Maine Township H.S. Dist. 207 seeks superintendent

The search is on for the next superintendent of Maine Township High School District 207. MG Park Board approves tax abatement

At the December 15 board meeting, the Board of Park Commissioners of Morton Grove has approved a \$40,000 tax abatement of the Park District's Debt Service levy for 1994. The abatement is possibly due to a surplus of cash in the Park District's Debt Service Fund. The abatement will reduce the tax liability of Morton Grove residents. The projected tax rate is .4814 without the abatement, .4725 with the abatement. The estimated savings by residents in the Park District portion of the levy is approximately 2 percent. A separate Abatement Ordinance will be filed later next week with the Cook County Clerk's Office. This is needed to reduce the tax levy set forth in Section Eight of Bond Ordinance 94-7 filed in November. This abatement does not affect future Debt Service tax levies called for in the Bond Ordinance. For questions, contact David Erb at the Morton Grove Park District.

District 71 votes tax increase for school upgrades

Taxpayers in School District 71 can expect higher taxes in the coming year, as the board of education recently approved a 14.974 percent higher tax levy than last year.

"Our district does not levy at its maximum," Superintendent Gene Zalewski said, addressing the public at the last board meeting held Dec. 20. "The district could have levied another million dollars."

After the board determines how much money it will need from local property taxes, that figure is divided by the total district property value to determine the tax rate.

To figure the local tax bill, the tax rate is multiplied by the value of a piece of property. "Our district's (tax) rate is the lowest from all of our neighboring school districts," Zalewski said.

District 71's 1993 tax rate of 1.325 is less than half of local East Main District 63's 3.290. Other local rates are as high as 4.148 in Evanston District 655 and 4.058 in Skokie District 73.5.

The difference between the district's 1993 tax extension and the 1994 levy is \$567,031. A significant portion, approximately \$200,000 of the increase will be for building improvement projects. "That is the main reason why we're asking for this substantial increase," Zalewski said.

In a slide presentation, the superintendent showed the major areas of improvement needed, mainly at Niles Elementary (South) School. They included a new boiler system, new plumbing, a new roof, better lighting and compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

"The South School needs at least \$2.5 million in the next few years just to bring it up to appropriate standards," he said.

Building improvements to South School may not be as good an idea as building an addition to Culver School.

The board of education is currently considering information obtained in a facility study, to determine if it would be a better idea to close the South building.

With the current student population, and to have a class size of 25, one building would need 18 classrooms to accommodate the district's enrollment, Zalewski said.

"Neither building currently has significant portion, approximately \$200,000 of the increase will be for building improvement projects. "That is the main reason why we're asking for this substantial increase," Zalewski said.

Board member Vincent Bugarin said that if the funding for the improvements is spread out over 20 years, it will be easier for taxpayers and will get the community involved and behind the project. "I'm firmly against a large tax increase," Bugarin said. "But I do realize that our district needs renovation."

A-SCIP Program to offer look at Rehab Institute

The work of the Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago (RIC) will be the topic of discussion at next month's meeting of A-SCIP, Maine Township's support group for disabled people.

The meeting is scheduled for 7 to 9 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 5, at the Maine Township Town Hall, 1700 Ballard Road, Park Ridge. Admission is free.

Speaking will be Roberta Winter, the multiple sclerosis social worker at the RIC since 1991. She has been active in social work and human services administration for more than 25 years and has started both support and therapy groups for patients and families at the RIC. She also has been involved in programs for amputees and for patients with arthritis, brain injuries, burns, spinal cord injuries and strokes.

The RIC has been working since 1954 to help people with disabilities pursue healthy and fulfilling lives. It offers both comprehensive treatment and a variety of specialized programs.

The A-SCIP program is open to all disabled individuals and their friends and families. The Town Hall is accessible to the disabled, and a sign-language interpreter will be available for anyone who needs one.

A-SCIP offers participants an opportunity to discuss and share methods of coping with the various problems related to their disabilities such as employment, housing, health-related issues, relationships and other topics. Meetings are held on the first Thursday of every month.

