From 1990 to 1994 in the United States, an average of 7,000 ani-mals per year - most of them wild - were diagnosed as having the disease. The disease is found in all states except Hawaii, as well as in Canada, Mexico and most

other countries around the world. Rabies is common in bats, skunks, raccoons and foxes, but the disease also has been found in deer and in large rodents, such as woodchucks. Cats, dogs and livestock can get rabies, too, if they are not vaccinated. Some animals, including chipmunks, gerbils, guinea pigs, hamsters, mice, rabbits, rats and squirrels, rarely get rabies. Birds, fish, insects, lizards, snakes and turtles never get rabies.

The first sign of rabies is usually a change in the animal's behavior. An animal need not be "foaming at the mouth" to have rabies. Other signs include difficulty walking, a general appearance of sickness or a change in the animal's normal behavior. For example, if an animal that is normally wild and avoids contact with humans approaches a picnic area, campsite or home and appears tame or friendly, consider it rabid. Conversely, if a normally tame and friendly animal becomes hostile or aggressive without provocation, it too should be considered rabid. A rabid animal usually dies within one week after showing signs of the disease.

People in high-risk occupations - for example, veterinarians. wildlife biologists, wildlife rehabilitators, animal control officers and taxidermists - should consider getting the rabies vaccine to protect themselves from exposures that could occur in their work. This type of vaccination (pre-exposure vaccination) consists of three rabies vaccine injections. Periodic single boosters are generally required every two years if the risk of contact continues. A person already vaccinated and later explosed to rabies must receive two booster injections three days apart immediately after exposure.





Illinois insurance questions

Q. Our homeowners insurance company won't renew our policy because we've had lots of claims. Our company said we can get coverage from the FAIR Plan but my friend said the FAIR Plan coverage isn't as good. What is the FAIR Plan and is my friend

A. The FAIR Plan is an association which functions like an insurance company in making homeowners and other property insurance available to people who aren't able to buy it from private insurance companies. The FAIR Plan, which stands for "Fair Access to Insurance Requirements," is basically the insurer of last resort. All insurance companies selling homeowner insurance in Illinois help to fund the Plan. The Plan is not govern-

Your friend is incorrect. You can buy coverage from the FAIR Plan that is the same as policies offered by private insurance companies. However, you'll need to try to buy insurance from at least three different companies before turning to the Plan. An agent licensed to sell property insurance can help. To find an agent in your area, call the Plan at (312) 861-0385, (618) 875-6261,

Q. My mom died. I can't find her life insurance records. She said her policy was paid up many years ago. I heard there is a service available to search for missing policy records. How can I use that service, or better yet, can you tell me what company she is insured with?

A. There was a missing policy service provided by the American Council of Life Insurance. However, the service was discontinued January 1, 1996, because the success rate was less than 1 percent

The Hotline cannot tell you who your mother is insured with. There is no central clearinghouse that maintains records of the company with which a person is insured - for any type of insurance. Although in some states the Secretary of State may have a record of where residents of that state have auto insurance, no such records are maintained in Illinoi

It is important that people plan ahead by maintaining their own financial and insurance records. It is advisable to also keep a copy of such records at a location other than your home (like a bank safety deposit box) in case of a home fire.

Also, there are 201 pending complaints that were received in the past 40 days. The complaints come from 49 states.

The majority of complaints allege delay in shipment and/or posting of charges on credit cards before shipment has been received and/or delay in issuance of credit to bank credit cards on canceled orders:

The company has been advertising wallcoverings and blinds in national magazines, purporting that consumers can save "up to 80% off retail on blinds" and "up to 78% off retail on wallcoverings." On April 25, 1996, BBB/ Chicago sent a memorandum to the advertising media, including those magazines that were known to be running ads for this company, recommending that further advertisements should be considered "Not In The Public Interest" (NIPI) because of these complaints.

look like the normal activities of lice department in the area that people going in to rent a video," Giovannelli said.

After the officer called for support, the two officers detained the suspects and discovered a large number of video tapes stacked up near the door of the store, "ready to be taken," Giovannelli said.

"They [the officers] prevented a pretty good theft from taking place," said Deputy Commander Bill Reid.

The four offenders were handcuffed and placed in the rear seat "cage" areas of the two squads, two suspects in each car. The Plexiglass "cages" cannot be opened from the inside of the car, Giovannelli explained, and the only opening in the acrylic is a 12" x 14" window to permit communication with front seat occu-

While the two officers went into the video store to obtain information from the female clerk, the only one on duty at the time of the attempted theft, the unthinkable happened: Handcuffed suspect Willie Garcia, a.k.a. Jimmy Garza, a career criminal with a record of 29 arrests on 37 charges, managed to squeeze himself through the opening in the Plexiglass into the front seat where he opened the door and fled northbound through the alley.

When the officers realized the suspect had escaped, they immediately alerted their supervisors and initiated a search of the area. The escapee was believed to be contained in the area between Main, Monroe, Milwaukee and Osceloa, and numerous squad cars converged on the area.

Air One, the State Police Helicopter, happened to be aloft nearby. The pilot, overhearing the ground radio communications between the officers and their watch commander, radioed his offer to aid in the search.

Giovannelli explained that Air One is always on call for any po-

A short public hearing was also held at the Board meeting on the issuance of \$3.2 million in industrial development revenue bonds to Lewis Spring & Stamping Co. by the Village of Niles.

Joanne Malinowski, Vice President of Kane, McKenna & Assoc., Inc., financial advisor to the Village and Mark Andreasik, President of Lewis Spring presented the proposal to the Board. The bonds will enable Lewis Spring to borrow funds for an industrial development project at tax-exempt rates, Malinowski said. Although the bonds will carry the Village's name, Niles is

not responsible for payment. Mark Andreasik, president of Lewis Spring, 2652 W. North Ave., Chicago, told the Board that the money will be used by the industrial company to acquire a building at 7500 N. Natchez, Niles. The company plans to move its entire operation, which

needs its assistance, but he emphasized that Niles police did not call for the helicopter. When helicopter assistance was offered, they merely accepted it, and with good and sufficient reason, according to Giovannelli. "The decision made by the

watch commander was based on the fact you had a career criminal running around the area who was somewhat desperate," Giovannelli said.

I think it's safe to say, the State Police officer offered up services, we accepted," Giovannelli added.

"You want to use all the resources available to you to try to apprehend him [Garcia]," Giovannelli said, citing the fact that Garcia was handcuffed, desperate and had a very long police record.

Area residents, however, were taken aback by the incident. "It was something else, coming through the trees with that beam,' said Nancy Redig of the 7200 block of Conrad. "It kept coming back. It seemed to start at Notre Dame [High School, 7655 W. Dempster] and kept coming back to Grennan, Milwaukee and Oakton," Redig said. "You didn't know what in God's name it was," she said. "It was interesting, though," she added.
