Alert guard prevents Park Ridge bank robbery; robber escapes

It's been a grand year for bank robberies. A record 67 have been committed in the Chicago area so far.

Thanks to a recently hired armed security guard at the First State Bank of Chicago, 608 W. Higgins Rd, Park Ridge, number 68 must remain in the "attempted" category.

The would-be robber entered the bank's walk-up facility about 7:15 a.m. Monday brandishing a gun and displaying a note, authorities said.

The robber was apparently surprised when the bank's armed security guard confronted him. In a brief face-off, gunman and guard pointed drawn guns at each

other until the robber fled east-bound on Higgins Road, according to Park Ridge Public Safety Director Robert Colangelo.

The guard gave chase, but lost sight of the robber, who was wearing an orange ski cap, sunglasses and a light gray moustache and goatee that police think

Proposed cuts upset Dist. 63 parents

The Board of Education of East Maine School District #63 tabled a resolution to approve budgetary modifications at their bi-monthly meeting last Tuesday evening.

The proposed modifications are part of a five-year plan designed to restructure operations in the district.

The basic elements provide for the expenditure reductions that will involve the cutting of some programs.

Many parents are concerned with the proposed reductions. Three programs that face loss of funding are extracurricular athletic programs at Gemini Jr. High School; the East Maine Players, a performing group for fifth through eighth grade students; and the instructional music program at Gemini.

The proposal regarding athletic programs at Gemini suggests

In a novel twist on television crime, a Niles man who had jumped an \$80,000 bond was arrested by Niles police after an off-duty officer saw him being interviewed on television.

"I guess the attraction of being on television outweighed the possibility of being caught," said Arresting Officer John Huinker.

708 code out; new area code to take effect January 1, 1996

New Niles-MG area code is 847

Amid rumors and protests, Ameritech finally made up its corporate mind and assigned a new area code for Niles and Morton Grove as well as all of Lake County, parts of north and west Cook, McHenry and Kane Counties.

And the number is... 847. Starting next Jan. 20, 847 will replace 708 in the north suburban portion of Cook County, the part of McHenry County that is now 708, and the northern part of Kane County, as well as all of Lake County.

Only people in the southern and western suburbs of Chicago and in eastern Will County will

keep the 708 code. According to the Chicago Tribune, a third area code, 630, will go into effect for DuPage County and portions of Will, Kane and Kendall Counties in 1998. Those areas will remain in the 708 area code until then.

The Illinois Commerce Commission approved the three-way split of the area now under the 708 area code last month.

Tremendous growth in communications, especially with the addition of cellular phones, beepers, pagers and fax machines, has exhausted the supply of available numbers in the 708 area code.

Resident discovers a weir(d) formation

The professor was always emphatic. "When it's just laying there, it's a rock. Once you pick it up, it's a stone." He was making a point: once a rock is handled, moved, even touched by a human, the rock has a purpose worth studying.

During the past four or five centuries, probably thousands of feet have walked on the rocks perhaps 300 yards south of the shopping center at Waukegan and Dempster in Morton Grove. They probably looked like "rocks" should look, especially when one is convinced "rocks" are being looked at.

Scott Klunder, by profession an attorney in Morton Grove, stopped to rest as he was jogging one day. He was alongside the Chicago River near the shopping center. As he glanced at the pattern of rocks crossing the river, he noticed a hole near the top of one of them. When he attempted to remove it, it broke evenly at the water line.

Klunder, as he reconstructs his thoughts, gives one the impression that he sensed something important at that time. He knew he was standing on a man-made structure. As he carefully removed the remainder of the stone that had a hole, he immediately noticed that it had been burrowed out in the center straight down.

Klunder also sought out the recognized authority in the area. Ed Lace, member of the Illinois Archaeological Survey, archaeologist and historian for the Cook County Forest Preserve District, was most helpful in determining that Klunder's discovery was a weir. Lace says he is "99 percent sure" it was a weir used by Indians.