Additional information is available through the township's Disabled Services department, which provides referrals on services for disabled residents, a Telecommunications Device for the deaf (TDD), transportation services, energy assistance and a guide to accessibility of commercial and public buildings in Maine Township. The department also helps organize an annual Job Fair for the Disabled and actively supports legislation to improve the quality of life for disabled people.

Another chance to sign up for Medicare

"If you're age 65 or older and don't have Part B Medicare coverage, you'll have a chance to sign up for the coverage during the 1995 annual enrollment period," said Thomas A. Curin, Social Security manager in Des Plaines.

Curin said every year, the government offers a three-month general enrollment period from Jan. 1 to Mar. 31. This period is to give you a second chance if you didn't enroll when you were first eligible or you dropped your coverage. If you enroll during the current sign-up period, your coverage will begin July 1, 1995.

For 1995 the cost for Part B coverage is \$46.10 per month. Most beneficiaries who delay enrollment pay a 10 percent surcharge for every 12 months they could have been enrolled but weren't. Part B coverage, also called

"medical insurance," helps pay for doctors' care, outpatient hospital visits, and other medical services. People are offered the option of signing up for Part B at the same time they are automatically enrolled in Medicare's Part A program. Part A helps pay for inpatient hospital care and certain other services and is paid for by the Medicare tax you paid while working.

People who want to sign up for Part B Medicare coverage should call Social Security's toll-free number, (800) 772-1213, between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. any business day. "The lines are busiest early in the week and early in the month, so it's best to call other times," said Curin.

Determining if a new anti-viral drug helps in the treatment of an acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) related disease is the focus of a new study by researchers at Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center.

As many as 45 percent of AIDS patients suffer from cytomegalovirus (CMV) gastrointestinal disease, which causes diarrhea, abdominal pain and bleeding. CMV is a cluster of viruses that causes many diseases in humans and tends to infect a majority of AIDS patients. There are few methods of effectively treating this disease.

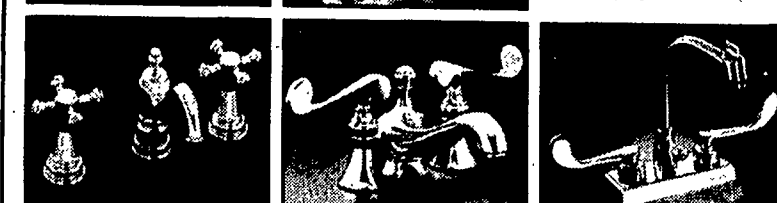

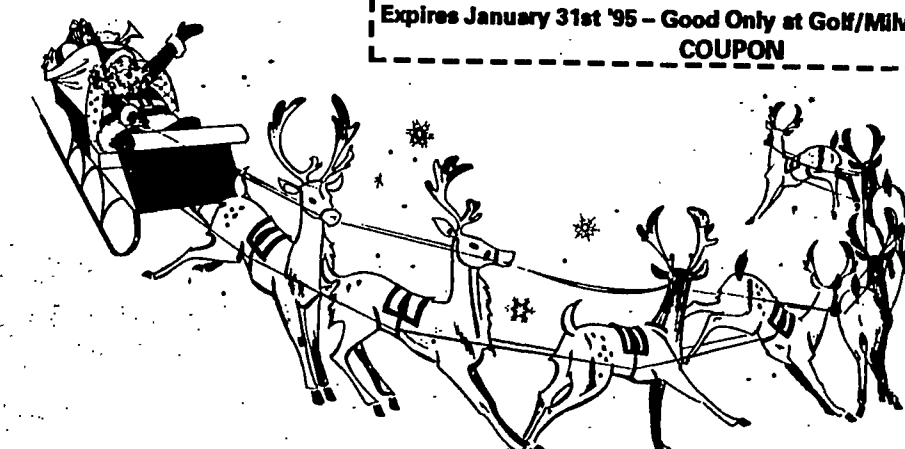

Federal tax returns can be filed electronically

People claiming refunds, as well as those who owe money, can have their 1994 federal tax returns filed electronically starting in January, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Offered, usually free, by many professional tax preparers as well as some banks and employers, electronic filing involves using a computer, a modem, and a telephone line to send returns directly to the IRS. Some IRS offices and volunteer tax help sites will also be offering this service. Electronic filing is available to people who do their own returns as well as those who have them professionally prepared.

