picks up the

teachers fees.

In 1993, the Early Retirement Incentive (ERI) became available to teachers regardless of their age or years of experience. Referred to as five plus five, the ERI allows teachers to add five years to their age or five years to their years of experience.

For every year the teacher worked, they get two percent of their salary annually.

Terms and conditions under each of the plans allow for the district to offer more incentives than the state.

Superintendent Eugene Zalewski said that the catch to the ERI plan is that the individual teacher has to pay four percent and the district pays 20 percent of the

teacher's salary for each number added.

Traver said that there is a great difference in benefits available under each plan. Zalewski reminded him that the benefits vary based on when a teacher retires.

"As a result of (ERO) there were some people that did retire over these last years that plan has been in existence and they got nothing," Zalewski said.

Board of Education member Vincent Bugarin said that the board looked at the retirement issue very hard and described the offer of extra local district incentives, in some cases no longer available, as a sale.

"In essence, what I think we're saying is, there's no sale anymore

Court rules on 'Home Alone' Mother

Beata Manini received two years of supervision in court March 11 following the Feb. 23 incident in which two of her children left home alone died in a fire at their Niles home.

Manini, 27, appeared in court for a preliminary hearing March 11 at the Skokie Courthouse on charges of child endangerment and child neglect.

"She received two years conditional discharge," said Sergeant Roger Wilson of the Niles Police Department. "It is a form of supervision, but it is a conviction."

Wilson said that if Manini does not commit any misdemeanor offenses during the two year period she will not serve jail time or re-

The Skokie wife and 14-year-old daughter of an Evanston fire department captain were charged last week for conspiring to have him murdered.

Marjorie Cook, 48, of the 8700 block of St. Louis, was charged March 17 with conspiracy to commit murder and solicitation to commit murder for plotting the murder of her husband.

Cook allegedly promised \$6,000 to a 17-year-old high school student to shoot Ward Cook, a fireman of 31 years. The murder was to take place near Cook and Sims were played.

Edison offers free electromagnetic field tests

Commonwealth Edison Co. is offering schools, consumers and others free measurements of electromagnetic fields, which have been linked by some studies to increased risk of cancer and other health hazards.

Recently, the utility said, however, that research is not yet clear on what constitutes "high" or hazardous readings.

"We're out there to educate," said spokesman John Costello. "There are no steps we would be taking to change it (a high reading)."

Electromagnetic fields, or EMF, emit from all manner of electric devices, including small appliances such as hair dryers and exterior sources such as overhead power lines.

A variety of studies have cited links between EMF and leukemia and brain cancer, particularly among children living near power lines and transformers. But other studies have indicated no such link.

District 63 to replace stolen computer

The East Maine School District 63 Board of Education voted to replace a stolen computer at their last meeting held March 8.

Superintendent Robert Varga said that the Apple computer was stolen Jan. 21 from a music classroom at Apollo School and that police have gone as far as they can with their investigation.

Guarding against a future theft is not easy, Varga said, as it was taken while there were people in activity in the building. Measures the district might take would include limiting activities in and around the building and improving security procedures, he added.

The district's insurance plan will help pay the \$3,000-plus replacement cost for the stolen computer.

"We will be paying a deductible amount and the insurance company will be picking up the balance," Scott Kriesman, Board of Education President, said. Superintendent Varga said that the deductible amount is \$1,000.

Within the music curriculum, Varga said that the computer was used by students to write scores, to compose music and to use in conjunction with synthesizers.

Costello said Edison is supporting additional research on EMF, including \$450,000 over the next five years to the federal Department of Energy for a study.

Police News

Shoplifter charged with battery

A 23-year-old Evanston man was leaving a store March 15 when the metal detectors activated.

The cash register attendant asked the man to come back inside and when he did, the metal detectors once again went off.

Labor dispute

An officer told members of mall security that they have a right to refuse the Union people who want to picket a job site inside the mall, but were wrong in requesting police to force them to leave the area, including the parking lot. Police informed the security officials that, contrary to their opinion, Golf Mill mall was not private property in the eyes of the courts. The officer suggested the officials set guidelines for the picketers allowing them to picket

outside the doors of the mall and pass out literature, while informing them that if they interfere with the entrance or exit of shoppers they would be subject to arrest.

The picketers said they had rights and left the scene to talk to their lawyer.

Two hours later it was determined that the construction supervisor of the job site had entered into an agreement with the Union and eliminated the problem by hiring a man from the Union. Both sides seemed satisfied and the case was closed.

Drunk driver collapses at red light

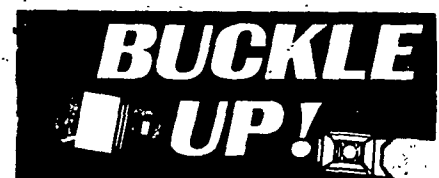
Police responded March 19 to a call of an intoxicated person at 7201 Harlem Avenue.

