

Touhy Ave. woman found dead in burning house

The apparent murder of a woman found dead in a fire-gutted home at 7544 W. Touhy Ave. in a Chicago neighborhood adjacent to Niles has prompted police to warn residents who are selling or showing homes to verify the identity of prospective buyers and never to show homes alone.

Police are conducting a death investigation because the autopsy on Dorothy Dziubak, 30, showed that her death was not caused by the fire.

Dziubak, a Polish immigrant and single mother of a 5-year-old girl who was at school at the time of the incident, worked as a factory machine operator. She had re-

cently put the house up for sale, and a sign bearing her phone number was in the front yard.

At least one prospective buyer contacted Dziubak Jan. 9 and made an appointment to return with his wife on Jan. 10. Police have not determined whether those visits are related to Dziubak's death.

Police also caution against supplying prospective buyers with any personal information such as work schedules, children or spouses.

Sellers and real estate agents should keep a list of the identity of all persons who are shown through a property that is for sale.

Myrna Breitzman has a special fondness for Wordel and has special memories of her own about him.

"He has been a member of my church since I was a little girl," she said. "He gives so much of himself to this community."

Monday is moving day for village and library

The Niles Administration Building currently located at 7601 Milwaukee Ave. will be closed Friday, Jan. 31 and Saturday, Feb. 1 to prepare for the transfer of operations to the new Administrative Offices at 1000 Civic Center Drive at the Southeast corner of Oakton Street and Waukegan Road.

The new offices will be open for business Monday, Feb. 3, the day also designated as Moving Day for the Niles Public Library when all the books and other materials will be packed up and moved from 6960 W. Oakton St. to two stories of a temporary facility in the former NCR building at 7400 N. Caldwell Ave.

The library will be closed from Feb. 3 to Feb. 7. When the move has been completed Feb. 8, most of the library's services will continue in the temporary facility. Some programs, such as the Battle of the Books, had to be moved

to other community facilities, such as the Trident Center, according to administrative services coordinator Dawn Ambrogio. Most of the village offices will

An unknown number of boxes of potato chips valued at \$954.09 was removed from a 1988 blue and white Jays van while it was parked in the fenced-in area near the Jays Foods Co. at 6969 N. Austin sometime between 4 p.m. Jan. 17 and 7 a.m. Jan. 20.

The driver's side window had been broken after the offender (s) apparently used a pry-type tool unsuccessfully to gain entry to the driver's door.

Once inside, the offender(s) removed the potato chips. Entry to the fenced-in parking lot was probably gained by using a key. Niles police said.

At least three times last fall Jays trucks were entered and large quantities of Jays products were removed. This incident was the first of the new year. Company officials declined to comment about the latest occurrence.



Free Medicare Guide available

The Illinois Department of Insurance is now offering a free buyer's guide to help Medicare beneficiaries make informed decisions about managed care insurance coverage, according to State Senator Walter Dudyecz (R-7th, Chicago).

The Medicare HMO Shopping Guide can help Medicare recipients understand how Medicare health maintenance organizations (HMOs) work, decide if a Medicare HMO is right for them, and select the plan that best fits their needs.

Dudyecz says the HMO guide identifies nine Medicare HMOs operating in Illinois and the 13 counties where this coverage is available, and provides cost and benefit information for each plan. The guide is a supplement to the Medicare Supplement Premium Comparison Guide, which lists similar information for every insurance company licensed to sell Medicare supplement insurance in Illinois. Publication was made possible through a federal grant from the Health Care Financing Administration to the Illinois Senior Health Insurance Program.

Flood Control and street improvements

Flood Control: The Village of Skokie Runoff Control Program to abate sewer backup into basements will see \$10 million in major sewer construction on several arterial routes in 1997. One lane of traffic in each direction will be maintained. The following street sections will be affected starting in April: Dempster Street: Edens Expressway to Niles Center Road; Keeler Avenue to Crawford Avenue and East Prairie Road to Ewing Avenue; Crawford: Dempster Street to Greenwood Avenue; Keystone Avenue: Church Street to Emerson Street; and Ewing: Dempster to Greenwood.

