Cellular antennas to be installed on Jarvis tower

Nine small communication antennas will soon be installed on the catwalk of an existing water tower at 5600 Jarvis, Niles.

At its March 4, meeting, the Niles Plan Commission & Zoning Board unanimously agreed to the change in zoning to permit the installation of the antennas, and a small equipment box, to PCS (Personal Communication Systems) Prime Co., Itasca, IL.

Amy Kurson, a representative of PCS Prime Co., told the Commissioners that the placement of the antennas is necessary for the public's convenience. Their use would provide privacy for individuals with cellular phones and pagers, and would assist in the prevention of "dropped calls, and

crackling calls."

She also said that "the system has been designed so as to protect the public health." The antennas and equipment box will be blocked by a fence and out of reach of children.

In further compliance with the Niles Code, Kurson also stated that placement of the antennas and equipment box would not injure surrounding property. The area nearby the water tower is a manufacturing district and Prime Co. has offered to place the water tower in a discreet location.

In a separate issue, a variation was granted to a homeowner wishing to construct an addition to her home at 8347 Harrison.

Trustee meets with congressional delegates

Village of Niles Trustee Louella Preston joined elected officials of the Northwest Municipal Conference (NWMC) in a first ever meeting with congressional delegates from the region. Congressional members Phil Crane, Henry Hyde, and representatives from Congressional members Sidney Yates, John Porter, and Carol Mosley-Braun's office participated in the event.

The focus of the meeting was to articulate positions on federal legislation that impacts the residents of Niles and surrounding communities. The positions discussed include:

(1) the support of redevelopment of "brownfields," polluted

parcels of land;

(2) a rational resolution of rail safety issues that incorporate the needs of residents and local officials, and

(3) block grants developed by Congress which must include the involvement of local governments, as well as adequate funding to operate those programs, such as job training.

The Village of Niles is one of 35 municipal and 5 township members of the Northwest Municipal Conference. The NWMC is a regional council of government that fosters intergovernmental cooperation throughout northern Cook, Lake, and DuPage Counties.

M-NASR receives award for Loss Control Program

Trying to make its therapeutic recreation programs safe and cost effective to the public has been a constant goal of the Maine-Niles Association of Special Recreation (M-NASR).

M-NASR, an extension of the Skokie, Des Plaines, Morton Grove, Niles, Golf-Maine and Park Ridge Park Districts and the Village of Lincolnwood, provides recreation and leisure programming for physically and mentally challenged youth, teens and adults.

M-NASR is also a member of the Park District Risk Management Agency (PDRMA), which is a self-insurance risk pool made up of 118 Illinois Park and Recre-

ation Agencies. The risk pool annually conducts a review of its members' loss prevention programs. This week, M-NASR learned from PDRMA that its loss control program was rated level

Morton Grove native ordained bishop

The Most Rev. John R. Manz, once a student at St. Martha's School in Morton Grove, was ordained an auxiliary bishop for the Archdiocese of Chicago by Cardinal Joseph Bernardin, at Holy Name Cathedral, State and Superior Streets in Chicago, at 3 p.m. March 5.

The Manz family moved to Morton Grove from St. Matthias Parish on Chicago's north side in 1956. The Rev. Manz was taught by the Sisters of Christian Charity at St. Martha's from sixth through eighth grades. Later, he attended Quigley Preparatory Seminary in Chicago, Niles College Seminary and the University of St. Mary of the Lake, Mundelein.

The Rev. Manz's eighth-grade teacher, Sister Angelica Hengesbach, S.C.C., now semi-retired and living in Westphalia, Mich.,

told the *New World*, Chicago's archdiocesan newspaper, that she remembers the former altar server as "a good student, a good per-

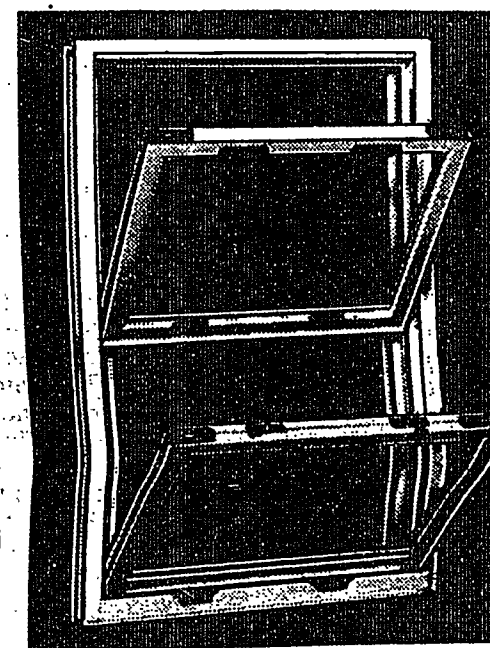

Edward Jones: Read and understand investment warnings

Warning labels don't make best-sellers. Most of us avoid reading them because they can be uninteresting and they seldom say anything we don't already know.