Electronic filing can save time, trouble, and worry by speeding up refunds and cutting down errors, the IRS says. A refund is issued within three weeks after the IRS receives the return. People can get their money even faster by choosing to have their refunds deposited directly into their bank accounts. Since direct deposit eliminates the possibility of a lost or stolen check, it may be particularly attractive to people who travel a lot, move soon after filing, live in high-crime areas, or for whatever reason, have difficulty getting their mail.

The IRS electronically verifies receipt of electronically-filed returns within two days. So there's no reason to worry about the return possibly getting lost in the mail. Mistakes often delay refunds, but according to the IRS, electronic filing reduces errors by an average of more than 90 percent. A more accurate return also means there's less chance you'll get a letter from the IRS. Nationwide, some 14 million income tax returns were filed electronically during the past year.

Ryan was nominated by the Alliance Against Intoxicated Motorists, MADD-Illinois, Illinois Students Against Drunk Driving, Illinois Traffic Safety Leaders and Kemper National Insurance Companies. The award was presented at the NCADD's 10th annual luncheon in Washington D.C.

State's revenue sharing helps local governments

During the past ten fiscal years, Illinois has shared an average of 10.2 percent of its revenues from the income, sales, and motor fuel taxes with local governments throughout the state. Comptroller Dawn Clark Niesch reported recently.

Total revenues shared with local governments from the three major state tax sources — income, sales, and motor fuel — were \$1.191 billion in fiscal 1994, an increase of \$519 million or about 77 percent more than the \$672 million shared in fiscal 1985.

Most of the more than 6500 units of local government in Illinois are dependent to some extent on receiving the state revenues.

Comptroller Niesch also reported that a Census Bureau study indicated per capita federal spending in Illinois was 15.5 percent below the national average while the Tax Foundation computed Illinois' per capita federal tax burden at 14.2 percent above the national average. Based on these studies, the Tax Foundation estimated that Illinois ranked 46th in the return on its federal tax dollar, receiving 74¢ for each dollar paid in federal taxes.

