Restaurants, schools cater to Hillary's 50th

"She doesn't look 50." That was the assessment of 11-year-old Joe Oliver, a sixth grader in Mrs. Warneke's class at the Field School in Park Ridge, when Hillary Rodham Clinton visited her alma mater on the day after her 50th birthday.

Oliver said that he and his classmates were excited and proud to have a 10-minute question-answer session with the First Lady in the school auditorium before she addressed the entire student body in the gym.

Clinton and her entourage of secret service and public relations people arrived at the school a little late at 9:45 a.m. after being greeted at O'Hare International Airport by the marching bands of three of the Park Ridge schools. Clinton attended in her youth, Lincoln Junior High, Maine East and Maine South.

"The hands of all the schools in Park Ridge did a fabulous job greeting her at the airport," said Mary Oliver, Joe's mom.

The 550 voices of the student body swelled to a crescendo as they sang "Happy Birthday" to their school's most famous graduate. Hanging in the gym were the portraits the fifth- and sixth-graders had made of Clinton as a special surprise on her 50th birthday.

Although Clinton was to have selected her favorite portrait from the group, she opted instead to take all of them back to the White House with her.

Niles Township District 219. Five candidates will vie for three vacancies in District 219. Incumbents are Sam Borek, Gail Stone and Robert Silverman. Challengers are Norman Ruber and Al Cohn. Terms will be for four years.

District 71. In Niles District 71, five candidates are competing for four school board vacancies. Terms are for four years.

Incumbents running are Clifford Drexler, John Lombardi and Veronica Meyer. Challengers are Sandra Marchisotta and Mary Krueger.

Barney Namovic is stepping down from his position on the board and will not run again.

Maine Township District 207.

Four four-year terms will be filled in the upcoming school board election in district 207.

The three incumbents running are Iris Friedlieb, Ralph M. Johnson and Oscar Marquis. Challengers are Jeffrey Bergen, Arturo Ramirez and Helen J. Nichols.

District 63. Five vacancies, four four-year terms and a two-year term, are waiting to be filled in District 63. So far, only three candidates, all of whom are incumbents, are running. They are Nancy Morten, Karen Dimond and Jane Wojcikiewicz.

The other two vacancies will likely be filled by write-in candidates from among the four candidates whose names were stricken from the ballot because of filing problems, according to Mike Johann, secretary to the Board of Education.

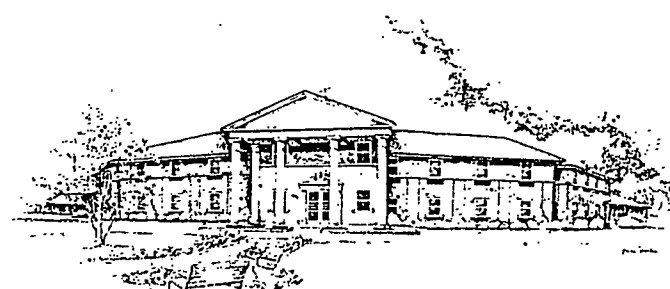

Edward Jones: Winners are Consistent

Look at successful people, and you'll find that many of them share an important trait: consistency.

Take race car drivers, for example. A road race lasts a long time, and the lead changes. Lap records and daring moves are common. Some drivers grab for heroics, but the winners know they must finish the race. Winners may not be in front through the whole race, but they know consistency will get them to the finish line first.

This is the benefit of consistency and professional management. Not only has the managed portfolio significantly outpaced the MSCI World Index over time,

it has shown more buoyancy during the down years.

The only guarantee offered by the stock market is that it will fluctuate. Investing, like road racing, is a long challenge. During the race, there are changes in leadership. But professional management can help reduce the risk of fluctuation, improve consistency over the long haul and enable you to come out a winner.

Saturday refuse and construction debris drop-off

Attention residents! Now is your chance to get rid of construction debris and old tires. The Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) has instituted a special residential refuse and construction debris drop-off center at the Wheeling Township Transfer Station in Glenview. This pilot program will run every Saturday through November 22 from 6 a.m. until noon. The fees are \$25 for a 1/2 ton of material or less, \$50 for anything over 1/2 ton up to one ton and \$50 per ton for all materials over one ton. There will be a \$3 charge for each tire brought to the transfer station. Cash or checks will not be accepted but all major credit cards will be accepted. This program was instituted in response to numerous phone calls received by SWANCC asking for this type of service. It is expected to be a very popular program.