For example, take one of the "warning labels" on mutual funds. Among the disclaimers that appear in every mutual fund prospectus is a warning that no one can foresee or guarantee results. This is not news to most people.

But even though people know this fact, they often ignore it. The disclaimers are put in writing to enable investors to make better-informed decisions and perhaps to protect them from sometimes-overenthusiastic salespeople.

One of the typical mutual fund warnings is that there is no assurance the fund will meet its stated objectives. Every fund must clearly state in its prospectus what it is designed to do. If you're looking for regular income, you don't want to invest in an aggressive growth fund -- and you won't, if you read the section of the prospectus listing the fund's objectives.

And if you read the warnings, you will also know that there is no guarantee the fund will meet these objectives. Even though the fund's managers are legally bound to their objectives, they can't guarantee they will achieve them. That's a reasonable warning that should encourage investors

to examine the fund's history of meeting its objectives.

That brings us to another warning: Past performance is not a promise of future performance. This is possibly the most difficult warning to accept. For many people, past performance is an integral part of investment decisions. Evaluating a fund's long-term historical performance through all market climates is a good practice. A long track record may provide reasonable expectations for the future -- but even then, it is not a promise of future results.

Another important warning is that the investment return and principal value of mutual fund shares will fluctuate. With the opportunity for gain also comes

the risk of loss. Just like an individual stock, at any time an investor's share may be worth more or less than the original cost. Additionally, the dividends that a mutual fund shareholder receives will fluctuate depending on the dividends and income that the mutual fund receives from its investments.

For example, when interest rates on U.S. Treasury bonds declined, so did the dividends paid by mutual funds that invested in these securities. As older, higher-paying bonds matured, mutual funds replaced them with newer, lower-paying bonds, therefore decreasing the dividends these funds could pay to their shareholders. Investors should not have been surprised,

since they were warned this could happen.

Finally, investors are also warned that mutual funds have management fees and expenses. These are fully disclosed in the prospectus. Regardless of what you think, no investment is without cost.

While these warnings can be dry reading, they are for your protection. Read them, and if you have any questions, have your investment representative explain them thoroughly. Understanding warning labels will help you avoid surprises.

CJE offers tax relief program assistance

Council for Jewish Elderly staff will provide free help to seniors applying for the 1995 Circuit Breaker Tax Assistance Program at any of its Neighborhood Resource Centers. Trained personnel will assist in completing Circuit Breaker Forms from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays, at 3003 W. Touhy Ave., and 1522 W. Morse Ave.

The Circuit Breaker Tax Relief Program helps reduce the burden of property, mobile home and sales tax on senior citizens and disabled persons in Illinois through a grant administered by the Illinois Department of Revenue. The Circuit Breaker grant is available to property owners and renters, and residents of retirement facilities subject to property tax. Persons are eligible if they are 65 or older or disabled, live in a building in Illinois subject to property tax, and have an annual income less than \$14,000.

CJE staff can also assist with applications for the Pharmaceutical Assistance Program, an optional program that pays for approved medications for those who suffer from heart, blood pressure, arthritis or diabetes problems. Any person interested should first discuss with their pharmacist. Also available for Circuit Breaker eligible applicants is a half price vehicle license discount card.

Anyone seeking assistance in completing the Circuit Breaker application should bring a social security card; records of all income for 1995, including interest statements; landlord's name, address and telephone number; statement of the amount of rent paid in 1995 or amount of property tax paid; to any of Council for Jewish Elderly's neighborhood resource centers. Proof of age and/or disability is also required for first time applicants.

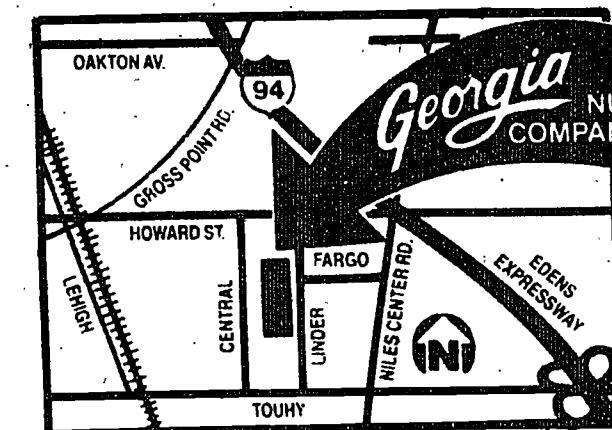

IRAs still deductible for many people

If you're not sure whether you can deduct your contribution to an Individual Retirement Account, the Internal Revenue Service says, here is some information that may help.

