

# **District 207** passes 3.67 percent tax levy

The 3.67 percent tax levy that was passed by the Maine Townhip High School District 207 Board of Education at the by Kathleen Quirsfeld than a \$90 increase in taxes on a \$150,000 home, according to Merilee McCracken, assistant superintendent for business. Assuming growth of about 10 percent due to the triennial reassessment, the \$60,522,744 levy is \$2,008,274 more than the 1994 tax extension of \$58,514,470. The actual tax rate equals the levy divided by the estimated equalized assessed valuation (EAV) and is projected to be \$2.198 for every \$100 of EAV for 1995. Historically, the tax rate has been as high as \$2.51 in 1976.

Although District 207 is operating under the tax cap which restricts it from increasing tax levies by more than five percent or the increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) which was 2.7 this year, District 207 set its levy told were used only by at 3.64 percent to capture any new growth in the tax base. "This levy only guarantees District 207 a 2.7 percent increase over the 1994 extension. The board levied an additional amount which may or may not be realized pending on the amount of new property in the 1995 tax base," said McCracken. "Bracing itself for the impact
