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Commissioners voted at special public meeting Wednesday

Park District decides fate of Jozwiak Park

The Jozwiak Park land swap decision will have been made by the time this edition goes to press.

At a special meeting of the Park District Board held at 6:30 p.m. last evening, the commissioners were scheduled to adjourn to executive session to decide the much-debated proposal by the Village to move the park from Franks and Touhy avenues to a 7.7-acre parcel on the northwest corner of the former Niles College property at Touhy and Harlem avenues.

The 7.7-acre parcel was donated to the village by Pontarelli Builders, Chicago, who will erect a nine-building, 420-unit condominium development on the remaining land.

Village officials proposed the land swap, which would allow a much-needed expansion of the existing public services facility at 6849 Touhy Ave., adjacent to Jozwiak Park, and would eliminate the need to construct a completely new facility from scratch on the donated parcel.

Of particular concern are the baseball diamonds and miniature golf facilities of the existing park. Park officials have said that the proposed new park site can accommodate existing Jozwiak fa-

cilities.

In addition, according to Mayor Nicholas Blase, the Village is currently negotiating with the Forest Preserve to acquire a tract

A Des Plaines Mall shopper became the first citizen to invoke the suburb's 8-year-old anti-smoking ordinance, which bans smoking in public places and allows for violators to be fined up to \$500.

According to a recent *Tribune* article, Lynne Lohr, who has asthma, pressed charges against Pat Kuehne, 66, who was having a quick puff while on a break from her cashier's job at the Shopmart grocery in the mall at 700 Pearson St in the suburb.

Lohr encountered Kuehne smoking in a common area of the mall and asked her to put the cigarette out because she is allergic to cigarette smoke.

Kuehne, whom Lohr described as having a "nasty attitude," ignored the request. Lohr's attempts to enlist the assistance of mall security

Vehicle sticker deadline for Morton Grove

Sales of 1996 vehicle stickers began a few weeks ago when applications were mailed to owners. New vehicle stickers must be properly displayed by midnight, April 30.

Residents are encouraged to use the pre-printed form and apply by mail well before the deadline. Any necessary changes should be made on the form before the mailing. If residents have not received a pre-printed application, they are still responsible for purchasing a motor vehicle sticker if it is registered in Morton Grove. Contact the Village Hall for blank application forms.

The fees for the vehicle stickers are as follows: passenger vehicles - \$20, trucks/commercial - \$40-\$100, motorcycle - \$15, motor scooter/mopeds - \$10, antique/religious - \$10, recreational vehicles - \$25.

Residents who are 65 or older may purchase one sticker per household for the reduced fee of \$10.