If you are not covered by a retirement plan at work you can still deduct your entire IRA contribution. This is true regardless of how much money you make. Ordinarily, you must have earned income of some kind either from running a business or working for someone else.

But, if you are covered by a retirement plan at work, the size of your income as well as your marital status will affect how much, if any, you can deduct. If you are single and your Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) is

some modifications, is \$25,000 or less, you're still eligible for a full IRA deduction of up to \$2,000. If your income is higher—between \$25,000 and \$35,000—the limit on your IRA deduction is reduced. At \$35,000 and above, the deduction disappears.

A similar limitation applies to a married couple filing a joint return where one or both spouses are covered by a retirement plan at work. If the couple's modified AGI is \$40,000 to

\$50,000, the deduction is phased out. And, at \$50,000 and above, the deduction is gone. Special rules apply to a married person filing a separate return.

Ameritech announces anti-slamming initiative

Joined by the Better Business Bureau, representatives of six consumer groups and victims of slamming fraud, Ameritech Illinois president, Doug Whitley announced that more than 1.5 million customers have asked the company to help protect them from "slamming"—the illegal practice of changing a customer's communications account without the customer's knowledge or consent.

Whitley said that Ameritech received an unprecedented response from customers to its mailing that accompanied the company's December phone bills. Customers merely had to fill out and return a form that accompanied the bill to protect their account from slamming.

Ameritech even has created an Anti-Slamming Hotline—1-

800-SLAM-920 (1-800-752-6920)—for customers who have not yet responded to the December offer, but who still want to protect their account from slamming. Callers to the number will find an easy to use automated system that will let them protect their account.

Whitley said, "that despite the fact that slammers face fines, financial penalties and lawsuits, slamming is still a leading source of consumer complaints to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC)." The practice even is specifically addressed in the new Telecommunications Act, which specifies financial penalties for companies that are convicted of slamming.

In addition to protecting their account with Ameritech, there are other steps people can take to avoid being slammed:

- Never sign anything without reading it carefully, or cash "bonus" checks and respond to contest offers without reading the fine print.
- If you receive a phone call about long distance service and you are not interested in switching your service, be sure to tell the caller that you are not interested in receiving their service.
- If someone sends you a letter or postcard "verifying" that you have switched services, notify them that you did not authorize the change, then call your local telephone company (Ameritech) to confirm that you are still with your preferred long-distance company.
- Ready your phone bill carefully every month. If you see any unfamiliar names, or charges you can't identify, call your local phone company and ask about these items.

The Telecommunications Act of 1996, signed into law earlier this month, will usher in even more choices for consumers, opening up local, long-distance and cable TV markets to a variety of companies. The bill also allows local service companies, like Ameritech, to enter the long distance business.

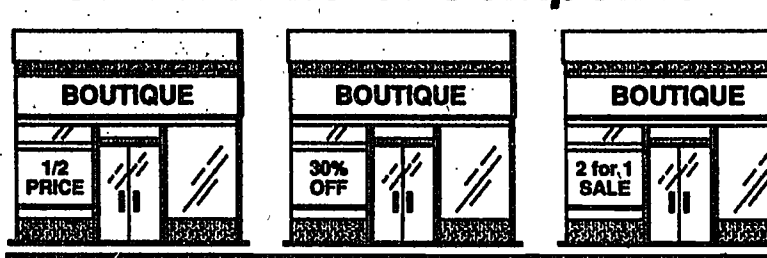

At these meetings, held by the Village Park District and Zoning Board, I have heard the people of Niles voice their opinions. So far EVERYONE who has spoken has been on the side of saving Joz as it is. NOT ONE PERSON HAS COME FORWARD IN FAVOR OF THE MOVE!

I have seen people approach the podium with class and respect. I've heard people screaming with rage from the back of the room. I've seen people cry at the thought of losing the site of their childhood memories and one of Niles most acclaimed facilities. Worst of all, I've seen kids approach the podium and just ask "why?" It is really sad because even then no one has given an answer.

The only reason that I have heard from the Park District for considering the swap is based on an IF. If Niles Elementary School South is sold by School District 71, Joz would have no parking lot. Well, if your sister was a man then she would be your brother. Let us suppose that District 71 did decide to sell the school land. They could sell it to another organization and keep it as another school or if not, why couldn't the Park District buy or lease the parking lot section of the land? Or if Public Works is moving, what about that land? Okay, the worst case scenario, Field #6 at Joz (Instructional League field) could be sacrificed and be developed into a parking lot.

