> According to attorney Peter Troy, who sat in for the absent Richard Troy at the Niles Village Board meeting July 26, the Village, or the Village attorney, should have been notified of the increase prior to its going into ef-

"Neither was notified," Troy said. "We feel the best course of action is to file a lawsuit against Centel to void the increase."

Troy said one-third of the Village, north of Oakton and west of Milwaukee, are Sprint/Centel customers. Rather than each resident file a separate lawsuit, the Village is seeking the opportunity to file a class action suit.

"All the people that are similarily affected would be called a class," he said. "A class action suit saves court time, but you have to seek permission from the court to do it.

Troy said the Village is hoping Judge Aaron Jaffe will grant permission for the suit around August 8 and predicts that the first contested hearing will occur before Thanksgiving.

Meanwhile, the attorney is seeking a preliminary injunction prohibiting the rate from being applied to its customers.

Further, Troy is requesting the funds raised from the increase be put in an escrow account and allowed to at least gain interest until a ruling has been made. "I don't know if we're going to

get that," Troy said. "But the case looks good. "We wouldn't file if we didn't think it was appropriate."

ment Officer. In his monthly Investment Perspectives newsletter to First Chicago's Personal Investments clients, McCartan reiterated his caution over the stock market, which "is still overvalued despite

a 10 percent decline." Investors should have a good portion of their money in cash or cash-equivalents, which have produced stronger returns than stocks or bonds over the last 12 months. McCartan said.

Taking the opportunity for a mid-year review, McCartan summarized several views of the mar-

•"Investors seem confused by the business and stock cycles," McCartan said. "The question most asked is: If the economy is so good, how can the stock market be so bad'?"

The answer is simple, if not logical: Stock prices tend to move inversely with economic cycles; the current bull market began during the 1990-1991 recession. 'Corporate earnings were terri-

ble, but prices were cheap; there was value," he said. "Inexperienced investors have a hard time accepting that the stock market has worked historically."


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
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