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Learn from trees at Oakton

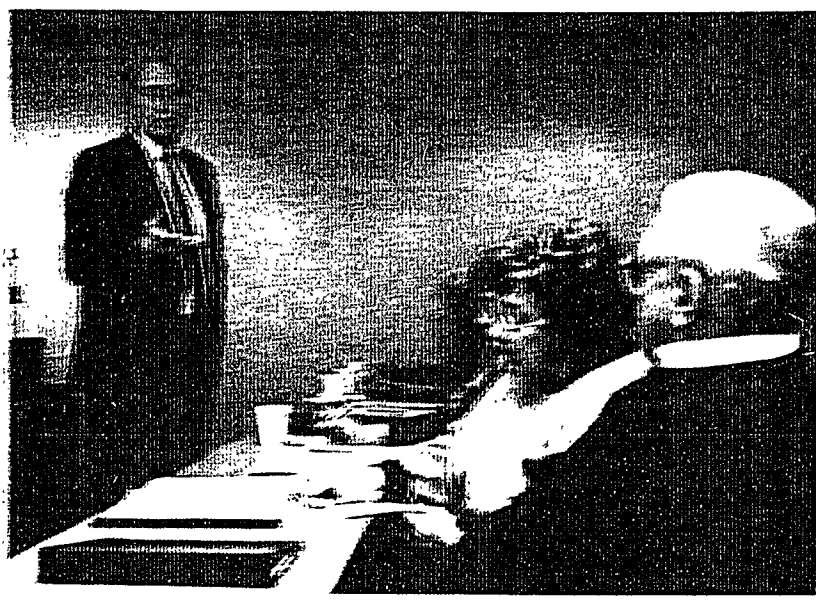

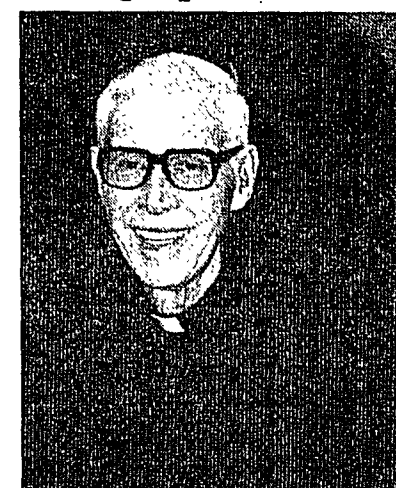
Notre Dame priest celebrates fifty years

Legislation extending maternity stays passes House

Women who have just given birth will be allowed longer hospital stays, thanks to legislation, sponsored by State Representative Ralph Capparelli (D-13), that passed the Illinois House of Representatives this week in Springfield. The measure, known as the "Drive-through Delivery" bill, requires insurance companies to allow new mothers and their babies to remain in the hospital for 48 hours following an uncomplicated delivery.

"This bill takes medical decision-making out of the hands of the insurance companies, and

puts it back in the hands of doctors and their patients," Capparelli said.

Capparelli explained that in an effort to keep health care costs down, Illinois insurance companies generally expect maternity patients to be discharged 24 hours after giving birth if a delivery has been uncomplicated (48 hours for a Caesarean delivery). In fact, many insurance companies are planning to reduce even further -- to 12 or even 6 hours after delivery -- the maternity stays in uncomplicated deliveries.

Under the proposal the mini-

mum maternity stay for which insurance must provide will be extended to 48 hours of care following an uncomplicated delivery, and 96 hours following a Caesarean, guidelines endorsed by the American Academy of Pediatrics and the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

"Health professionals are concerned that the recent trend toward shortened hospital stays (some insurance companies have advocated only covering care for 12 or even 6 hours following birth) increases risk to both the mother and the newborn," said Capparelli.

"Early discharge increases the risk that mothers and infants will develop significant health problems which may go undetected," Capparelli continued. "In the long run, the costs will be even greater if additional medical services are needed as undetected problems become worse. Many problems can be easily remedied if they are caught at birth."

The bill now moves to the Senate for consideration.

The Alloy's mostly used with Yellow Gold are Silver, Copper, Zinc and Nickel. I am mostly used with White Gold.