The following street sections are tentatively scheduled to begin in May: Oakton Street: Skokie Boulevard to McCormick Boulevard; Crawford Avenue: Jarvis Avenue to Kennedy Street; Keeney: Keystone Avenue to Crawford; Keystone: Keeney to Cleveland Street; Ridgeway Avenue: Oakton to Cleveland; Lawndale Avenue: Oakton to Cleveland; Monticello Avenue: Oakton to Cleveland; Central Park Avenue:

Oakton to Madison Street; and Fargo Avenue: Long Avenue to Niles Center Road.

Intersection Improvement: The Illinois Department of Transportation will be constructing a major improvement to the three street intersection areas of Howard Street, Lincoln Avenue and Skokie Boulevard. The project will include traffic signal modernization, left-turn lanes on Skokie Boulevard and Howard, stormwater detention and resurfacing.

Watermain improvements: Based upon a 1995 engineering analysis of the Village's water distribution system, a five-year improvement plan was developed to improve system pressure and peak hour water flows. For 1997 the following three areas will see watermain improvement projects: Golf Road: Skokie Boulevard to Gross Point Road and Gross Point: Golf to Keeler; Terminal Avenue: Church Street to Gross Point; Lamon Avenue: Oakton Street to Mulford Street.

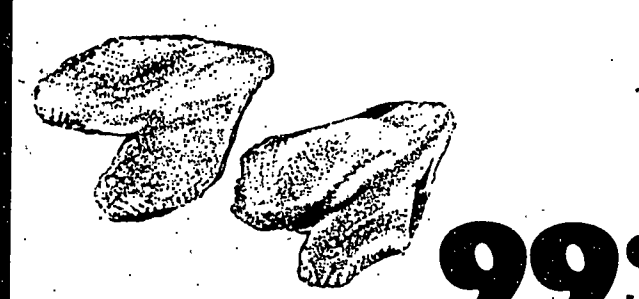

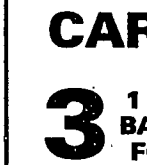

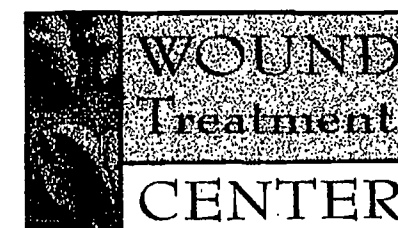

A busy year for babies at Lutheran General Hospital

1996 was a busy year for babies at Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge. One of the busiest obstetrical programs in the Chicago area, 4,216 babies were born at the hospital -- with multiple births of 58 sets of twins, 13 sets of triplets and one set of quadruplets.

A hospital milestone was reached on May 23, when the record for deliveries of babies in a 24-hour period, was broken. That day, 27 deliveries took place in the hospital's Labor and Delivery Unit -- 18 girls and 10 boys, including a set of twins.

"We average 14 deliveries a day," said Kathy Gerber, R.N., clinical manager of labor and delivery. "Of course, we always have some extremely busy days. In June, we had a remarkable day when our unit had a set of twins, triplets and quadruplets all born on one day."

The labor and delivery unit at Lutheran General Hospital features 15 labor-delivery-recovery rooms and a family-centered care approach which involves the father or significant other as a vital

part of the health care team. The department of obstetrics at Lutheran General also includes a 42-bed, 54-bassinet mother/baby unit and a 20-bed perinatal/gynecology unit.

In addition, the hospital has a 36-bed neonatal intensive care unit and a maternal transport program that brings expectant mothers with high-risk pregnancies to Lutheran General Hospital from area community hospitals.

Lutheran General Hospital is part of Advocate Health Care which is based in Oak Brook, IL. Have you had enough water today?

It's January again, so that must mean that it's time to reevaluate your health and fitness goals for the new year. And if you don't already know it, water is a key component to a healthy and active lifestyle. So if you're thinking about getting into shape, here are several tips to ensure that you remain healthy and properly hydrated.