Exhaustive analysis confirms it is a weir. As Lace speaks, one must be impressed with his exhaustive analysis. He discusses the location of the weir and what it is made of. He explains why "it is not a dam" and the selection of the "three pieces (that) are limestone which had the holes drilled into it." Lace says, Indians "wobled a bit" when they started but then were very exact as they finished the hole.

the Indian past," says Klunder. The discovery of the weir "peaked my interest," mentions Klunder and he intensified his research to confirm his finding. He visited the Field Museum and studied the maps of Albert Scharf at the Chicago Historical Society. Scharf made very detailed maps of the Indian villages, trails, and other sites of this area. Previously Klunder has researched the area and his article on "Indian Lore" of Morton Grove was published in the city's centennial book-length publication.

he is answering the same question for the umpteenth time. "We sell petroleum products and fix cars." Why hasn't this station gone the way of virtually all the others? "I don't care what other people do," Rybski says. He maintains he is still able to make money, while providing the old-time amenities of full service.

The price for lead-free gas is currently \$1.25 per gallon, not as cheap as most lead-free prices in the area, but way below the prices charged for "Full Serve" at many stations.

"Sure, you can get it cheaper," Rybski says, "but there are many North Shore and suburban stations that are the same price or more."

Rybski says his station was a Pure Oil and a Conoco before becoming a Union 76 station. The independent Rybski said that he owns the station and the land it stands on, and so he is free to run his business "the way I think it should be done."

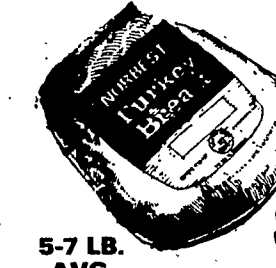

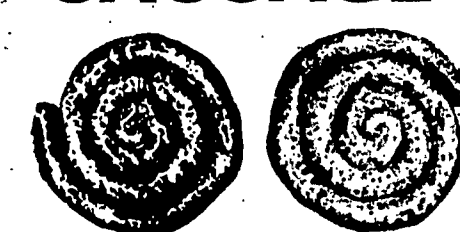

told me, he was trying to instill voting duty into his son as an American. Adding to that was the action of a young couple coming to vote at 6:30 p.m., probably after supper, carrying a small baby in a car seat carrier and in tow, a 2 year old son with a 90 skewed baseball cap, smilingly shielding their children from the cold to do their civic duty. What I tell you here could have just as well gone on at any other precinct location.

One gentleman noticeably disabled, and agonizingly walking with a cane, pushed ahead with determination that made him stand out. I kid you not, that eleven hours made my day worthwhile, because all of the schooling lectures of duty, etc. can never take the place of good old-fashioned actual experiencing of what some Nilesites are really all about.

Finally, I want you to know that in all my days of contacting, observing, and verbally giving and talking with the park district staff, leaves me with little doubt I'll be coming aboard with dedicated, fine people, who give 110%. They are the bridge between the Board and the residents. Their efforts equate into the visible output of the Board's policy making, and as a team, we and they give the residents the pleasures of fine parks, facilities and programs. I know they get paid for what they do, but a kind word, if it's warranted, can make their day more pleasurable.

Left untreated, panic or anxiety disorders can escalate into agoraphobia, as the sufferer increasingly restricts his or her activities. Other risks are major depression and alcohol dependence (as an individual self-medicates to overcome fear and the fear of fear).

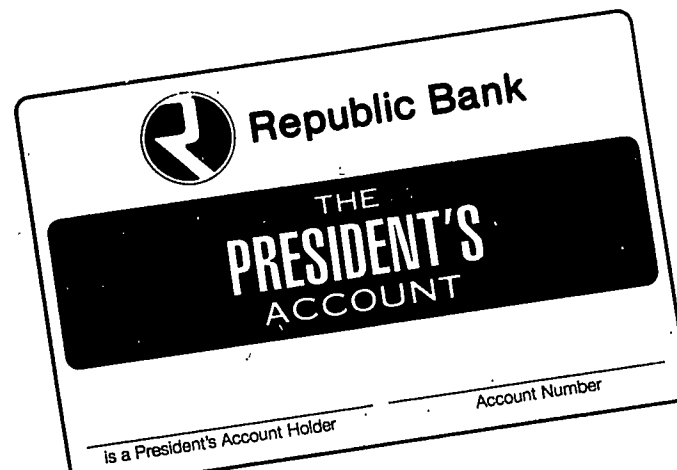

Enumeration at birth now a common practice

Of all the babies born in the United States last year, almost three million were signed up to get their Social Security card before they left the hospital. They accounted for about half of all new Social Security cards issued in 1993.