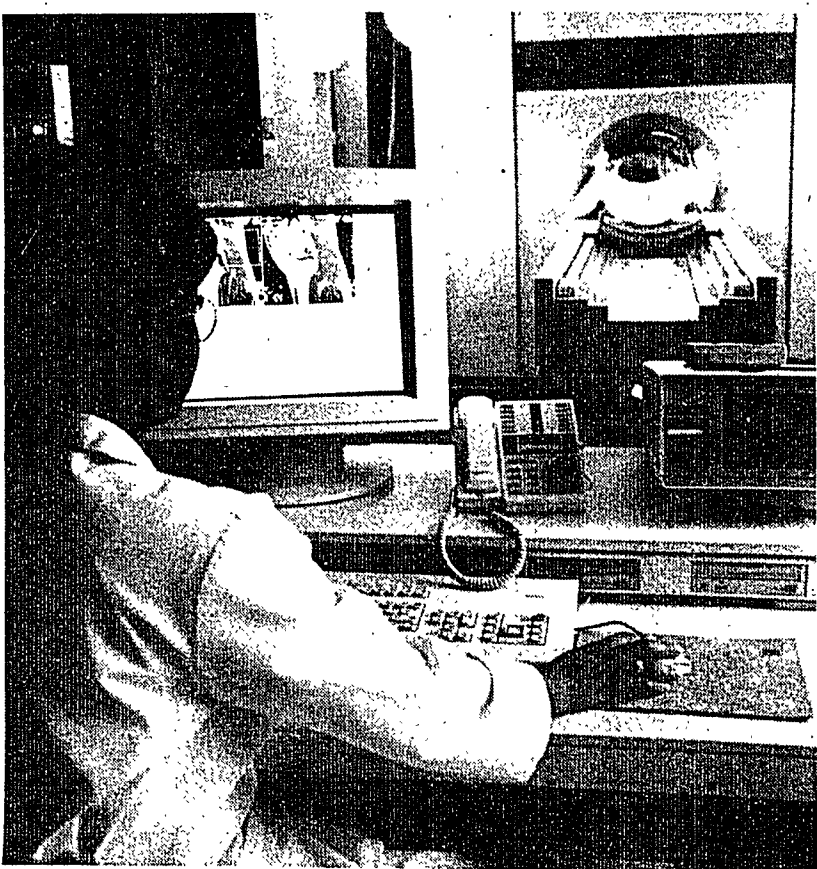

Later, he was transported back to the Niles Police Department and processed.

The owners of the condo unit were home at the time of the crash, but no one in the unit sustained injuries. A 54-year-old Chicago man witnessed the incident and said the arrestee's vehicle was traveling northbound on Caldwell Avenue in the curb lane when it drove over the curb and crashed into the building.

•Most students do not know that if they drink too much too quickly, they can die of an alcohol overdose.

•Drinking is associated with other causes of death among youth—including car crashes, murders and suicides.

It is time our community comes together to reduce and prevent underage drinking. We

must get the message out in our schools, our homes and in our businesses that we will not tolerate sales of alcohol to minors. This is an important step in keeping our kids safe.

District 219 to participate in TIMSS testing

The Third International Mathematics and Science Survey (TIMSS) is the largest comparative study of educational achievement ever undertaken, and students at Niles North and Niles West High Schools have been selected to be a part of it. On April 17 and 18, selected seniors at each school will be tested on their math and science skills. The results of these exams will be grouped with other schools in the area and compared to the results of students who have taken similar exams worldwide.

The TIMSS program is coordinated by the International Association for the Evaluation of Educational Achievement (IEA), an independent international cooperative of research centers and departments of education. Approximately 50 countries are

participating in this study, including Australia, China, England, France, Israel, Japan, Korea, Russia, Spain and the Ukraine. Selected seniors who have taken advanced courses in calculus as part of their regular curriculum will be included, as will those who have taken advanced physics classes. Another group of students who have not taken any advanced calculus or physics courses will also take the exam. Overall, approximately 270 District 219 students will be tested.

District 219 is participating in the TIMSS program with other local high schools such as Glenbrook South, Glenbrook North, New Trier, and the Illinois Math and Science Academy. A number of local elementary and middle school districts are also participating, including Morton Grove District 67 and Lincolnwood District 74. These institutions are all members of the First In the World Consortium, a group of local school districts and business partners who are committed to the next generations of teaching and learning in mathematics and science.

The preliminary results of the exams will be available in September with initial reports and data files supplied to participating districts by the end of the year.

