

So when your feet hurt, listen to them. Don't just accept foot pain as a fact of life. In patients with diabetes, poor circulation, abnormal sensation or a compromised immune system this message takes on even greater significance. Are your feet killing you? Then do something about it!

Customer Choice and Rate Relief Act of 1997. This new law will reduce electric rates for consumers across the state and finally bring competition to Illinois' electric industry. Under the law, rates for resi-

dential customers of Commonwealth Edison and Illinois Power,

the state's largest and most expensive utilities, will be reduced by a total of 20 percent, 15 percent this August and an additional 5 percent cut in May 2002 -- the largest rate reduction anywhere in the nation. Residential customers of other utilities will see total savings of at least 5 percent off today's rates.

But that's not all. Along with ordering the largest rate cut in the nation, the legislation will open up Illinois' electric industry to competition, a change that should lower rates even further in years to come. March gas costs continue to be lower than last year




Although the March GSC is somewhat higher than last month, mild weather has helped to keep gas prices down.






The city could not force him to leave because the law does not require the office to be vacated until the official is sentenced," Dudycz said. "Because court appeals can drag on and delay sentencing, it could be that these convicted criminals, in their role as public officials, will be making important decisions and receiving taxpayer dollars through the public payroll."

Dudycz says Senate Bill 1225 will affect all elected officeholders in the judicial, legislative and executive branches of city, county and state government.

Senate Bill 1225 now moves to the House of Representatives for further consideration.