Under the Social Security Administration (SSA)'s "enumeration at birth" program, parents can have the hospital birth registration form they complete serve as an application for their newborn baby's Social Security number. The state vital statistics office provides the birth information to Social Security, and the parents no longer need to mail or take the newborn birth certificate and other required documents as a Social Security office after they have left the hospital.

When SSA receives the application, a Social Security number is assigned. The card is mailed in the child's name to the address shown on the birth certificate. The process takes about one week.

Currently, parents of newborns have this option in all but four states. Oklahoma, Alaska, Connecticut, and Rhode Island do not offer this option yet. In the state where parents can choose this option, about 85 percent of the parents use it. Since 1987, when the program began as a pilot project, a total of 12.3 million babies have been enumerated this way.

A Social Security number is needed to claim any child who is at least one year old as a dependent on federal tax returns. And the number is needed to start a savings account or buy bonds in a child's name.

One reminder: Don't be misled by any company whose offer to get your child a Social Security card includes a charge for the service. Getting a new or replacement Social Security card is a free service of the Social Security Administration.

We all take for granted that we will be able to wake up tomorrow and continue our normal activities throughout the day. For someone who suffered a debilitating illness or injury, however, the tasks of eating, washing and dressing can seem almost impossible.

Occupational therapists at Glenview Terrace Nursing Center can make a difference by helping a person maintain or regain his or her ability to perform these necessary activities of daily living (ADL's). They design programs to maximize independence by applying purposeful activities to improve strength, coordination, memory and concentration.

For some residents at Glenview Terrace, rehabilitation may involve relearning skills after a stroke or accident. For many others, they must learn new ways to accomplish an activity or adapt their surroundings to obtain an optimum level of performance.

Life after heart attack

A heart attack is a serious medical condition, but that doesn't mean you can't return to living a full life.

"The changes you make can help reduce your risk of another heart attack. For the first several weeks after an attack, follow your physician's instructions and review your risk factors," says Dr. Ellen Gordon, assistant professor of internal medicine at the University of Iowa College of Medicine and medical director of Iowa Cardiovascular Health Assessment, Management and Prevention Services at UI Hospitals and Clinics.

Gordon suggest the following steps for recovery:

Talk with your physician about exercise. An exercise program tailored especially for you is best. Once you start one, stick with it. Many patients become more physically fit after their heart attack, she adds.

Stop smoking. "It's never too late to quit. A smoker is more likely to have another heart attack. Ask your physician about stopping. Set a quit date and do it. If you start smoking, try to quit again. Many people try and fail several times before finally kicking the habit for good, she says. Those who keep trying eventually succeed.

Find out about your cholesterol levels, not just the total, but the "good" and "bad" fractions, too. "Your cholesterol may drop while you are in the hospital, so to have an accurate result, you should have a cholesterol test several weeks after your heart attack," she says. Many people can lower their cholesterol by changing their eating habits to include more grains, fruits and vegetables. "You may want to meet with a dietitian to help change your diet. If changing your diet doesn't lower your cholesterol, your physician may prescribe medication," she adds.

Control your blood pressure.

Area resident named to White House Aging Conference

Jonathan Lavin, a resident of Skokie and Executive Director of the Suburban Area Agency on Aging in Oak Park, has been named by Congressman Sidney Yates (Illinois Ninth Congressional District) as a delegate for the 1995 White House Conference on Aging (WHCoA), to be held May 2 through May 5 in Washington, D.C.

The 1995 WHCoA is the fourth such conference in history and the last of this century. More than 2,250 delegates from all 50 states and the U.S. territories will gather at the Washington Hilton Hotel in May to develop resolutions which will shape aging national policy over the next decade.