Exercise: The smart athlete or exerciser will always start out well hydrated. Ideally, two hours before activity, you should drink about 16 ounces (two 8 ounce cups or a half-liter) of water. If you cannot drink water two hours prior to working out, drink at least 8 or up to 16 ounces before starting your activity. Either way, make sure to drink water throughout your activity, consuming 6 to 12 ounces every 15 to 20 minutes, particularly when exercising in the heat. To foster maximum consumption and rapid absorption into your system, the water should be cool, about 40 to 50 degrees Fahrenheit, but not ice cold. To ensure that you have had enough water, weigh yourself unclothed before and after your activity. For each one pound deficit in body weight, you will need to drink a pint (two cups) of water to replace the water you lost as sweat.

Thirst: Never rely on thirst as your guide to how much water you need. Thirst is a signal designed to prevent severe dehydration. It activates when your body is in serious trouble, long after you should have begun drinking water to replenish your water to replenish your (Thirst, ctd) losses. The thirst signal also shuts off well before you've drunk enough. So you cannot afford to rely on thirst; you must use knowledge and good sense.

Diet and Weight loss: Exercise is not the only activity that increases your body's need for water. During dieting and weight loss, your kidneys must go into overdrive to eliminate toxins formed from lost fat and muscle. Water is essential to this flushing process. It also helps you control your food intake, especially if one glass is consumed before and one during each meal.

Airplane travel: When you travel on an airplane, the atmosphere is similar to that of a desert: extremely dry. Many travelers compound the problem by drinking alcohol and coffee. The resulting dehydration dries out your eyes and respiratory passages, causes irritability, worsens the symptoms of jet lag and may impair physical or mental aptitude.

High Altitudes: In high altitude situations the humidity is also very low and you must breathe more to take in adequate oxygen.

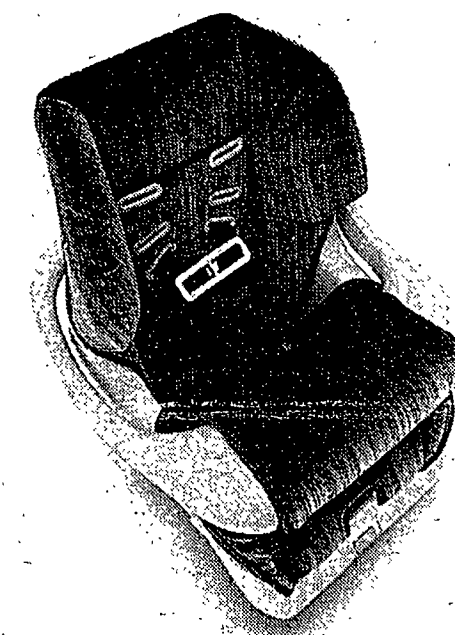

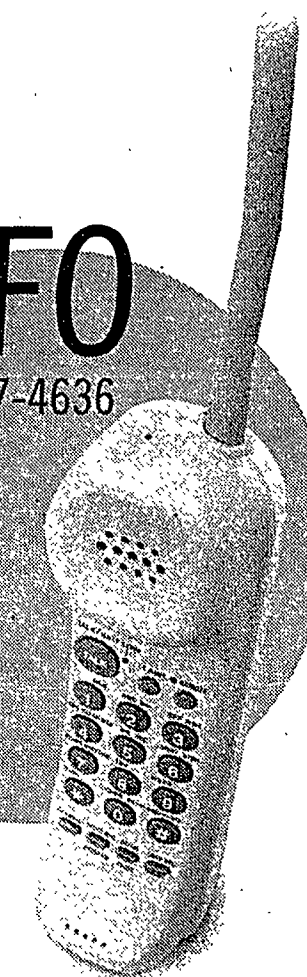

"Widows and Orphans Fund" benefits paid

Thanks to a bill passed by the legislature and signed by Governor Jim Edgar last summer, all overdue workers' compensation payments due to recipients of the Rate Adjustment Fund have not been paid. The fund pays cost-of-living benefits to approximately 1,500 individuals who are either permanently and totally disabled or the survivors of fatally injured workers.

The fund has fallen millions of dollars in debt and months behind in payments, because collections had exceeded payments in almost every year since 1983. Various short-term solutions had been legislated over the years, but it became apparent that an increase in the fund's income was necessary.