ARE YOU O.K.?

The "Are You O.K.?" telephone reassurance program is a free service for seniors or disabled individuals who live in Morton Grove. The program is a telephone system that makes daily calls to a subscriber's home each day at a time that is chosen by the subscriber. If the subscriber is okay, he/she simply hangs up the telephone after hearing a pre-recorded message. If the subscriber does not answer or if the telephone line is busy, three more attempts will be made before the system activates an alert report. At that point, police dispatchers will contact either a neighbor who has previously agreed to assist, or police personnel. RTA REDUCED FARE CARD

As many senior travelers are aware the RTA is revamping their Reduced Fare Cards and riders now must reapply for new cards even when old cards have not yet expired. The Morton Grove Village Hall Senior Center is a distribution point for the RTA Reduced Fare Card any weekday morning between 9 a.m. and 12 noon. The card provides a half fare discount on the CTA, Metra or Pace transit systems. Individuals must be age 65+ and bring in a driver's license or Illinois identification card, plus a current color 1-1/2" by 1-1/2" photograph. ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Morton Grove residents age 65+ or those receiving Social Security Disability benefits who live west of Harlem Avenue can call Maine Township General Assistance (297-2510) and those who live east of Harlem in Niles Township can call CEDA Neighbors At Work (328-5166) for information about the Low Income Energy Assistance Partnership Program. This program offers assistance in paying heating costs for home owners or renters this winter. To be eligible, a household's gross income must be less than \$822 per month (one person); less than \$1,106 (couple); less than \$1,390 (three people); less than \$1,674 (four people); less than \$1,958 (five people); etc.

FLU & PNEUMONIA IMMUNIZATIONS

The Morton Grove Village Hall Senior Center will provide influenza and pneumonia immunizations for residents over age 60. The cost of the shots are free for those whose primary insurance is Medicare Part B. Patients who are enrolled in an HMO or who do not subscribe to Medicare Part B must pay \$10 for the flu shot and \$15 for the pneumonia shot.

Influenza immunizations provide immunity to the most commonly predicted flu strains for this winter. Seniors should get a flu shot each year. Pneumonia immunizations provide lifelong immunity to the most common forms of pneumonia. People who have already received this immunization do not need another one. You should not be immunized if you are:

- 1) allergic to chicken, chicken feathers or eggs,
- 2) on a prescription blood thinner (coumadin, warfarin, panwarfarin, etc.),
- 3) allergic to thimerosal (mercurial antiseptic) or aminoglycosides (gentamicin, kanamycin or neomycin),
- 4) someone who has ever suffered from the illness known as Guillain-Barre Syndrome, or
- 5) someone who has cold symptoms the day of their shot.

Shots will be administered in a "needle-free" system by Evanston Northwestern Healthcare. Those interested in a shot on the dates below must make a reservation by calling the Senior Hot Line at 470-5223.

- Saturday, Nov. 1: 9 a.m. to noon
- Thursday, Nov. 13: 2 to 5 p.m.

CHOLESTEROL SCREENING

Cholesterol is a soft, fat-like substance found in every cell in the body. Most of the body's cholesterol is made in the liver, the rest comes from animal fat in foods. Egg yolks, meat, poultry, and dairy products all contain cholesterol. Everyone needs some cholesterol, but not too much. Eating foods low in animal fat is one of the best ways to lower cholesterol. Cholesterol screenings will be offered from 9 to 11 a.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 4 in the Morton Grove Village Hall Senior Center. The quick and simple test will give an accurate total blood cholesterol measurement in just three minutes. For Morton Grove seniors (age 65+) there is a charge of \$3. For those under 65, or for non-residents, the charge is \$4.

