beforean activity, you should drink about 16 ounces (two 8 ounce cups or a half-liter) of water. If you cannot drink water two hours prior to working out, drink at least 8 or up to 16 ounces before starting your activity. Either way, make sure to drink water throughout your activity, consuming 6 to 12 ounces every 15 to 20 minutes, particularly when exercising in the heat. To foster maximum consumption and rapid absorption into your system, the water should be cool, abot 40 to 50 degrees Fahrenheit, but not ice cold. To ensure that you have had enough water, weigh yourself unclothed before and after

your activity. For each one pound deficit in body weight, you will need to drink a pint (two cups) of water to replace the water you lost as sweat.

Thirst: Never rely on thirst as your guide to how much water you need. Thirst is a signal designed to prevent severe dehydration. It activates when your body is in serious trouble, long after you should have begun drinking water to replenish your water to replenish your (Thirst, ctd) losses. The thirst signal also shuts off well before you've drunk enough. So you cannot afford to rely on thirst; you must use knowledge and good sense.

Diet and Weight loss: Exercise s not the only activity that increases your bodys need for water. During dieting and weight loss, your kidneys must go into overdrive to eliminates toxins formed from lost fat and muscle. Water is essential to this flushing process. It also helps you control your food intake, especially if one glass is consumed before and one during each meal.

Airplane travel: When you travel on an airplane, the atmsphere is similar to that of a desert: extremely dry. Mant travelers compound the problem by drinking alcohol and coffee. The resulting dehydration dries out your eyes and respiratory passages, causes irritability, worsens the symptoms of jet lag and may impair physical or mental aptitude.

High Altitudes: In high altitude situations the humidity is also very low and you must breathe more to take in adequate. oxygen.

Maine East and Maine South High Schools since September 1995 have been hooked up to the two-way interactive video-network of the North Suburban Higher Education Consortium (NSHEC). Through distance learning, high school students High School in Elk Grove Village have studied subjects such as Spanish, Accounting and Computer Science. Also through distance learning, students at both high schools have received advanced placement credit for completing Oakton Community College courses in Japanese I and II.

According to HSHEC Coordinator Patricia Widmayer, Ph.D., the Consortium is working with the Maine Township schools to of Higher Education to create a secure funding for a distance strategy for cooperative programlearning lab at Maine West High School.

Don Kerr and Jim Lonergan are District 207's long distance learning system coordinators and also English teachers at Maine South. Interactive video "allows us to combine our best teaching resources to reach the most number of students at both high schools," says Kerr.

The new technology also has paved the way for special student projects. High school English students were able to participate via inteactive video in a drama seminar from DePaul Universit the day after attending the production that was discussed in the seminar. High school French students have participated in a French professor's program at Oakton Community College. High school Social Studies students at both schools conducted a mock trial on Christopher Columbus, complete with a judge, a. jury, attorneys and witnesses.

The high school staff also benefits from distance learning, according to Lonergan. Several teachers have enrolled in a Type 75 certification program for school administrators, offered by Northeastern Illinois University at Maine South in the evenings on the NSHEC Network. High school conselors have taken part in information sessions on student scholarships, offered by the Illinois Student Assistance Commission.

Approximately 300 Maine Township high school students have had experience with distance learning to date. Kerr and Lonergan plan to con-

nect with other high schools