The new law increases the assessments levied against insurance companies and self-insured employers from 1/2 to 3/4 of 1% of indemnity benefits paid in the previous six months. The new assessment level will bring \$3 million more into the fund each year, and should assure the fund's solvency to approximately 2006. With roughly 280,000 employers in the state, this represents an increase of \$11 per employer.

Representatives of both business and labor organizations supported the bill to increase the rates.

• Help your children develop good physical activity habits at an early age by setting a good example yourself. Practice good heart healthy habits.

• Limit the amount of television, movies, videos and computer games to less than two hours a day. Substitute the rest of leisure time with physical activity.

• Plan family outings and vacations so that they involve vigorous activities such as hiking, bicycling, skiing, swimming, etc.

• Give your children some household chores that require physical exertion, keeping in mind their levels of strength, coordination and maturity. Mowing lawns, raking leaves, scrubbing floors and taking out the garbage

not only teaches responsibility but can be good exercise.

• Observe what sports and activities appeal to your children, then find out about lessons and clubs. Some children thrive on team sports; other children prefer individual activities. Some activities, like tennis and swimming, can be enjoyed for a lifetime and are much easier to learn during childhood.

• If it is safe to walk or bike rather than drive, do so. Use stairs instead of elevators and escalators. Increase the distances you and your children walk.

• Stay involved in your child's physical education classes at school. At daycare, make sure the kids exercise at least 20 minutes a day. Ask about frequency of classes and activity, class size, curriculum (instruction in lifetime fitness activities as well as team sports should be emphasized), physical fitness assessments, qualifications of the teacher or should hold appropriate certification in physical education and be an appropriate role model for students). Physical fitness should be measured at the beginning and end of each year, and goals should be established for each child. Encourage your school board to put emphasis on skills students can use for the rest of their lives.

• Discourage homework immediately after school to allow children to find some diversion from the structure of the school day. Children should be active after school and before dinner.

• Choose fitness oriented gifts - a jump rope, mini-trampoline, tennis racket, baseball bat, a

youth membership at the local YMCA or YWCA. Select the gift with your child's skills and interests in mind.

• Take advantage of your city's recreation opportunities - from soccer leagues to fun runs. Check out the various camps or organi-

zations like the Sierra Club that sponsor outdoor activities such as camping, hiking trips and bird watching.

• Spring your infant from mechanical restraints as much as possible.

District 207 to use distance learning

Maine Township High School District 207 has teamed up with area colleges and universities to use modern technology to enhance educational opportunities for both students and staff.

Maine East and Maine South High Schools since September 1995 have been hooked up to the two-way interactive video-network of the North Suburban Higher Education Consortium (NSHEC). Through distance learning, high school students have studied subjects such as Spanish, Accounting and Computer Science. Also through distance learning, students at both high schools have received advanced placement credit for completing Oakton Community College courses in Japanese I and II.

According to HSHEC Coordinator Patricia Widmayer, Ph.D., the Consortium is working with the Maine Township schools to secure funding for a distance learning lab at Maine West High School.

Don Kerr and Jim Loneragan are District 207's long distance learning system coordinators and also English teachers at Maine South. Interactive video "allows us to combine our best teaching resources to reach the most number of students at both high schools," says Kerr.

The new technology also has paved the way for special student projects. High school English students were able to participate via interactive video in a drama seminar from DePaul University the day after attending the production that was discussed in the seminar. High school French students have participated in a French professor's program at Oakton Community College. High school Social Studies students at both schools conducted a mock trial on Christopher Columbus, complete with a judge, a jury, attorneys and witnesses.

The high school staff also benefits from distance learning, according to Loneragan. Several teachers have enrolled in a Type 75 certification program for school administrators, offered by Northeastern Illinois University at Maine South in the evenings on the NSHEC Network. High school counselors have taken part in information sessions on student scholarships, offered by the Illinois Student Assistance Commission.

Approximately 300 Maine Township high school students have had experience with distance learning to date.