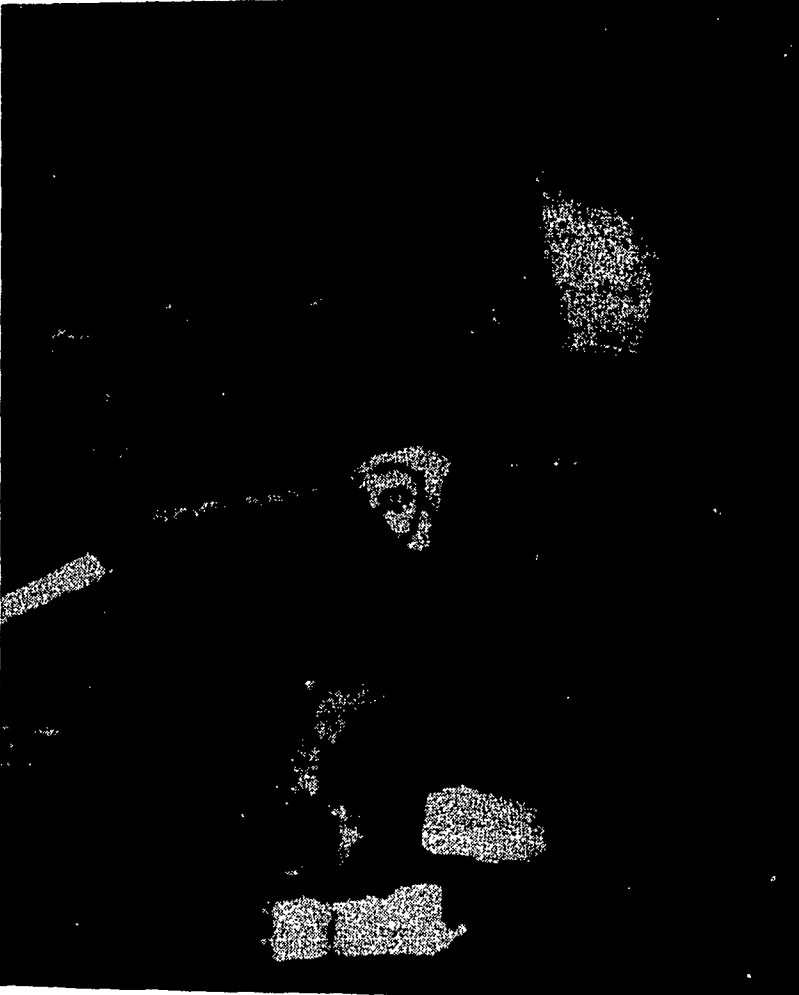

Distribution of surplus food is cancelled

Because of federal budget cuts, Maine Township will not distribute surplus government food during January. The next distribution is expected to be held in February.

The Illinois Department of Public Aid last month eliminated distribution of surplus food throughout the state during December, January and June. The cutoff was required because of a 69 percent reduction in federal funding for surplus food purchases.

To be eligible to participate in the next distribution, residents must have a surplus food identification card issued by Maine Township. Those without cards should bring proof of residency and proof of income to the township offices during the distribution. The Maine Township Town Hall is located at 1700 Ballard Rd. in Park Ridge.

Proof of income must include one or more of the following: Social Security award letter, paycheck or stub, public aid card, pension award letter, and interest income verification.

Federal guidelines for income eligibility are \$767 per month for one person, \$1,025 for a family of two, \$1,283 for three, \$1,541 for four, \$1,799 for five, and \$258 for each additional family member beyond five.

Plastic surgeon leads team of doctors

Richard C. Schultz, M.D., department of plastic surgery, Lutheran General HealthSystems, recently lead an international delegation of plastic surgeons on an educational mission to Albania and Russia. The trip was sponsored by Citizen Ambassador People to People, an agency initiated by President Eisenhower in 1956 to facilitate the exchange of professional information.

Over 35 delegates from all over the world joined Dr. Schultz as they shared techniques, practices and recent research with their Russian and Albanian counterparts. Topics discussed included controversies and current recommendations concerning reconstructive and cosmetic breast surgery, orthognathic and craniofacial surgery, other various aspects of cosmetic surgery and facial and extremity injury and reconstruction.

In Albania, the physicians performed over thirty surgical demonstrations. So many Albanian patients sought consultation from the doctors that a special contingent of armed police had to be deployed to control crowds.

"Our" delegations bonded quickly in Albania in response to overcoming deprivations in personal comfort and professional facilities and amenities," said Dr. Schultz. "As a result, we became very helpful to each other."

In Russia, the group was not asked to perform any surgical procedures and did not see any Russian patients. Instead, the delegation participated in lectures and conferences.

"This trip was an extraordinary professional and cultural opportunity," said Dr. Schultz. "Despite the problems with language, creature comforts, professional deprivations, official corruption and the threat of crime, our delegation emerged from the mission in good health and high spirits, expressing a new appreciation for our professional and personal lives at home," he concluded.

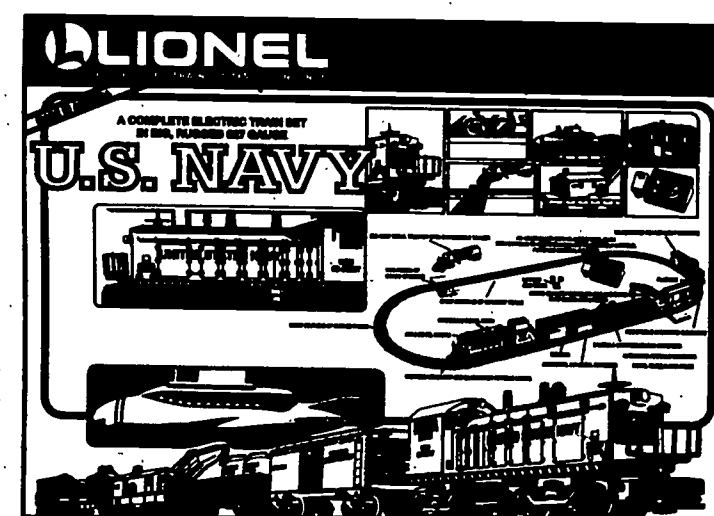

A few years ago, no one thought much about drinking alcohol at a party and then driving home, but things are different now. In fact, there are many states where hosts can be held liable if they serve alcohol to guests who later cause fatal or injury-causing crashes.

