
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# From the Left Hand



Many people may still be vacationing in Florida, he said, and the number of Republican judges needed is especially large this year because Republican Jim Edgar won in more than 90 of the 135 precincts in the November gubernatorial election.,

Five judges are assigned to every precinct, three of which must be from the party of the winning candidate in the governor's race. This year, that means that more than 90 precincts must have three Republican judges.

Bidders can pay for purchases with cash, certified check, money order or travelers checks in increments of \$100 or less. Business or personal checks also are accepted, but all checks must be supported by a letter of credit from a financial institution that includes the maximum amount of credit approved through a specific date. These letters should also state that they cover the purchase price of State of Illinois property only. All letters of credit must be approved prior to the sale. Two types of identification must also be provided, including one with a photograph.

The vehicles will be sold "as is" to the highest bidders. Buyers must take possession of all vehicles immediately upon conclusion of the auction.

Beusse also wants to set the record straight that as a freshman Commissioner in 1969, he conceived the idea of starting a park district bus service that would bring the Niles Parks closer together. It was not until 1972 that he could muster board support and obtain the finances for such a project. As you know this service is now carried on by the Village

and serves the entire community. In conjunction with other local park districts and after many preliminary organizational meetings, Walt recalls the Maine-Niles Association Recreation Walter M. Beusse program designed for the handicapped was founded. Walt Beusse, for his outstanding effort, was appointed its first chairman and in the year 1972 proudly administered its activities along with a professional staff.

Walt has served as chairman of Niles Park District facilities and departments, golf course, ice rink, swimming pools and gymnasium, finance, public relations village liaison, recreation and maintenance. In addition Beusse has authored many programs, T-Ball, fish derby, junior girl's soft-ball, olympics, figure skating and ice hockey.

**Continued from Page 1** The ordinance made it unlawful for anyone under 18 who is enrolled in a public, private or parochial elementary or secondary school to be present in any public place other than a school during school hours unless traveling to or from school or engaged in school-authorized activities. Students might be out of school for what the ordinance termed personal business, but only if a parent or legal guardian had given prior written notice to the school.

Boundroukas argued that the part of the ordinance requiring prior written notice did not take into consideration emergency situations when a student might have to be out of a school building during school hours but prior written notice would be impossible to obtain.

"A kid could be hit by a bus and never make it to school," be picked up by police because the parent or guardian didn't give prior written notice," he said.