Kerr and Loneragan plan to connect with other high schools

around Illinois that use interactive video. District 207 also is exploring the possibility of connecting with a high school in Nebraska that is involved with a similar Social Studies project. Additionally, the Maine Township schools plan to hook up with a major League of Women Voters program on keeping the country's waterways safe.

Kindergarten Registration & Preschool Screening

District 71's kindergarten registration and screening for 5 year olds and preschool screening for 3 and 4 year olds will take place on Monday, February 3rd; Tuesday, February 4th; and Wednesday, February 5th; at Niles Elementary School (South), 6935 W. A Quick Tax Reference Guide for 1996 and 1997

For investors, taxes are an important consideration in a financial planning strategy. The quick reference guide that follows provides an overview of current tax rates for 1996 and 1997 and was prepared in accordance with current federal tax legislation. (The 1997 figures are based on preliminary estimates that will be finalized in December 1996.) You should, of course, consult a tax professional before making any tax-related investment decisions.

1996-97 Quick Tax Reference Guide

Individual Tax Rates:

1996 and 1997 retain the same five individual tax brackets: 15%, 28%, 31%, 36% and 39.6%.

Exemptions:

\$2,550 per person for 1996; \$2,650 per person for 1997.

Standard Deductions:

For 1996 -- Single: \$4,000; joint: \$6,700; head of household: \$5,900; married filing separately: \$3,350.

For 1997 -- Single: \$4,750; joint: \$6,900; head of household: \$6,050; married filing separately: \$3,450.

Capital Gains:

Long-term capital gains are taxed at a maximum rate of 28%; short-term capital gains are taxed at the same rate as ordinary income.

Capital Losses:

Capital losses can be used to offset capital gains, dollar for dollar. Up to \$3,000 of excess losses can offset ordinary income, with any balance carried forward indefinitely.

Deductible IRA Contributions:

If neither spouse is an active participant in a qualified retirement plan, IRA contributions are

deductible regardless of adjusted gross income (AGI). The contribution limit for 1996 and 1997 is \$2,000 for an individual IRA. In 1996, the limit is \$2,250 for a combination with a spousal IRA. The \$2,250 may be divided any way, provided no account receives more than \$2,000.

Effective for the 1997 tax year, the IRA contribution limit for non-wage earning spouses has been increased to \$2,000 (from \$250), which will allow spouses who do not work outside the home to increase their ability to build a source of retirement income. Therefore, in 1997, the combined IRA contribution limit for a married couple is \$4,000.

No contribution may be made to any IRA for a year in which the owner of that IRA attains the age of 70 1/2 or in subsequent years. But a contribution may be made to the IRA of that person's non-wage-earning spouse if the spouse is under age 70 1/2 and the first spouse is still working.

If either spouse is an active participant in a qualified retirement plan, then the following schedule will apply:

If you and your spouse are joint filers with AGI of less than \$40,000 (\$25,000 for single individual filers), your IRA contribution is fully deductible, up to \$2,000.

If you and your spouse's joint AGI is above \$50,000 (\$35,000 for single filers), your IRA contribution is not deductible.

If you and your spouse's joint AGI is between \$40,000 and \$50,000 (\$25,000 and \$35,000 for single filers), your IRA contribution is partially deductible and is phased out evenly. For exam-

ple, married couples with an AGI of \$45,000 would be able to deduct one-half of their IRA contribution. The annual IRA contribution limits described above are applicable, regardless of whether contributions are deductible or non-deductible.

Alternative Minimum Tax: The alternative minimum tax (AMT) rate is 26% on the first \$175,000 of AMT income and 27% on the balance. AMT applies only if it exceeds the regular tax.

Itemized Deductions: Mortgage Interest: Deductions on mortgage interest are limited to \$1,000,000 of debt. Deductions on home equity loans are limited to \$100,000 balances, with few restrictions on how you may use the proceeds of the loan.

-- Consumer Interest: Non-deductible.

-- Investment Interest: Generally deductible up to net investment income.

State and Local Income taxes and Real Estate Taxes: Deductible.

Charitable Contributions: Deductible, within percentage limits. Miscellaneous Expenses: Excess above 2% of AGI is deductible. Includes employee business and investment expenses.