As a host, put a lot of heart into parties by focusing on fun and food - not the bar. When tempted to offer friends another drink,

ask yourself if you're really doing them a favor. If guests leave your party and drive under the influence of alcohol, you haven't been a very good friend.

From its new brochure Host a Holiday Party Your Friends Will Love and Live to Tell About, AAA-CMC suggests the following, as part of its annual First Friend, Then a Host (FAFTH) program:

• Serve a variety of nonalcoholic beverages, using the recipes from the holiday brochure.

• Slow down the drinking rate of your guests with lively talk and party games.

• Serve protein-rich and starchy foods throughout the evening to help retard alcohol absorption.

• Put away the alcohol when it gets late; serve coffee and dessert.

• Encourage carpooling. Give a small gift to all designated drivers.

• Take away car keys, call a cab or insist that guests who have had too much to drink sleep overnight at your home. Remember, only time will sober inebriated guests. Cold showers, coffee and other means will not lower blood alcohol level or improve motor skills or reaction time.

California man's account number used in credit card scam

Two Chicago men are free on \$4,000 bond and will appear in court Dec. 29 on a charge of unlawful use of a credit card. One offender was arrested at the Warehouse Club at 7420 Lehigh about 5:30 p.m. Dec. 20 after an employee recognized his accomplice as a former employee and became suspicious. The credit card used was a Visa Card that had been encoded with a Discover Card account number. He said he was at a loss to know how someone could have obtained his account number.

Further investigation revealed that one of the suspects had recently been in the same area of California, but he insisted that it was just a coincidence.

Charges that the two also used the credit card on Dec. 19 are under investigation.

Waiter shops on diners' credit cards

A 19-year-old waiter employed by the ChiChi's Restaurant in the Golf Mill Shopping Center was charged with forgery Dec. 23 after he admitted making several unauthorized purchases on a credit card forgotten by a ChiChi's patron.

On Dec. 22, a Chicago man ate at the restaurant and paid for his meal with a credit card which was not returned to him. He left the restaurant, but a short time later remembered the credit card was missing and returned to the restaurant. The manager informed him that the waiter, known only to the patron by his first name, was out shopping in the mall. The victim called the credit card company to cancel the card and was informed that the card had been used four times since being lost, and that it was being used again at that very moment.

The waiter returned to ChiChi's carrying a shopping bag from the Spencer Store also located in the Golf Mill Mall, but denied knowledge of the credit card. The victim then went to the Spencer store and learned that his credit card had been used there.

A similar report was made to the Niles Police Department by a man and wife who also had eaten at ChiChi's only to have their credit card withheld and used without their permission to make several unauthorized purchases. The offender, whose address is on Howard St. in Skokie, was arrested at 11:35 p.m. Dec. 23 at a friend's home in the 8700 block of Ozark Ave. in Niles where he had been staying.

The items which the offender admitted taking were inventoried and a \$4000 bond set. The offender will appear in court Dec. 29.

Beware of con artists posing as utility workers

For most people the holidays are a time of good will and happiness. For con artists, however, it is a chance to prey on unsuspecting residents whose guard may be down.

Con artists package themselves in all kinds of disguises this time of the year, including posing as utility workers. Over the years, in various communities, con artists have arrived at someone's door, claiming the utility owes a refund, but they require change for a large denomination bill. Other times, they might claim that a home's wiring is causing trouble in nearby power lines and they need to conduct an investigation. On still another occasion, imposters called a number of homes to say ComEd was having transformer problems, that power would be shut off for three days, and it would be a good

time to move in with a relative or friend.

Regardless of the method used, the intention is nearly always the same: to gain entry to the home in order to commit theft. In some cases, an imposter will keep the homeowner occupied in one room while his partner ransacks another part of the house.

