Sizing up your estate

Leaving something to the kids...it's a time-honored tradition and one that just might get a little easier, thanks to a provision in the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997. The Illinois CPA Society reports that the Act gradually increases the amount of assets that is exempt from gift and estate taxes. For 1998, the unified gift and estate tax credit exempts the first \$625,000 (up from \$600,000 first established in 1976) in assets that are subject to estate or gift taxes; that amount will increase each year until it reaches \$1 million in 2006.

While increases in the unified credit allow taxpayers to transfer more property free of estate and gift taxes, the need for estate planning remains strong. Since many people accumulate a large estate without realizing it, CPAs recommend that you periodically calculate its net value.

Take it easy when reintroducing plants to the great outdoors. Sunburn of foliage commonly occurs when plants are brought into intense light too quickly. After all danger of frost has passed, acclimate overwintered plants gradually. Give them a few days in an intermediate zone, like a covered porch or under a tree canopy, before moving into full sun.

Spring is a good time to see if plants are potbound. Are plants wilting, do they have poor color. are leaves dropping? Lay the pot on its side and gently tap it out of its pot. Are the roots crowded, or even growing through drainage holes? If so, it's time to repot. Your garden center is a great source of colorful and practical containers, as well as potting soil mixes and fertilizers. Those items, and these overwintering suggestions, are about all your plant needs to look great going into spring.







The 1998-99 budget was approved 4-1 with one abstention by member Leon Finkel who was attending his first meeting. The lone opposing vote came from board member Joe Weiss who has perennially taken issue with the teacher and administrative salaries paid by the district.



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