Employee Deductions for Business Meals and Entertainment: Generally, 50% deductible in 1996 and 1997 and subject to miscellaneous expense floor of 2% of AGI.

Custodial Accounts: For 1997, unearned income of children under age 14 is taxed at the parents' marginal rate to the extent it exceeds \$1,300 (first \$650 is tax-

free, second \$650 is taxed at children's rate). This is the same as in 1996.

Sprint teams with industry

Sprint has joined with five other telecommunications companies in signing an agreement today which is a major step for Illinois Consumers in the development of number portability nationwide. Number portability will allow customers to retain their phone number if they change local phone companies.

The Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) two years ago required the establishment of a telecommunications industry working group to develop number portability solutions. Last year, a task force of six industry members-- AT&T, Ameritech, MCI, MFS, Sprint and TCG -- selected Lockheed Martin IMS to provide a Number Portability Administration Center (NPAC) Management System (NPAC/SMS). These six companies have signed a master contract with Lockheed Martin IMS.

Today, those six companies will sign individual user agree-

ments for access to the number portability database being developed by Lockheed Martin IMS.

This is a step toward the Federal Communication Commission (FCC) mandated implementation of number portability for the Chicago area by fourth quarter of 1997. The next crucial milestones are the system testing phase and the field trial required by the FCC in August of this year. Once these hurdles are crossed, many Chicago area customers will have the ability to change service providers while retaining their current telephone number.

"This agreement is a major step toward eliminating an obstacle to consumers who may wish to switch their local exchange carrier but who don't want to give up their current phone numbers," said Dan Miller of the ICC. "With effective number portability, consumers will be deciding carriers based on price and service, not on a phone number."

regarding "The Stimulator"

The Better Business Bureau is issuing a national alert to advise consumers about the Stimulator, a pain killing device allegedly made from gas grill igniters, that is being marketed and distributed despite actions by the federal government to a prohibit further sales.

Marketed solely by Akron, Ohio companies, Universal Management Services, Inc. and Natural Choice, Inc. the Stimulator device delivers a high-voltage electrical spark by way of hand-held plunger. This device is a modified gas grill igniter. Its promoters allege it can relieve joint, muscle, sinus, and other types of pain.

The BBB advises consumers that neither the Stimulator nor an associated product, the Xtendor, have been approved by the Federal Drug Administration (FDA). In May 1995, Federal Marshals seized approximately 16,000 Stimulators from Universal Management Services as a result of a complaint by the FDA alleging that the device required FDA approval prior to being sold, but the approval had not been obtained.

The BBB estimates that 16,000 Stimulators and Xtendos are being weekly. Elderly citizens are being heavily targeted and areas showing high sales of the two products include Florida and the

West Coast, according to calls the BBB. Consumers learn about the products through television infomercials featuring daredevil Evel Knievel and actress Lee Merriweather, and advertisements in airline and other magazines.

The BBB reports numerous consumer complaints alleging non-delivery of the ordered product, non-refund of refunds as requested, and ineffectiveness of the product. The Stimulator is sold with a 60-Day money back guarantee.

Wlaszyn noted that "although the company has responded to some of the complaints brought to its attention, the Bureau's file also shows a pattern of no response to other complaints."

Secured Credit Cards

If you have no credit or a negative credit history, it can be difficult to obtain an unsecured credit card. But, what you may not know is that you may be able to qualify for a secured credit card, which can offer many of the same benefits as an unsecured card. A secured credit card is much like a secured loan. You are required to deposit money into a savings account or a certificate of deposit as collateral for a line of credit. The card has the same appearance as an unsecured card and can offer the same convenience and charging privileges as a traditional unsecured credit card.

While almost anyone can apply for a secured credit card, there are some limitations. Most issuers do not accept applicants that have been convicted of credit card fraud, have outstanding liens on their property, or are filing for bankruptcy.

Finding the best card for you requires research. You should determine what features are most important to your financial situation and spending style, measuring them against the costs associated with each offer. Factors such as application fees, annual fees, finance charges, accrued interest on the deposit, savings deposit, available line of credit and minimum savings deposit are some of the most important considerations.