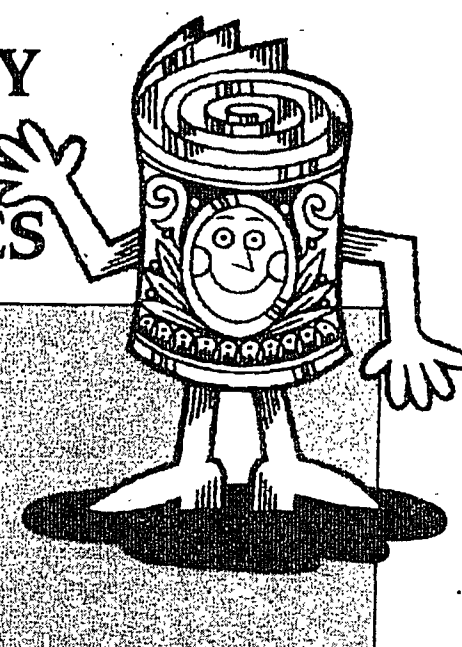

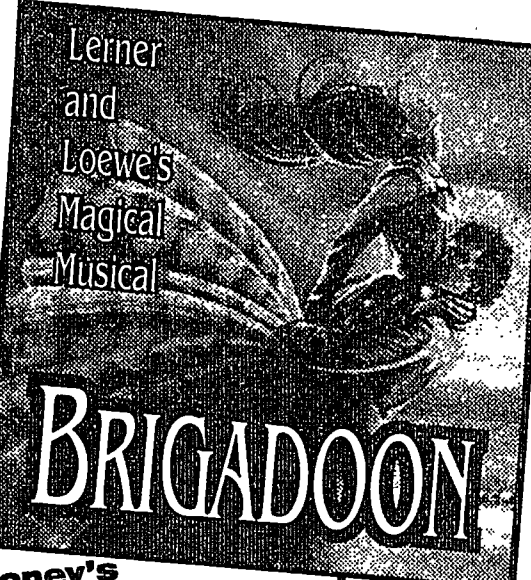

Ameritech announces \$29 million price cut

Ameritech announced that it plans to reduce prices \$29 million on July 1, with \$17 million of the reduction benefiting residential consumers and \$8 million benefiting business customers.

Residential consumers statewide will see a 25 percent cut, from \$55 to \$41.50, in the basic one-time charge for installing new telephone service, and a 70 percent cut, from \$10 to \$3, in the one-time "change order" charge that is applied when they order a feature such as Caller ID

or voice mail.

Business customers in Chicago and certain suburbs will see reductions ranging from 2.5 percent to 5 percent in the monthly charge for a telecommunications line. Business customers statewide will see the basic one-time charge for installing new service cut more than 40 percent, from \$52.35 to \$30.

This is the third major cut in Ameritech's basic service prices since the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) adopted a more flexible system of regulat-

ing the company in 1994. Previous price reductions totaled \$93 million in November 1994 and \$40 million in July 1995.

At the same time, Ameritech's monthly line charge for residential customers and residential calling rates within local calling areas are capped at November 1994 levels for five years.

While implementing these price reductions, Ameritech also is meeting its commitment to spend at least \$3 billion over five years to expand and modernize its telecommunications

network in Illinois. The company filed documents with the ICC showing that its 1995 modernization expenditures totaled \$760.7 million, well above the \$600 million annual average that is needed to meet the five-year commitment.

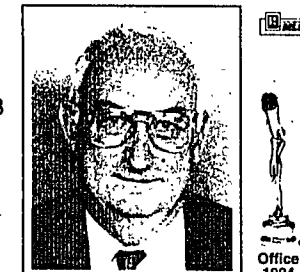

Recordkeeping tips offered by the Illinois CPA Society

If you needed your 1992 tax return in a hurry, would you know where to look? What about last month's mutual fund statement? Or last year's canceled checks? If you answered "no" to these questions, you're not alone. Most people amass so much financial documentation that they don't know how to organize it all. But don't give up.

The Illinois CPA Society says recordkeeping is vital to effective money management, and offers this primer on what you should retain, why, and for how long.

Your Tax Returns

Keep all federal tax returns and supporting documents for at least six years. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) generally has three years after your return is filed to assess tax. (If you filed your return prior to the due date, it's deemed filed on the due date.) This three-year statute of limitations is extended to six years if amounts in excess of 25 percent of your reported gross income have been omitted from your return. If you file a fraudulent tax return, the IRS can come after you at any time. State laws

on tax audits vary, so be sure to check with local authorities before discarding old returns.

While it's generally safe to discard tax-supporting documents after six years, it's a good idea to keep your tax returns indefinitely. Copies of past returns can help remind you of carryover items, such as capital losses and depreciation, for your current return.