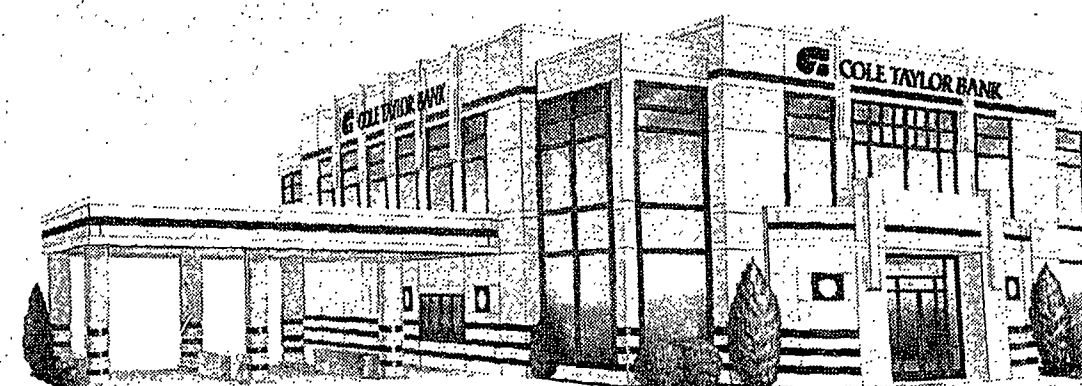

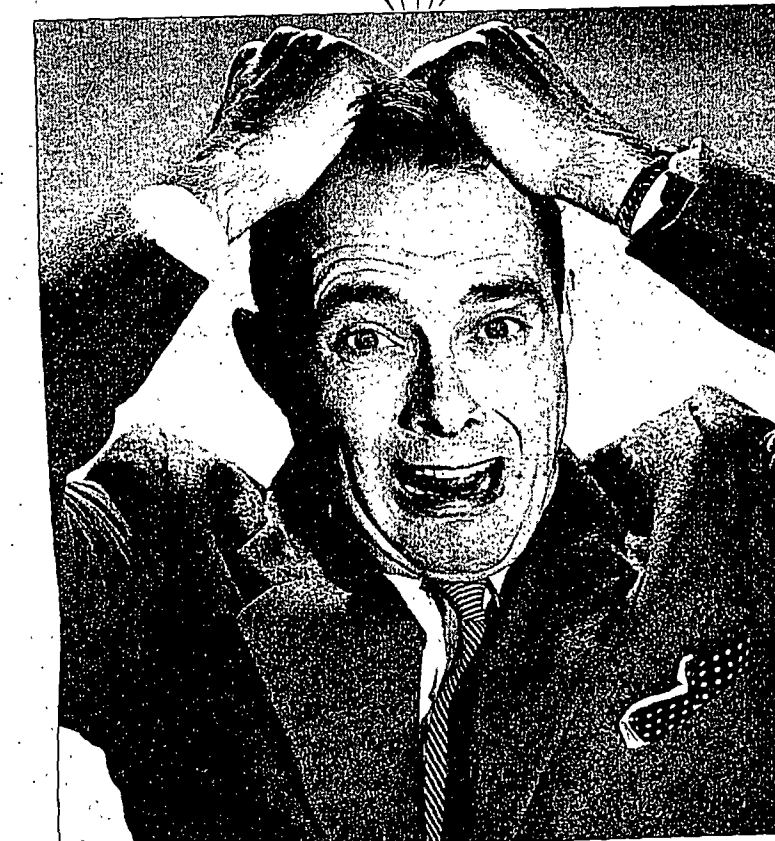

Writing skills and original thinking are important criteria considered by the judges. They also look for fresh, feasible, constructive and well-supported ideas, along with spelling, thought organization, punctuation and grammar.

Scholarships totaling \$7,000 will be awarded to the 10 students

whose essays best respond to the topic. First and second prizes will be \$2,000 and \$1,000 scholarships. Each of the eight remaining winners will receive \$500. Since the contest originated, nearly 30,000 students have participated and more than \$169,000 in scholarship money has been awarded by the AAA-Chicago Motor Club.

Previous contests have addressed many traffic safety issues including drunk driving, speed limits, legal driving age, driver education and new legislation. An official entry form must accompany each essay which should contain approximately 500 words and be postmarked no later than Dec. 31, 1997.

Contest rules and entry forms are available at most Illinois high schools, AAA-CMC branch offices or from Seminar Headquarters: AAA-Chicago Motor Club, P.O. Box 5027, Des Plaines, IL 60017-5027. The scholarship awards will be presented to the winners in early May, 1998, at the annual awards luncheon of the Illinois Editors' Traffic Safety Seminar.

tended the 50th birthday party at Chicago's Cultural Center.