In most cases, an application fee is required by the issuer,

which adds to the cost of obtaining a secured card. The fee is usually non-refundable, even if you're not accepted by the issuer. Once you're accepted for the card, you are required to make a deposit into a savings account or certificate of deposit as security. The average minimum deposit required can run around \$300. The amount of money you deposit should depend on your income and the line of credit desired. However, some issuers will offer credit the same or greater than the amount deposited; some others may offer a credit limit lower than the amount deposited.

Most issuers will pay you interest on your security deposit. The more money you wish to or are required to deposit, the more important it is to have a card that

offers respectable interest payments.

Like most secured credit cards, issuers of unsecured cards charge additional fees for use of the card and services associated with the card, such as, cash advances, late payment fees, and fees for charging over the limit or insufficient funds. Carefully review all information provided by the issuer to determine how and when such charges will be incurred.

If you wish to cancel your secured card, do so in writing. Credit card issuers have different policies concerning the amount of time before you receive your refund. Also, keep in mind that if you have an outstanding balance, most card issuers will use your security deposit to pay the remaining balance.

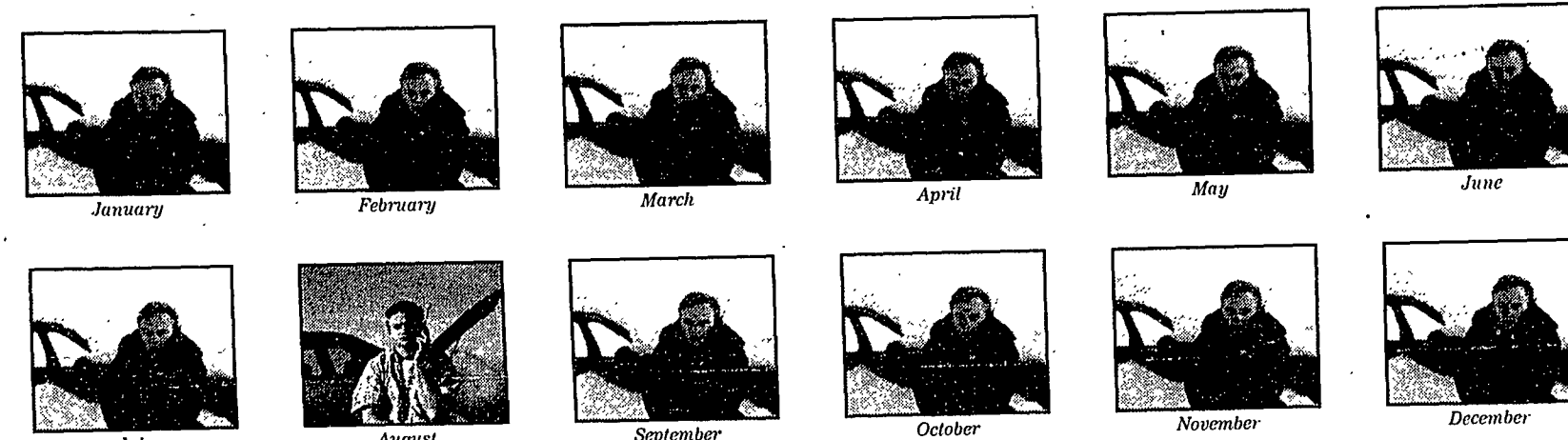

Taking care of tires in winter

A. Because air contracts in the cold, tires lose about one pound of pressure for every 10-degree drop in temperature. A tire properly inflated in warmer weather could be five pounds underinflated by midwinter.

Q. What are the dangers of im-

properly inflated tires?

A. When tires are underinflated or overinflated and you make an emergency stop, the tires are more likely to come off the rim. Overinflated tires reduce traction because the center is higher than the rest of the tire, making tires more prone to blowouts.

Q. How often should tire pres-

sure be checked?