Rice Memorial Distinguished Company of the Year Award, bestowed by members of the CNIAHU. In addition, Katz said Time Insurance of Milwaukee, Wis. will be honored with the CNIAHU's Archive Award.

Katz, of Deerfield, also is chairman of the CNIAHU awards selection committee and event. His committee members include George Shea of Gurnee, an independent agent representing Time Insurance and Fortis Life of Milwaukee, Wis. and Wilbur Mills of Elmhurst, a marketing consultant with Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois.

Preventing heart attacks and coronary disease

To help prevent a heart attack or coronary disease, control four risk areas, or "the Big Four," says Dr. Ellen Gordon, assistant professor of internal medicine at the University of Iowa College of Medicine and staff physician at UI Hospitals and Clinics. The Big Four are cholesterol, smoking, high blood pressure, and a sedentary lifestyle.

"Cholesterol is a fat-like substance in the blood that can obstruct blood flow when deposits collect on the artery walls," explains Gordon, who is also medical director of Iowa CHAMPS (Cardiovascular Health Assessment, Management of Prevention Services).

"Visit your doctor and check your cholesterol level. If it is too high, cut the fat in your diet. Eat more vegetables, fruits and whole grains. Use skim milk and low-fat cheeses," she says.

Smoking is also very risky, because it damages and constricts blood vessels, she says. "It's never too late to stop smoking, because your risk of heart attack drops back down to the level of the non-smoking population in just two or three years after quitting," Gordon says.

Gordon says quitting smoking can reduce the chances of another heart attack in people who have already had one.

High blood pressure makes the heart work harder. "Lower your blood pressure below 135/90," Gordon advises. Medicines pre-

scribed by a doctor can help, as can losing weight, exercising and reducing the amount of salt and alcohol you consume. Even people who stop smoking and lower their cholesterol and blood pressure, may still be at risk for a heart attack if they sit on the couch all day, Gordon says.

"Exercise your heart by walking and taking the stairs when possible. We used to think you had to exercise for 30 minutes three to four times a week, and while that is good, we now know that any activity counts. Even 10 minutes of walking is a start and better than nothing."

There are other risk factors. Being overweight, for example, increases the risk of heart attack, especially if the fat is distributed more in the abdomen than in the hips, Gordon says. Diabetics are at an increased risk for heart disease, particularly diabetic women, she says, and need to have blood sugars closely monitored and controlled. Other risks need more study. Researchers are studying hormone replacements to see if they can lessen the risk of heart disease in post-menopausal women.

As for other ways to keep the blood flowing clearly, Gordon confirms that an aspirin a day can help, especially to persons over 50.

A downed power line can kill if it's live. And that's just the problem. You can't always tell if it's live. Sometimes it simply lies there, still. Even worse, it can be hidden under a fallen tree or be touching a neighboring fence, you just don't know.

You cannot afford the risk of finding out. A downed power line can carry 12,500 volts of electricity. So keep away. If you suspect you have a downed line, report it to Commonwealth Edison at 1-800-Edison-1. (1-800-334-7661)

What women need to know about Social Security

Studies continue to show that older women are among the poorest of the poor and the most likely to be without Social Security benefits or to have lower-than-average benefits. Almost three-fourths of the elderly living below the poverty level are women, and approximately 2.5 million are older than age 65. More than two out of every five older women are poor or near poor.

A recent survey shows about 40 percent of the women who are Social Security beneficiaries receive less than \$350 in monthly benefits. Only 10 percent of the men receive benefits below this level.

Women's benefits tend to be lower than men's for a number of reasons. For one thing, women still are more likely than men to have interrupted work patterns. Also, they are the most likely to leave the paid labor force to be at home with young children or aging older parents; to have years of part-time work; and to have worked in lower paying jobs than men. The result is generally lower Social Security benefits.

Women need to be aware of these findings point up to the need for women to be aware of the Social Security protection available to them during their working lives and to take full advantage of all her potential benefits under the program. The fact is, women are at a greater risk than men to miss out on the full benefits available from Social Security, even though the rules are the same for men and women.

Social Security remains the main source of income for divorced and widowed women. The original Social Security program was enacted at the time when women were primarily homemakers. The program, therefore, was structured to provide benefits to a wife or widow based on her husband's wage record.

Growth in Workforce
Today, however, 55 million women are in the work force - 45 percent of the paid labor force - and more women are becoming entitled to Social Security benefits based on their own earnings records. And while the proportion of women who receive benefits based on their husband's earnings has not yet declined, the proportion entitled to receive benefits both on their own and their husband's earnings records rose from 5 percent to 22 percent from 1960 to 1988.