The theme of the Conference is "America Now and Into the 21st Century. Generations Aging Together with Independence. Opportunity and Dignity." The agenda consists of four issues: Assuring Comprehensive Health Care including Long Term Care; Promoting Economic Security; Maximizing Housing and Support Service Options; and Maximizing Options for a Quality Life.

Two cross-cutting concerns pervade the agenda and will influence discussions at the Conference. These are: (1) interdependence among generations and among members of extended families, and the responsibility of individuals to plan for changes

that will occur throughout their lifespan; and (2) unique contributions and needs of special populations, especially veterans, caregivers (including grandparents), rural elderly, women, minorities and individuals with disabilities.

A twenty-one year veteran of senior advocacy, Lavin joined the Suburban Area Agency on Aging as the Executive Director in 1978, after serving at the City of Chicago Department on Aging for five years. The Suburban Area Agency on Aging services the 130 municipalities and unincorporated areas in Cook County surrounding the City of Chicago. Under the auspices of the Illinois Act on Aging and the U.S. Older Americans Act, the Suburban Area Agency on Aging is the leader for aging services to older persons age 60 and over in suburban Cook County.

Lavin received the 1994 Illinois Coalition on Aging Leadership Award and the 1992 National Association of Area Agencies on Aging Distinguished Director Award for development of new programs and leadership in advocacy for older persons. He currently serves as President of the Illinois Association of Area Agencies on Aging. Governor Jim Edgar recently appointed Mr. Lavin to the Community-Based Long Term Care Reform Committee of the Illinois Department on Aging.

Use earnings report to avoid SS benefit overpay

Social Security beneficiaries who submit their earnings reports by the April 17 due date should remember that the reports can be changed at any time if their estimate of future earnings prove too low or too high, Social Security officials reminded. "The best way to avoid overpayments - benefits to which you are not entitled - is to report any change in your estimated earnings as soon as it occurs," stated Nancy Dowell, manager of the Des Plaines Social Security office.

Dowell said beneficiaries who work and earn over the exempt amount are required to submit earnings reports on how much they made the previous year and how much they expect to make during the current year. The annual limit in 1994 was \$8,040 for persons under age 65, and \$11,160 for persons between age 65 and 69. Benefits are reduced \$1 for every \$2 in excess earnings for people under 65, and \$1 for every \$3 in excess earnings for people 65-69. If you are still working at age 70, the earnings limits do not apply so you no longer have to report your earnings to Social Security.

Every year about a million people receive more money from Social Security than they were entitled to receive as a result of unanticipated earnings. Most of these overpayments occurred because beneficiaries who work while drawing benefits earned more than they had estimated and their income exceeded Social Security's annual limits. The annual limits for 1995 are \$8,160 for persons under age 65, and \$11,280 for persons between age 65-69. People who are overpaid by Social Security are required to return the money, either by direct refunds or by having their benefits reduced to cover the overpayment.

There is a substantial penalty for not filing an annual report of earnings on or before the due date, April 17 this year because the usual due date, April 15, falls on a Saturday.

"Because it is difficult to estimate exact earnings for the year, we encourage beneficiaries who work to call us to adjust their estimated earnings if they get a raise, work overtime, or otherwise increase their income," Dowell stated.

It's easy to report excess earnings and other events that would cause you to be overpaid. Visit the nearest Social Security office or call us on our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, business days between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

There is no cost to participating seniors. Upon completion of this program, seniors will be qualified to become members of local senior advisory boards and participate in other community policing programs, such as the Neighborhood Watch.

One of the many goals of the Niles Park District is to make its parks and facilities as safe as possible for its residents. Their efforts are beginning to pay off. At its regular March Board meeting, the Park District received special recognition from the Park District Risk Management Agency (PDRMA) for an Excellent - Level A rating for its loss control program.

PDRMA awarded Niles Park District a final point rating of 96.74 percent. Points are awarded in areas such as recreation safety practices, claims management, hazard inspection, and many other accident prevention methods. In addition, the District was recognized as being Excellent for two years in a row. For this the District was awarded the supreme status of "Accredited," whereby they will not be evaluated for two years.