A. Tire inflation is a do-it-

A grand opening celebration is planned for the spring. The library, however, will not move back to its permanent location for at least one year. Asian spice may help fight cancer

Anyone who has ever eaten Indian food has tasted the spice curcumin. Commonly known as curcumin, curcumin is not only used widely in Asia for cooking, but also to treat skin inflammations and ailments. Like many other common flavorings, including garlic, onions, parsley, and licorice, research studies are beginning to show preliminary evidence that curcumin, too, may have anti-cancer properties.

At the recent annual conference of the American Institute for Cancer Research, investigators summarized some small studies that have begun to experiment with curcumin's effect on skin, breast and colon cancers in laboratory animals and tissue samples: **Breast Cancer:** In a study with breast cancer cells, researchers at Pennsylvania State University found that curcumin may inhibit the activity of certain proteins that play a role in cancer development. This study is ongoing and has yet to identify other key factors that may interact in combinations with the curcumin to affect cell proliferation.

Skin cancer: Researchers at Chiang Mai University in Thailand found that mice treated with cur-

cumin before being exposed to carcinogens had significantly lower incidence of skin tumor formation and development than mice who did not receive the treatment. More research needs to be conducted in human.

Tissue Inflammation: Scientists from the State University of New Jersey found that curcumin suppressed inflammation caused by an enzyme called nitric oxide, which is produced by the body as an immune response to infections and to harmful substances. In this study, curcumin limited nitric oxide's effect to damage cells and possibly leading to cancer development.

Because a growing number of plant foods, including fruits, vegetables, grains and herbs, are being identified as having possible cancer-fighting substances, the American Institute for Cancer Research advises a wide variety of these foods every day. Homework assignments are for parents too

Study after study show that kids perform better in school when their parents share in their education. Yet many parents are not sure how to get involved.

The support and encouragement that kids need to succeed can begin at home, said Lisa Woessner, University of Illinois Extension youth development educator.

"Too many parents leave the responsibility of educating their children to the schools," Woessner said. "What they don't realize is that they too can heavily influence their children's attitudes about school and how well they do in the classroom."

Helping kids with homework is a good way to get involved, she suggested. One purpose of homework is to extend learning outside of class. Parents shouldn't do their child's homework for them, but they can help establish a homework routine.

Set a time each day that your child agrees upon to spend with studies. The child can choose the place. The after-dinner hours are typically the best time to study because children need time after school to unwind.

Many children will procrastinate doing their homework, so it helps to have an incentive plan. Yelling at children will not work. Instead, let the child know that you expect homework to be done, and the consequences if it is not done.

For example, say, "If you do all your homework, I will (take you to the park, play a game with you,

etc.) if you don't finish your homework, you will not be allowed to (watch T.V., play, etc.)."

Offer praise when children do what is expected of them.

Woessner provided these additional suggestions on helping children with homework:

Make sure your child has all the supplies he or she needs to complete assignments. Ask your child about the day's work in school.

Be available to answer questions and offer assistance, especially for children in grades 1-3.

Allow time for breaks.

Review the homework when it is finished.

Praise the things your child does well; don't dwell on shortcomings.

Help children learn where to find additional information, such as newspapers, magazines and books. Take children to the library to find new books on the topic of study.

Be persistent in your daily attention to your child's school work.

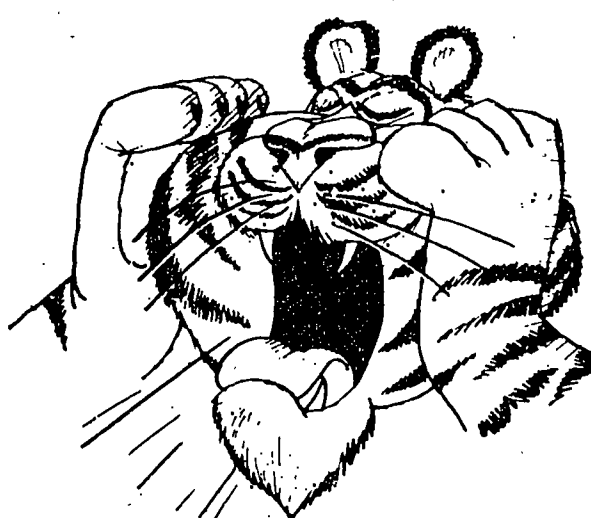