Between 1981 and 1996 daily newspapers in the U.S. have decreased from 1,730 to 1,520. Morning papers have increased from 469 to 686. Three out of five newspaper readers are adults while younger people read less. This trend has continued for the past century. Three out of four 16 to 19 year olds read a newspaper at least once a week. The trend down the road is older people will be reading newspapers more than anybody else.

The United States has 1.7 million prisoners behind bars. It is six to ten times more than any other western industrialized nation.

Coca Cola is experimenting with an aluminum can which is a contour can whose shape and design evoke the classic glass bottle. Unveiled in Terre Haute, Indiana, where the original bottle was introduced in 1915, Coke's Sprite can is a bubble can with dimples on its sides resembling the glass bottle. Silver streaks running diagonally down the sides of the can suggest the can's contents are bursting out with effervescence. Future cans are being designed, not only that they be marketable, but that they be consumed. Future cans will have holograms (3-dimensional) designs, liquid crystal displays with micro-processor - twinkling and

One-half of 1.6 million nursing home patients are Alzheimer patients or have other forms of dementia. Memory is the initial loss of these patients and then loss of comprehension and use of language.

More than 17,100 people died in alcohol-related vehicle accidents last year. It caused about 41% of all traffic deaths.

Studies show 600 such deaths could be avoided by lowering blood-alcohol content to 0.8% limit. Illinois is already at the limit.

There is a major difference between 5 drinks of 12 ounce beers or 5 ounces of wine per hour compared to 4 drinks per hour for a 170 pound man on an empty stomach. A 137 pound woman would reach the 0.8% level after 3 drinks per hour.

Nine percent of deaths involved drivers with less than 0.10% limit. By the year 2,000 states not lowering their alcohol limit to the 0.8% will risk losing a portion of their federal highway tax moneys. This tactic was used in 1984 when the national minimum drinking age was adopted and in 1995 when it was illegal for anyone under the legal drinking age to drive with measurable amounts of alcohol in their bodies.

Wearing a gray pantsuit, Clinton told the students that she was happy and honored to be back home. She said the school looked good, but she wondered what had become of an underground bike rack she remembered using when she was a Field student, according to Joe Oliver.

A special highlight of Clinton's visit was a reunion with her second grade teacher, Mrs. King. Other former teachers were also in attendance.

"I was really excited," Joe Oliver said. "She's really nice, acts like a normal person," he added. "She was making jokes. She was funny."

Clinton remained at the school until about 11:45 a.m. when she left to visit her old home at Wisner and Elm Streets. By that time, the Field students were ready for lunch, the most memorable lunch of their school days because dessert was provided by the wife of the President of the United States.

Slices of a large chocolate cake with white frosting and red and blue sugar stars were served to each Field School student to cap off the very momentous morning when Hillary Rodham Clinton came back to school.

Meanwhile, over at Booby's, 8161 Milwaukee Ave., and Riggio's, Oakton Street and Milwaukee Avenue, owners and staff members were busy packing up their delivery vans with the favorite orders Clinton remembered enjoying at the restaurants when she was a young Park Ridge resident.

Both restaurants made two deliveries each to the three luxury buses that were parked near the First United Methodist Church of Park Ridge, 418 Touhy Ave. The First Lady and her guests, many of her childhood Park Ridge friends, had their lunch on the bus to save time in the busy schedule planned for Clinton's visit.

"We invited them here, but they said they didn't have enough time," said Steve Protofanousis, one of the owners of Booby's. "They are on the bus on their way downtown," he added.

Booby's supplied 30 of their famous steak sandwiches, 25 hamburgers, 25 hot dogs, 20 orders each of french fries and onion rings, several cases of Coke, 7-Up and Diet Coke and Clinton's favorite, 15 to 20 chocolate shakes.

Add to that the 32 sausage and vegetable pizzas delivered by Riggio's Tony Riggio and manager Ron Sundh, and Clinton's party had enough food to feed about 200 people, according to Andy Vinieratos, Booby's other owner.

"It was a lot of fun doing the deliveries," Sundh said. "It was really nice how she went up and talked to Tony (Riggio) and the people from Booby's and shook their hands and thanked them," Sundh added.

Protofanousis, however, was one up on everyone because, "I kissed her Happy Birthday." Later, on the second trip, Sally Friedman, Booby's former owner and present cashier went along and gave the First Lady another birthday kiss.