ComEd does not conduct unsolicited wiring inspections, and if a refund is due, it will be made by check or bill credit. Bona fide utility workers carry picture identification cards and should display them when seeking entry to a home.

Householders who still doubt the identity of a person claiming to work for ComEd should contact Edison and the police. The all purpose ComEd telephone number is 1 (800) EDISON-1.

AAA-CMC announces new motoring laws

Under a new law that takes effect Jan. 1, 1995, Illinois motorists under the age of 21 found with any trace of alcohol in their system while driving will have their licenses suspended, says the AAA-Chicago Motor Club.

Dubbed the "Zero Tolerance" law, the legislation is the result of continued pressure by state motorists on drunken driving particularly that of underage drinkers. More than 80 percent of AAA-CMC members said they supported this legislation when responding to a recent survey published in the Club's official membership magazine, Home & Away.

The law specifically states that any person under 21 years old will have his or her license suspended if a chemical test shows a blood alcohol content (BAC) of more than 0.00 and less than 0.10. (Individuals with BAC's above .10 can be prosecuted under the state's existing DUI laws.) "Zero Tolerance" exempts individuals who consume alcohol for a religious ceremony.

A first violation of the new law results in a three-month suspension, with a one-year suspension for a subsequent violation and a two-year suspension for refusing to take a blood, breath or urine test as requested by a police officer.

House Bill 1733 requires applicants for school bus drivers' permits to be fingerprinted. The applicant shall pay all required fees which include a \$4 fee to be used for refresher courses for school bus drivers.

Additional Illinois laws that go into effect Jan. 1 include:

This law also says a paramedic or phlebotomist may draw blood for the test.

Evanston babysitter held on \$2 million bond

An Evanston woman was ordered held on \$2 million bond, Dec. 13 by Judge Marcia Orr for allegedly causing serious injury to the 4-month-old baby she was caring for, said Cook County State's Attorney Jack O'Malley.

Judith Madourie, 28, 821 Dobson St., Evanston, is charged with aggravated battery to a child, a Class 2 felony, punishable by three to seven years in prison. The judge ordered Madourie, a Jamaican national, to surrender her passport.

According to investigators, on Dec. 7, Madourie, who was babysitting for a Northbrook family's

baby boy, allegedly shook and threw the infant into his crib. The child suffered severe injuries.

Madourie is scheduled to appear for a preliminary hearing before Judge Orr on Jan. 12, at the Skokie Courthouse.

Prepare for winter driving trips

The approaching holidays signal the beginning of the winter driving season. Snow, ice, fog, freezing temperatures and increased traffic make driving hazardous. Wear your safety belt at all times and plan ahead to ensure a safe trip over the holidays and during the winter months.

Q. How can I prepare for a winter driving trip?

A. • Inspect your car's battery, tires, headlights and taillights, belts and heating system for proper working order. Fill the windshield wiper fluid and anti-freeze.

• Pack several blankets, extra food, a first aid kit, lighters or matches, a flashlight and a shovel in case you get stranded. Pack extra gloves, socks, scarves and hats. More than 50 percent of your body heat is lost through your head and feet during extreme cold.

• Check the oil level and switch to a lightweight, winter-grade for better oil flow and fuel economy.

Q. What other precautions can I take?

A. • Listen to the weather forecast before leaving on a long trip. If bad weather is predicted or already in progress, call the Illinois State Police for road conditions and alternate routes.

• Start with a full tank of gas and inform friends and family when you are leaving, your expected arrival time and the route you will be taking.

'Use It & Lose It' law takes effect

Illinois will ring in a safer new year with the arrival of a law taking away the licenses of drivers under age 21 caught with even a trace of alcohol in their systems, Secretary of State George H. Ryan said recently.

The "Use It & Lose It" law, which Ryan proposed and pushed through the General Assembly last spring, takes effect at the stroke of midnight on Jan. 1 - a holiday associated with drinking and notorious for its drunk driving death toll.

The new "zero-tolerance" measure is aimed at discouraging young people across Illinois from drinking even a drop of alcohol before getting into the driver's seat, Ryan said.

