The Circuit Breaker Tax Relief Program helps reduce the burden of property, mobile home and sales tax on senior citizens and disabled persons in Illinois through a grant administered by the Illinois Department of Revenue. The Circuit Breaker grant is available to property owners and renters, and residents of retirement facilities subject to property tax. Persons are eligible if they are 65 or older or disabled, live in a building in Illinois subject to property tax, and have an annual income less than \$14,000.

CJE staff can also assist with applications for the Pharmaceutical Assistance Program, an optional program that pays for approved medications for those who suffer from heart, blood pressure, arthritis or diabetes problems. Any person interested should first discuss with their pharmacists. Also available for Circuit Breaker eligible applicants is a half price vehicle li-