"She actually remembered me," Friedman said. "Someone asked her if she knew who I was, and she said, 'That's Mrs. Friedman from Booby's,'" Friedman said.

Friedman said she also got to speak with Clinton's mother and two brothers who were also among Clinton's birthday luncheon guests.

Daley and his brother, Secretary of Commerce Bill Daley.

"It was a fabulous party," Friedman bubbled. "There was entertainment on every level, and more food than you could shake a stick at."

A jazz band played on the first level, Harry Carey and "a bunch of baseball players sang Happy Birthday to her," and the Gentlemen of Distinction, a dance band Friedman described as excellent, entertained on another level.

Friedman said there was champagne and wine. On the fourth floor a "Kind of Taste of Chicago" was set up. Friedman said where restaurants supplied samples of their finest fare for the First Family and their guests.

But the nicest part of the day to Friedman was meeting Clinton while delivering the food. "She came out and kissed us and thanked us," Friedman said. "She was so gracious."

Riggio, too, described Clinton's birthday bash at the Cultural Center as wonderful. He loved the beautiful GAR room where the speeches were presented and praised the outstanding refurbishment of the Cultural Center.

"It was very gracious," Riggio said. "The Mayor and Maggie Daley—everybody was just glowing," he said.

Speaking of gracious, it appears that one party was not enough to thank her hosts. They were all invited to a second party Tuesday afternoon at Lino's Restaurant on Ontario Street in downtown Chicago.

In the words of Tony Riggio, "They gave her a wonderful 50th Birthday." And at press time, it looks like the party's not over yet. Happy 50th, Hillary!

Heating Without Getting Burned. With the fall and winter seasons fast approaching, the Morton Grove Fire Department would like to remind residents about several heating tips. Most home heating fires involve portable heaters and space heaters. Room gas heaters and kerosene heaters account for the highest risk of fatalities in home heating related fires. But all heating systems including fireplaces, can be dangerous if they are not used and maintained properly. Remember, all portable heating equipment should bear the label of an independent testing laboratory, indicating the heater has met basic safety standards.

Tip #1 Give Space Heaters Space: Keep all combustible materials away from portable and space heaters. Place all space heaters at least three feet away from furniture, walls, curtains, or anything else that burns. Turn off space heaters when you leave home or go to bed.

Tip #2 Electric Heaters: Inspect electric heater cords for cracks or other damage and have an electrician replace frayed, cracked, or damaged cords. If the cord overheats while the unit is in

use, have the heater inspected and serviced.

Tip #3 Fireplaces: When you use your fireplace, protect your home from sparks by using a fire screen made of sturdy metal or heat tempered glass. Burn only seasoned wood, never rubbish, in your fireplace. Be sure dampers are in working order and never leave fires unattended, especially in an area used by children or pets.

Tip #4 Central Heating Systems: Statistically, central heating systems are less likely than portable or space heaters to cause home fires, however, neglect can dramatically increase the risk to your home. Have your furnace, chimneys, and chimney connections inspected and serviced at least once a year by a qualified professional. Never store combustible materials near a furnace and be sure that installation and automatic shut-off systems conform to local codes and are in good working order.

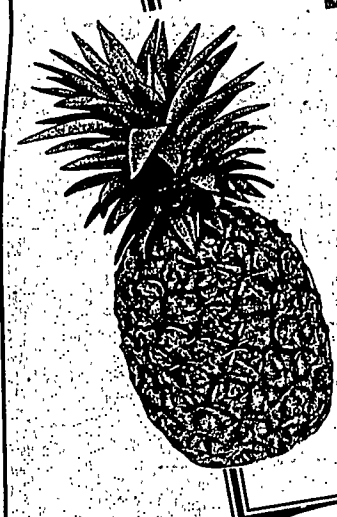

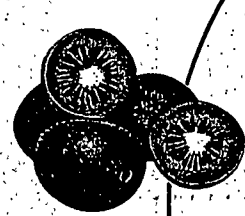

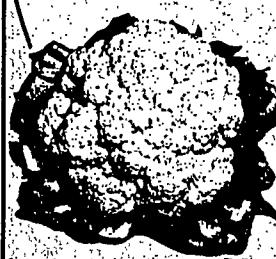
