Some months ago we at tended a memorial service for a woman psychologist who worked with AIDS patients. She was a very special lady whose love and concern made a real difference in people's

Last year I had a classmate in a seniors' program at Northwestern. He was killed Saturday in a freak accident while saving a young child's life.

The classmate, Roger Bardwell, was sitting at a picnic table in a small park in Evanston, when a runaway steamroller with two six to eight-year-old boys atop, began rolling into the street. One boy jumped off but the other one remained on the vehicle. Roger jumped up from the table, ran around the machine and got the other boy off. But Roger slipped or tripped over a curb and fell under the roller. The steamroller crashed through a baseball backstop, mangled a parked car, and turned over breaking an exposed gas main. Roger's wife administered cardiopulmonary resuscitation but he was pronounced dead at St. Francis
