

Resident discovers a weir(d) formation

The professor was always emphatic. "When it's just laying there, it's a rock. Once you pick it up, it's a stone," He was making a point: once a rock is handled, moved, even touched by a human, the rock has a purpose worth studying.

During the past four or five centuries, probably thousands of feet have walked on the rocks perhaps 300 yards south of the shopping center at Waukegan and Dempster in Morton Grove. They probably looked like "rocks" should look, especially when one is convinced "rocks" are being

Scott Klunder, by profession an attorney in Morton Grove, stopped to rest as he was jogging one day. He was alongside the Chicago River near the shopping center. As he glanced at the pattern of rocks crossing the river, he noticed a hole near the top of one of them. When he attempted to remove it, it broke evenly at the

Klunder, as he reconstructs his thoughts, gives one the impression that he sensed something important at that time. He knew he was standing on a man-made structure. As he carefully removed the remainder of the stone that had a hole, he immediately noticed that it had been burrowed out in the center straight down.

Knew exactly where to look. "If it's what I think it is," he probably thought to himself. But no one was around to talk to, so Klunder glanced quickly to the opposite bank, estimated where ten feet may have been and began looking. Almost immediately he found another stone with similar burrowing. Even though that stone was completely submerged in water-its top was weathered or shorn away-Klunder knew it was

Every customer gets full service - windshields washed, oil checked, tires inflated, whatever you need - and everyone pays the

Rybski says, "That's the way we've always done it. People like service. That's the way I came in, and the way I'll go out." So where's the grocery store or at least the cigarette counter, Mr.

"Sure, you can get it cheaper,' Rybski says," but there are many North Shore and suburban stations that are the same price or