Under the law, violators will receive a three-month suspension on a first offense or a yearlong suspension on a repeat offense. The penalties double for minors who refuse to be tested.

"Our goal is not to take away teens' drivers licenses -- it's to save lives," Ryan said. "And our best hope for accomplishing that is to make sure that every young driver in Illinois knows this law is on the books."

A recent federal study linked

Maryland's zero-tolerance law to a 21 percent decrease in the number of under-age drinking drivers. However, in six counties where the new law was accompanied by an intensive education program, the number was reduced even more dramatically -- by about 50 percent.

Additionally, a federal study released recently showed that fatal single-car crashes at night fell by 16 percent among young drivers in states with zero-tolerance laws. The number of such crashes rose by 1 percent in neighboring states without the law.

The study concluded that 375 single-vehicle fatalities a year could be prevented if zero-tolerance laws were adopted nationwide. Illinois will be joining 29 other states and the District of Columbia in adopting lower standards for minors.

Also taking effect Jan. 1 is the new Omnibus Crime Bill, including a provision mandating jail time or community service for anyone caught driving on license revoked or suspended for DUI, hit-and-run offenses or reckless homicide.

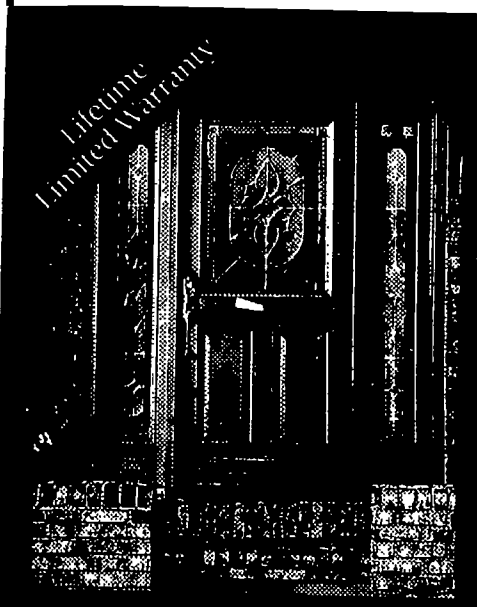

Economist predicts Midwest economy to outpace nation's

The Midwest economy will grow faster than the nation as a whole in 1995, but that could fuel both inflation and an eventual correction, said Diane Swonk, senior regional economist for The First National Bank of Chicago.

In her annual year-ahead forecast, Swonk projected that the First Chicago-Great Lakes Index, which measures the regional economy, will grow 3.4 percent in 1995. In comparison, the nation's Gross Domestic Product is expected to increase 3 percent.

The Great Lakes Index, designed by First Chicago, measures the total output of goods and

services within the five-state region of Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin.

"In the Great Lakes region, both manufacturing and consumer fundamentals will remain strong, but growth overall will slow from 1994's robust pace," Swonk said. The economies of both the region and the county grew an estimated 4 percent in 1994.

Swonk pointed to three positive trends in the manufacturing sector:

• Stronger growth abroad will fuel exports, benefiting a number of Great Lakes producers with

substantial market outside the United States.

• Continued strong corporate profits will boost investment in equipment. Great Lakes companies produce a larger-than-proportional share of the nation's equipment.

• Tight inventories will prompt many companies to rebuild their stock, again helping Great Lakes manufacturers.

"There is, however, a downside to strong manufacturing demand: It puts a great deal of pressure on plant capacity," Swonk said. "Many industries already are running full tilt."

The steel and automotive industries will have a particularly hard time meeting demand early in 1995.

"So, producers will have to pay more for their raw materials and pay more overtime. That certainly will be passed on as they charge more for their products," Swonk said.

Meanwhile, that overtime pay is helping the consumer side of the economy. Great Lakes consumers have still-manageable debt loads and housing remains affordable and values are still appreciating. "Such fundamentals will help offset consumer's reac-

tion to interest rates that are sharply higher than when 1994 began."