Your Investment Documents

It's important to retain trade confirmation notices you receive from your stockbroker or mutual fund when you buy or sell securities. You'll need the information to calculate your capital gains and losses. When you sell an investment, it's a good idea to attach the buy and sell confirmation form to your copy of your tax return for that year to document the capital gain or loss you reported.

Keep your monthly brokerage or mutual fund statements at least until you receive your annual statement. If that statement summarizes all transactions and related data for the year, toss your monthly statements.

If you're reinvesting dividends, save each reinvestment transaction notice. When you sell, you'll need accurate records of the prices at which you bought those reinvested dividend shares to determine your taxable gain or loss.

Your Home Improvement Costs
Create a file for bills and canceled checks that contains the invoices from any improvements you made to your home. When you sell, you can reduce the tax due on your profit by adding the cost of permanent home improvements, such as those incurred to update kitchens or bathrooms, to your home's basis.

Your Canceled Checks
Most people file their canceled checks by date or check number. Here's another alternative. After you balance your monthly statement, separate your checks according to purpose. File all the home improvement checks separately and do the same with other tax-related checks, such as medical expenses, charitable contributions, and business expenses. Keep checks that support your tax returns for six years. It's also wise to hold onto your bank books for six

years—in the event of an audit, the IRS may want to review them to examine the sources of your deposits. Generally, many non-tax-related checks can be tossed after a year or two.

Receipts For Valuables

File receipts for big-ticket purchases, such as jewelry and antiques. You may need them as proof of value in the event they are lost or stolen and you need to file an insurance claim.

Your File Storage

Your current financial files should be kept where it's easy and convenient to work with them. CPAs say papers that are either valuable or difficult to replace—like securities and deeds—are best kept in a safe deposit box or fireproof home safe. But before placing your will, life insurance policies, or cemetery deed in a safe deposit box, check your state laws. Some states seal the box upon the owner's death, which makes it difficult, if not impossible, to retrieve those documents.

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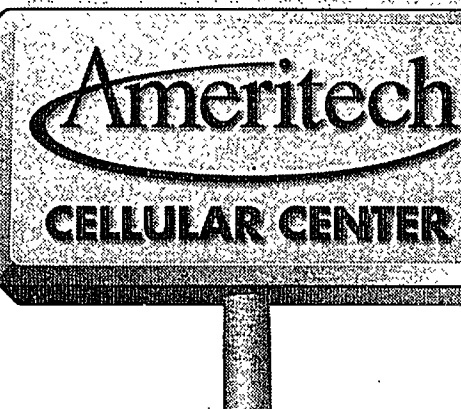

Governor to extend tax
deadline for soldiers in Bosnia

Gov. Jim Edgar recently acted to give Illinois men and women serving with the U. S. military peacekeeping mission in Bosnia more time to pay their state income taxes without fines or penalties.

"There is no reason any Illinois resident serving in Operation Joint Endeavor or in support of that operation should be penalized for not being able to file their state tax returns," the Governor said.

Congress and the President have recently acted to extend the federal tax filing deadline for those individuals serving in Bosnia-Herzegovina, Croatia and Macedonia until December 15, 1996. The Governor's Executive Order reaffirms that the deadline for filing state taxes also will be postponed and that any military pay not taxed by the federal government likewise is exempted from state taxes.

The Governor also asks state revenue officials to strongly consider waiving any penalties and interest that might be levied against the Illinois servicemen and women for filing after April 15.

"Illinois law generally mirrors the federal tax law but does not cover all the tax problems raised for these men and women," Edgar said. "We are acting to assure that no Illinois man and woman serving in this military operation is unduly penalized because of his or her service to our country."

Illinois law provides for an identical filing extension if a federal extension is granted. But the Governor's order was necessary to prevent the military personnel from being assessed fines and penalties for filing their returns after the traditional, statutory

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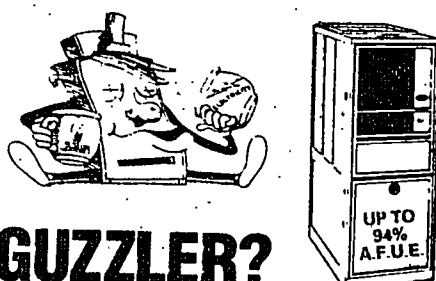

Lohr was able to trace Kuehne because she knew she worked at the mall. Des Plaines police did not arrest Kuehne but delivered a citation to her at home the day after the incident.

