Federal tax returns can be filed electronically

People claiming refunds, as well as those who owe money, can have their 1994 federal tax returns filed electronically starting in January, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Offered, usually free, by many professional tax preparers as well as some banks and employers, electronic filing involves using a computer, a modem, and a telephone line to send returns directly to the IRS. Some IRS offices and

as those who have them profes-sionally prepared. Electronic filing can save time, trouble, and worry by speeding up refunds and cutting down er-rors, the IRS says. A refund is is-sued within three weeks after the IRS receives the return. People can get their money even faster by choosing to have their refunds deposited directly into their bank accounts. Plastic surgeon leads team of doctors

Richard C. Schultz, M.D., de-partment of plastic surgery, Lu-theran General HealthSystems, recently lead an international delegation of plastic surgeons on an educational mission to Albania and Russia. The trip was sponsored by Citizen Ambassador People to People, an agency ini-tiated by President Eisenhower in 1956 to facilitate the exchange of professional information.

Over 35 delegates from all over the world joined Dr. Schultz as they shared techniques, practices and recent research with their Russian and Albanian counterparts. Topics discussed included controversies and current recommendations concerning reconstructive and cosmetic breast surgery, orthognathic and cranio-facial surgery, other various aspects of cosmetic surgery and facial and extremity injury and reconstruction.

In Albania, the physicians performed over thirty surgical demonstrations. So many Albanian patients sought consultation from the doctors that a special contingent of armed police had to be deployed to control crowds.

"Our delegations bonded quickly in Albania in response to overcoming deprivations in per-sonal comfort and professional facilities and amenities," said Dr. Schultz. "As a result, we became very helpful to each other."

In Russia, the group was no asked to perform any surgical procedures and did not see any Russian patients. Instead, the delegation participated in lectures and conferences.

"This trip was an extraordinary professional and cultural opporspite the problems with language, creature comforts, professional deprivations, official corruption and the threat of crime. our delegation emerged from the mission in good health and high spirits, expressing a new appreciation for our professional and personal lives at home," he concluded.