The Park Services Department of the District also received special recognition for "Best Safety

Project" for a task manual that is an essential part of training efforts.

The Niles Park District is a member of the Park District Risk Management Agency (PDRMA), a self-insurance pool made up of 114 park and recreation agencies. The risk pool annually evaluates its members' loss control programs.

Shauna Bezilla, Safety Coordinator for the District was very appreciative of the award as well as the hard work of the District's Safety Committee and all of the staff. "PDRMA appreciates its members' close participation because there is a correlation between quality safety programs and reduced losses. Reduced losses translate into lower member contributions to the risk pool. We are already saving a lot of tax dollars by belonging to a risk pool rather than using commercial insurance. The continued development of our loss control program

will help prevent losses and save even more money," stated Bezilla.

Proposal may help enforce ordinances

A bill sponsored by State Rep. Rosemary Mulligan of Des Plaines could make it easier for Maine Township to enforce its garbage pickup ordinance for the unincorporated area.

House Bill 1004, now on third reading in the Illinois House of Representatives, would give townships in Cook County the right to appoint enforcement officers to oversee local regulations. It also would authorize township enforcement officers throughout the state to issue citations when they observe violations.

Currently, Maine and all other Cook County townships cannot appoint enforcement officers, while townships in counties with a population under 3 million have the authority to do so. However, enforcement officers in those counties cannot now write tickets for violations.

If approved, the proposal could help Maine Township improve compliance with its garbage pickup ordinance, which has been an ongoing source of concern in the unincorporated area, said Supervisor Mark Thompson.

"We greatly appreciate Rep. Mulligan's efforts to help us," Thompson said.

which was first introduced about five years ago, when the 312 area code faced a similar predicament.

An earlier proposal called for the 630 area code to be assigned to cellular phones and beepers, but the wireless industry objected. Another suggestion was adding "overlay" code, to new numbers in the 708 area. But that would have meant 11-digit dialing and was widely criticized and finally dropped.

Grumbling and unhappiness are quickly spreading throughout the new area code area, as business owners particularly are estimating the cost, not to mention the inconvenience, of replacing business cards, letterhead, computer systems, invoices, receipts and even the sign on the door. One pet shop owner in Hoffman Estates predicted that the change would cost \$1,000.

But the good news is, dialers will have a three-month grace period. They can reach numbers in the new area code using either 847 or 708. However, on April 21, 1996, the new code takes effect permanently.

Hynes mails 1994 homeowner exemptions

summer, Hynes said, adding that the exact amount saved will depend on the tax rate from local taxing bodies.

Homeowners can receive an exemption simply by signing their application and returning it to the Assessor's Office by April 25.

"This exemption represents significant tax relief for homeowners and I strongly urge anyone who is eligible to make sure they receive it," Hynes said.

The Homeowner Exemption is for owners of single-family homes, condominiums, cooperatives, and apartment buildings of up to six units. The current or previous owner must have occupied the property as a principal place of residence as of January 1, 1994.

Senior citizens who complete their application for a 1994 Senior Citizen Exemption, which was recently mailed, will automatically qualify for the Homeowner Exemption as well, Hynes said. Homeowners who turned 65 last year or earlier must notify the Assessor's Office to receive an application for the Senior Citizen Exemption.

An eligible senior citizen can realize from \$400 to \$700 in combined tax savings from the two

exemptions, Hynes said. He added that last year, more than one million homeowners realized over \$400 million in savings from both exemptions.

Hynes sponsored the Homeowner Exemption while serving as Illinois Senate President and, as assessor, worked to increase its benefits to the present amount.

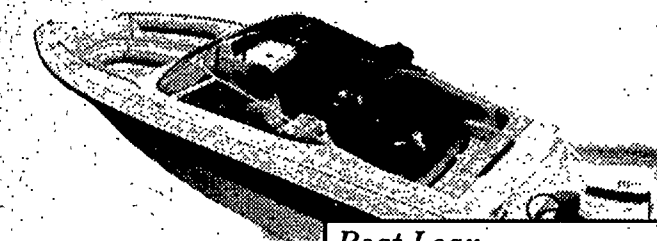