"I think the whole thing is really kind of ridiculous," Kuehne said. Cook County Circuit Judge Susan Grussel, however, did not think it was so ridiculous. She ordered Kuehne to pay Lohr's \$4729 doctor bill for treatment Lohr received after her sinuses were affected by secondhand smoke from Kuehne's cigarette.

of land at Oakton Street and Nordica Avenue where two new lighted ball fields would be constructed. Another ball field would be situated at the Touhy and Harlem park.

The present Jozwiak Park has two lighted baseball fields, where Little League, Bronco, Double A and Triple A teams compete, and a third unlighted field used by the instructional league.

The proposal has met with stiff opposition from residents who live near the current Jozwiak Park site and others opposed to the park relocation.

Opponents have launched a petition drive to collect 2,000 signatures of registered voters residing in the Niles Park District to place the matter in a referendum question on the Nov. 5 ballot. Only 1,400 valid signatures are required to be filed with the Cook County Board of Elections prior to the Sept. 3 deadline.

Park District attorney Barry Moss said that despite the outcome of such a referendum, the Park Board still has the right under state law to go ahead with a land trade if it sees fit.

Village Manager Abe Selman said that if the Park Board decides not to move Jozwiak Park to the larger site, the village would construct a new public works facility on the site.

Scofflaw Program

The Village of Skokie Legal Department is proud to announce an increase of almost 75% in revenue from the Village Scofflaw Program as a result of more aggressive procedures by the Scofflaw division of the Legal Department.

Between May of 1995 and February 1996, the Village collected a total of \$60,105.40 through the Scofflaw Program as compared to \$34,038.40 the year before; an increase of \$25,067 (74%). The increase is attributed to two mailings to individuals who had judgments recorded against them for non-payment of parking and other ordinance violation citations.

Citizens are reminded that ignoring even a \$5 parking ticket, can result in a lawsuit being filed and a \$200 judgment being charged to the violator. Failure to pay can result in liens against property and credit records.

"The goal of the Scofflaw Program, however, is not to raise funds," said Village of Skokie Corporation Counsel Barbara Meyer. "While the increase in revenue is a benefit to the Village, the goal of the Scofflaw Program is to enforce compliance with the law."

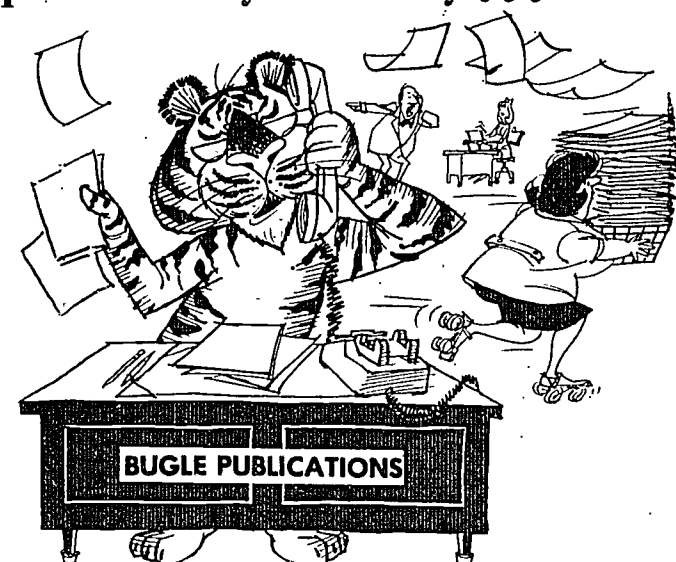

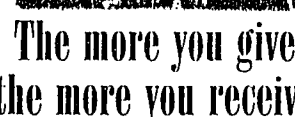