At the Zoning Board meeting there was probably 250 to 300 people at the Trident Center. Last week the Park District had approximately 160 at the Rec Cen-

ter on Ash Wednesday. NO ONE HAS BEEN IN FAVOR OF THE SWAP!

I have not even touched on traffic patterns, needed turn lanes, having 2 parks directly across the street from each other, safety for the kids trying to get to the park, lights and dust from the ball fields right outside the condominium bedroom windows, or kids straying from the proposed park and doing who knows what around the condos.

It is really strange. These elected officials are supposed to listen to the people and represent

the people. Well, if they are listening the answer is clear. The people of Niles DO NOT want their treasure destroyed!

If I were a betting man, I would tell you to bet everything you've got that this swap will happen even though the citizens don't want it. Maybe it is time for our elected officials to remember why they are in office. I thought it was to represent the people.

The allotments to some of the municipalities follow: Des Plaines, \$107,602; Glenview, \$77,431; and Niles, \$57,179.

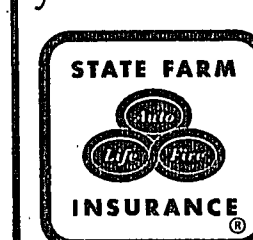

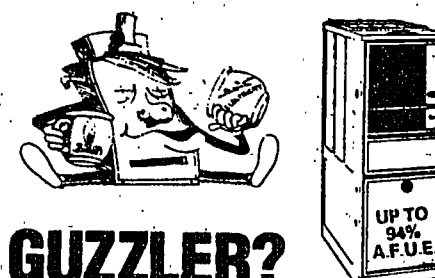

Packet radio is a relatively new mode of amateur radio communications which utilizes computers. Among its advantages are the ability to provide error-free communications. Or, as one packet aficionado notes: when a packet station transmits "send a surgeon," that station can be sure the receiving station will not send him a fish because of an error in voice or Morse code communications.

Packet radio employs a bulletin board system which, with E-mail, allows radio operators to store messages for retrieval at a later time by other hams. However, there are no hook-up or provider charges.

While packet is frequently used by hams for day-to-day messages, it also serves a public service function. For example, following an earthquake in Armenia, portable packet radio stations were used to provide communications during relief efforts. And when Hurricane Gilbert hit Texas, health and welfare reports were carried throughout the United States on a packet radio network.

Questions and Answers

Q. Would a nutritional supplement help my frail mother (age 85) keep up her strength?

A. A recent issue of the New England Journal of Medicine noted that while frailty is common at advanced ages, it is difficult to know how much is due to disease, age itself, undernutrition or inactivity. A study of nursing home residents aged 72 to 98, most of whom needed canes or walkers, demonstrated that a program of exercises that involved pushing against resistance increased muscle strength and improved walking ability and the level of physical activity. A nutritional supplement added to the diet produced no apparent benefit, not surprising since the subjects' diets already appeared adequate.

On the other hand, physical therapy can do little if nutritional needs are not met. A registered dietitian can evaluate your mother's diet; any inadequacies are best made up through food, with supplements used only when necessary.

Q. Should I be concerned about how safe caffeine is for my children?

A. For adults, caffeine seems to offer little reason for concern about long-term health risks like cancer or heart disease. However, caffeine is a drug that is a central nervous system stimulant; too much can cause nervousness, irritability, and sleep difficulties. Because of children's smaller size the same amount of caffeine affects them more than adults: two cans of caffeinated soda may be like an adult drinking six cups of coffee! Frequent soda-drinking also poses a nutrition problem because it provides calories and sugar without the calcium and other nutrients of milk. If your child drinks more than just an occasional soda, you should probably check ingredient listings for caffeine. Colas are the most common caffeinated sodas, but some others also contain large amounts.

Q. I know that popcorn can be a healthy snack. Are the cheese- or caramel-flavored popcorns also good snack choices?

A. Not if you're choosing them because you think they're low in fat! One ounce (about a cup) of caramel corn contains about 10 grams of fat, while an ounce (about 2 cups) of cheese popcorn tends to contain about 12 to 14 grams of fat, as much as a candy bar. Even butter-flavored, pre-popped packaged popcorn tends to have from 10 to 13 grams of fat per ounce (although the ounce is a satisfying 3 cups). While there's no need to give up high-fat snack foods like this completely, most of the time you might look first for fruits, vegetables, popcorn made with little or no added fat, or other low-fat grains like bagels or the increasing variety of fat-free crackers and rice cakes.