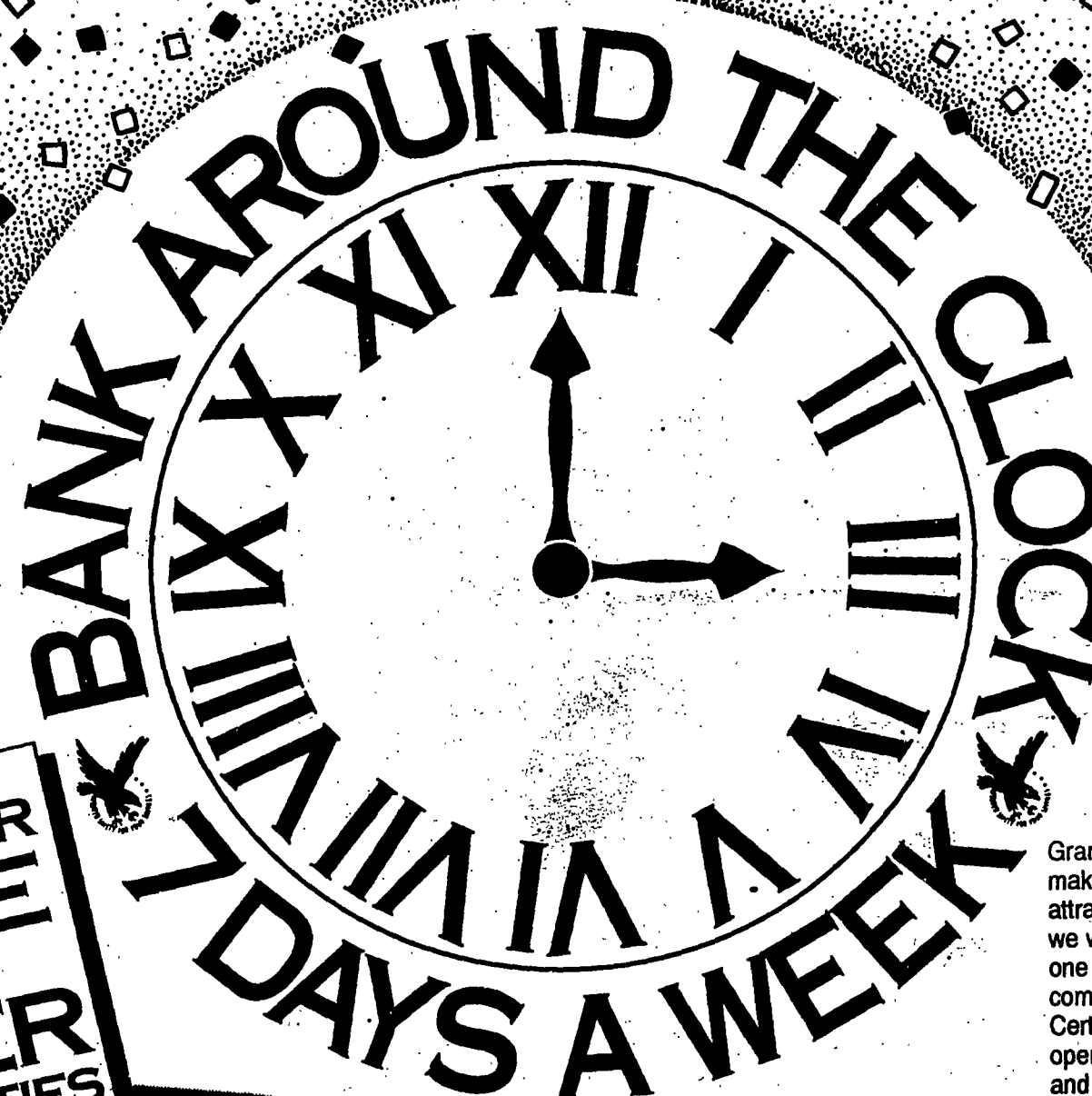
Overall, the Great Lakes economy will continue to grow in 1995, but so will the risk that growth will be derailed. In addition to record factory utilization of 88.4 percent, the Great Lakes faces very tight labor markets. In late 1994, the unemployment rate of 4.8 percent was a 20-year low.

"Inflationary pressures are clearly greater in the Great Lakes than elsewhere around the country," Swonk said. "Any additional growth will only exacerbate the situation in 1995."