Women have more choices today about their work and careers. Many of them may not be aware of the impact that these choices have on their Social Security protection. They need to know what protection they have as workers, wives, widows, divorcees, and parents. In each case, different rules may apply. The following examples indicate some of the benefits and protection available to women.

Women as Workers
If you work in a job or profession in which you have paid So-

cial Security taxes for 10 years or more, you will be fully covered for Social Security retirement benefits and your family will be eligible for survivors benefits should you die young. And, depending on your age and the type of benefit, you may qualify for Social Security with less than 10 years of work.

You will be able to retire at age 65 with full benefits or at age 62 with reduced benefits. (Note that beginning in the year 2000, the age for full retirement benefits will begin to increase gradually until it reaches age 66 in 2009 and age 67 in 2027.)

In addition to retirement and survivors benefits, you also may qualify for disability benefits if your disability is so severe that it prevents you from doing "substantial work" for at least a year or it is expected to result in your death. You must be fully covered, but to be eligible for disability payments you'll need to have worked recently - one-half the time between age 22 and the time you become disabled. This is the work requirement through age 30. At age 31 or older, you need 5 years of work out of the 10 years immediately before you became disabled. Your husband and your married, minor children also may be eligible for benefits while you are receiving disability benefits.

Wives
If you have been married at least 1 year (or even less in some cases), you'll be eligible to receive benefits based on your husband's earnings record. Depending on Federal and State law, common-law and other nontraditional marriages may be recognized as valid for Social Security purposes.

As a wife, you may receive benefits at any age if you're caring for the child of a retired, disabled or deceased beneficiary and that child is under age 16 or disabled. If you have no children or they are grown, you'll be eligible for 50 percent of your husband's benefit when you are 65 or for a reduced benefit at age 62. (As is true of the age at which full retirement benefits are payable, the age for full spouse's benefits will begin increasing gradually in the year 2000.)

Widows
You may be eligible for widow's benefits as early as age 60. If you're disabled, you may be eligible at age 50. You may be eligible at any age if you're caring for the deceased worker's child who is under 16 or disabled. Generally, you must be unmarried to qualify for widow's benefits. However, if you remarry after age 60 (or after age 50 if you are disabled) you may still receive widow's benefits on your former husband's Social Security record. But if the benefit amount would be higher, you will receive wife's benefits based on your current husband's Social Security record.

Divorced Women
If you were married at least 10 years before the divorce, you'll be

entitled to the same benefits you would have received as the worker's wife or widow. As a divorced wife, under certain circumstances you may receive reduced benefits at age 62 even if your former spouse is still working. As a divorced widow, you may be eligible at age 50 for benefits based on disability and at age 60 for benefits based on age. Again, if you're caring for the worker's child who is under age 16 or disabled, you may be eligible for benefits at any age.

Other Benefits Not Affected
Social Security benefits paid to a spouse do not reduce the worker's benefit and, in the case of divorced spouses they do not reduce the amount payable to other spouses receiving benefits on the same worker's earnings record.

All of these rules also apply to men. However, traditionally women as a group have been more likely than men to qualify for dependents' and survivors' benefits.

For more information about any of these benefits, just all Social Security's toll-free telephone number, 1 (800) 772-1213, any business day between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. The best times to call are early in the morning, late in the afternoon, late in the week, and toward the end of the month. Ask for the booklet, Understanding Social Security. For information about specific Social Security programs, ask for the booklets entitled Retirement, Survivors Disability, SSI, or Medicare. You may obtain any of these publications at your local Social Security office.

Preparing a child for a new sibling

There's a lot more to preparing a child for baby number two than just asking "How would you like to have a baby brother or sister?"

"Parents can take steps before the baby arrives to help the child at home adjust well to a new sibling," says Dr. Lois Dusdieker, associate professor of pediatrics at the University of Iowa College of Medicine and a staff physician at UI Hospital and Clinics (UIHC).

These tips may be useful before the baby arrives, suggests Gail Herzog, pediatric outpatient clinic nurse at UIHC.

"Introduce the child to the person who will be caring for him or her while the mother is at the hospital."

"Visit a friend who has a baby in her home and let the child interact with the baby."

"If the child still sleeps in a crib, switch to a youth or twin bed several months before the new baby arrives. Tell the child how happy you are that he or she is a big boy or girl."

"If the child is ready to start toilet training a few months before the baby arrives, feel free to start the process, but don't try to begin toilet training when you bring the new baby home. Older siblings often regress in the training process so one may have to retrain the child."

"Encourage the child to help select a name for the new baby."

"Help the child practice feeding, diapering, holding and burping a doll. Also, allow the child to be baby's helper, getting fresh diapers, talking to the baby, etc."

Parents may want to use the following tips when mom goes to the hospital to deliver the baby:

"The older child may be able to visit the mother and the baby in the hospital. This helps the older child feel important."

"Let the child accompany the new baby home from the hospital."

"Consider giving the older child a gift upon homecoming. Also, pick out a few small gifts to give the older child when friends and relatives bring only baby gifts to the house."

"Let the older child choose a gift for the baby."

"Take a photo of the older child holding the baby."

"Teach the child to touch the baby lovingly and gently, and encourage the child to talk and tell stories to the baby."

"Be sure to spend special time with your older child if signs of jealousy or regression surface. Hug and kiss the child to reassure that you still love him or her," Herzog says.

going into executive session, and how long they meet in such sessions. The Board's position is that all such meetings are posted as is required by law.

In addition during this meeting the February, 1994 bills were approved for payment and the Treasurer's Report was accepted.

Authorizations to transfer working cash funds, and to use Grant funds were granted. Purchases of parking lot repairs, a Chevrolet Cavalier wagon, and field study courses were also authorized. The costs from the field study courses are all covered by student fees.

The Board accepted staffing recommendations including staff for the fitness center and labs. Much of the additional staff will be paid for through user fees for these areas, and will only be employed on an as needed basis.

The Board authorized the donation of 1,200 auditorium seats to Centre East Authority with the note that Oakton wishes Centre East well in the building of their new facility.

The actions of the MONNA-CEP Executive Board were ratified. A grant from the Illinois Board of Higher Education was accepted to be used in working with other North Shore institutions in cooperative telecommunication and other technology.

It was resolved that Oakton would recognize April as National Community College Month. The celebration will be woven into already planned or existing activities.

The supplementary authorization was granted, and the Clinical Practice Agreements for the month and a policy on responsible use of information technology were approved.

A resolution allowing the student trustee to cast advisory votes was discussed during the last meeting, and brought to a vote during this meeting. Ellen Schrodt, Secretary, was strongly opposed, as she felt there was no need for this and that it might compromise the trustees from the obligations for which they are elected.

Trustee Larry Goldberg argued in favor of the measure, explaining that nearly every other Community College in Illinois has this measure, and that it helps in making the student trustee accountable to his/her electorate. Wadhwa stated that the reason the Oakton Board exists is to serve the students and their voice should definitely be a consideration in decision. It was also stated that the Trustees are in no way bound by such an advisory vote.

The policy revision was carried with one dissenting vote from Ms. Schrodt, and became effective immediately.

The next meeting will take place as regularly scheduled on Tuesday, April 19, 1994, at 7:30 p.m. at the Des Plaines Campus.

pulled the school board together." And Burns said this "pulling together" of the diverse, seven-member school board was one of Lange's greatest accomplishments.

"It is hard to get seven different people from seven different backgrounds together," Burns said. "He gives us enough options to head down one path instead of seven."

Lange said he had set forth many goals as superintendent, one of these goals being the strengthening of the school board. But Lange said one task, which is in the making, remains to be conquered—the development of strategic plan that would detail the plans, actions and goals for the district through the year 2000.

But aside from these financial and strategic goals, Lange has achieved success with the district on a personal level as he truly cares about the children and knows many by their first names, Burns said.

"While he will hold the line on finances, at the same time he will say 'Hi' to Johnny in the hall," Burns said. "A lot of what he gives the schools we can't put down in a job description. Most districts run with an office manager. We run with a superintendent who wears many hats, and they all fit well."

or health care decisions in the event the senior becomes physically or mentally unable to do so. A Living Will allows an individual with a terminal health condition to express his or her desire to have death-delaying procedures withheld or withdrawn.

The fee for completing a Durable Power of Attorney document is \$75 maximum for an individual (\$125 maximum for a couple). The cost for establishing a Living Will is no more than \$50 for an individual (\$75 for a couple).

To be eligible for the Senior citizens Will Program, a client must be age 60 or over. Annual

income must not exceed \$15,000 (\$20,000 for a couple); and assets, excluding a home and personal car, should be worth no more than \$30,000.

The Senior Citizens Will Program is sponsored by The Chicago Bar Association, the Suburban Area Agency on Aging, the Chicago Department on Aging, and the Cook County Legal Assistance Foundation.

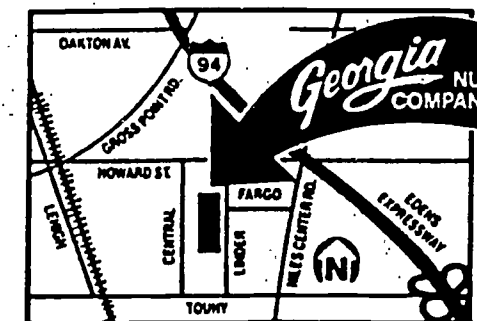
